CONSERVATIVES HAVE SAFE MARGIN OF 83

HON. JOHN HART, MINISTER OF FINANCE, MAKES BUDGET SPEECH TODAY

Satisfaction Generally Expressed with Results of Britain's Elections

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Gratification is expressed by the most of London morning papers at the result of the parliamentary elections. This was to be expected from the Conservative press but some of the Liberal papers also find certain grounds for satisfaction or at least consolation. They recognize that the outcome means a return to party government and the disappearance of all they most disliked in the survival of the coalition long after they had regarded its dissolution to be due.

The Times regards the result with deep satisfaction and says it demolishes the last argument for the maintenance of the coalition. The paper would have preferred if the balance had been held more evenly between Liberals and Laborite but believes that the country has nothing to fear and much to gain from a ventilation of the Labor party's ideas in Parliament. Several papers derive satisfaction from the fact that the Conservative party's majority was not overwhelmingly large thus enabling the opposition to exercise a wholesome check upon the predominant party.

SULTAN FLEES FROM PORTE

President of Turkish Socialists Assassinated in Constantinople.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 17.—Mohammed, the sixth Turkish Sultan, fled today from Constantinople on a British warship bound for Malta. Upon embarking the Sultan emphasized the fact that he was not abdicating but merely removing himself from immediate danger.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 17.—The attempt by the Kemalists to run the intended Turkish destroyer, Akhisar, disguised as a merchantman, out of the Golden Horn, past Allied control was frustrated last night.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Russian Blind Bay, president of the Turkish Socialist party, has been assassinated in Constantinople, according to a late report. The crime is ascribed to political movements.

CHAMPAGNE IS CHEAPER

Liquor Board Announces Reductions for the Christmas Trade

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—The Liquor Board is preparing for the Christmas trade and announces the reduction of the price of champagne from \$7.50 to \$6 a quart and \$4.50 to \$3.50 a pint. The price of ale is down to \$2.00 a dozen on the island and in Vancouver districts and is now the same price as beer.

BIG DECREASE IN SALMON EXPORTS

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—Canada's exports of canned salmon in October totalled 58,062 hundred-weights, a decrease of nearly fifty per cent as compared with last year.

DAN CAMPBELL CASE ON TODAY

Liquor Seizure Case Again Punctuated by Differences of Counsel

Evidence is being taken in the police court today in the case of Dan Campbell of the Central two bottles of beer and as they whiskey. Magistrate McClymont is hearing the case. M. Gonzales is defending and T. B. Hooper prosecuting.

According to Constable Harrison, he and Constable Dixon entered the Central Club at 10.10 on the morning of October 26, and found the accused behind the bar. The witness bought hotel charged with selling were drinking R. Dixon asked for a "shot." Accused replied, "Sure come on this way" and led them through the hall to a little room with a bed in it. He then left the room to get some liquor and he witness sat on the bed waiting.

The accused returned shortly after with a bottle and gave Dixon a drink. Accused took a drink also. Later he bought a round of drinks which were served from the bottle and one glass. Witness said Dixon handed the accused a five-dollar bill. He rang up \$1.50 in the cash register and handed him back the change.

Mr. Gonzales in cross-examining the witness asked if he had been in any other place before the Central Club that morning. Witness stated he could not remember but would not swear he was not.

"You like your beer just as well as anyone else?" asked the defence. "Yes," came the reply. "Your whiskey too?"

"No, I do not care for it so much," witness said.

Mr. Gonzales asked the number of the room they visited to get the drink but witness replied that it had no number.

"Have you discussed your notes of this case with Dixon?" asked the defence.

"No."

"You made your notes in the same room with Dixon?"

"Yes."

"And yet you want the court to believe that you did not speak of the case when you were writing your notes together in the same room?" queried Mr. Gonzales.

Witness replied that he did not know whether Dixon made his notes at the same time or not, although he was writing. He further answered that the only conversation about the case took place when he asked Dixon when the trial was to start. "If we had made our notes together we would not have made slips like we did in the other cases," witness informed the defence.

Differences of Counsel

The witness was then asked to draw a plan of the route they took in the hotel. Mr. Gonzales complained to the court that the crown counsel was correcting him and asked the court to make him sit down. The crown denied this and told the defence to sit down.

Magistrate McClymont ordered them both to sit down and leave the witness alone till he had finished.

Mr. Hooper—"He's my witness, make Mr. Gonzales sit down."

"Then make him sit down for my witness then," came back the retort from the defence.

Constable Dixon gave similar evidence. The case is proceeding.

ESSENTIALS OF PROGRESS MINING FIELD

Prof. J. S. Schofield, of University of B.C. Addresses Mining Convention

VANCOUVER, Nov. 17.—Research work to discover new methods treating primary ores of the country, further and systematic study of geological formations of the province and syn-patitic appreciation of the natural difficulties in mining are essentials to the development of the mineral resources of British Columbia. Prof. J. S. Schofield, of the University of B.C., told the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy at its meeting today.

Referring to mineral production, Prof. Schofield said that he believed if the government would thoroughly investigate the subject and seek to devise methods of selling claims when and where there was a market for properties the hills would be full of prospectors.

RIVERS BIGHT MINE OWNER IS VISITING TOWN

Gold Claims on Princess Royal Reverted to Original Owners This Week

David Cordila, a third share owner in the Rivers Bight gold claims, which were bonded to D. Sloan and W. McMillan, of Toronto, for \$50,000 last year, is in port aboard his launch Clara. The bond expired Wednesday and the claims now revert back to the original owners. Although several letters had been written to the bond holders no word has been received by Mr. Cordila as to their intentions. Previous to and since the claims were bonded considerable development work has been carried out on the property. A tunnel 350 feet long has been driven and a considerable quantity of rich ore is now on the dump. The tunnel has caved in a little in places and it is the intention of the present owners to do considerable repair work during the coming spring. Of nine samples of ore assayed from the claims the average assayed at \$9.00 per ton in gold and silver.

Rivers Bight is situated on the Princess Royal Island, some 100 miles south of Prince Rupert. Mr. Cordila will return south as soon as the weather abates sufficiently to permit of his voyage.

Finance of Province Sound and Outlook for Future is Very Bright

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, presented his budget to the legislature this afternoon. He gave a comprehensive speech in which he set forth plainly the financial condition of the province's affairs and outlined the plans of the finance department.

The gross debt of the province to November was \$66,000,000 against which there was a sinking fund of \$10,000,000, the minister said. British Columbia was the only province fully providing for its sinking fund.

The minister stated that it was proposed to borrow \$3,500,000 of which \$2,000,000 would be for public buildings under construction, \$1,000,000 for the Land Settlement Board, and the balance for the Soldiers' Land Act and irrigation.

The minister showed an immense saving from short term loans. All departments of the government had operated below estimates. Revenue collected since March had been \$11,000,000 and expenditures, \$7,500,000.

The revenue for next year was estimated at \$18,250,000 and expenditure at \$17,250,000. There were reductions in all departments except education, agriculture, land and railways. A deficit of \$500,000 was shown on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

The speech showed heavy taxation due to the extravagant financing of the former government which started in 1910 with a surplus of \$9,000,000. The minister told of efforts made to secure just collection of income taxes with Ottawa and of a commencement of revaluation of timber limits.

Mr. Hart said that he looked for better conditions soon but much money would be needed for schools and aid to municipalities. There would be no tax increases but no reductions. The government was working for tax equalization.

That the credit of the province was better than at any time since Confederation was seen in the ready sale of bonds and the prices received. A number of financial houses had been bidding. A return of normal conditions and influx of population combined with a sane and sound policy of development of natural resources assured the province of a bright and prosperous future.

ENFORCEMENT OF LIQUOR ACT PAYS

Expenditure Over \$100,000 While Revenue Not Complete Stands at \$227,267

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—Against the cost of enforcing the liquor act set yesterday by the public accounts committee at over \$100,000, figures were given this morning showing that the income from enforcement had been \$227,267 made up of \$129,795 from fines, \$79,235 from estimated bail monies, \$2,119 from confiscations, and \$16,087 taxes on private importations. In addition to this there is approximately \$100,000 of seized liquor which has not yet been given definite valuation.

Archie Johnson, chairman of the Liquor Board, stated yesterday that the net profit for the last half year ending September 30 yet to be distributed would amount to about \$1,000,000. Reserve fund would get about \$172,974.

DEMANDS TO BE MADE AT PARLEY

Egyptians Want Independence and Indians Freedom Regarding Caliphate

TURKS ASK INDEMNITIES AND GREEK REPARATIONS

LAUSANNE, Nov. 17.—Egyptian delegates to the Near East conference will demand complete independence for Egypt and the Sudan, the removal of all British troops and the cancellation of special British privileges. The Indian Mohammedan delegates are prepared to demand that the British refrain from meddling with the Mussulman caliphate saying that it is none of Britain's business.

Israel Pasha on behalf of the Turkish government will demand reparations from Greece as a subjugated country and will also ask for indemnities on account of the Allied occupation of Turkish property during the past four years.

BOWSER STILL PLAYS POLITICS

Premier Refuses to Make Public Ross Napier's Private Report

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—Another attempt by Hon. W. J. Bowser and B. H. Pooley, member for Esquimalt, to make political capital out of the Liquor Act was frustrated today by Premier Oliver.

The Conservative members of the public accounts committee asked that Col. Ross Napier's private recommendations to the Premier be made public but this was refused and the Premier moved an amendment that the committee examine witnesses only on matters referred to it by the legislature. Bowser claimed an attempt to balk the inquiry but with no result.

PERRY OBJECTS TO INSURANCE LICENSES

Says That Prince Rupert and Lower Mainland Agents Against Measure

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—H. G. Perry, member for Prince George, in the legislature yesterday objected to the Attorney General's bill licensing insurance agents and said that Prince Rupert and the lower mainland insurance agents were opposing it. The bill was good for big cities but not for smaller places, he said.

**Victory Of Such
Size Was Not Expected.**

While many expected that the Conservatives would win in the British elections, there were few who anticipated that they would receive such a tremendous verdict in their favor as was registered by the Old Country voters on Wednesday. The result of the contest marks the passing of the Coalition and will put the House of Commons back on party lines once more with Ex-Premier Lloyd George's following in a rather insignificant position and Ex-Premier Asquith's little better. The election was one of those periodical turnovers that comes in due course of time in any country governed by party politics.

**Labor Makes Big
Gain In Strength.**

The Labor party has been gaining strength steadily of late in Great Britain and the fact that Laborites, as a group, are second in strength in the House of Commons and will lead in the Opposition is not a great surprise although they may have gained more seats than it was generally expected they would get. Stormed against in the campaign by the Liberals and Conservatives, and particularly by Lloyd George, they came through in no uncertain measure. There are real statesmen in the British Labor party, and their increasing influence in the House of Commons should be of benefit rather than hindrance to the Government of the land.

**Lloyd George Repudiated;
Appreciated Nevertheless.**

Though Ex-Premier Lloyd George was elected by acclamation and will thus be not lost to the House, the defeat of his followers was decided. For many years considered the most wonderful pilot of the nation, the little Welshman has suffered the ungrateful buffeting of public opinion and finds himself now in a rather isolated position. He has been repudiated by the people, it is true, but even should his political career be at a turning point, his name will go down in history as one of England's greatest statesmen who guided the nation through its most serious crisis, outshining all others. He is still in the House and will, doubtless, continue his usefulness in the moulding of the nation's destiny even if it may be in a different capacity.

**What Will Lloyd
George's Future Be?**

What Lloyd George's future in British politics may be is a matter of keen speculation. Some are of the opinion that he is done and that he will never again come into power. Others emphatically declare that in no short space of time he will again be Premier of England. If the latter is to be the case it will be necessary for him to find new alliances or bolster up his party in a remarkable manner. After the breaking up of the coalition little time was allowed him for organization, and it is little wonder that his followers met with the reverses that they did, although, some say, their fate was a rejection of their leader in a tide that was not to be turned. An alliance with the ever growing Labor strength is a suggestion often heard in regard to the deposed Premier.

**MOCK TRIAL AT
ROTARY DINNER**

Varied Program at Meeting Called for Discussion of Ethical Principles

A higher standard in the business and professional life of the community was advanced by speakers at the Rotary Club dinner in the St. Regis cafe last night. The meeting was held primarily to discuss the ethics of business and professional men in following out the program laid down by the International Association. It was the first time in the history of the local club, since its inception eighteen months ago, that the members were asked to bring a competitor or friend and when the program ended late in the evening it was voted a great success.

Duncan McRae, vice-president, in the absence of the President T. R. Johnston, occupied the chair and in speaking of the aims and ideals of Rotary declared that the members should do their utmost to maintain the highest standards in business. He told of the first club formed in Chicago in 1905 by Paul P. Harris, a native son of Edinburgh, Scotland, and pointed out that there were now 1253 clubs in twenty-five countries throughout the world with a membership of 85,000 men.

J. W. Nicholls was the song leader and he got more harmony out of some of the business men in the city than they ever produced before in their lives. Several members were announced to sing solos but when the time came they took stage fright and backed out.

The Mock Trial

The big feature of the evening was the mock trial. Mike McCaffery as chairman of the stunts committee arose and stated that Fred Stork, M.P. had been appointed judge for the trial of several members of the club for neglecting their duty. Then he named Dr. Grant crown prosecutor, E. A. Wakefield, counsel for the defence, and George Woodland, assistant counsel.

ON information laid by Jack Nicholls, Sheriff McCaffery had Jack Campbell put on trial on a charge of being delinquent in his duty as chairman of the boys' work committee. Dr. Grant urged His Lordship not to press the charge too hard on the prisoner and interjected a number of humorous remarks into his speech to the court. The prisoner was dismissed.

The next person to be arraigned was Everard Duby on a charge of never smiling while speaking at meetings. Dr. Grant, in making the charge, stated that the accused was a neighbor of his and that his back yard lock was still intact but he had so proceeded with the case as a matter of duty. He asked the accused if the presence of three clergymen in the club was an excuse for never smiling but he added that this was a court of justice and not one of law and urged the court to be lenient. His lordship pronounced that the accused had been found guilty and sentenced him to sing one verse of "Pack up your troubles."

Biggest Hit

The biggest-hit of the evening was the arrest of Duncan McRae on a charge of not bringing new speakers to the luncheons but using his neighbors in Section Six most of the time. Jack Nicholls was called as a witness and whenever Dr. Grant suggested that the speakers had told old jokes and had not dealt with their subjects in a proper manner, the witness agreed with him although the defence counsel argued several times that the questions were leading ones. Of the speakers named, Doc Orme, Magistrate T. McClymont, E. A. Wakefield and others came in for some comical criticism.

The counsel for the defence entered a brilliant plea on behalf of his client and was rewarded by having His Lordship discharge the prisoner with honor. The court was adjourned till the next meeting.

Medical Ethics

On behalf of the professional men, Dr. W. T. Kergin gave a fine talk on the ethics of medical men. In speaking of the relations between doctor and doctor he stated that they were forbidden to advertise their cases in the daily press and were not to use any means whatsoever to get a patient from another doctor. 

MARINE TRAFFIC AT HAMBURG INCREASES

German Port is Only One of the Three Largest in Europe That Shows a Gain in 1922

HAMBURG, Nov. 17.—Of Europe's three largest ports, Hamburg was the only one in 1922 to show a gain over last year in the number of incoming ships during the first seven months. The other two harbors, Antwerp and Rotterdam, registered an increase in arriving tonnage, although less ships docked than during the same period in 1921.

From January 1 to August 1, 6,959 vessels put in at Hamburg with a tonnage of 7,268,256, an increase of 1,603 ships and 2,509,128 tons. Antwerp had 4,616 arrivals during this period and Rotterdam 4,770.

BRINGING UP FATHER



MUCH GAMBLING MOSCOW TODAY

MOSCOW, Nov. 16.—There are five players waiting for every available seat around the baccarat and roulette tables in the newly opened gambling Casino in Moscow, where the play runs high from 8 o'clock in the evening until 10 the next morning.

Frequenters of Monte Carlo and the other big European gaming places in the old days when Russian aristocrats went abroad to spend their money, always remember the Slavs as the most reckless and inveterate of gamblers. A visit to the Moscow Casino today shows that all of the troubles of the Russian revolution have not changed them.

Workmen, roughly dressed and unshaven, with heaps of ten and hundred million ruble notes in front of them, sit tensely watching the turn of a card at tables where, perhaps, a fashionably dressed girl, unable to get a seat, leans over a workman and asks him to place a bet for her, or proposes that they take the "bank" at baccarat together.

Foreigners Wonder

Foreigners wonder where the players get their money. Persons whose appearance suggest their readiness for the vagrancy court or the poor house, dig heaps of Russian ruble notes, foreign currency and even gold coins out of ragged coats, and lose or win billions without outward appearance of elation or discomposure.

The "big play" at baccarat is confined to one room, barred to all those except actual players. Here the minimum bet is 50,000,000 rubles or, at present rates, about \$12 in American money. From this minimum banks are frequently built up to many billions of rubles, equal to several thousand dollars. At other tables the minimum bet is 10,000,000 rubles, or two and a half dollars, and these tables are in the open, with scores of anxious spectators crowding about those lucky enough to get places.

Roulette.

The roulette wheel is operated only for one hour each night, and here the maximum bets range from 3,000,000 rubles on a single number to 30,000,000 on a color. The wheel has two zeros, instead of the usual one at Monte Carlo and the profits of the "house" at roulette are, in proportion, twice those which the Monte Carlo gamblers reap from their wheels.

At least \$200,000 changes hands nightly at this casino, for the "house," in taking five per cent from each baccarat pot, reaps an average of about \$10,000 a night. Recently one night's takings were 69,000,000 rubles.

Prices that shock even hardened American tourists are demanded for refreshments served by the waiters while the play is on. A package of ten cigarettes of a well-known but very cheap brand, selling in England for the equivalent of ten cents, bring six million rubles or a dollar and a half, while a small bottle of soda water is served at the equivalent of seventy-five cents.

Practically all of the gains of the house go to the government for relief of famine sufferers, or other worthy causes.

HOUDINI AGAINST PSYCHIC PHENOMENA

Says He Can do Any of Tricks Done by Mediums

BOSTON, Nov. 16.—Morbidness and melancholia induced by interest in psychic phenomena threaten the health and sanity of many persons in the opinion of Harry Houdini, president of the Society of American Magicians, expressed at the annual dinner of the society here. He spoke of his 25 years' investigation of the subject, and said he had never seen anything to convince him that there had been a single communication from the dead.

"I have never seen any of the mediums or spiritualists do anything or produce a single effect which I could not, through my knowledge of magic, account for or duplicate," he asserted. "I have had nine pacts with the dead, who while alive agreed with me to try to communicate with me from beyond, but each had been fruitless."

He said he had worked with Sir Oliver Lodge and other scientists engaged in the study of psychic phenomena and respected them.

Do Not Know

"But," he added, "when I demonstrate to them the secrets and reveal the methods used by mediums and they tell me that I too am a medium, in spite of myself, I am forced to conclude that they merely do not know."

"I have seen people who previous to the war, never concerned themselves with things psychic now delving into it to the point of hysteria. It is conducive of morbidness, brooding and melancholia. It becomes an obsession very quickly and I would warn against it. It is threatening the health and sanity of those who indulge in it."

Basketball and How to Play It

By Observer

CENTER AND GUARDS

Important Position

One of the most important positions on the basketball team is that of center and a few words regarding this position may not come amiss.

The center is the pivot man, as a rule, of all team plays both defensive and offensive. For that reason he must be accomplished in all the arts which we have discussed in regard to the forward and at the same time must possess the qualifications of a good guard. He is usually a tall man so that he can secure the ball at the tip-off although some very good jumpers are to be found among the men of shorter stature. In selecting a center ability to get the jump along with the following qualifications must be considered.

He must be a live wire for he has to cover all parts of the floor. He is an offensive player when his team has the ball and a defensive one when the opponents have it. He must constantly back-check and must be able to stand the most strenuous pace. He must be quick on his feet and must use his wits at all times.

Shoulder control must be acquired by the center so that it is possible to reach the full height with one arm without moving the other. Swinging Indian clubs and dumbbells will help to develop the shoulder muscles and make them supple and strong.

The abdominal muscles should also be well developed in the center because he must remain in his half of the circle when jumping for the ball and not commit a foul by touching the other man. The leg muscles of course, must be in excellent condition and must respond immediately to the necessity for the jump. Stooping with hands on the hips and raising the hinged knee are good developing exercises for the leg muscles.

Perhaps the most important feature of the center's games is good passing. He should be able to shoot well, to guard well and above all to pass well. He will be required to feed the forwards and his passes to them must be made with great accuracy. Being the pivot man he is likely to receive more passes than any other man and he must therefore handle the ball with neatness and dispatch and must lose no time in getting the ball to the forwards.

Back Checking Essential

Just a word about back-checking. You have often seen a game lost because one or other member of the team did not back-check. The failure of the forwards to do so has been mentioned but it is an even greater error for the center to fail in this for his opponent will probably make the third and free man of the opponents offense. Should a guard be drawn out to check him, a forward is left unguarded.

The position of guard calls for specialization in one or two qualities which the forwards need not possess to the same degree. A sense of perception and cunning in solving the offensive play of the opponents and the ability to move quickly enough to break up these formations are these necessities.

The guard first of all must be very keen in sensing the direction in which the play is going to move. In advancing to check his men it is often possible that the ball will be passed in any of three directions and it is necessary for the guard to start in that direction before the pass has been started, if he is to block or intercept successfully. It is that quality of being able to sense the trend of the play and to time one's interference that makes a first-class guard.

Passing out to the forwards and backing up offensive movements of the team are two important features of the guard's play. A running and a stationary guard are usually posted for the latter purpose, the faster and better shot of the two being placed as the running guard. It is his duty to go up the floor with the offensive and to assist by going in for passes when the other men are checked.

Edward Poltro, of Ketchikan, now attending Principia college at St. Louis, has a record of ten seconds for 100 yards, and twenty-two seconds for 220 yards. It is believed by many college trainers he will be world champion runner.

Not many persons know that a prize-fighter is buried among the celebrities of Westminster Abbey. In a group of statuary near the north door of the Abbey, one of the statues shows a remarkable arm. Some persons observing it might imagine that the arm in question was an exaggeration, but it was actually modelled from the arm of a verger of the Abbey named John Burton, who was also champion prize-fighter of England. Burton was the Dean's verger, and he was asked on one occasion if he would like to be buried in the Abbey. Burton said he would, and asked that the fact of his championship should be inscribed on his tomb. To this the Dean consented, but the proposal was too much for the Chapter, and Burton's tomb has a blank space on it in consequence.

A situation unique in boxing annals developed recently when it became known that Joe Lynch, bantam champion, has been barred temporarily from boxing at Madison Square Garden by the New York State Athletic Commission as a result of his recent poor showing there in a match with Joe Wolfe, of Cleveland.

The fact that Lynch is in disfavor with the commission became known when Promoter Tex Rickard sought sanction for a match between the bantam king and Joe Burman, of Chicago last night, or Thanksgiving night, Nov. 30. Chairman William Muldoon, of the commission, flatly refused sanction.

"Since the Wolfe bout, Lynch is no longer a Garden attraction," said Chairman Muldoon. "He will have to box elsewhere and demonstrate his fitness before we will sanction a Garden bout with him as one of the principals."

With two decisive victories to their credit, both of them resulting from encounters away from their home ice, the Seattle Metropolitans are off to a good start in the Pacific Coast hockey race. If they continued that pace there would not be much to the series and fans would not like it. Tonight, at Victoria, the Millionaires and Aristocrats will meet for the first time to decide which will occupy second place temporarily at least.
