ANNUITIES SETTLEMENT BEING URGED

SALMON FISHERIES MATTERS DISCUSSED AT CONFERENCE

Chamber of Commerce In Dublin Advises de Valera to Settle Up

Concern Felt at Loss of Trade Irish Free State Has Suffered Since Dispute Started Several Months Ago—Government Asked to Take Action

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Nov. 22.—The council of the Dublin Chamber of Commerce passed a resolution yesterday urging President Eamonn de Valera's government to effect an early settlement of the land annuities dispute with the United Kingdom. Business and industrial interests of the Irish Free State are now becoming alarmed at the loss of trade which the Free State has suffered owing to the customs reprisals imposed by the British government following failure of the de Valera government to meet the annuities payments. Since the dispute started a few months ago, it is estimated the Free State has lost trade amounting to \$50,000,000.

WINS PRIZE IN SEATTLE

John Lawrence of This City Gets \$30 For Yo-Yo Spinning

SEATTLE, Nov. 22.—Before an audience of 2400 people in the Orpheum Theatre here John Lawrence of Prince Rupert, B.C., won the junior championship for the yo-yo spinning contest sponsored by the Seattle Times. With this championship went a cash prize of \$30.

This contest was open to the 60,000 children of Seattle and was keenly contested in the preliminaries which were held a week ago on eight playfields here. This elimination contest brought out forty contestants for the finals at the Orpheum.

WOODSWORTH HEARD FROM

Labor Member Believes Monetary Reform is More Fundamental Than Relation of Silver and Gold

"The question of monetary reform is undoubtedly a very important one," states J. S. Woodsworth, Labor Member of Parliament for Winnipeg, in a letter to the city council in acknowledgment of the receipt of a resolution on the relationship between silver and gold which was recently passed by the council at the instance of Ald. Casey. "Personally, I think that the matter is much more fundamental than that of a proper relationship between silver and gold. In my judgment, the gold standard is wholly inadequate but, instead of adopting bi-metallicism, we should rather base our currency on some other than a metallic standard."

Receipt of the resolution was also acknowledged in letters from Premier R. B. Bennett, Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Lt. Adair of the Opposition, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, government leader in the Senate, Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, and H. E. Spencer, M. P. for Battle River, all of which were read at last night's council meeting.

CONFERENCE ON TODAY

Hoover and Roosevelt to Meet in Washington This Afternoon to Discuss Problems

No Coalition

Announcement of Democratic Program to Be Withheld Until Inauguration

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 22.—The politically unparalleled conference of President Herbert Hoover and President-Elect Franklin D. Roosevelt will take place in Washington this afternoon. Governor Roosevelt will arrive in Washington at 3:30 p.m. and will proceed at once by car from the station to the White House to meet the President. The conference will take place in the famous Lincoln Study.

Immediate problems arising between now and March 4, Inauguration Day, principally war debts and budget balancing, will be discussed by the President and President-Elect. The President will be assisted by Secretary of the Treasury Ogden Mills.

While continuous conferences such as this are not expected, it is probable that Governor Roosevelt may be called to Washington on at least one later occasion before he assumes the presidency.

Governor Roosevelt has made it clear that there will be nothing in way of a temporary coalition. Such, he declares, is "not only impracticable but impossible."

Neither will the new Democratic administration set forth its program until inauguration when the new President will deliver his usual inaugural address.

President Hoover and Governor Roosevelt had a conversation by long distance telephone late last week.

ALIENS IN FISHERIES

Law in Regard to Them to Be Strictly Enforced, Deputy Minister Announces

Conference Here

Various Matters in Regard to Salmon Fishing Taken Up

At a large public meeting of fishermen in the Moose Hall last night W. A. Found, deputy minister of fisheries, declared that the fisheries department was determined to see that the law in regard to aliens fishing in British Columbia waters was strictly enforced. He admitted that the law had been broken in this respect in the past but every possible care would be taken during the coming year to clear up the situation. The fishermen approved this step.

The fishermen asked that no further steps be taken to reduce the number of licences issued to Japanese who were British subjects, that the snag scow be again operated on the Skeena and Naas Rivers and discussed with the deputy minister a number of regulations dealing with the fisheries as conducted in Northern B. C. waters, particularly the salmon fisheries.

The fishermen asked that steps be taken to abrogate the sealing treaty because of the depredations of the seals when passing through B. C. waters, particularly on the West Coast of the Queen Charlottes and at North Island. The deputy minister said investigations so far conducted had shown that only to a small extent did the seal feed on commercial fish and that it was only during a limited period that they were in these waters, but fishermen declared that practically all the culled salmon were culled because of bites from fur seals and that the depredations continued for a period of two and a half months. A halibut fisherman also stated that the halibut were similarly injured in the same area. The minister said the investigations would be continued but pointed to the value of the seal fisheries, 15% of which came to Canada.

Members of the fisheries associations took a prominent part in the conference, the chief spokesman being Mike Anderson, Jack Roberts and John Saldon representing the Northern B. C. Fishermen's Association, C. Obata and M. Sakamoto, representing the Japanese Association, J. Boyd representing the department of fisheries with Miss Rose Couture stenographer.

Among matters dealt with were the restrictions as to the minimum size of razor clams allowed to be taken on Queen Charlotte Islands. A proposal was approved asking that halibut fishermen be allowed to take herring or pichards without securing an additional licence.

Objection Is Taken

A proposal that the captain of a fishing boat be responsible for seeing that every man aboard was a British subject was objected to by the deputy minister who pointed out the hardship this might work. On the fishermen's side a case was cited where a man signed up under the name of Murphy yet could not speak a word of English.

All seemed to be agreed that salmon gillnet operations should be abolished in Prince Rupert Harbor and the waters between the Cold Storage plant and the Zenardi bridge but were opposed to bringing Porpoise Harbor within the scope of the restriction.

CHINAMEN IN FRACAS

John Lien in Hospital and Chang Suey Charged With Assault Causing Bodily Injury

John Lien, Chinese, is a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital suffering from scalp wounds and Chang Suey, another Chinaman, is out on \$5000 bail on a charge of assault occasioning grievous bodily harm as a result of a fracas yesterday afternoon in the kitchen of the Commodore Cafe where both Orientals were employed. Chang Suey is alleged to have attacked John Lien with a sharpening steel.

John Lien is expected to recover. Chang Suey appeared before Magistrate McClymont last evening to be formally charged.

Debentures Issued By City to Cover Relief Work Cost

The city council last night gave preliminary readings to a bylaw providing for the issuance of debentures to the amount of \$14,337 to reimburse the provincial government for advances made to the city a year ago pursuant to the Unemployment Relief Act. This amount covers the city's share of relief work done up to December 22 last, which work the government financed.

James Boyd, supervisor of fisheries for District No. 2, called this afternoon on the Cardena for a trip to Vancouver on official business.

WOULD CUT ALDERMEN

Two Hundred Ratepayers Ask That Membership of Council Be Reduced From Eight to Four

A petition signed by two hundred ratepayers asking that a bylaw be presented to the voters at the civic election next January on the question of reducing the number of aldermen from eight to four and that aldermen be elected for a term of one year instead of two was presented to the city council last night and, after brief discussion, was laid over until the next meeting of the council two weeks hence.

Mentioning the fact that Vancouver was considering reducing the number of its aldermen from 16 to 12, Ald. Collart spoke in favor of a smaller number of aldermen for this city. If there were four instead of eight aldermen, each would belong to a central committee and all would be better acquainted with the business of the city. He moved that the bylaw as requested be prepared and presented to the voters.

Ald. Pillsbury said he thought the council should have more time to consider the matter and suggested that the petition lay on the table until the next meeting. Ald. Collart withdrew his original motion to second Ald. Pillsbury's motion to lay the matter on the table.

The city council last night adopted a recommendation from the Board of Works that a sand sidewalk on rough grade be constructed on the westerly side of Eighth Street from Second Avenue to the lane north. Ald. Pillsbury, chairman of the board of works, stated that the cost of the work, which will be carried out by relief, was estimated at \$15.

British Government Will Deal With Unemployment Menace in a Comprehensive Manner King Says

LONDON, Nov. 22.—Unemployment bulks foremost in the legislative program for the new session of Parliament which was opened today by His Majesty, King George in person.

The speech from the throne, after stressing the necessity for economy in the public services, declared that unemployment was undoubtedly the gravest of social problems. Comprehensive measures for dealing with it were forecast.

REFORMER TURNS UP

Col. Robbins Found in North Carolina Suffering From Loss of Memory

ASHEVILLE, North Carolina, Nov. 22.—With dramatic suddenness, Col. Raymond Robbins, noted dry campaigner, who has been suffering from a peculiar form of amnesia, regained his memory in Appalachian Hall Hospital here yesterday when he recognized his wife during her third visit with him since her arrival from Florida a few days ago. Robbins also recognized his nephew yesterday. Col. Robbins' physician announced that it will be necessary for him to rest a long time before his mind is restored to normality.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Col. Raymond Robbins, well known prohibition leader, who has been missing since September 3 when he left his home in New York for Washington with the intention of conferring at the White House with his personal friend, President Hoover, has been located alive and well near Asheville, North Carolina, though apparently suffering from amnesia. He was recognized by his wife who hurried from Tampa, Fla., on hearing that he had been found. He, however, apparently did not recognize Mrs. Robbins.

Col. Robbins had been engaged in prospecting for gold and campaigned during the presidential election contest for President Hoover using the name of Reynolds Rogers.

Original Report Was Exaggerated

Incident in Relief Camp in Prince George District of Little Consequence After All

According to word received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here this morning, original reports as to unemployed having taken possession of a relief camp at Penny in the Prince George district were much exaggerated. The incident, according to later word, was quite trivial and was adjusted without any arrests.

ESTIMATE FOR ROAD

Will Cost \$240 to Complete Hays Creek Connection to Fishermen's Floats

City Engineer F. N. Good reported to the city council last night that it would cost \$240 to make passable the road along the east bank of Hays Creek to the fishermen's floats on the other side of the dry dock. To continue the present dry dock road to the fishermen's floats, eliminating the level crossing of the railway tracks, would cost \$160, the city engineer estimated.

Referring to the importance of the fishing fleet as a source of productive wealth to the city, Ald. Casey urged the advisability of providing the fishermen's floats with road connection to the city if the money with which to carry out the work was available at all. He felt that the extension of the present road might meet the requirements meantime, leaving the new road on the east side of Hays Creek to be linked up when the financial situation was somewhat easier.

After some further discussion, it was decided, on motion of Ald. Rudderham and Ald. Casey, to refer the matter to the finance committee for financial consideration.

WARNING TO CITIES

Liquor Profits Drop Forty Percent and Municipalities and Hospitals Will Suffer

VICTORIA, Nov. 22.—Liquor revenue for British Columbia for this year is off 40%, according to the preliminary report compiled by the government auditors for the information of the cabinet.

Government officials said they feared liquor profits had passed their peak for a long time to come. The most serious problem arising is from the fact that the province has come to depend largely on liquor profits pouring into the treasury in the past decade. Municipalities and hospitals have been in the same position. All three will now be faced with the major problems of readjustment.

Hon. J. W. Jones has issued a statement in which he seeks to warn the municipalities not to count on anything but sharply cut payments from provincial government sources.

The Corporative State
A Brief Outline of the System of Government Obtaining in Italy Today Under Premier Mussolini and Generally Known as Fascism

(By Victor Basso-Bert)

In the evolution of the social system since the French Revolution, 1789, that is since the advent of the Third State and, more particularly, the inception of the Liberal state, 1830, brought about as a reaction against the Holy Alliance, which was aiming to bring the social order to the pre-'89 period, the primary object has been the absolute freedom of the individual, the unlimited liberty of "playing his game," the accumulation of wealth through the exploitation of natural resources and human efforts in the great schemes of populating vast and new continents.

In these intensive transformations, the inventive genius of humanity was so greatly stimulated that production has now reached a point of saturation. The application of the theory of "laissez faire" has had, as a consequence, the disruption of the distribution of wealth.

The various political doctrines that have sprung up since the advent of liberalism have so far failed to produce an applicable substitute. The organized masses of producers, in their efforts to cope with this ever changing process of exploitation, have failed to be a match for the organized forces, both political and economic, entrenched in the citadel of the bourgeoisie state.

The Utopian socialism of Fourier, Saint Simon, Owen and others, the so-called scientific socialism of Marx, after over three-quarters of a century of preaching, have so far failed to make a tangible impression except in Russia.

Eliminate Class Struggle

To eliminate the consequences of the class struggle, class hatred, class legislation and the consequent disruption and disintegration of the state, a genial and gigantic mind conceived a centralized and unitarian state—the Corporative State. It was Mussolini, the socialist, to whom the vision came which has been materialized in Italy today.

Through the new ministry of the corporations, all labor, intellectual and manual, is incorporated in the huge state institution of the corporations. The entire mass of the producers is divided into thirteen corporations including that of the employers.

The ministry of the corporations takes care of every individual member of the corporations and sees that each one has a political vote. The thirteen corporations have each a president and these are members of the Fascist Grand Council which is composed of 21 members. The Premier is chairman of the council and, in addition to the thirteen presidents of the corporations, the members include the president of the House of Commons, president of the Senate, the chief justice, the secretary of the Fascist party and a few others.

Conduct of Elections

The election of Parliament takes place every five years. At election time the corporations are called upon to nominate members. In a first ballot the corporations nominate a list of 800 names of their best men. The list goes to the Grand Council which, in secret session, eliminates half of the number. The remaining 400 stand as a national list from which Parliament is elected by the people. Should they be rejected, another election takes place.

The Premier is nominated by the Grand Council and a secret list of possible future premiers is held ever ready to be submitted to the Crown for selection in case of a vacancy.

The Premier is responsible only to the Crown. He selects and discharges the ministers subject to the approval of the King.

One will readily see in this the elimination of party politics and the foundation of a great popular state.

Council member of the corporation, choosing the best administrators, economists, organizers, scientists, thus forming the parliament of labor, the representatives of capital and labor thus are brought face to face. The toilers, in exercising their qualities, in grappling with the social realities, can realize their shortcomings. The employers, face to face, with the best intellects that labor can bring forth, must assume their full social obligation: and responsibilities.

The Magna Charta of labor enacted in 1926 regulates both parties. In the Corporative State the strike and lockout are outlawed. The organizations of the Corporative State control all the forces of production and distribution. A well regulated and rigid discipline practically controls and assists the various forms of economy—the private, the public, the great, the small, the urban, the co-operative, and if does not regulate initiative, as the facts prove in organizing the huge trusts, the co-operatives, the financial and social insurance institutions, all directed to serve the public interests.

The revolution of the Black Shirts has been a deep and far-reaching one. The sense of security brought about by the enactment of the most advanced social legislation explains the devotion and attachment of the working classes to the Fascist regime.

Great Insurance Plan

Of every hundred lire paid in wages, 7½% goes to the Institute of Social National Insurance; 2½% is the contribution of labor; 5% of the employer. This insurance covers compensation for injuries, half rate pay for sickness with hospital and medical attendance; treatment in sanatoriums of tuberculous patients; unemployment and old age pensions, the latter taking effect at the age of 65. This institute has today a capital of \$450,000,000 and, in the past 12 months, has collected \$75,000,000.

Following out their motto of "everything for the state, nothing against the state," Fascism considers the holder of wealth as a trustee. Property has a social function to perform. Industry is not socialized but avails itself of private initiative and considers it the primary factor of production.

The business of the state is to look after the welfare of the masses, to regulate production and distribution and see that there is social justice. Its mottoes are: AUTHORITY, ORDER AND JUSTICE, quite different from the motto of '89: "Liberty, Equality and Fraternity," with results that can be seen by everyone.

Fascism is a political and not an economic idea. It is above all, the state, the strong state, regulating, guarding the moral and material life of the nation.

It was asked that restrictions on the export of raw sockeye be removed because the canners freely imported American fish and it was the opinion that fishermen should be allowed to sell their product in the highest market.

There were several suggestions sent in from seiners indicating that they thought the trollers might be using the regulations to protect their own interests, one of the requests asking that the department do not interfere with seining except insofar as it might be in the interests of conservation.

At the conclusion Mr. Found expressed pleasure at seeing so many present and at the expeditious manner in which the conference had been carried through. He looked forward to meeting them again next year and hoped that by then the dark cloud of depression would have passed.

Is Appreciative

Later to the Daily News Mr. Found expressed appreciation of the manner in which the members of the fishermen's association had tackled the questions before them. It had been a great help to the department.

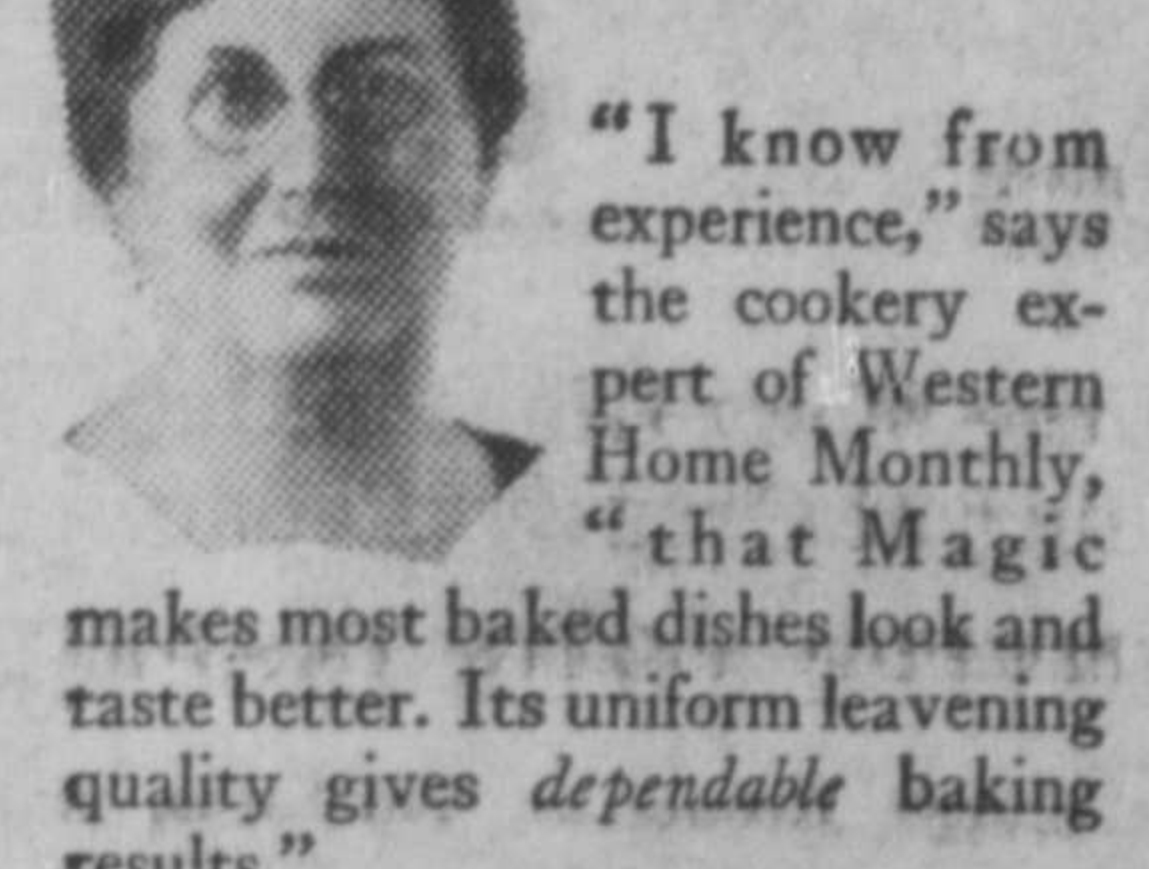

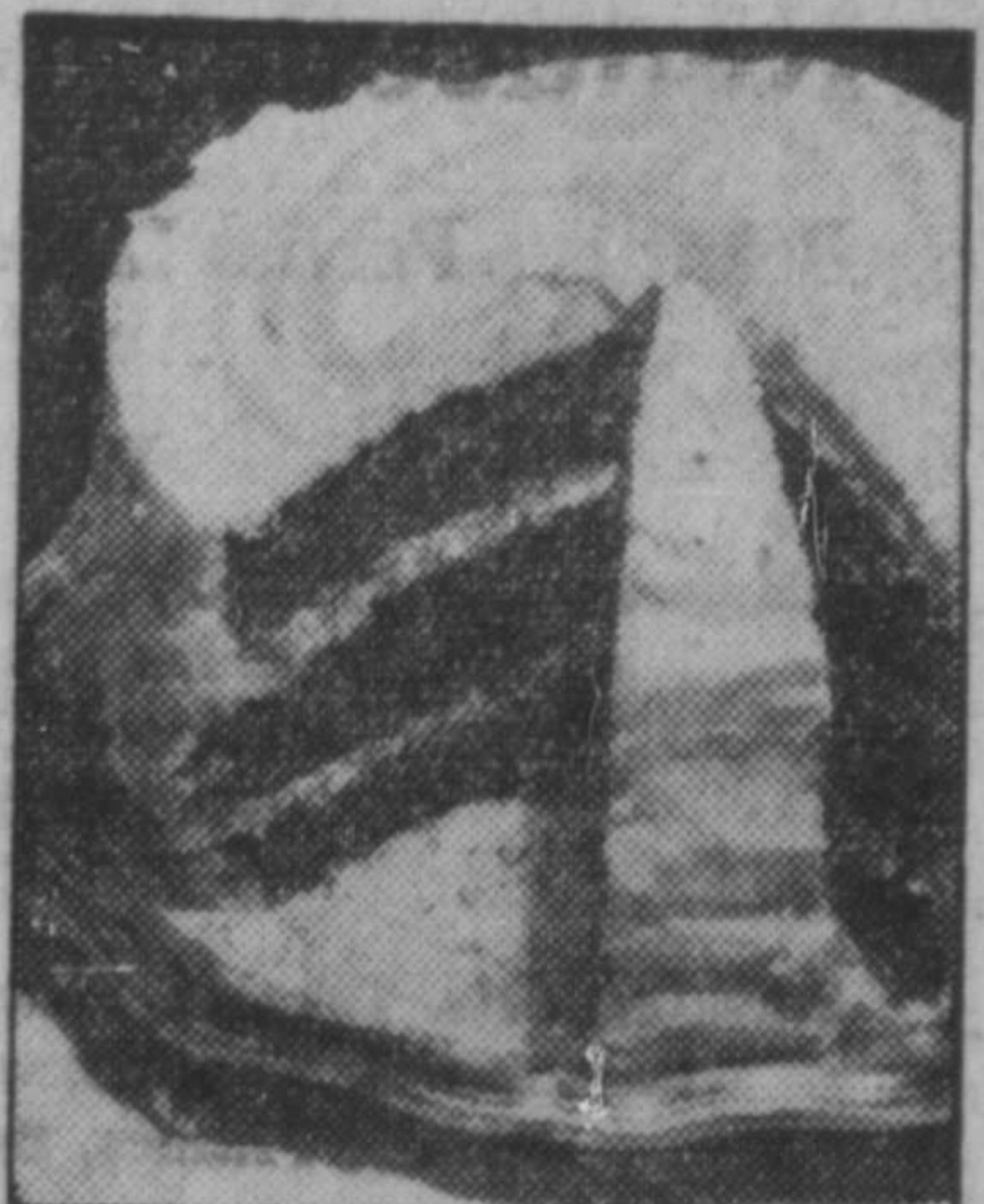

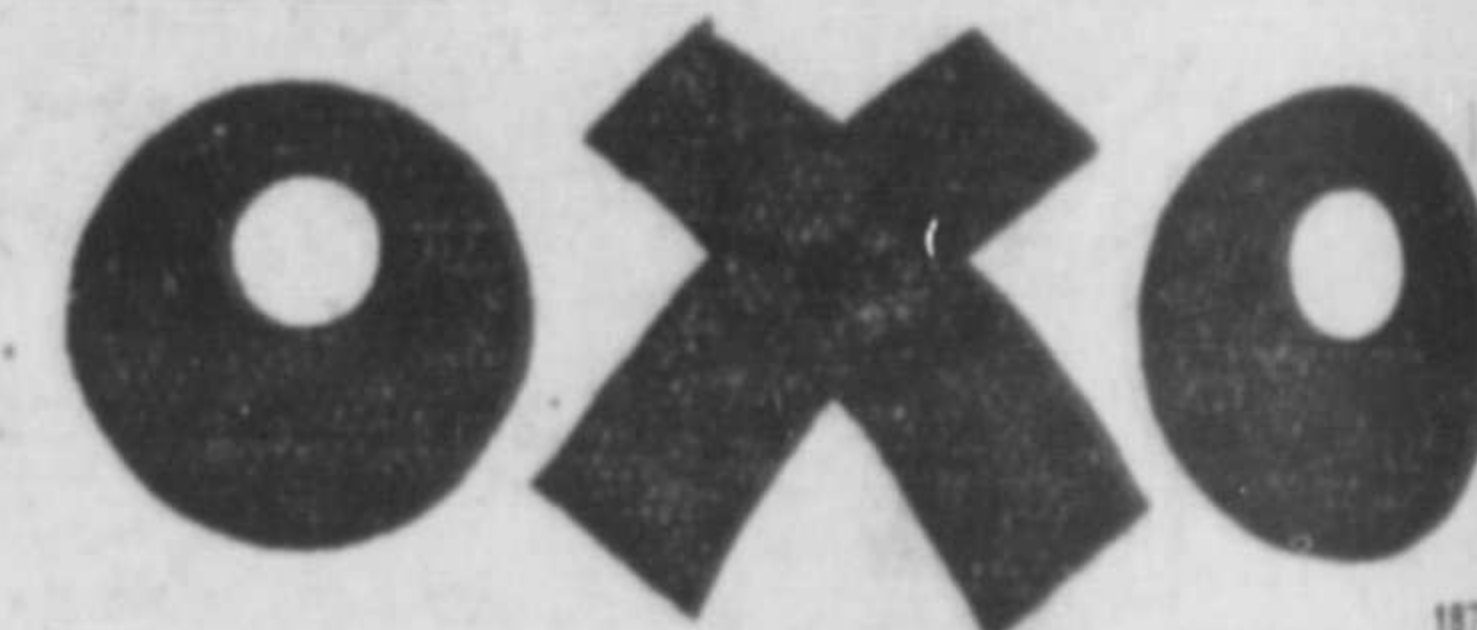
