PEACE MAY BE IRELAND'S CHRISTMAS BOX

ATTORNEY GENERAL INTRODUCES LIQUOR ACT AMENDMENTS IN LEGISLATURE

Indications of Peace in Emerald Isle are Increasingly Apparent

DUBLIN, Dec. 14.—Talk of peace between the factions in Ireland is increasingly heard as Christmas approaches. The action taken by the new senate of the Free State on Tuesday in appointing a committee to work for immediate cessation of hostilities has developed some indications that a section of the Republican party is willing to treat for peace and that the rank and file is moving in that direction. The summoning of all Sinn Féin clubs in Dublin city and county to debate the question is pointed to as significant.

TISDALL LEADS FOR MAYORALTY

Present Vancouver Chief Magistrate Has Lead Over Taylor
By 374 on First Choice

VANCOUVER, Dec. 14.—First choice ballots in the civic election held yesterday gave Mayor Charles E. Tisdall a majority of 274 over his nearest opponent for the mayoralty, Ex-Mayor L. D. Taylor. Ex-Ald. J. J. McEwen was 1,000 down the list and A. P. Lawless was counted out with 51 votes. Second choice ballots to be counted today will decide the mayoralty.

W. R. Almond, W. R. Owen and R. P. Pettipiece were the only aldermen elected on the first ballot. Five more are to be decided. By-law votes were not counted yesterday.

ASKING REPRIEVE FOR MURDERERS ON RAND

Clerics Add Their Voice to the
Petition Made by South
African Labor Party

CAPETOWN, Dec. 14.—The Archbishop of Capetown and the Capetown Presbyterian Assembly have added their appeals to the petition of the South African Labor party for the reprieve of men recently condemned to death for murder in connection with the revolt on the Rand last spring. The petition has been widely signed.

SHOP REGULATION ACT WAS PASSED

Five O'Clock Closing Optional—
Inspection of Sanitary
Conditions

VICTORIA, Dec. 14.—An amendment to the Shops Regulations Act was passed in the House Wednesday making the five o'clock closing optional where desired and also giving the right to inspect shops and compel proper sanitary conditions. The latter clause was aimed at the Orientals.

LEWIS AND ZBYSKO WILL MEET TONIGHT

Heavyweight Wrestlers Will Go
to Mat For Big Purse at St.
Louis

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 14.—Ed. "Strangler" Lewis, world's champion heavyweight wrestler, will meet Stanislaus Zbysko, former holder of the title, for a purse of \$9,000, 75 per cent to go to the winner and 25 per cent to the loser, here tonight.

Mayoralty Candidates are now Lining up for Forthcoming Election

The office of chief magistrate of the city seems to be attracting a number of candidates this year and already three men are in the field with a prospect of more.

Mayor Rochester, in an interview this morning, stated that he was almost certain that he would not run again this year, but would drop out of the council. Not making a definite announcement, the mayor said he was almost certain that he would not allow his name to go before the electors.

Ald. Theo. Collart today made the official announcement of his candidature for the mayoralty and his platform is being published.

As announced yesterday, he will stand by his motion in the organization of the city hall departments.

Ald. Dybbavn is almost sure he will enter the contest. This morning he said, "It is a rather awkward situation just now but it looks as if I will ultimately run for mayor."

"The planks in Alderman Dybbavn's platform will include a completion of the re-organization of the city hall staff and full investigation of the city manager plan in an effort to establish greater efficiency and co-ordination in the various departments. He will also take the stand that the capital expenditures should be avoided by the city whenever possible and will work for co-operation with the Canadian National Railways towards the establishment of adequate facilities for the de-

LONDON, Dec. 14.—The rise of sterling exchange continues and yesterday the demand rate in New York was \$4.67 3/4. As a result, some of the morning papers enthusiastically anticipate a reduction in the prices of food and cotton importations from the United States. The papers qualify this view by citing the opinion of Premier Bonar Law, as expressed in the House of Commons last night, that unless some great disaster occurs in Great Britain it will soon enjoy better trade conditions.

Price of Permits Coming Down; Jail Terms for Beer Sellers; Export Licenses to Cost More

VICTORIA, Dec. 14.—Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, brought down a Liquor Act amendment in the legislature yesterday providing for a cut in the price of permits for spirits to \$2 and for beer to \$1, eliminating single purchase permits.

Other provisions are:

Brewers or wholesale dealers not to be allowed to give away beer or liquor.

Inspector or constable may seize liquor or make arrests without warrants or laying of information.

Jail sentence for the first offence of selling beer as well as whiskey and a minimum fine of \$1,000 for companies.

Correct labelling of all beer.

Raising of export licenses from \$3,000 to \$10,000 with an extra \$1,000 for each additional agency.

Increasing of members of liquor board from three to four.

Charging of costs of prosecutions undertaken by the Liquor Board or provincial police against the municipality.

Allocating of fifteen per cent of liquor profits to hospitals up to 25¢ a day per patient and 35 per cent to municipalities, two-sevenths of which is to be for schools.

Further regulations for export houses including the inspection of books, records and liquor.

TURKEY WILL JOIN LEAGUE

Ismet Pasha Made Important
Announcement at Lausanne Today

LAUSANNE, Dec. 14.—Turkey will join the League of Nations as soon as the Peace is signed at Lausanne. Ismet Pasha made this announcement at the Near East conference today.

As the League exercises general supervision over minority populations, Ismet Pasha's announcement is interpreted as meaning that Turkey will accept the League's supervision over the Christian peoples of Turkey. Ismet said that Turkey was ready to accord the same treatment to minorities as provided for in the treaties between various European countries.

Little Planning For Campaign Yet.

Municipal election day is now just about a month distant but little definite action towards launching a campaign has been manifested although there is a good deal of gossip heard about the street in regard to possibilities.

Mayorality candidates are commencing to line up. The business men of the city are expected to put forward a candidate and there is also a possibility that the Labor Party may have a man. Their nominating convention will be held on Friday night of this week.

Some of the present aldermen will seek re-election and there will also be the usual number of new candidates to make a contest.

The school board, a place that has not been very popular in the past, will likely see little more contest this January while there will be, as usual, a race for the police commission, it is expected.

More definite announcements of candidature are expected within the course of the next few days.

Purposes Of Redistribution.

Observance of municipal boundaries and equalization of population in the different constituencies are the broad principles taken as the objective in a Redistribution Bill which will have to be passed by the Dominion parliament at its next session.

In the matter of equalization of population, there is likely to be a keen conflict of opinion between urban and rural members. The British North America Act defines the basis of representation from each province but no attempt is made in the Act to define the size or population of individual constituencies. Thus, there are urban constituencies returning one member with several times the population of a rural constituency also returning one member. In all the provinces, there are wide differences in certain cases in the population of constituencies although each is entitled to send one member to parliament. It is some of these anomalies that the coming redistribution plans to remove while, at the same time, the representation of the different provinces is readjusted.

France And Britain And Reparations.

On each occasion that discussion of German reparations comes up, an agreement between Great Britain and France seems to be farther removed. Britain has been following a generous conciliatory course but France demands strict enforcement. Occupation of the Ruhr valley and seizure of its industrial wealth as a guarantee in default of payment is the course that France urges and which she threatens to pursue. Britain is against such a course. In order to prevent such action and satisfy France, England is now working on a counter course with the object in view of cancelling, temporarily at least, French war debts to United States and Britain. Whether the efforts along this line will be successful remains to be seen but, in view of its attitude in the past on similar questions, it would seem not an unreasonable prediction to make that United States will not accede to any such overtures.

There is no doubt that economic questions are pressing France and that is one of the main motives in her insistence, against the advice of Great Britain and others of the Allied powers, towards getting her pound of flesh in the matter of reparations. She is willing to invade the Ruhr and Britain is not. If a breach occurs and Britain should abandon France on the question, it would probably mean disaster for France in the end. Then Britain would come to her rescue again and nothing would have been gained. Perhaps an actual experiment by France with her own reparations medicine would do her good although Great Britain will probably continue as long as it is possible, at her own disadvantage to prevent an arbitrary action by the Republic that, embarked upon individually, bears little indication of ultimately doing her any good.

NO CHANGE IN POLICE FORCE

Mayor's Recommendation for Re-organization is Laid Over for Incoming Commission

Mayor Rochester's scheme for reorganization of the police force by the installing of a system of patrol lights and the elimination of two officers, fell by the wayside for the time being at least last night, when the commission decided to leave the matter over with favorable recommendation for the incoming commission.

The mayor reported that he had received estimates from the superintendent on the cost of installing a system of red lights for night officers on patrol. A circuit of 400 lights would cost \$737 and five, \$560. He thought that five, located at well selected points of prominence, would be sufficient.

The question of keeping an officer in the station also came up. The mayor said that he had only recently found out that it was not necessary to keep a man at the station all night. Commissioner Macdonald expressed surprise at this and stated that he had always been under the impression that the law compelled the keeping of an officer in the station over night to guard the prisoners. The city clerk pointed out that there was nothing in the law to this effect but it had been accepted in the past by commissions on moral grounds in order to insure the safety of prisoners against fire, sickness, or other untoward happenings. In any case, under the mayor's scheme, it was proposed to have prisoners kept at night in the provincial jail.

Eleventh Hour

Commissioner Macdonald said that he did not want to draw up a policy at the eleventh hour when one month from now he would be out of office. He could see, however, where reduction could be made if it was not necessary to keep an officer in the station all night. He would go so far, however, as to recommend the new system to the incoming commission.

Commissioner Shockey felt that they should at least ascertain the practicability of the new scheme before putting it into operation. He seconded Commissioner Macdonald's resolution.

Mayor Rochester felt that there would be no mistake in immediate action on the matter but he acceded to the motion to lay it over which he declared passed.

Chief on Reduction

At the request of the mayor, the chief of police submitted a report on the possibility of reorganization. The report stated that there were at present one chief, two sergeants and three officers on the force. This total of six men was less by one than the commission had decided upon in September. Reduction at this time before the holiday season, the chief stated, would be inadvisable but early in the New Year he would be able to submit a report calling for the reduction of the force by one officer.

The mayor stated that the payroll for the force on this basis, including the magistrate, would be \$13,200 as against \$17,800 in 1921.

WINNERS AT POTATO FAIR

Northern British Columbia Took Five Prizes for Tubers

EXPERTS ARE COMING

VICTORIA, Dec. 14. — There were five winners from Northern British Columbia at the provincial potato fair at Grand Forks out of thirteen exhibitors. According to C. Tice, provincial potato expert, the exhibits compared favorably with the specimens from the south. While they lacked a few points in scoring the judges considered they were excellent potatoes and experts are now looking to central British Columbia to get clean stock for use as seed potatoes for the rest of the province. BETTER CONDITION IN ALBERTA COAL MINES

More Men at Work and Less Picketing — Considerable Interference Some Mines

EDMONTON, Dec. 14. — Improved conditions in the Edmonton coal field are reported today, the thirteenth day of the I.M.W.A. strike order. The Black Diamond reports full working force. The Fraser-McKay, Marcus and Ottewill report a slight increase in working force over Friday, and very little interference by pickets. Hummerstone and Glover Bar also report an increased force and improved coal production, but active picketing was still going on.

The Bush, which has been closed since December 2, was making preparations for opening early in the week. A fireman named Hugh Higham, who had been at the mine to keep up steam, on his way home in the late afternoon, was set upon by three masked men and seriously bruised and cut by them in the attack they made on him. He resides in the northern part of Beverley.

All the city mines are working and with increased forces. The Standard was heavily picketed, but the working force is larger than last week, about 75 per cent. of normal.

The Penn is also picketed but is working full force. Dawson and Glenbrook also at work in spite of picketing.

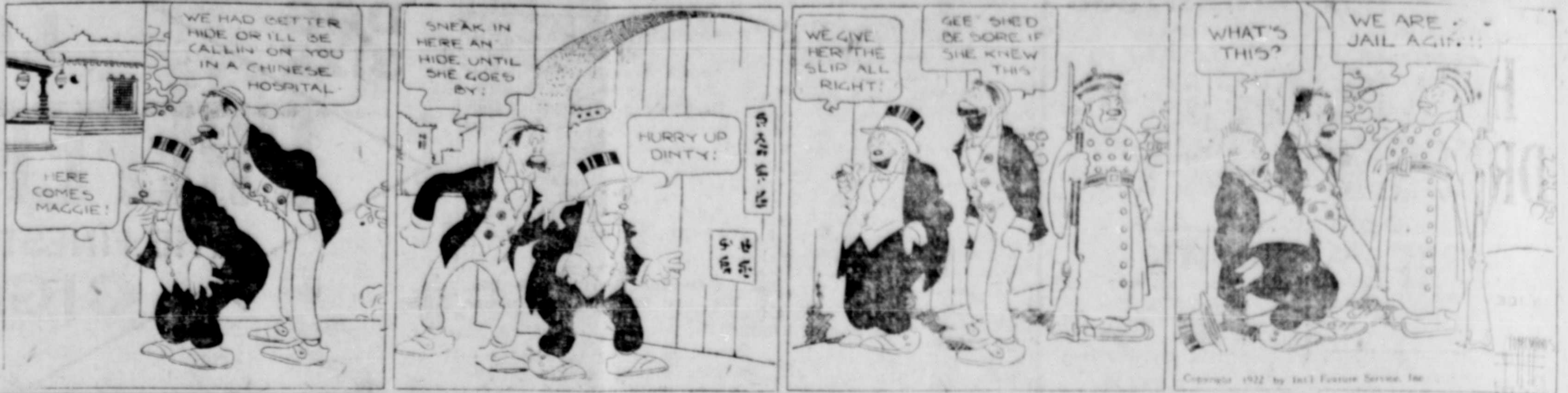

BITTER CRITICISM OF ROSS RIFLE CO.

Justice Latchford Outspoken in Supreme Court of Ontario

OTTAWA, Dec. 14.—"There are some Canadian soldiers—444 living—who would like to see every one connected with the Ross Rifle Company lined up against a wall and shot."

Such was the startling statement made from the Bench of the Supreme Court of Ontario, by Mr. Justice Frank Latchford. The statement from the Bench was made during the trial of Norman C. Guthrie, Parliamentary agent, who is suing Sir Charles Ross for the sum of \$19,361, in connection with the sale of the Ross Rifle Works, to the Canadian government, which took place in 1920, involving around \$4,000,000.

The remark of His Lordship was made when Edward K. Nicholson, attorney of Bridgeport, Conn., who was a Ross witness, was on the stand and was being examined by L. N. Palen, K.C., of Toronto, who is representing the interests of Sir Charles. Mr. Nicholson had previously said that he considered the value of the Ross Rifle plant, at the time it was taken over by the government to have been worth six million dollars, and had told Judge Latchford that parts and

materials valued at around one and one-half million dollars, had been used and assembled into rifles and supplied to Canadian troops.

After there was an afternoon which bristled with interesting evidence, which brought into prominence the names of Sir Robert Borden, General Newcombe, ex-Minister of Justice, Charles Lancelot, Attorney General for Quebec, and such legal lights as Sir John Simon, Aime Geoffrion, K.C., Wallace Nesbitt, K.C., and had on the witness stand W. N. Tilley, K.C.

Judge Latchford intimated that at the conclusion of the hearing of evidence, judgment might not immediately be given.

SIR KEITH SMITH IN FRISCO PLANNING FOR FLIGHT ROUND WORLD

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 14.—Sir Keith Smith, famous British aviator, has arrived here to prepare for the round-the-world flight he proposes to make in the spring of 1923. The course of the air cruise will be from London to Egypt and Mesopotamia; over India and Burma, up the China coast and across Japan; thence to the Aleutian Islands, Alaska, and Vancouver; across Canada to New York up to St. Johns, Nfld., and finally to London by Greenland and Iceland.

Sir Keith expects to complete the entire journey in three hundred flying hours over a period of three months. While here he will close negotiations with an oil company for the gasoline supply of 8,000 gallons to be used on the trip.

BOY EMPEROR OF CHINA AND BRIDE TO TOUR

Wedding Ceremonies Over, the Youthful Monarch Hopes to See World

PEKIN, Dec. 14.—The picturesque and complicated wedding ceremonies over, Hsuan Tung, the 17-year-old emperor of China, and his bride, the princess Kuei Chin Si, two years his junior, are counting eagerly the days before they may set forth to see the world.

Although an emperor only in name since the revolution which made China a republic, and caused him to abdicate the imperial throne young Hsuan Tung has been forced to observe the strictest ritual and to spend his life within the Forbidden City, outside Peking, a walled enclosure consisting of less than half a square mile.

The young emperor has grown weary of his confinement. Only three times has he been allowed to leave the Forbidden City, on each occasion for the purpose of attending a funeral or memorial service. He is of the student type, and in spite of his disadvantages has learned many things about the outside world from his tutors, some of whom are English. Not long ago he had his queue removed, thus cutting away from the Manchurian traditions. Occasionally he wears European clothes and several times he has pleaded with his court to buy him an automobile.

Evades Attendants
There are rumors that the young emperor sometimes evades his attendants and secretly ventures outside the Forbidden City and glimpses Peking from a closed car owned by a sympathetic friend. It is known that Hsuan is becoming "fed up" with the present routine and that he yearns to see something of the outside world, especially the British Isles, Canada and the United States, of which he has read much.

The boy monarch has apparently no desire to return to power in China. He was only seven years old when, as the choice of the famous old dowager Empress Lang Yu, he was placed on the throne. He had no opportunity of lasting power. The revolution came a few years later and he was obliged to resign the government before he scarcely knew what the action meant. He retains the throne and title with the Chinese people and the terms of the abdication are such that a fairly pleasant future is before him if he is able to control his own activities.

Too Many Courtiers
The trouble is that the young emperor has so many retainers and courtiers that it is impossible to break away from tradition and to live as a free man. Even his design to tour the world may be interfered with because there are influential courtiers within the forbidden city who realize that with the emperor journeying in foreign lands they must join the ranks of the unemployed. Hundreds of people earn a livelihood within the Forbidden City, hemmed in by the quinn wall, and they are on the payroll merely because the emperor lives there. Naturally they do not favor progressive ideas for the emperor and brown upon ineffectual wanderlust.

Under the terms of abdication His Majesty is granted \$4,000,000 annually with which he is expected to maintain the palace and his bodyguard and as the republican government has defaulted in a number of payments recently the idea of abandoning the pomp and grandeur of a paper empire has gained strength. If it were not for his private income the emperor would probably be forced to eliminate many of the luxuries which his advisers consider it necessary to order to maintain the dignity of the imperial station.

The young empress too is eager to travel. She has been instructed in the English language by a young Philadelphia woman and speaks English fluently. Now that the imperial household contains two ardent advocates of the plan to see something of the world, it is believed that the job holders have more to worry about than ever.

POLICE COSTS HERE AND ELSEWHERE ARE COMPARED BY BOARD

Police costs here were compared by the commission last night with those prevailing in other cities of the province. It was shown that a stenographer's bill here for one month was \$128, while for the entire year of 1923 it tallied only \$6,89. Transportation of prisoners to Okalla prison also came heavy in Prince Rupert. To take two men to the provincial jail last month it had cost this city \$145 while the entire transportation bill of Nanaimo for 1923 was \$152.

Speaking of stenographers' fees, Mayor Rochester stated his opinion that there was too much unnecessary evidence taken in local police court cases. Qualifying this statement, the city clerk said that one case alone had contained 20,000 words.

In the matter of revenue, however, it was pointed out by Commissioner Macdonald that fines here in 1921 had tallied \$11,000 as against \$8,400 in the city of New Westminster.

"Taken as a whole," said Commissioner Macdonald, "I think this city would bear favorable comparison with any other city in the province. There is little actual crime here and one thing is certain that any woman is safe on our streets from 6 in the morning until midnight, and I think that it is our police force that is largely responsible for the state of law and order here which is in a class by itself."

POLICE REPORT FOR MONTH OF NOVEMBER

Fines Collected Totalled \$525—21 Convictions Out of 31 Charges

According to the report of the chief of police for the month of November, submitted to the commission last night, there were 31 charges dealt with in the police court during the month resulting in 21 convictions, 4 dismissals and 6 pending cases. Under the Government Liquor Act 24 cases resulted in 17 convictions. Five six month sentences were handed down, the most of these being appealed and the accused out on bail. Six clubs had been given \$1000 fines but had failed to pay and warrants of distress were issued. Fines for the month tallied \$525. Bread and coal weights had been tested and found correct.

People of Strawberry Town Enjoyed Breach of Promise Suit Put on by Welfare League

TERRACE, Dec. 14.—A special feature of Terrace Welfare League meeting on Tuesday night was a mock trial in which Miss Susanah Dewdrop (Miss Fowler) sued Theophilus Mephisto (Sammy Kirkaldy) for breach of promise. The trial was very amusingly conducted by F. C. Bishop and A. Fowler, lawyers for the plaintiff and defendant. Rev. W. J. Parsons acted as clerk of the court and Mr. Archie Donaghy as judge. The mother of the plaintiff, Mrs. V. T. Sundal, caused much merriment in her heart rending account of her daughter's tragedy.

The witnesses for the prosecution were Mrs. Sundal, Misses Fowler and Dohp, and Messrs. Beacher and Long. Those for the defense were Miss Grieg, Mrs. Callahan, and Messrs Brooks and Renwood.

The jury was called from the audience and Mrs. Grieg as foreman delivered their verdict.

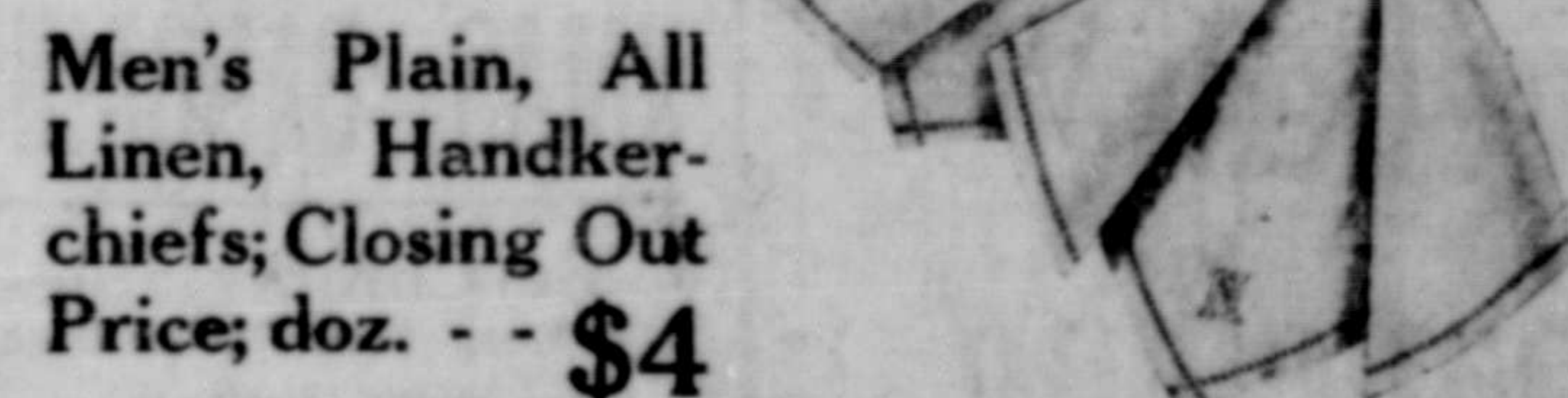

NEW MATERIAL ROPE MAKING

Arghan, Discovered in South America, Has Strength of Steel—Better Than Hemp

A new fabric, known as Arghan, has been discovered recently in South America according to the Overseas Daily Mail. Fibre experts claim it equal the strength of steel and has proved itself 50 per cent stronger than the best hemp or flax for rope-making. It is of a beautiful silk-like texture.

The discovery was made by Sir Henry Wickham—a pioneer of the rubber plantation industry—during his explorations in the uncharted wilds of South America. He first noticed the material being used by certain native races for the making of bags, nets, and various classes of fabrics. Upon investigation, he ascertained that it was a plant fibre known as arghan and that it was derived from a plant of the Maguey or pineapple order.

Preparation Simple

The discoverer was also impressed with the simplicity of the preparation process and with the fact that it required no degumming or retting as is the case with flax, hemp, ramie, and other fibres. All that was necessary was to dry the large, long leaves and then tear them into their constituent fibres. The result was the production of beautiful silk-like filaments, up to 8 even feet in length, of a pearly white color. A firm of ropemakers in England has submitted arghan to rigid tests and the fibre has proved to be 50 per cent stronger than the best hemp or flax.

Further investigation has demonstrated that arghan can be woven into a magnificently firm material. It bleaches admirably and is easily and permanently dyed.

Experts Enthusiastic

British experts have become very enthusiastic over the future possibilities of arghan.

The fibre was submitted for tests to Messrs. Bevan & Cross, British government fibre experts for the Federated Malay States, who declare that it possesses unquestionable merits. Indeed, bulk for bulk it equalled the strength of steel. Foreseeing the immense commercial and national possibilities, the Federated Malay States immediately offered the Arghan Syndicate 30,000 acres free of fee, for development purposes.

Manufacturers' Enthused

An expedition was thereupon despatched to South America and, after considerable trouble, the members were able to convey a quantity of the roots and suckers to the Malay Peninsula, where it was first acclimatized in a nursery. Next the Indian and Ceylon governments offered similar large tracts of land and today these plantations are proving very successful indeed. Lancashire manufacturers are enthusiastic over the possibilities of the new fibre.

The responsibility of producing and placing on the market adequate quantities of arghan fibre has been undertaken by a number of thoroughly practical men who believe that the venture upon which they embarked will result in placing at the disposal of British textile manufacturers a new Empire-grown raw material of great value.

M'GILL PROFESSORS AT JANITOR'S FUNERAL

MONTREAL, Dec. 14.—A large number of professors and students of McGill University, together with the principal, Sir Arthur Currie, gathered in the lecture room of the Chemistry and Mining Building recently to pay a last tribute of respect to Joseph Grimsdale, the oldest janitor of the university, whose death took place suddenly. The funeral service was held in the lecture room of the building of which Mr. Grimsdale had been janitor for 25 years of his 30 years service at McGill. Shortly before the time fixed for the service, the casket was carried to the lecture room and completely covered with wreaths, tributes from professors and students, by whom he was held in highest esteem.
