LONDON IS TALKING OF AN ELECTION SOON

WEEKLY STEAMSHIP SERVICE BETWEEN VANCOUVER AND SAN FRANCISCO

British Conservatives are Meeting to Discuss the Political Situation

LONDON, Oct. 16.—Conservative members of the coalition government have been summoned to meet today to decide whether they shall continue to support the coalition under the leadership of Lloyd George. The meeting has been called by Austen Chamberlain, Lord of the Privy Seal and leader of the government in the House of Commons.

It is believed that Mr. Chamberlain will be backed by Earl Balfour, Lord Birkenhead (formerly Sir Max Aiken of Manitoba), and Sir Thomas Horne in his adherence to the Premier, but the attitude of several others is regarded as more than doubtful.

GETTING OUT RAILWAY TIES

Ninety Men Already Employed But No Contract Yet Let

O. Hanson, of the Hanson Tie Company, stated today that while tenders had been called by the Canadian National railways for the cutting of 1,600,000 railway ties on the line adjacent to Prince Rupert, no definite orders had yet been received from the C.N. Tie Agent in Toronto as to the exact number each tie contractor would be called upon to get out. However, he had received assurance that orders for ties would be forthcoming in the near future, and already some ninety men are employed cutting ties at Priestly, Priestly Spur, and Sheraton, west of Endako, Mr. Hanson anticipates a busier season this year in connection with the tie contracts in Northern B.C. than the case last year.

All the logging contractors are now getting busy up the line east of Terrace.

Settlers Busy

One of the conditions of the tie contracts is that all the ties to be taken out must be bought in by the contractors. This will mean that practically at every station someone will be occupied on this work.

The total number of ties called for by the Canadian National railway this season on the G.T.P. line west of Lucerne amounts to 4,600,000.

PASSENGERS OF STEAMER LAND

Investigation Into Cause of Burning of City of Honolulu is to be Made

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 16.—The transport Thomas, bearing the crew and passengers of the burned steamer, City of Honolulu, arrive in Los Angeles early this morning. The passengers await the usual health inspection before being permitted to come ashore.

The federal board is to investigate the burning of the steamer and the members are also expected to interview the passengers before permitting them to land.

KILLED BY LANDSLIDE AT BRITANNIA BEACH

YANCOUVER, Oct. 16.—R. Tanaguchi, Japanese, was killed yesterday in a landslide which occurred at Britannia Beach. The property damage from the slide was slight.

FINED FOR WORKING OVER EIGHT HOURS AT PREMIER MINE

Five Men Prosecuted Under Laws of Province for Breaking Provisions of Eight Hour Law.

STEWART, Oct. 16.—On Saturday before John Conway, D. V., Thornton, J. M. Walker, and W. Slack, blacksmiths and J. Cameron and W. Boyd, millmen, were each fined ten dollars and two dollars cost of the court for working more than eight hours a day contrary to the provisions of the Mining laws of the province. The offense took place at the Premier mine on October 30.

Evidence as to the offense was given by T. J. Shenton, mining inspector and Dale Pitt, manager of the mine was heard in defense. Magistrate Conway in fining the men said that the laws of the province must be respected. It was the duty of the inspector to bring these prosecutions.

The only men who are allowed to work around a mine more than eight hours a day are the bunk house, mess house and office employees.

LIGHT AND POWER COMPANY FORMED AT STEWART AND HYDER

Concern is Capitalized at \$100,000 and Will Supply Two Towns

A company has been incorporated with head offices at Stewart, B.C. for the purpose of carrying on business as a public utility and water company to supply Stewart and Hyder and adjacent districts with light, power, water and telephone services and to carry on a lumber business. The new company is capitalized at \$100,000.

ARMED RAIDS INDIAN GANGS

Sniping and Ambushes Common on Frontier of Country

PESHAWAR, India, Oct. 16.—The efforts of police and military forces have not yet effected any perceptible decrease in the number of armed raids in the northwestern frontier districts, which occurred with unusual frequency during the past few months.

A late report tells of a bullet battle between a party of police and a raiding gang in the Bannu district. The police, only eight in number, formed a detachment of a larger party which was searching in the Maidangi range of hills for outlaws known to be hiding there. This detached party was ambushed in a defile by the raiding gang and had two of its number killed and its leader severely wounded almost at the first volley.

Opened Fire

The remaining constables opened fire on their attackers at once, although without cover of any sort. Later they withdrew, one by one, to some water holes about 100 yards away which afforded partial cover. From this position they kept their opponents at bay for three hours. Finally, when ammunition was nearly exhausted, the raiders, fearing the arrival of other parties of police and villagers, drew off. This enabled the police to recover the bodies, arms and equipment of their dead comrades, and to carry their wounded leader to the hospital at Issa Khel, where he died the next day.

The tale of sniping incidents, ambushes and attacks on convoys, which the present occupation of the Mahsud country has not terminated, is a long one. Regular troops, with specialized training, have not yet been able to overawe the raiders or to prevent them from carrying out their long established vocation. The raiders' chances of success are greatly enhanced when they descend to the plains after passing un molested through the area of military occupation. In the plains they have to fear only the opposition of partly armed villagers, and pursuit later by such forces of villagers and police as can be hurriedly mobilized. Every advantage lies on the side of the pursued.

Additional Forces

Additional forces of police and constabulary are now being drafted into the Dera Ismail Khan district, and all possible steps are being taken to confine raiding gangs to their own country by adding to the risks they must take in coming across the border.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.—The Pacific Coast League pennant for 1922 comes to San Francisco this year. PEOPLE ARE THINKING OF CIVIC ELECTIONS

One Candidate For Mayorality is Announced and Others Spoken of

During the past week or so there has been a good deal of talk about possible candidates for the forthcoming civil elections and more particularly for the mayorality. Already S. M. Newton has intimated that he would be in the field, his particular civic policy being to secure in investigation into the Booth School construction. No others have yet stated their intentions but names mentioned on the street very frequently are Aldermen Dybbavn, Montgomery and Kerr, Police Commissioner Macdonald, W. E. Williams, E. C. Gibbons, C. H. Orme, and the present mayor.

While it has been understood that Mayor Rochester was not anxious for a third term and he so stated on more than one occasion, yet there are those who think that if pressure was brought to bear he could be induced to undertake a third term.

The difficulty in securing suitable candidates is that those who are most capable and who would make good officials, are the ones who feel that they cannot afford to neglect their businesses for a year or two in order to serve the public. The \$1,500 a year salary is not enough for a man of mayoralty calibre to live on and to keep up the dignity of his office, especially when election expenses have to come out of it. In order to undertake it private business has to be neglected and all business people know that once a business begins to lose money it can do so a lot faster than \$1,500 a year.

Canadian Government Vessels get Contract to Carry all Fruit from California to British Columbia

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.—The agents of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine here announce the establishment of an augmented steamship service between California and Vancouver, B.C., in the near future. There are to be weekly sailings instead of the present ten day schedule.

A contract is signed by the Canadian Government line with the fruit importers of Vancouver whereby all citrus fruits sent from California to Canada are to be shipped on the steamers of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine.

NO ONE TO BLAME FOR DEATH OF GUST LEAF PREMIER MINE ACCIDENT

STEWART, Oct. 16.—At the inquest into the death of Gust Leaf at the Premier mine before John Conway, coroner, the evidence showed that Leaf with five other men went down in the cage to the 300 foot level and on alighting the others went off to their work. One returned for his tools just in time to see the man pinned between the descending cage and the guard. No one saw the accident happen. There were men in the descending cage but they could see nothing. The cage was lifted off the injured man and it was found that life was extinct.

There was no need for the man to have been where he was and no one was to blame for the accident. The jury brought in a verdict of accidental death with no one to blame.

The funeral of the deceased, who was 35 years of age, took place on the afternoon of the 12th following the inquest.

BRITAIN NOT AGREEABLE TO SEARCH RIGHT

Communication Received in Washington Today Objects to Reciprocal Proposal

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Great Britain in a communication delivered today to the state department declines to agree to the suggestion of Secretary Hughes for the extension of the right to search and seize vessels of either nation so as to give the America prohibition navy jurisdiction outside the three mile limit.

BEST YEAR CANADA HAS EVER YET HAD

Crops Turning Out Well Says Bank of Montreal Report

Taken as a whole, the present year is one of the best that Canada has ever experienced as regards the quantity and quality of the crops, says the Bank of Montreal report. In the Prairie Provinces the yield of wheat is estimated to be close upon 380,000,000 bushels or some 100,000,000 bushels larger than last year and yields of other grains are proportionately greater. Most of the grain is grading high. The Province of Ontario probably never had a more splendid crop than this year. The average has now been considerably exceeded in practically every class of agricultural produce. Heavy crops have also been garnered in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. British Columbia suffered from drought in the early part of the season.

COMING HERE INVESTIGATE LIQUOR SALE

POLITICS TODAY IN AUSTRALIA

General Election in December Looks Bad For Present Government

LONDON, Oct. 16 (Canadian Press).—Several factors promise to lead to the forthcoming general elections in the Commonwealth of Australia an unusual degree of interest. One is the newly risen enmity between the Prime Minister, Rt. Hon. W. M. Hughes, and the leaders of the country, or Farmers' party which has hitherto proved a more or less docile supporter of the nationalist minority; another is the growing sentiment in the Liberal wing of the Nationalist party in favor of a reversion to pure Liberalism; and a third is the operation of a redistribution measure which may have an important bearing on the composition of the new parliament.

Great Differences In the present parliament the state of parties, excluding the Nationalist Speaker, Sir Elliot Johnson, is: Nationalists, 37; Country party 13; Labor 24. It will be seen, therefore, that even including the Speaker, Mr. Hughes has only a clear majority of one over the other two parties. In reality, however, his position has been much more secure than the figures would suggest. There is not a shadow of cominunity of interest between the low tariff Country party and the high protectionist Labor party; between the representative of the rural producer and the spokesman of the Trades Hall, with his dream of a rural workers' trade union and the introduction of an eight-hour day and a fixed minimum wage for farm laborers; and Mr. Hughes, master tactician as he is, has adroitly contrived to accentuate the breach between the two parties, with the result that they have invariably been found on opposite sides of the Chair in times of crisis.

Angry Scenes But the outlook is changing. The present session, the last of the present parliament, has been marked by angry scenes between Mr. Hughes and the leaders of the Country party and in one division the prime minister found the entire party ranged with Labor against him. Indeed it was only by a chance majority of one vote that the ministry managed to escape defeat. The quarrel began during the last session with some trenchant criticism by the Country party leader, Dr. Earle Page, of the ministry's financial policy, particularly its failure to effect the requisite measure of economy. Mr. Hughes, ever impatient of criticism, replied in a speech unhappily tinged with stinging personalities and from that point the controversy was waged with increasing bitterness.

Troubled Water Truth to tell, Mr. Hughes, having held office as Prime Minister for the record term of seven years, finds himself in troubled water. It is not his old Labor enemies who will be his most formidable opponents in the coming fight, for Labor was rarely at a lower ebb; it is a combination of city and rural business interests, the latter represented by the Liberal wing of the Nationalists, who fused with the conscriptionist Laborites in 1917 to form a new party that has held the reins of government ever since. Among the Liberals in parliament and among the wealthy organizations which support them outside there is a growing sentiment in favor of a breakaway from the Nationalist cause, a reversion to Liberalism; and a consequent renunciation of those Labor principles which were embodied in the Nationalist platform as part of a scheme of compromise at the time of the fusion. Mr. Watt has frankly declared that he favors such a policy and should the election give an indeterminate state of parties, a fusion between the Liberals and the Country party and the ousting of Mr. Hughes and his erstwhile Labor followers are not beyond the realms of probability.

PSYCHOLOGY AND BASEBALL

New Manager Put Pop into
Pittsburg Pirates With
Good Result

PITTSBURG, Oct. 16.—Des-
pite the fact that the Pittsburg
Pirates failed to wrest the Na-
tional league pennant from the
New York Giants, local fandom
is in a distinctly different mood
to what it was a year ago today.

In 1921, Manager Gibson's
warriors came down the home
stretch with a commanding lead
—and then blew up with a re-
port that was heard throughout
organized baseball. Pennant
hopes faded away with the
Giants' rush, and local support-
ers gave vigorous vent to their
disappointment.

Gibson got away poorly this
year. A change of managers
resulted. From the week that
Bill McKechnie became skipper,
distinct improvement was noted.
From the middle of July, Pitts-
burg played like a champion-
ship team and records show
that the Corsairs made the
greatest record in the league
from the turning point.

Look to Next Year
The Giants' lead was too
much, however, and local fans
must wait another year. And
they are, seemingly, confident
that 1923 will be the scene of
triumphs such as were record-
ed at Forbes Field when Fred
Clarke's men became champions
of the world.

For the past six weeks, the
Pirates have been leading the
league in team hitting. The
pitching has been superb, with
shout victories anything but
rare. The fielding has been equi-
ally as spectacular.

McKechnie intends to start
next season with his present
line-up and pitching staff.
"Why break up a champion-
ship team," he asked. "Would
you trade our outfield for any
in the business, or our pitching
staff for any corps in either
league?" Is there a better
catcher than Schmidt or a
nightier infielder—on offense or
defense—than Grimm, Tierney,
Maranville and Traynor?

Change in Pirates
Local writers and grandstand
experts have advanced many
theories for the remarkable
change that came over the Pir-
ates after McKechnie took
charge. Some give the manager
all the credit. Others insist
that the pitching staff did it—
after catcher Schmidt was
brought back to the fold and given
charge of the hurlers. Another
faction credits a lion's share to
Reb Russell, mighty slugger, who
was brought from Minne-
apolis by Skipper Mac.

Conservative followers of the
Pirates have been willing to
admit that the individuals re-
ferred to have all contributed
their share, but they point out
that it was McKechnie who pat-
ched up the Schmidt trouble and
McKechnie who added Russell's
42 centimeter bat to the avail-
able artillery. Players them-
selves have aired their views.

"This psychology stuff may be
called the bunk by some, but
I'm for it," said one of the
veterans. "We looked like hums
when McKechnie took hold. Then

we start out and break the sea-
son's record for consecutive vic-
tories. How do you explain it?
Easy—

"Schmitt comes back to take
the kid catchers in hand and in
a few days he has the pitchers
believing they can't lose. Rus-
sell blows in and gets hit by the
home run bug. Tierney goes on
a rampage and boosts his batt-
ing average to .370. Higbee
blows himself to a similar aver-
age. Max Carey and Rabbit
Maranville, the two real cozs of
the outfit, have their greatest
season. Grimm and Traynor
prove they are really wonderful
fielders despite their hard luck
with the bat. It was psychology
that made us win.

LADY DOCTOR TALKS ON CHILD FEEDING

Children Should Not be Punished Over Food, But Should be Expected to Eat

LONDON, Oct. 16.—"A child who leads a healthy life, has a wholesome diet, no food between meals, and who has been taught to masticate, is not in any great danger of over-eating," said Dr. Margaret Grace Thackrah, lecturing at the Food Exhibition at Olympia.

All the strain in connection with school examinations came when rapid physical and emotional development was taking place, she said. One way to guard against mishap was by good feeding. Many healthy boys of twelve and thirteen ate as much as an average man, and from fourteen to nineteen they ate more. In consideration of the large part which athletics played in the life of boys and girls, it was important that school authorities should pay special attention to sufficient diet.

Regarding the inordinate liking for sugar on the part of most children, the lecturer advocated the old-fashioned plan of giving a child a weekly income of one penny or twopenny, and allowing him to spend it, if he wished, on sweets. Then he would hardly manage to poison himself with carbohydrates, and would get a correct idea of the place of sweets in life's economy.

Select With Care
Scoldings and punishments in connection with food should be rigorously avoided, and there should never be a forcing of food down with reprimands, for that way lay nervous indigestion. A child's food should be selected with care, but young children should not be asked to choose their food; they should take what was prepared without questioning. Special treats should be left to such external agents as uncles, aunts, and Christmas parties.

Doubtless the simple-minded person in the Garden of Eden when he was hungry stretched out his hand and plucked the fruits of the earth, but to-day the really simple-minded person went into the first eating house he saw, ordered the first thing on the menu, and was lucky if it were not frozen meat and tinned apricots. The Tree of Knowledge had made us too clever by half; it had taught us to tin our food, to freeze it, dry it, and preserve it in all kinds of wonderful ways, and we had, incidentally, managed to invent quite a number of diseases.

SHOCKS INDICATE WATER AND OIL IS BENEATH SURFACE

Girl in Venice Able to do Profitable and Pleasant Work

ROME, Oct. 14.—Augusta Del Pio Luogo, a beautiful young girl of Venice, is looking forward to a period of profitable and pleasant employment. Italy is particularly interested just now in two things, the location of petroleum, for all the world wants oil, and the finding of water, for the drought of the past two summers is said to be but the beginning of a long dry spell. To Augusta Del Pio Luogo is ascribed the ability to locate the deposit, within the earth, of both oil and water, and her successes have been so remarkable that her services are being sought by companies interested in oil production and irrigation.

Augusta first noticed her ability when a child. When walking in the country she would notice little shocks passing from her feet to her head, causing her distinct pain. In 1909 she met a famous water diviner, Chiabrera, and found that his divining rod acted as well for her as it did for him. A year later she went to Argentine and, making use of her powers, indicated a number of places where water would be found, sometimes at a depth of 600 feet. In each case water was found, but in some instances it turned out to be salt.

Back in Italy after the war Augusta, in the presence of two engineers, has located not only water, but petroleum and deposits of pyrites. She no longer uses the divining rod, but a chronometer. It is said that this equipped she can tell with remarkable accuracy the depth at which the water will be discovered, and whether it is scanty or abundant.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

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PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by accident on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918, when such pre-emptions were made.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
