# FISHERMEN MAROONED ON COCOS ID.

## ULSTER HAS HECTIC DAY DURING ROYAL VISITOR'S STAY

### Party Searching for Treasure Stranded As Their Boat is Burned

Twelve Men Reported Short of Food and in Need of Clothing on Desolate Island in Pacific Ocean 2800 Miles From San Diego

SAN DIEGO, Nov. 17.—Twelve fishermen from San Diego are reported stranded on Cocos Island, in the Pacific Ocean 2800 miles southeast of here, following the destruction of their boat by fire. The party, which was in search of treasure reported to be hidden on the island, is believed to be short of food and in need of clothing although all members of the expedition are safe.

### DENMARK ELECTION

Labor Party Returned to Power—Country's First Political Killing

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 17.—Copenhagen witnessed its first political killing yesterday when a Labor party man was slain by a Communist during the holding of the Danish general election. Early indications were that the Labor government would be returned to office with a large majority.

### INTERIOR HAS SNOW

Railway Track Covered to Depth of Three and Four Feet at Places—Telegraph Wires Down

Heavy rains of the past few days in Prince Rupert took the form of snow in the interior, heavy falls being reported at all points from Haysport eastward. At some points along the Skeena River, the snow had drifted along the railway track to a depth of three and four feet. Telegraph wires were down this morning.

### Al Capone Out Of Penitentiary To Attend Court

ATLANTA, Nov. 17.—Al Capone emerged temporarily from Atlanta Federal Penitentiary yesterday to attend at court for three hours and a half to hear arguments on behalf of the government against his appeal for freedom in habeas corpus proceedings. Judge E. Marvin Underwood reserved his decision.

### ALASKA GOLD SHIPMENTS WERE HEAVY IN OCTOBER

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 17.—Gold shipments from Alaska in October were heavier than in many months previous, it was revealed in government statistics yesterday. The shipments totalled \$1,743,630 in value and were made up largely of clean-ups from dredging operations in the Nome and Fairbanks districts which have closed for the winter.

### WILL GET LICENCES

Unemployed Hear From Department—Pattullo is Answered

At a meeting of the local Branch of the National Unemployed Workers' Association in the Canadian Labor Defence League Hall last night a communication was received from the game warden notifying the unemployed to apply to the government agent regarding hunting licences. The letter was in reply to a request made by the Association to the government that unemployed be permitted to augment their food supply with deer meat without having to pay the game licence fee.

Several members urged that the deer hunting season be extended but those familiar with hunting pointed out that deer were thin and practically unfit for food by January. Attention of the members was drawn to the domestic meat situation on farms and ranches of Canada and this will be further taken up.

The address of T. D. Pattullo, M.L.A. for Prince Rupert and Leader of the British Columbia Opposition, the night previous was discussed and exception was taken to some of Mr. Pattullo's economic theories which is claimed could have no place in the highly industrialized state. Some members asserted that Mr. Pattullo's party had failed the workers.

### Rumor of Hoover Heading College Said Ridiculous

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17.—The president of the board of trustees of Stanford University termed as ridiculous yesterday reports that President Herbert Hoover may become president of the university. The subject has never even been discussed, it was declared.

### Treasury Bills Are Offered By U.S. Government

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 17.—Secretary of the Treasury Ogden Mills announced yesterday that tenders would be called on November 21 for \$80,000,000 of treasury bills.

### EXCITEMENT IN BELFAST

Capital of Northern Ireland Has Stirring Time as Prince of Wales Conducts Dedication

### Some Hostility

Loyal Irishmen, However, Gave Her Fine Reception as He Opened New Buildings

BELFAST, Ireland, Nov. 17.—There was plenty of excitement in Belfast yesterday in connection with the visit of the Prince of Wales to the capital of Northern Ireland to dedicate the new parliament buildings at Stormont.

Twelve thousand police and soldiers were pressed into service against the possibility of hostile demonstrations against the Prince who, however, was at no time in personal danger.

Particularly between Kells and Belfast, railway tracks were ripped up and, in some instances, mined, apparently as a part of the effort of those hostile to the Prince to prevent people from getting into Belfast to attend the dedication.

Hostile signs, some reading "Ireland belongs to the Irish—both north and south" and "Down with the Prince of Wales" were to be seen.

The Prince, on landing, was given a rousing reception by loyal Irish people. There was wild cheering as he took to the British Throne, wearing the uniform of a colonel of the Irish Guards, stepped ashore from his steamer.

During the actual dedication ceremonies, the Prince paid tribute to the splendid part men of Northern Ireland had played in the Great War.

### WORK TO BE DONE

Government Decides on Policy to Enable Unemployed to Secure Hunting Licences

Government Agent Norman A. Watt has been advised from Victoria that ten percent of the unemployed will be provided by the government with sufficient work to provide them with funds with which to purchase hunting licences and a limited quantity of ammunition.

No definite instructions have yet been received as to the means of selection of the ten percent which shall receive such work although it is considered likely that this will be left to the unemployed themselves.

Neither has word yet been received as to the exact nature of the work which shall be carried out.

### TREATIES IN EFFECT

New Duties Between United Kingdom and Dominions Are Now In Operation

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The Ottawa Agreements Bill, implementing the United Kingdom's new trade pacts with the Dominions, which were agreed upon at the recent Imperial economic conference in Ottawa, became law Tuesday night and became effective at midnight last night.

HALIFAX, N.S., Nov. 17.—Four men, Clem Walker, Joe Doucette, Irvin Slangen-White and Charles MacNeill, were killed yesterday when a fish plant on the Ferry Wharf collapsed, burying them in the debris.

### PASSING OF WESTERNER

John Wright Sifton, Eldest Son of Sir Clifford, Dies of Heart Trouble

### Newspaperman

Spent Nearly All His Life West of Great Lakes

TORONTO, Nov. 17.—John Wright Sifton, aged 46, secretary-treasurer of the Winnipeg Free Press newspaper and eldest son of the late Sir Clifford and Lady Sifton, died here Tuesday night. He had been ill for many months with heart trouble.

Although the Sifton family had been associated with Western Canada for three generations, no member of it could more truly lay claim to the title of "westerner" than John Wright Sifton. For "Jack" Sifton was born in Brandon, Man., November 7, 1886, and lived west of the Great Lakes nearly all his life.

For 10 years John Sifton lived in Brandon where his father was laying the foundation of his own future career.

In 1897 Clifford Sifton became minister of interior in the Laurier cabinet and the family moved east. At Ottawa "Jack" attended Model School and Ottawa Collegiate Institute, passing matriculation examinations in 1903 when he was 17, high in the honors list. He played hockey and football, and Ottawa Collegiate team of 1902 had a quarterback whose reputation is still remembered.

In 1903 he entered the Arts faculty University of Toronto, graduating a B.A. in 1908. Sir Clifford Sifton urged his eldest son to enter the newspaper business. Ready and willing, he returned to Winnipeg and the Free Press, placing himself under the tutelage of E. H. Macklin, General Manager of the Free Press.

The young fellow started in the press room and worked his way through every department. When his apprenticeship came to an end he was perhaps as fully equipped technically for his career as any man in Canada.

On September 6, 1913, Mr. Sifton married Miss Grace Christine Bell, daughter and only child of William Henry Bell of Montreal, and next year a son, Clifford Bell Sifton, was born to them. But tragedy followed close behind. The child was immediately seized by serious illness, and the mother a few days later was also struck down by what seemed like a fatal disease. For two months the two lives hung in the balance. (Continued on Page Four)

### WOULD BE SPEAKER

Representative Raney of Illinois to Be Candidate For Post Relinquished by John Garner

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—Representative Raney of Illinois, Democratic floor leader and for 28 years a member of Congress, announced yesterday that he would be a candidate for the Speakership in succession to John Nance Garner, who becomes vice-president of the United States on March 4 next.

That there will be plenty of competition for the Speakership is apparent. Others prominently mentioned as candidates are Burns of Tennessee, McDuffy and Bankhead of Alabama and Rankin of Mississippi.

### WEAKNESS IN STOCK

Dividend Announcements Fail to Hold Up Values—All Issues Are Off

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—In spite of dividend announcements by certain companies, stock prices broke from one to four points on the New York Stock Exchange yesterday, recovering partially before the close. Utilities closed at an average of 28.25, down 68-100, the industrial average at the close was 63.24, off 2.02, and rails 28.26, off 1.13. Just short of a million shares changed hands during the day.

### MANY ARE WORKLESS

Minister of Labor Presents Figures to House of Commons Regarding Unemployed in Canada

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—So far as the Department of Labor can estimate, there are 800,000 men, women and children receiving relief at present in Canada. Hon. Wesley A. Gordon, minister of labor, told the House of Commons yesterday.

Of the total, Mr. Gordon said, it was estimated that 144,000 were people who had not worked very steadily since 1919 while another 100,000 were what were known as transients, 50% of whom were recent arrivals in Canada.

### SPECIFYING OF TIMBER

Lumbermen From British Columbia in United Kingdom Decide Upon Line of Action

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Lumbermen from British Columbia in the United Kingdom decided yesterday to establish immediately a representative committee under the Aegis British Standards Institution to prepare a series of British standard specifications for timber.

### Seattle School Official Killed

John Jean Marshall Lost His Life When Car Plunged Off Lake Washington Road

SEATTLE, Nov. 17.—The body of John Jean Marshall, Seattle school official, who disappeared last Saturday, was found in Lake Washington yesterday under his overturned car. The car had, apparently, plunged off the road while Marshall was driving it. He was 39 years of age.

**MR. PATTULLO'S ADDRESS**

In these days when every person has the right and, to a certain extent, the ability to think for himself, there are, of course, hundreds of individual opinions all of which differ from all others. For that reason there will be differences in detail regarding the address given by T. D. Pattullo Tuesday night. Any statesman today has to take a middle course which will receive more or less general approval.

Mr. Pattullo is a Liberal, bound to a large degree by the Liberal platform evolved at the recent convention, but he also can exercise a great deal of individuality. When he becomes premier he will be the man who will advise the lieutenant-governor and will have power to dismiss other members of the cabinet just as Dr. Tolmie has today. He will be guided by Liberal principles but, from time to time, questions will arise which will make it necessary to take action apart from the guiding Liberal program.

In his address Mr. Pattullo did very little criticizing but dealt instead with constructive policies which caused his hearers to ponder and think. Incidentally he touched on federal matters. It was a new kind of speech to which Prince Rupert people listened and one that is still impressing them.

**M'LAUGHLIN IS WINNER**

Vancouver Wrestler Wins Over Winnipeg Opponent With Two Falls Out of Three

**Exciting Sport**

Local Fans Get Great Kick Out of First Exhibition of New Kind of Pugilism Here

Taking two falls out of three, Jack McLaughlin of Vancouver, middleweight wrestling champion of Canada, had no difficulty taking Leo Jensen, lanky opponent from Winnipeg, in last night's clutching bout in the Exhibition Hall. It was the first exhibition of this vigorous form of pugilism in Prince Rupert and it proved highly interesting, to say nothing of exciting, to the four hundred or so spectators in attendance.

McLaughlin and Jensen displayed most of the tricks of their trade for the benefit of the fans and, while the former appeared to be completely master of the situation in practically all stages of the grabbing and kicking display, it, nevertheless, proved an exciting affair for all who witnessed it.

McLaughlin took the first fall in the third round and Jensen evened it up in the fourth. McLaughlin ended the show in the fifth round with an airplane spin and body slam.

Rupert Fong met Tommy DeMarco in one of the three-round boxing preliminaries while Benny Burnett took on Pete Chenoski in the other. They were both no-decision exhibitions.

Doug Frizzell was referee for the evening and Roi Barnes acted as announcer. Max Heilbronner and R. E. Moore were timekeepers.

The card was staged by the Exhibition Board in aid of its finances. Both McLaughlin and Jensen will sail on the Prince Rupert tonight for Vancouver.

The mother recovered, but the baby died.

Entering military service he became chief staff officer of Major General John Hughes at Camp Hughes, Man., where there were such heavy concentrations of men

during the years of heavy recruitment. Finally, to his great joy, he got overseas—to Siberia with a small Canadian expeditionary force whose headquarters were at Vladivostok. In 1919 he fell once more into civilian life, and resumed his duties at the Free Press, now with rank of secretary-treasurer of the company.

Throughout his life he maintained

a keen interest in horses, in horse breeding and racing. It has been frequently said he was the best amateur rider in the show ring in his time.

For years both as player of polo, and organizer and donor of trophies, he helped bring the game into local prominence at Winnipeg.

He was A.D.C. to successive lieutenant-governors of Manitoba.
