Loan of \$680,000,000 to Be Offered to Provide Work in Smaller Depressed Countries With Prospect That Larger Ones Will Derive Direct and Immediate Benefit

PARIS, Nov. 16:-Formation of a tripartite economic consortium among France, Germany and Great Britain was announced today by Raymond Patenotre, Under Secretary for National Economy. The first project will be the offering of a seventeen billion franc loan for the electrification of railways in Poland, Roumania, Iraq and Portugal. The sum is equivalent to upproximately \$680,000,000.
