### SALMON SEASON NOW CLOSING

Smiths and Rivers Inlet Are Done  
and Sockeye Fishing on Naas  
and Skeena Close Tuesday

Major J. A. Motherwell, chief inspector of fisheries for the province, reports that the salmon season is now over at Rivers Inlet and Smiths Inlet, and, as far as sockeye is concerned, the season on the Naas and Skeena Rivers will close on the evening of August 22, next Tuesday. Some canneries may continue to use all varieties, cohoes and chums, but with 6 1/2 inch nets and gill seines after that date but being activity for the season on the rivers will be about concluded.

### MINES FLOOD STRIKE AREA

Extra Troops Ordered to  
Nova Scotia For Police  
Work

SYDNEY, N.S., Aug. 18.—The firemen and pumpmen at all the Nova Scotia collieries have decided to leave the mines and water is commencing to pour into two more. Number ten is already half full and may never be operated again.

Many steam and sailing craft are lying up here, unable to get coal.

The situation is quiet but 500 extra troops have been ordered by the federal minister to police Cape Breton, making a total of 1,000 on duty.

Both sides in the wage dispute are adamant, the men declaring they will not yield, even if it means starvation. The operators say they will let the mines be destroyed before they will give in.

### PROVINCIAL HOSPITALS OPERATE ON DEFICIT

Loss of Year Was \$120,000 or  
For Two Years, \$227,000.

VICTORIA, Aug. 18.—The hospitals of British Columbia after receiving all provincial and municipal grants operated on a deficit of \$120,000, according to a statement of Hon. Dr. McLean, provincial secretary. This, with the deficit carried over from last year brings the total deficit up to \$227,000. The actual loss was eleven per cent.

### CONTRACT IS LET FOR EDMONTON LIBRARY

EDMONTON, Aug. 18.—The Library board has accepted the tender of the Poole Construction Company of Regina to erect the new library building at a cost to the city of \$125,109. The bid was \$11,500 less than any local bid. The building will be constructed of Bedford stone.

### Masterful Address Before Canadian Bar Association on Ideals of the Empire

VANCOUVER, Aug. 18 (By Canadian Press).—"I have come thus far," said Lord Shaw of Dunfermline to the Canadian Bar Association assembled here in annual convention, "not alone because of your gratefully appreciated invitation, but because I am a believer in a British Empire which linked together by law, dedicates the majesty of justice to the service of mankind."

In a lengthy address Lord Shaw touched on the share of the Scotchman in "the citizenship of the world;" gave high place to law as a force which stabilized "the very life of civilization," and spoke of the relations of the component parts of what he called the "Imperial Brotherhood" of the British Empire; and told of the part played by the Privy Council in linking together Dominions and dependencies with "an administrative jurisprudence which with equal hand preserves for all alike the priceless heritage of an appeal to justice wide and open and inviolate."

"I wish to make it plain that the British Empire is not to me an imperial dominion but an Imperial Brotherhood. Canada has arrived; her nationhood is accomplished, and it has been ac-

### FARMER SHOT RESULT FEUD

Henry Green of Douglas District  
Dead and Posse After Slayer.

NEW WESTMINSTER, Aug. 18.—Henry Green, a farmer residing in Douglas district near the international boundary, was shot and killed last night, his alleged slayer being James Austin, another farmer of the district. The police say the shooting was the result of a long feud between the two men. The shooting took place on Austin's farm. Austin fled and is now being sought by a posse headed by Chief of Police Matheson of Cloverdale.

### MINNESOTA PEOPLE FLY FOREST FIRE

Death Toll So Far Reported  
Is Twelve and Other  
Towns Doomed.

DULUTH, Aug. 18.—Fears are expressed that the death toll from forest fires raging in northern Minnesota will go beyond the reported total of twelve. Three small towns have been destroyed and only rain or a calm day can save a score of other towns. Mindful of the 1918 holocaust in northern Minnesota when more than 400 lost their lives, hundreds of persons abandoned their homes livestock and everything they owned and fled last night on all the main roads leading to Duluth.

### Resolve To Establish Nurses' Home Follows Appeal by Miss Randal

After hearing Miss Helen Randal, inspector of training schools and registrar of graduate nurses for B.C., make an urgent appeal for the establishment of a nurses' home in connection with the Prince Rupert General Hospital, a meeting of representative citizens in the hospital last night decided to take immediate steps with this end in view. Accordingly a meeting is to be called as soon as possible to which delegates of various patriotic, fraternal, philanthropic and religious societies will be invited. At this meeting will be selected a strong committee which will undertake the work of raising funds for the nurses' home which Miss Randal desires should accommodate 25 nurses and be built on the unit plan so that it may be added to. The estimated cost of the building will be \$15,000. The hospital board besides having the lots, has already on hand \$2100 cash as a nucleus fund, this having been donated for the nurses' home purpose some two years ago by the Red Cross Society.

D. G. Stewart, president of the hospital board, presided at the meeting last night and there were present Mrs. T. C. Pringle (president, Mrs. D. W. Morrissey, Mrs. Harry Atkins, Mrs. Max Heilbroner, Mrs. S. Dorton, Mrs. Parsons and Mrs. T. C. Duncan of the Ladies Auxiliary; Judge F. McB. Young, president of the Canadian Red Cross Society; Joe Greer, representing the Masonic order; W. F. Roberge, Elks; Ald. Rod McLeod, E. A. Donohoe, S. K. Campbell, and Major E. Gibson.

Miss Randall Speaks.  
In opening her address, Miss Randal said that the hospital here was one of which the city might be proud. However, the test of the value of a hospital was the quality of the nursing. The building might be beautiful but if the nursing was not efficient it amounted to nothing. Prince Rupert Hospital was fortunate in having such a matron as Miss Black. There were very few women in Canada with such qualifications as she had. A graduate of the Vancouver General Hospital, she had had charge of a training school in California and had been a member of the first class in nurses' training at the McGill University and was, in fact, president of the class. The pupil nurses here were, therefore, being well trained.

"The day has gone by when girls come to a hospital to serve a three year sentence," declared Miss Randal. "They come as students and there is supposed to be a proper school. If there is not then it is not honest to call it a training school. Besides the equipment there must be proper housing. Well equipped hospitals in the United States (Continued on Page Two)

### WELCOME TO BARON BYNG

Plans Are Now Well Advanced—  
Handsome Scroll of Welcome  
Ready

Preparations for the reception of Baron Byng of Vimy, Governor General of Canada, on his official visit to the city tomorrow afternoon are practically complete. The various organizations have done their parts and the general public, it is expected, will turn out in large numbers to make the success roving and complete.

The Great War Veterans met last night and decided to have a mass parade which will assemble at the rooms at 3:30 tomorrow afternoon and march to the government dock. All men are asked to wear their decorations. President W. E. Denning will be in charge. This will be besides the North B.C. Regiment guard of honor, Boy Scouts, Naval Cadets, Girl Guides, etc. The speaking platform has already been erected by the city on the wharf.

Mortie Craig has just completed the handsome scroll of welcome which will be presented by Mayor Rochester on behalf of the city. The decorations and text are burnt in by Mr. Craig's peculiar fire etching method on caribou skin tanned by the Indians of the Mackenzie River. It is 30 by 19 inches in dimensions and is silk lined. It bears the monogram of the Governor General, the seal of the city and the signature of the mayor besides decorations of a patriotic description. Similar scrolls have been highly prized by visitors of the past and, no doubt, Baron Byng will also be delighted with Prince Rupert's gift of such a unique and peculiar nature.

### HAZELTON OIL AND COAL COMPANY HAS BEEN INCORPORATED

Difficult Situation  
In Palestine Today.

The position in Palestine, according to all accounts, is a most difficult one, largely because of the religious and racial divisions in the population of the country. The native population is largely Mohammedan but besides that there is a considerable Jewish section and a Christian section and the latter is divided into Catholic and Protestant.

For years there has been a movement on foot to have Palestine repopulated with Jews and have it become the national headquarters of the Jewish people. This has been to some extent fostered by Great Britain and the United States. To this, objection is taken by the Mohammedan population who see in it an attempt to drive Islam from the country and supplant it. They have seen the spread of Christianity in other countries and its aggressive methods followed by commercial aggression and they do not look with favor on any movement which will tend to oust them from one of their strongholds.

While the pressure from the Arabs would not be taken very seriously, if it were an isolated case, its relation to the Government of India where a large part of the population is Mohammedan, makes it necessary for the British Government to move carefully and to show no favors to any sect, religion or race in its governmental dealings. Britain has a mandate for the Government of Palestine, which was formerly under Turkish suzerainty, and the lopping off of the country from the Turkish empire is a blow at Islam which the Mohammedans do not appreciate.

Commenting on the situation Jamak Effendi el Hussein, the Secretary of the Arab Executive, said: "The world in general and in particular Great Britain must realize that the spark of liberty and independence still burns in the heart of every Palestinian. We would rather shed the last drop of our blood in the struggle for freedom than spend the rest of our lives as the slaves of the Jew in our beloved land."

Taking Part In  
Political Work.

Just now the Conservatives of the province are becoming active and a convention is being held at Vancouver at which the provincial leadership will be settled and other matters of importance to the party will be discussed. Local delegates have gone south and will be present at the meeting.

It is always important that people take an intelligent interest in political affairs. A hide bound politician is better than a man who takes no interest in political affairs or in the government of his country. The average person looks on governmental affairs without bias. While he may be influenced often by small things rather than considering the big issues, he does not follow one party all the time, else there would not be those great revulsions from one side to the other. Thousands of voters go to the polls with an open mind and are ready to be convinced of the justice of either cause.

Healthy Sign  
In Electorate.

This tendency to view the work of a party on its merits and to show independence in the matter of voting, is one of the hopeful signs of the times. It is the elasticity of the electorate that makes revolution unnecessary because anything and everything may be gained eventually through the ballot. If the Liberals are not right, turn them out and put some one better in their places. If they are doing good work, stand by them and support their actions. It is useless to abuse one side or the other. This is the method of the political trickster. Give each side fair consideration. View the policy without bias, trying to eliminate the petty and centering on the important. That is the method of the intelligent person.

AMATEUR PHOTOGRAPHERS  
LOOK FOR COMPETITION  
FROM OUTSIDE POINTS

One of the local amateur photographers has issued something that looks like a challenge to the snap shooters of Anyox, Terrace, Smithers and other towns of the neighborhood including Ocean Falls and Swanson Bay, to see if there is any scenery in their respective districts and which they can photograph equal to that around Prince Rupert.

With the raising of the restrictions against professional finishing for amateur photographers in one of the classes, interest in the photographic department has increased and there will be keen competition for the diploma and the Wrathall prize for the best collection of photos, either enlargements or contact prints to be shown at the fair.

There are some here who aver that there are no amateur photographers at Anyox and the other places and that nothing can be expected from those places.

MAKES BIG PROFIT  
MINING 50-CENT ORE

Figures Showing Exact Cost of  
Milling and Operating Mine

The remarkable performance of the Alaska Juneau Gold Mining Co., in making an operating profit on gold ore from which only 54 cents per ton of rock is recovered, is reported by the Engineering and Mining Journal Press of New York. For many years engineers have been at work perfecting the scheme of operations whereby this result is made possible. The record for June is as follows: 207,200 tons of ore was milled, from which 103,800 tons of coarse tailings was rejected and 103,400 tons was milled. The gold recovered amounted to \$112,000, or \$1.08 per ton milled, or 80.54 per cent. milled. This does not include recovered silver and lead, which is expected to net about \$6,000 per month.

The operating milling cost was \$46,000, or 44c per ton milled, or 22c per ton milled. The operating, tramming and mining cost was \$36,000, or 35c per ton milled, or 17c per ton milled. The operating general cost was \$3,000 or 3c per ton milled, or 2c per ton milled. The total operating expenditure was \$85,000, or 82c per ton milled, or 41c per ton milled. The operating profit was \$27,000. Expenditure on capital account totalled \$8,500; San Francisco expense, which was about \$2,000 above the normal, was \$17,000. The total estimated expenditure was \$110,500.

RESOLVE TO ESTABLISH  
NURSES' HOME FOLLOWS  
APPEAL BY MISS RANDAL

never have any difficulty in obtaining pupil nurses.

"What conditions would you want for your daughter? Would you want her to live with two or three in a room? Would you like her to work hard during the day and have no relaxation whatever away from the hospital? The nurses in training are working under those conditions here and a home is urgently needed.

## Time Has Come.

"The board has been in sympathy with the project but has done nothing so far. The time has come when something must be decided. This is an urgent need here and all energies should be put forward with this end in view.

"You are fortunate in having the site so that is something you will not have to pay for. What you need is a practical building with no frills but one that will provide proper conditions for the nurses. Nursing is a very arduous profession and the public sympathizes with the women engaged in it but, if proper hours for study, work and recreation

are provided as well as a proper home, they will have no complaint and will not need sympathy.

## Individual Rooms.

"Every nurse is deserving of proper accommodation and every one is entitled to a room by herself. It is not fair that one girl after her day's work, should have to share her room with another. One might need rest while the other might be more energetic and want fun. An individual room is the first requirement.

"Your home should be built on the unit plan, small at first. It should accommodate the present staff and perhaps a few more. My suggestion would be that the initial building accommodate about twenty-five nurses."

## Decide at Once.

President Stewart believed that the meeting should decide at once on building a nurses' home. If that decision was made it would be done. The Red Cross had donated \$2,000 which sum the board still had intact. They might be able to persuade the city council in the fall to give further share of the liquor profits to the hospital for this purpose. That would raise the \$2,000 to \$7,000. The estimated cost of the proposed building was \$15,000.

Judge Young said that there were very few people in the city who would doubt the necessity for a nurses' home. If any did, the words of Miss Randal would dispel the doubt. If any workers needed to be 100 percent efficient it was nurses and that would be impossible unless they had proper rest and recreation which could only properly be provided through a nurses' home. The Red Cross had understood there was to be a drive for \$10,000 but it had never been carried out. A greater effort would have to be made to raise money but he was satisfied that if the various patriotic, philanthropic and religious institutions joined together in the campaign that united effort would put it over successfully.

## Committee and Publicity.

Miss Randal said that a strong and representative committee should be delegated to undertake the matter. They should also advertise without letting up.

S. K. Campbell said that the matter should not be taken up in a haphazard manner and they should not be fooled with optimism. They should not undertake plans beyond their means and a building of immense proportions would be of no use. He would like to see the money before the plans. He suggested that an objective be set and that a strong committee be appointed to put it over quickly. With every institution working on it the campaign should be successfully carried out within a month.

## Masonic Support.

Joe Greer, representing the Masonic lodges, thought there would be no trouble in raising the money and going through with the project if they had a concrete plan and energetic workers. He, personally, and the organization which he represented would do all possible to assist.

Fred Roberge was in accord with all that had been said. The Elks would be all willing to get behind the drive, realizing that it would be in the best interests of the community. They could be relied upon.

Mrs. Parsons and Mrs. Pringle said that the Ladies' Auxiliary would do everything possible to assist in raising funds. Good work could not be done by the nurses under present conditions. Before the meeting closed, Miss Randal urged the press to keep up the drive for the nurses' home and not let the public lose sight of the necessity.

President Stewart thanked Miss Randal and assured her that the project would not be dropped this time. She, in reply said that she had no doubt it would go on when the people realized and knew the importance of the nurses' home to the efficiency and service of the hospital.

## VISITOR TO ROTARY CLUB ENTERTAINED

Frank H. Lamb, District Governor of Organization Addresses Members.

In honor of the visit of the district governor, Frank H. Lamb of Hoquiam, the local Rotary Club held a dinner last evening instead of the usual luncheon, the wives and lady friends of members being present for the occasion. T. H. Johnson presided and the proceedings proved most enjoyable. John Davie sang and there was a good deal of club singing. The speaker of the evening was Mr. Lamb who gave a masterly address, largely of interest to members of the order.

Mr. Lamb in opening referred to the development of the west. Life was commenced in log huts and even yet all were looking forward to things that were to be. He, personally, was glad to be one of the pioneers. In this land were pictures finer than any the hand of man could paint. As he came down the Skeena River he saw the loveliest scenery such as it would be hard to surpass. The West had great things in store for it.

Discussing the growth of Rotary, Mr. Lamb referred to the wonderful success it had attained. Today there were over 1200 clubs with a total of 83,000 members and yet they had never employed a paid organizer. The constitution was gradually being evolved. They were so devising it as to make it international in character without destroying its ideals. In Great Britain there were 100 clubs, and 28 countries were already represented although a number of these had but one club largely composed of members of the Anglo-Saxon race. Tokio had a native club and Copenhagen and Christiania had clubs made up of the two Scandinavian nations.

**Rotary Program.** Speaking of the program of the organization, the speaker outlined it as having to do with the cultivation of acquaintance, development of higher ethical standards, recognition of the worthiness of all vocations, increasing efficiency of the members, development of the idea of service, fostering interest in the commercial, social and moral life of the community.

Mr. Lamb emphasized the commercial basis of Rotary as an organization and declared it was not an uplift organization but one to make better businessmen of its members. It was distinguished from all other organizations in its system of choosing one member only from any

one business classification.

Attendance at meetings was one of the primal features of the clubs. The average last year had been eighty per cent, this having been steadily raised year by year to the present satisfactory condition but they would go higher yet. A member who did not attend the meetings was filling a classification that someone else should have.

**Importance of Business.** "Mr. Lamb said he thought it was about time to stop apologizing for business. Today business was one of the most important things in the world. The days of 'Let the buyer beware' and 'Business is business' had passed and a system of fair prices and good values was taking their place. The Rotarian was not in business primarily to make money. He gave public service. His gain was not all measured by profits. The motto, 'He profits most who serves best' should be always before them."

One matter that would have to receive attention in the near future was the relation of employer and employee. A set of principles governing this was being laid down. If there was any organization that could hope to have success in solving this problem it was the Rotary Club.

**Avoid Politics.** While members of the club should avoid politics, there was no harm in hearing speakers on both sides at club meetings. The club was a forum for presentation but not for determination. It did not in any way set itself up as the voice of the community. It endeavored to work and strengthen the board of trade and other civic organizations. Members should get behind it and work in the interests of the community. To allow the club to become a resolving club was to be avoided. Opposing opinions should be listened to with respect but members should have courage to carry out their convictions.

Mr. Lamb went on to tell of social service work that had

been done by clubs, but this was not the chief work. The main thing was to carry out the Rotary ideals in daily business. No profit was legitimate unless both parties to the deal benefited. Rotary was simply sounding brass unless it found expression in its members.

**International Aspect.** Dealing with the international aspect of Rotary, the speaker said it did not recognize the 19th parallel so far as their organization was concerned. When the organization became a sufficiently large force all dangers of an international cataclysm would cease. The golden rule should be carried out not only in personal but in international affairs. There were no foreigners in Rotary. It was carrying out the vision of the ages, the formation of one great fellowship throughout the world.

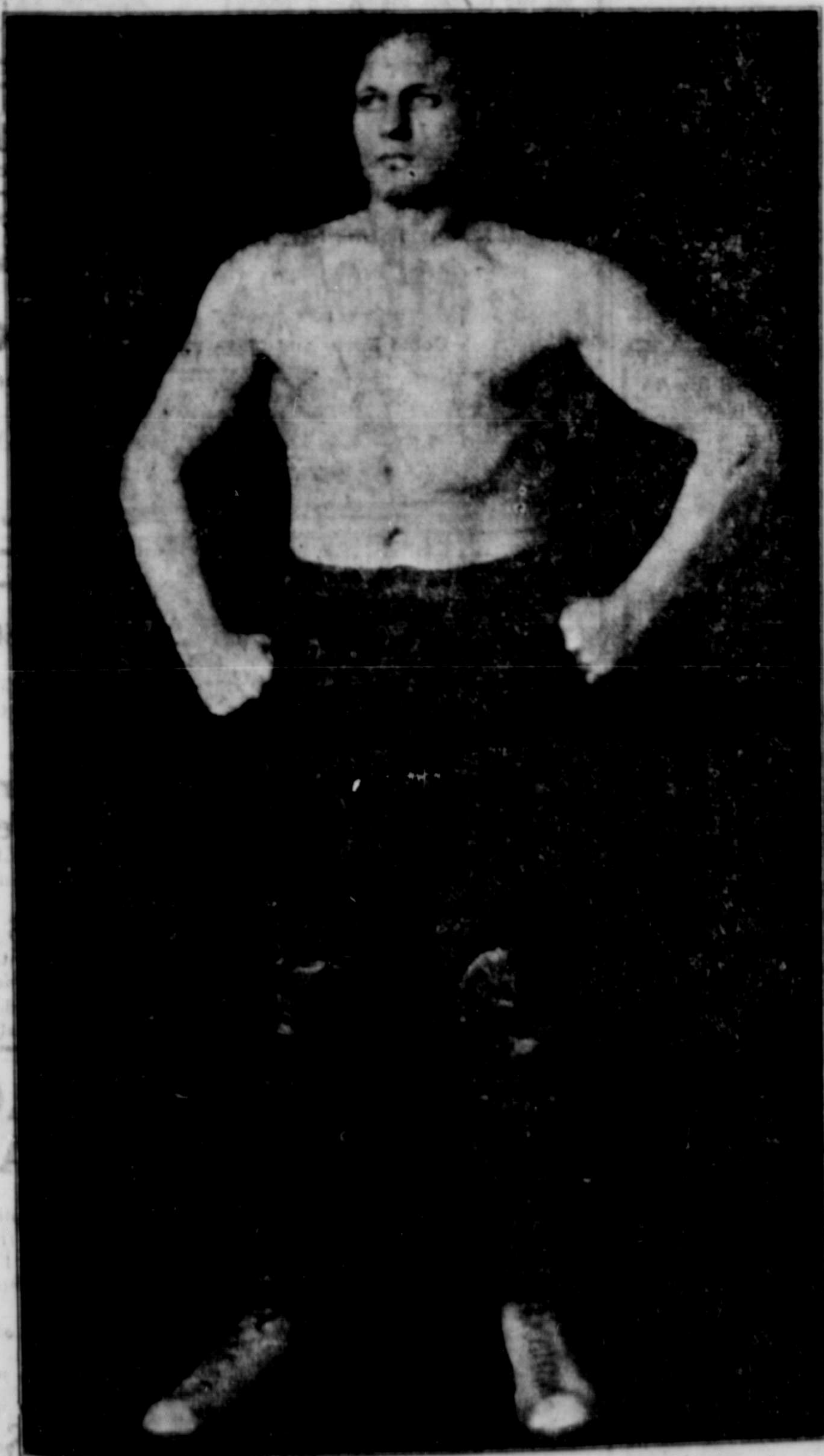
## DROWNS IN SHALLOW WATER DURING RACE

## MASTERFUL ADDRESS BEFORE CANADIAN BAR ASSOCIATION ON IDEALS OF THE EMPIRE.

(Continued from Page One.)

ciety, it will do so by a homage to those principles of law which over-reach the boundaries of states and which being consciously maintained can bind an Empire together, by that marvellous reconciler, adjuster, inspirer of Empire, justice itself. And it is the Ministry of Justice in which you and I are now enlisted. Law is the link of the Empire.

### Place in Empire

"I know well enough the ways of diplomats to affirm that it would in their opinion be more correct to have a written supplement to the Resolution of the Imperial War Conference of 1917. That will no doubt come; but the fact is there; it can never be gone back upon; the nationhood of Canada and her place in the most august councils of the world are established and sure, established beyond question, established for ever.

"The ink is hardly dry upon that concession of self-government to Ireland which it is hoped will bring peace to a land distracted for centuries. And the Irish Constitution breathes the very words, as well as the air, of this great Canadian dominion beyond the sea. Your constitution; the British North American Act; the famous entrustment of 'peace, order and good government' which we in the Privy Council know so well; the reference to Canada by name; all these crop up in this

new constitution to which every lover of peace and enlightenment wishes well; who will deny now that your rise and greatness are not only an Imperial asset but an Imperial example?"

### Binding Force.

"The laws which can endure as in elevating harmonizing and binding force, is a respecter of tradition, which, through the ages in every land have contributed something to the noble inheritance of mankind. It is in this way that law, as a link of empire, comes to be a very sacred thing. For, by force of reason and principle, law is lifted to the level of true majesty as the friend of progress. It gives liberty and individualism among the nations their chance, and receives back from then an enlightened gratitude or co-operation.

"An Empire, believing in freedom and self-government as a rule of right, not for the present alone, but for the future, recognizes also in the vast burden which it bears, the respect which is due to a mighty past; massing together the laws moved by the present day spirit among progressive peoples, with these inspired by traditions extending from the very dawn of recorded knowledge.

### Fortunate Canada.

"Canada, how fortunate she has been. Such good fortune the world has never known. Her southern frontier, over 3000 miles long, guarded for over a century by the good sense and friendship which were embodied in the Rush-Bagot Agree-

ment. Other nations have had to defend their Independence at enormous and depressing cost, with all the panoply of war. The Canadian Lakes are guarded by four of the greatest warships that the world has ever known; four vessels of 100 tons each but with a remarkable gun whose projectile weighs 18 lbs. To military and naval men these would be the ornaments of a doll's house, but to lovers of civilization and peaceful ways among the kingdoms of the earth they are consecrated symbols of good sense and good neighborhood.

They foreshadow the death of force and the life of reason in the government of human affairs. Then in her constitution also, as well as her situation, how grateful a country this wonderful Canada should be. She won it, and it has been made a model in Australia and South Africa, and even in Ireland, and in each of these cases, even the last, notwithstanding the acerbities of centuries of conflict, they strike that deep resonant chord of justice to which every land within the Empire responds, and all of these lands look upon the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council as a providentially handy keyboard upon which to sound it. With them the old notions of force and forcible restraints and forcible distortions, and still more force, all that disappears. It is justice all these nations are after that come to the British Throne and ask how an impartial tribunal views their problems."

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## GRUESOME WOMEN LIVE IN MILWAUKEE

Seem to Enjoy Keeping Remains of Dead Pets in House

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 18. — (By Canadian Press). — In a home crowded with living dogs and cats and with the skeletons of dead pets, amid the odor of decaying flesh and the dust and gloom of a neglected house, Jane and Margaret Mellen have been living with their brother for fourteen years.

With the shades drawn, the two spinsters, fifty and forty-five years old, seemingly devoted their lives to the care of the living and dead animals. And most of this care seems to have been given the dead.

In the basement and on the ground floor the bodies and bones of a score of dead pets were laid out carefully in their coffins, while the living beasts were gaunt and emaciated, whining as they slunk into corners and cages and obviously starving.

The existence of this weird house was discovered by firemen responding to the call of a passer-by who saw smoke coming from the basement window of the Mellen home. The younger Miss Mellen attempted to bar the door and vehemently refused firemen permission to enter.

With the smoke still issuing, however, they broke in the door, brushed the woman aside and extinguished the blaze, believed due to spontaneous combustion in a can of phosphorus.

Then the fire fighters had time to look around. Dogs seemed everywhere. Their cages and kennels were abundant. They shrank from the newcomers fearfully.

**Lying in Coffin**  
The dead animals were scattered about the rooms on the lower floors, all laid out with the greatest care. One in the parlor was typical of the rest. Here, flanked on either side by another body, the stiff body of a shaggy dog was lying in a small coffin such as is used for babies. The grinning head rested on a dainty pillow; lacy coverings draped the sides of the casket and body.

On the walls hung oil paintings covered with the dust and mold of years. The once luxurious furniture was dirty and shabby. The rooms were in perpetual dusk, the blinds closely drawn. The closed windows accentuated the heavy, nauseating smell of decomposing flesh.

For years Mellen sisters have been considered "queer" by their neighbors. But they were never

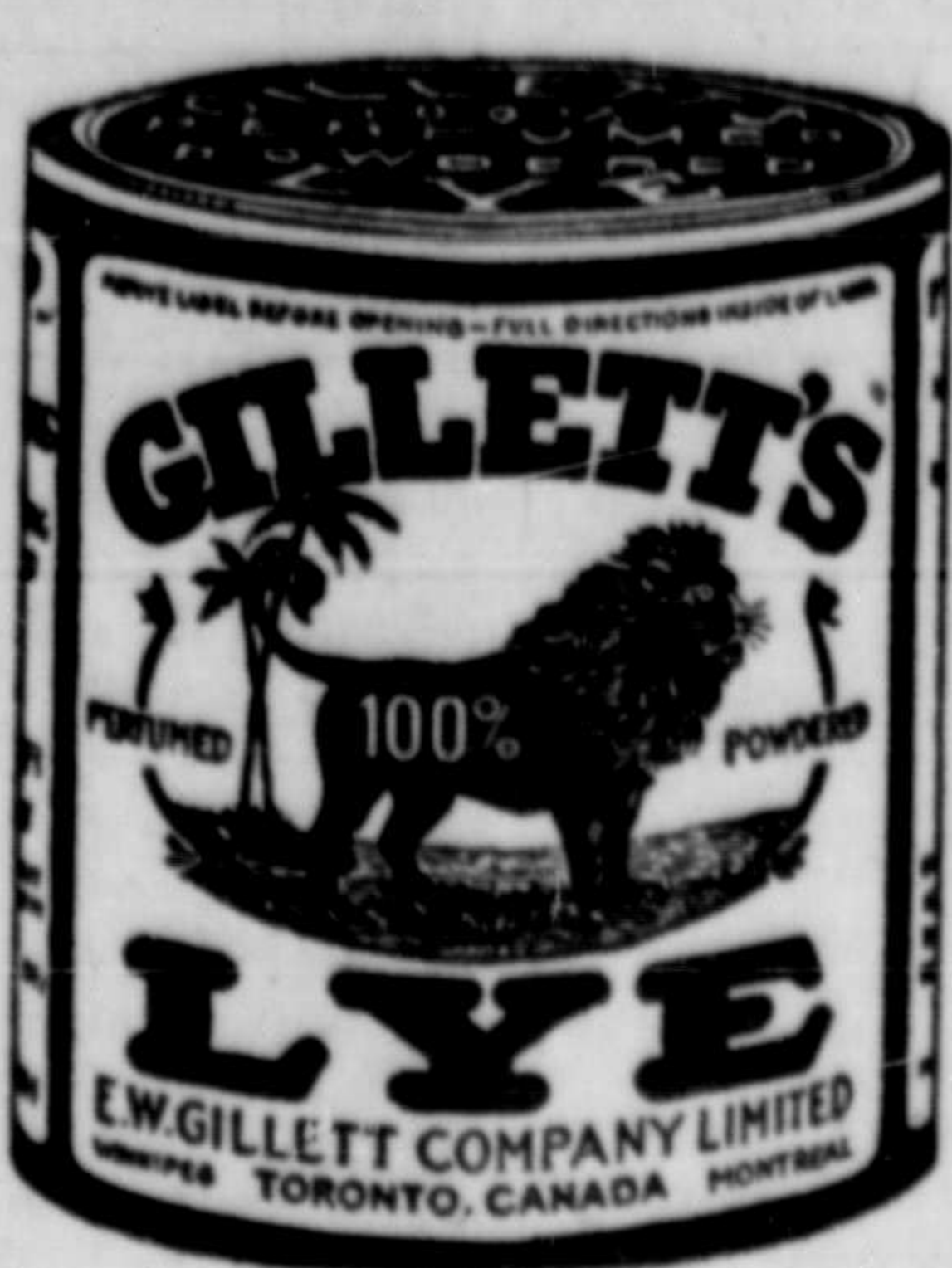

JIGGING FOR COD KILLED HIS DOG

VICTORIA, Aug. 14.—One of the strangest cases reported in some time in connection with the death of a dog is recorded by W. F. Burton of this city. Mr. Burton was out fishing, what is known as jigging for cod, and had just landed a large red spiked back cod, when he noticed his dog roll over. The dog, a highly valued Boston bull terrier, was bleeding slightly from a tiny pin prick over one eye. Whether in killing the fish with a baton the owner struck his dog on the head or what is conceded to be more likely, the cod spiked the dog over the eye in the tussle in the small boat is not known. The dog rolled on to its back with its legs in the air and died in a few minutes.

## POLITICAL FRAME IN VANCOUVER IS SUGGESTED THERE

Suggestion Made That H. H. Stevens be Returned by Acclamation as Conservative Leader.

Vancouver, Aug. 18.—That Hon. H. H. Stevens, M. P. for Vancouver Centre in the federal parliament, be selected at next week's provincial convention of Conservatives, as their party leader in British Columbia, resign his seat in that constituency and be returned by acclamation for Vancouver provincial riding, the Conservatives, in exchange for the acclamation given Mr. Stevens, according to a Liberal nominee return by acclamation in the Vancouver Centre federal by-election which would be necessitated by Mr. Stevens' withdrawal from the federal field.

This is one of the interesting arrangements suggested by political gossipers who have next week's convention foremost in mind.

The argument used is that the Vancouver seat in the Victoria legislature remains unfilled since the resignation of M. A. Macdonald, K.C., and that the Oliver government is in no hurry to call a by-election to fill the vacancy. If chosen as leader of B. C. Conservatives, Mr. Stevens is it contended, would have little difficulty in finding a constituency that would elect him to the provincial legislature. As regards the vacancy that would arise in Vancouver Centre federal constituency, it is stated that this would in any case be safe for the Liberals—despite the Vancouver Conservative victory at the general election—as the electorate would in all probability return a Liberal now that the Liberals are in power. Past political experience shows, it is asserted that irrespective of any other issues, the great majority of an electoral body wishes its representative to be on the winning side.

All this of course is contingent on such big factors as Mr. Bowser's friends being unable to carry the convention in favor of his continued leadership, on Mr. Stevens being offered and accepting the leadership, on the entry of a "dark horse" and the ultimate acceptance by Dr. S. F. Tolmie of the nomination.
