ACTIVITIES AT SAWMILL ON MASSET INLET

BITTER DISPUTE CAUSES CLOSING OF SESSION AT LAUSANNE CONFERENCE

Buckley Mill in Full Operation; Schooner Loading for Seattle

BUCKLEY BAY, Q.C.L., Dec. 21.—Good progress is being made with the loading of a large lumber schooner at the Massett Timber Co.'s mill here which is now in operation and it is expected to be completed by the end of the year. She has a capacity of 900,000 feet, 400,000 between decks and 500,000 deck load. The cargo is consigned for Seattle.

Shortly after the New Year, the first of the company's new lumber schooners is expected to arrive to take the large cants to Los Angeles. These large timbers are now being made into rafts. The schooner will anchor off shore and load from the water. This will enable the ship to be loaded as fast as the lumber can be stowed aboard and will obviate any difficulty with the wharf.

The mill is running regularly, producing from 80,000 to 100,000 feet per day and employing about 125 men.

LADY RHONDDA GETS DIVORCE

Sir Humphrey Mackworth Does Not Defend Petition Brought Against Him

LONDON, Dec. 21.—Lady Rhondda was today granted a divorce from her husband, Sir Humphrey Mackworth. The suit was undefended.

Lady Rhondda is the daughter of the late Viscount Rhondda who was British food controller during the war. She succeeded him in directing his many large business enterprises.

Lady Rhondda visited Prince Rupert in the fall of 1919 in the course of a tour of Canada. Her father's estate includes coal holdings in the Ground Hog country.

PRINCE JOHN IN FROM ISLANDS

The G.T.P. steamer Prince John arrived in port this morning from the south via the Islands. She carried a fair passenger list and also 300 tons of coal from Nahaim, which she is now discharging at the Albert & McCaffrey dock.

Captain Nodden reported very fine weather and also that the mills at Buckley Bay are now running full blast. A large schooner is anchored at the mill taking a shipment of lumber for Seattle.

SURVEY FOR PULP MILL

Has Been Completed at Buckley Bay—New York Expert on Ground

BUCKLEY BAY, Dec. 21.—A survey has been completed on the Ian River in connection with the possibility of establishing a pulp mill. The power to be developed, it is planned, will operate both the pulp and the present sawmill and the waste from the sawmill could be made into pulp. A power expert from New York has been on the ground lately examining the possibilities of the project.

WILL NOT ADMIT ARMENIAN REFUGEES

United States Government Deaf to Appeals of Numerous Organizations

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Despite numerous appeals, especially by Church organizations, that the Federal Government take action to raise immigration bars to Armenian and Greek refugees seeking admission to this country, no action will be taken by the Administration to this end, it was learned authoritatively today. Congressional action, it is pointed out, would be necessary, and the Administration feels that this is not a matter in which it should take the initiative.

WINNIPEG MILL MAN SECURES TITLE TO ACREAGE IN GEORGE

PRINCE GEORGE, Dec. 21.—J. D. McArthur, the Winnipeg lumberman, writes to Mayor Johnson that he has received the title from the Hudson Bay Co. for acreage in the city of Prince George, on which he proposes to put up a big sawmill. Mr. McArthur says he is going ahead with the project and the next step will be the securing of permission from the provincial government to close certain streets.

Complications following an attack of the influenza are said by his doctors to be the cause of the serious illness from which he has been suffering for weeks. His constitution, it is stated, has been undermined through the use of liquor and narcotics. He is attended constantly by two physicians and two male nurses. Mrs. Alice Davenport, the star's mother-in-law, and his wife, formerly Miss Dorothy Davenport, are at his bedside.

COMMODITIES DO NOT LIST HIGHLY

Reciprocal Trade Agreement With Australia Not Extensive

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 21.—The reciprocal trade agreement which Hon. J. A. Robb has negotiated with the tariff board of Australia is not on an extensive line of commodities. It is understood that fruits and raisins are the principal products of the Commonwealth to which the preferential tariff will be applied, while pulp and paper and lumber will be the main Canadian commodities. Similarly treated wool, which is extensively imported from Australia is already on the free list. As regards manufactures, Australia is going into that line itself and it is understood that few Canadian lines enter into the agreement.

Venezelos and Riza Nur Bey Had Wordy Altercation When Emigration Question Was Up

LAUSANNE, Dec. 21.—A wordy altercation between ex-Premier Venezelos, of Greece, and Riza Nur Bey, the Turk Nationalist delegate, caused Signor Montagna, president of the Near East conference commission on minorities, to bring this morning's session of the commission to an abrupt close.

The dispute was over the question of liberty of emigration. Premier Venezelos bitterly attacked the Angora government and protested against the alleged deportation of Greeks by the thousands from Anatolia. Riza Nur replied in a similar vein charging Venezelos with being responsible for the Turko-Greek war and its consequences. The voices of both men rose to a high pitch and the pleadings of the president to calm down were of no avail.

ST. NAZAIRE, France, Dec. 21.—The coasting steamer Vintilis foundered early today with a loss of nine men of the crew after having been rammed and cut in two by the Norwegian freighter Asturi just off St. Nazaire shortly before midnight.

ALL BRITISH EXHIBITION

Duke of Devonshire Undertakes that Only Empire Products Will Be Used

LONDON, Dec. 21.—The Duke of Devonshire has written on behalf of the 1924 Empire Exhibition to Sir Joseph Cook, Australian High Commissioner, undertaking that only Empire materials will be used in the construction of the Exhibition buildings and that only Empire products will be used in the Exhibition restaurants. There will be no exception from this rule unless the authorities and representatives of the Dominions co-operating in the management, certify that Empire products are not available.

HOPES FOR SPEEDY MEETING BETWEEN NORTH AND SOUTH

BELFAST, Dec. 21.—Hope for a speedy meeting between the representatives of Ulster and of the Irish Free State to reach an agreement on the questions affecting both sections was expressed by the Duke of Abercorn, the new governor-general of northern Ireland, in his first speech to the Ulster house.

"I desire," he said, "to express the earnest hope that the time may not be far distant when the executive of the Irish Free State and the executive of northern Ireland may meet to settle in amicable fashion those questions outstanding which affect both areas."

NO POLITICS EDICT RECEIVES SUPPORT

MONTREAL, Dec. 21.—Canadian National Express Company employees, at a meeting here expressed hearty approval of the announcement made by Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways that he would run the lines without political interference.

PRINCE RUPERT - BRITISH COLUMBIA

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Broader Work Of Teaching Exemplified.

That the children of this city are receiving excellent training along the lines of art was demonstrated by the confident and free yet exact manner in which many difficult rules were enacted at the public school concert last night. It is through such functions as these that the public learns that school work in Prince Rupert, as well as elsewhere, is no longer devoted entirely to the tedious requirements of regularity and punctuality, department and the rules of the three "Y's." That is as it should be for modern pedagogy is ever realizing more and more that there is something better in the teaching profession than the formal propounding of grammar, figures and geography and other subjects as set down in the old curricula.

Self-reliance, confidence and ability to face the public are ever becoming more essential requisites to useful citizenship. If the child is early instructed along these lines, their use will come readily when manhood and womanhood is reached. Performing in public is one of the best ways of inculcating these attributes.

The teachers and the children themselves are to be congratulated on their splendid efforts as shown at the Christmas concert.

Christmas Business Quiet This Year.

Economy is in the air even in the matter of Christmas buying. Local merchants report a quiet holiday trade. Of course there is more business on account of the gift season but it does not come up to that of previous years.

This is rather a peculiar condition for, generally speaking, money is no tighter this Christmas than it has been in certain winters of the past. It seems that a wave of general economy has hit the community and people are getting back to sane and sensible giving from the extravagances of the past few years.

This may be good for the tradesman and it may not be. If the people are curtailing their actual spending capacity, the merchants are losing. If it is simply a matter of spending within their means then everybody will be ahead for bad debts always follow when people spend more than they have.

Activity In Mining Field.

The production of gold and silver in Canada continues on an increased scale, says the Canadian Bank of Commerce monthly trade letter. Producing gold mines are being exploited more vigorously and new properties are being tested and put into operation, not only in the Porcupine district in Ontario, but in British Columbia and the Yukon Territory. In the last-named, recent developments indicate finds of silver sufficiently large to ensure the successful operation of the camps for some years. In practically all coal-mining districts activity is reported, but it is exceptionally great in those districts which serve the prairie provinces. At Drumheller shipments for October, 1922, were 5,211 cars, as compared with 2,622 cars in 1921. On the Pacific Coast the mines are operating to the limit of shipping facilities.

Better Demand For Salmon.

Salmon packers in British Columbia are experiencing a better demand for canned salmon from the United States, where prices are rising to a parity with those in Canada. Except in the case of sockeyes, the situation in the salmon industry is regarded as satisfactory, it being expected that stocks will be cleaned up completely in the course of a few months. Figures received from salmon-canning plants in British Columbia indicate an increase of 50 per cent over the pack of 1921. The total pack of salmon for 1921 was 602,548 cases, while this year it is 1,257,639 cases, of which 299,423 are sockeyes. The output of chums has been much lower than expected.

PAST SESSION UNDER REVIEW

Government is Stronger Today And Indications Are That It Will Live Out Term

LAST DAYS

Members Were Anxious to Get Away and There Was Much Speeding Up of Work

In H. F. Pullen's... VICTORIA, Dec. 21.—Liberal members of the Legislature went away Saturday very much pleased with themselves and with the work of the session. They were pleased because the early had been threatened with all sorts of dire things by opposition leaders and opposition news and none of these things happened. As a result of the session the Government is much stronger today than it was a year ago and not a suggestion of dissolution is heard anywhere.

To press representatives Premier Oliver expressed satisfaction that the work done and at the present standing of the Government. Other ministers, also, were very pleased and the Liberal Whip, John Buckham and the chairman of caucus, K. C. MacDonald, of Vernon, spoke of the efficiency of members and the good work done.

Most of the bills had to do with revision of the work of the department of the attorney-general. A new minister usually finds things that do not suit him. When the present Government first came into power, Hon. T. D. Pattullo was responsible for a good deal of legislation dealing with practically every section of his large department. Now all the departments are working smoothly and little legislation is needed there. Next year the Attorney General is likely to have less than at the present session.

Much Time on Liquor

As has been mentioned before almost half the time of the session has been devoted to discussions of some phase of the sale of intoxicating liquors. It commenced right at the opening of the session with criticisms of this department of the Government's activities and was taken up in the discussion of the budget, continued every day in the public accounts committee and reached an acute stage when the resolutions were presented, having to do with the sale of beer by the glass. The final efforts were made when the Attorney General's bill amending the Liquor Act came before the House, the last half hour of the last day being devoted to final attempts to defeat the amendment providing imprisonment in first offences instead of fines for those convicted of selling beer.

The curious thing about beer divisions was that the divisions were not along party lines, yet the majorities were about the same as on Government measures. The last vote might have been considered a party division, yet a number of Liberals voted against the Government while the leader of the opposition voted with the Government. In the final lineup those voting against imprisonment for beer selling were Mrs. Smith, Messrs. White-side, Ian McKenzie, Kergin, Perry, Anderson, Farris, Lister, Pooley, Schofield, Wallinger, Uphill, K. C. MacDonald, Campbell and Hinchcliffe.

Independence Not Weakness

The one or two occasions when the votes were close were in committee on minor questions. Once there was a tie and the Speaker voted with the Government but this was on a minor amendment to the Land Registry
