Needs of this District Presented to Dr. King by Northern Members

(Special to Daily News.)

VICTORIA, Dec. 23.—Hon. Dr. J. H. King, federal minister of public works, had a conference yesterday with Hon. T. D. Pattullo, member for Prince Rupert, and Hon. A. M. Manson, member for Omineca, in regard to the needs of the north country and especially in regard to immigration policies and co-operation between the Dominion and province.

"I was hoping to have visited Prince Rupert this time but I could not possibly do so," said Dr. King to a Daily News representative. "However, your constituency is so well looked after by your member, Fred Stork, that it is not necessary. I know conditions there well. Mr. Stork is a splendid man, highly esteemed by the government and respected by the other side of the House.

MINISTERS GO HOME FOR XMAS

Few Members of Government Remaining Next Week at Ottawa

OTTAWA, Dec. 23.—Several cabinet ministers have left or are leaving shortly to spend Christmas out of the city and the holiday finds fewer than half a dozen members of the government in the capital. It is expected that Premier King, Hon. Charles Stewart, Hon. D. D. McKenzie and Hon. H. S. Beland will remain here for the holidays.

BATTLING SIKI TAKING ACTION

To Sue French Boxing Federation as a Result of Recent Suspension

PARIS, Dec. 23.—Batling Siki, the former European heavyweight boxing champion, has started legal proceedings against the French Boxing Federation which recently deprived him of the title he won from George Carpentier and suspended him for nine months upon charges of various escapades being brought against him by French sportsmen.

BELGIAN STUDENTS PROTESTED ACTION

Object to Government Changing Ghent University Into Flemish Institution

BRUSSELS, Dec. 23.—Thousands of students paraded yesterday protesting against parliament changing Ghent University into a Flemish institution. A protest signed by 4,000 students was presented to parliament. Twenty people were injured in street fighting.

REPUBLICANS ARE RELEASED TODAY FROM DUBLIN JAIL

DUBLIN, Dec. 23.—Two hundred and sixty-four Republicans were released from prison today having signed declarations of allegiance to the Free State. Four of them are women.

SECTION OF OLD COUNTRY SNOWED UP

LONDON, Dec. 23.—Derbyshire is almost snowed up and Buxton where thousands of Canadian soldiers sojourned as inmates of the discharge depot, is practically isolated at present.

DIFFICULTIES ROAD MAKING

Vancouver Contractor Compares Costs Here and in South

Louis M. Deitler, who recently visited the city in connection with the winding up of the Smith Island quarries and who is head of a crushed rock and gravel business which bears his name in the south as well as head of the United Paving Company, has given some very interesting comparisons in regard to the cost of paving here and in Vancouver.

Speaking of the delivery of rock to the city here, Mr. Deitler mentioned the fact that he had prepared and delivered 12,000 cubic yards in one month in the south while it has taken 15 months to do the same work in this city. He added that he was prepared to deliver crushed granite on Prince Rupert streets from Vancouver at \$5.00 a cubic yard. Asked regarding the spraying of asphalt on the streets, he told of the method used in the south where he laid eight miles of streets this year under contract. The work was speeded up by using a motor spray wagon of 500 gallons capacity capable of applying a tank car a day. The asphalt was supplied heated at the siding and pumped into the spray tank. His contract for spraying was at the rate of 22 cents a gallon or 44 cents per square yard of completed surface. The cost of the raw material in Prince Rupert, inclusive of freight and hauling, was 47 cents per gallon and the cost per square yard sprayed at the rate of two gallons to a yard, was 16.44 cents.

MELBOURNE, Dec. 23.—Labor gets a majority in the Australian parliament with 29 members. Premier Hughes' Nationalists have 27 and the Liberal and Country parties, 19.

PRODUCTION OF MINES GREATER

British Columbia's Minerals For Year 1922 Will Total \$32,167,463, Minister Estimates

VICTORIA, Dec. 23.—The value of the mineral output in British Columbia for the year 1922 is estimated at \$32,167,463 as compared with \$28,066,644 in 1921 according to an announcement made yesterday by Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines. Gold and silver production has increased, the former amounting to \$1,116,816 and the latter to \$4,634,454.

- 5—Properties having reverted to the City through Tax Sales to be sold in order that they may again become revenue producers.
- 6—A business administration for efficiency and economy.

PROSPECTS HERE ARE VERY GOOD

Lieut. Governor Nichol Says Britain Recovering But Other European Countries in Chaos

VICTORIA, Dec. 23.—Lieut. Governor W. C. Nichol, on returning from a four-month tour to Europe, says that he found chaos in nearly every country with dissipation and idleness evident on all sides in Germany. British conditions, however, have passed the worst and Empire development is bound to recommence soon with Canada getting a fair share of prosperity, he thinks. He finds the prospects for British Columbia's industries good for next year. Export trade is waiting for development which can only be brought about with an influx of immigration. Mr. Nichol thinks Canada should go after immigration as Australia has done.

PROCEED WITH VICTORIA DOCK

Hon. Dr. King Gives Order—Total of Millian and Half to be Expended

VICTORIA, Dec. 23.—Hon. Dr. J. H. King, federal minister of public works, has ordered resumption of work on the Victoria dry dock. It is expected the new plant will be in active operation by June 1924 and tenders will shortly be asked for operating it. Equipment to the value of about \$500,000 is to be purchased, making a total of \$1,500,000 to be expended.

ON LIFEBOAT IN ATLANTIC

Freighter Picks up Six Men Half Dead From Hunger and Fatigue

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—A lifeboat containing six men half dead from hunger and fatigue was picked up 4,000 miles out in Mid-Atlantic by the freighter Menominee on Friday. They were members of the crew of the fishing schooner Gordon Ridge of Newfoundland which was abandoned in a storm while sailing from Spain with salt fish.

CHRISTMAS TREE AND PARTY GIVEN TO METHODIST KIDDIES

BIG ROAD GRANT Omineca Riding

The Goodwill Of Christmas.
 Peace and Good-will. This is the key-note of Christmas. Peace is in reality the outcome of good-will. Any apparent peace which is not founded upon mutual good-will is little better than an armed neutrality. This holds true not only in regard to individuals, but also in regard to groups of individuals both small and great.

It seems easy to stir up ill-will between man and man, between class and class, and between nation and nation. It is only necessary to repeat some unkind statement about another, foster some old grudge against another, and imagine some provoking insult given by another, and whether this other be an individual, a class, or a nation, the result is the same. Ill-will is created and the seeds of strife and war are sown.

Good-will Must Be Increased.
 It seems difficult to inspire the good-will which kindly of another, speaks well of another, and renders helpful service to another, whether this other be an individual, a class, or a nation, but if this world is ever to grow better the energy and range of good-will must be greatly increased.

This is really not so difficult a matter as it seems if we go about it in the right way. The secret is to implant in our subconscious mind the spirit of good-will and this spirit will go on working silently day and night as a powerful suggestion until it pervades our whole being; and the best source from which to draw this spirit of good-will is from the Christ of Christmas.

Law Of Life: Like Begets Like.
 It is the law of life that like begets like. If we send forth good-will we shall receive back good-will. Sympathetic mental radiation plays an important part in our lives. It takes very little to start a fire of war-like passion running through the nation. It should take less effort to spread the contagion of good-will throughout the world.

On Christmas Day we get a glimpse of the transforming power of the fellowship of good-will; God and men being drawn together in Christ. If millions of people on different continents would only concentrate their minds for a few minutes each day upon the love of God seeking to become incarnate in the lives of men a psychic wave of good-will to all would sweep round the world with irresistible power and there would be — "Peace on Earth."

The local fish houses expect a big rush of fish over the week end although no fish will be handled through the Fish Exchange on Monday, Christmas.
