ESTIMATE FOR ROAD

Will Cost \$240 to Complete Hays Creek Connection to Fishermen's Floats

City Engineer F. N. Good reported to the city council last night that it would cost \$240 to make passable the road along the east bank of Hays Creek to the fishermen's floats on the other side of the dry dock. To continue the present dry dock road to the fishermen's floats, eliminating the level crossing of the railway tracks, would cost \$160, the city engineer estimated.

Referring to the importance of the fishing fleet as a source of productive wealth to the city, Ald. Casey urged the advisability of provid-ASHEVILLE, North Carolina, ing the fishermen's floats with road connection to the city if the money with which to carry out the work was available at all. He felt that the extension of the present road might meet the requirements meantime, leaving the new road on the east side of Hays Creek to be linked up when the financial situation was somewhat easier.
