Welcome To Visiting Ministers.

Prince Rupert people are always ready to welcome public men of any shade of political opinion. Today they are welcoming some of the members of the Oliver cabinet and especially the minister of public works who has charge of the chief spending department of the Government. We especially welcome him, particularly at a time when we are so badly in need of a road.

We would like to draw the attention of the ministers to the fact that they are unable to drive over any provincial roads because there is none leading out of Prince Rupert. For years we have paid the automobile tax and continue to do so, yet Victoria has given us nothing in return. The court house is built out of our own money which we paid into the treasury.

What a road to the mouth of the Skeena River. Our people are buying cars, yet they have no road on which to drive except such roads as we build ourselves inside the city limits. We must have that road and have it soon. If we do not get action soon we shall have to run an excursion to Victoria during the session and take the legislature by storm. The building of that road or part of it during the coming winter would aid in keeping the working men of the north employed and would give us that outlet which we seek and must have.

Prince Rupert is a Liberal constituency and is well represented by the minister of lands. It has done its duty by the Oliver Government and it expects the Oliver Government to do its duty here and build that road. It is the one thing badly needed just now.

Victoria's Dream Has Come True.

For half a century Victoria has dreamed of a fast ferry service between that city and the mainland that would make them really part of the American continent. Plans have been laid at various times for such a ferry. Port Angeles was often spoken of as a possible port with which to connect the island by train with the mainland. A ferry was at one time inaugurated between New Westminster and Sidney carrying passengers and railway cars for the Great Northern Railway. Later on the inception of the C.N.R. the ferry Canora was built and Premier McBride promised that it should be operated continuously between English Bluff and Patricia Bay. The railway was built and the ferry, but the trains were never carried although freight cars have been taken across when sufficient business offered.

Now the growth of the auto business has made a ferry possible, aided by the attraction of the Government liquor store. The Victoria Chamber of Commerce took advantage of the movement and by spending a little money has secured a good service with the mainland in addition to the regular ferry steamers to Vancouver, Seattle and Port Angeles.

The inauguration of the ferry was the work of one man, the secretary of the chamber of commerce. Without his efforts nothing would have been done. He is a live wire. The new business is worth a great deal to Victoria and is an example of what well directed energy may do for a city.

Confusion In China Still Continues.

Confusion continues in China. Dr. Sun Yat Sen is apparently not down and out, as is sometimes alleged, and the Canton party may yet reassert itself and bring back better conditions in the country.

It is difficult to understand the Chinese situation. The Chinese of the south swear by their leader, who undoubtedly seems to be actuated by the highest ideals, too high, perhaps, for the present condition of the country. Dr. Sun is a patriot and a democrat but he has tried to graft American democracy on the Chinese when they were not ready for it. He would give the people of China the right to rule, whereas many of the Chinese people do not know how to take part in public affairs and do not wish to do so.

The Peking Governments have all been monarchical in their ideals. In the name of democracy they have been extremely autocratic and possibly their method may be more successful than the other at the present time.

It will be interesting to watch developments. Will China rise to the occasion and develop along republican lines or will she revert to a monarchy? Is China really awakening or is she simply enjoying a nightmare? Eventually we believe she will come out all right and will develop into one of the great nations of the world unless militaristic Japan interferes with the plans.

ELECTIONS IN MANITOBA ON

Campaign There is in Full Swing With Three Parties in Field

LIQUOR REFERENDUM

WINNIPEG, Man., July 8.—(By Canadian Press).—A referendum on the question of government control and sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes is almost certain to be held in Manitoba in the summer of 1923. Pledge to such action is contained in the official platforms of the Liberal and Conservative parties and of the Progressives in Winnipeg, who are allied with the United Farmers of Manitoba. The Farmers' policy calls for complete prohibition of traffic in liquors "excepting for sacramental, medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes," but they are pledged to the principle of "direct legislation" as well and a Farmer government might be expected to grant a referendum on receipt of petitions bearing fifty or sixty thousand signatures such as were presented, unsuccessfully, to the last legislature.

Lengthy Program

From a hundred platforms every day throughout the province are the candidates and their supporters pointing with pride and vigour with alarm. The Liberals claim a record of unprecedented achievement and ask for an opportunity to complete their work. Conservatives condemn what they call the flagrant extravagance of the Norris government and pledge themselves to economy and curtailment of expenditures. The United Farmers, in their first campaign as an organization, present a lengthy program covering moral reform, education, finance and general administration.

Reviewing their record of seven years in control of the administration the Liberals call attention especially to enactment of rural credits and long term farm mortgage loans; of provincial savings office to many measures designed to develop the agricultural industry in particular and the general welfare of the province. The government platform declares that the Liberal administration should be charged with responsibility for completing the settlement of the natural resources question, and that crown lands should be disposed of only to those who will undertake to develop them productively. It is declared that there should be "a more equitable distribution of the burden of taxation" and "a drastic curtailment of provincial expenditures." The position is taken that the present is an opportune time for co-operation between the provincial and federal governments with a view to an aggressive immigration policy designed to place settlers on the land. The principle of the preferential ballot in single-member constituencies is endorsed, and the early completion of the Hudson Bay railway is advocated.

Conservatives Busy

The platform of the Conservative party advocates reorganization of the civil service and all government utilities and services with a view to cutting expenses, and adopts the general principle that "the cost of civil government must be kept within the income of the province. It is proposed that taxation should be so co-ordinated and adjusted as equitably to distribute the burden, and a conference with federal and municipal authorities to allocate the "fields of taxation" is suggested. The platform urges the return of the natural resources to the province; promises development of agriculture and its services in the interests of industrial efficiency and harmony should a Conservative government be returned; urges economic, civil and political equality for the sexes; and sets out that "a thorough knowledge of the English language shall be an essential in elementary education in every school."

Farmers on Job

The United Farmers are working on the basis of a platform which was adopted at their annual convention last January. It advocates direct legislation, proportional representation for

grouped constituencies and the preferential ballot in single-member seats; equality of the sexes; simplification of legal procedure; compulsory attendance at school to the age of sixteen or completion of eighth grade work; encouragement of common standards and inter-provincial certificates for teachers; a provincial hospital system; opposition to all forms of "commercialized gambling"; a systematic survey of farming conditions; extension of rural credits and farm loans systems; transfers of the natural resources; public ownership of provincial utilities; insistence on early completion of the Hudson Bay railway; a general conference on taxation and a land settlement scheme.

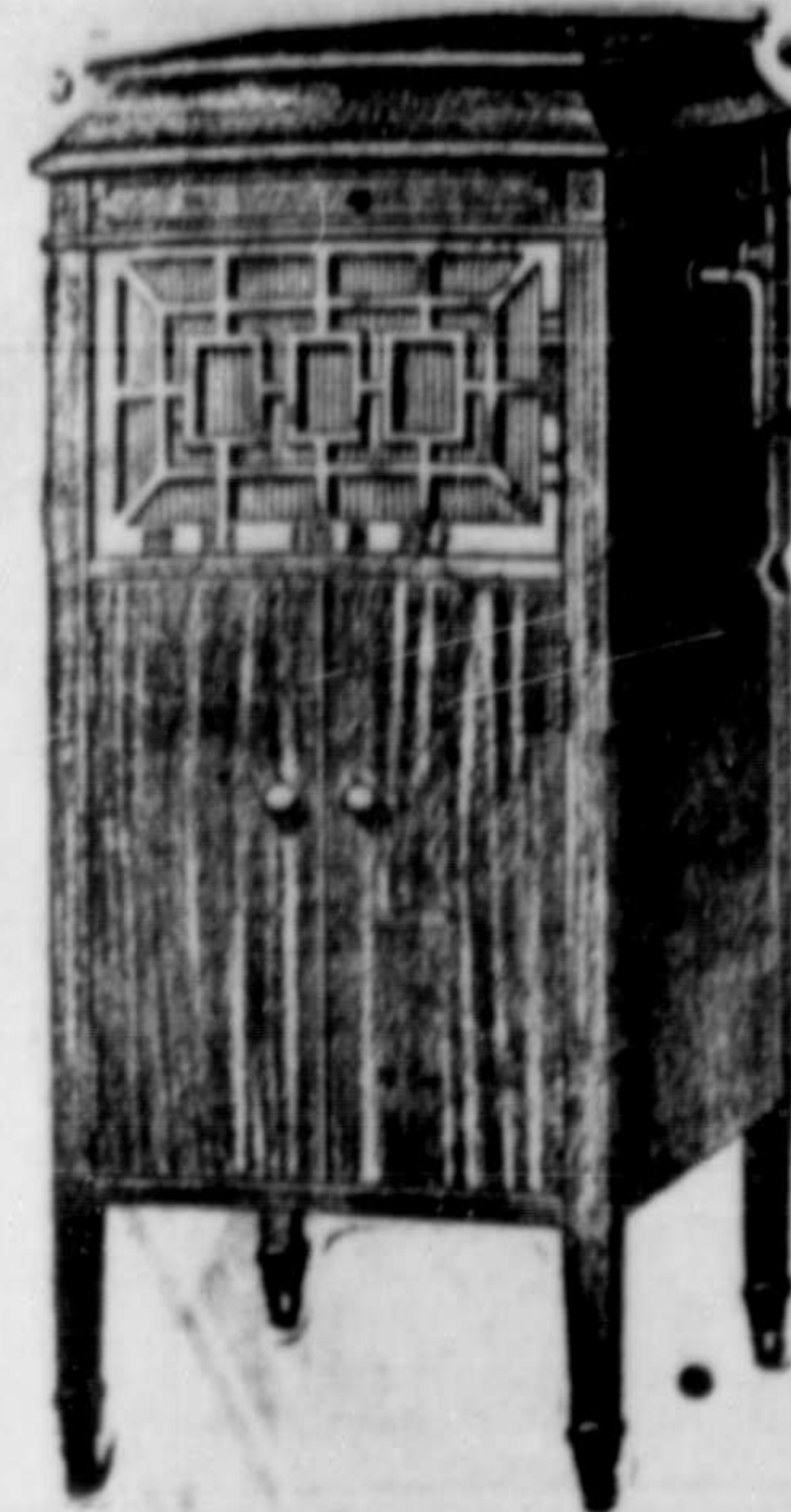

NEDDEN BAY NEWEST PORT

Logging Camp Bay Near Queen Charlotte Sound is Named After Local Skipper.

The Queen Charlotte Island steamer is making a new stop near Seymour Inlet on the mainland just off Pine Island and due east of Queen Charlotte Island announced Capt. Nicholson yesterday. There a large logging camp has been opened by the Smith-Dollar Co., of Vancouver. As the Prince Albert, commanded by Capt. Nedden, was the first steamer to go in there and the Island boat is giving the place its only service, Mr. Parizeau, assistant hydrographer for the Dominion government, in charge of the steamer Lillooet, has decided to give the bay the official name of Nedden Bay. POPULARITY CONTEST TO START VERY SOON

Exhibition Board Announces Prize List, Schedule of Votes and Rules and Regulations.

The prize list, vote schedule, nomination blanks and rules and regulations for the popularity contest, under the auspices of the Northern B. C. Agricultural and Industrial Association which is to open on July 15 and close on September 9 have just been issued. 1f

The prize list offers awards to the value of \$1200. The first prize is a \$500 piano; second, sewing machine; third, diamond ring; fourth, set of silverware; fifth, French ivory toilet set; sixth, silver tea set; seventh, gold watch; eighth, silk umbrella; ninth, black ebony toilet set; tenth, cut glass vase. Two special prizes are offered; first a \$150 Brunswick phonograph for the candidate receiving the greatest number of votes outside of Prince Rupert or Anyox; second, a similar prize for the holder of the lucky ticket. 1f

The schedule of votes is to be as follows: combination ticket, 15,000 votes; season ticket, 3,000; membership ticket, 2,000; merry-go-round tickets, 2,000; masked ball ticket, 1,000. A nomination blank entitles the candidate to an initial 5,000 votes; nomination blank with \$1 remittance, 10,000; with \$2 remittance, 25,000; nomination blanks with remittance of \$1 for combination ticket, 60,000 votes. 1f

On receipt of nominations the candidates will be published from tickets for sale. Each candidate must be endorsed by some responsible party. Standings of candidates will be published from time to time in the newspapers. The winners of prizes will be determined by their accredited votes and a committee of prominent citizens will be appointed to verify the counts. Candidates are not restricted to any territory. 1f

Sport Chat

Soccer fans are agreed that Dave Scott, who made his first appearance here on Thursday night playing with the Calles team against the Grotto, is one of the classiest football players that ever graced a local field. He is a brother of George Scott and just arrived from Scotland last week. His home was in Haddington and his football experience was gained in first-class junior circles there. He was sought for the First Division Scottish League, but did not accept the offer. Although he played centre forward on Thursday, his regular position is centre-half.

The soccer league schedule is drawing to a close and there are but three more games to be played. The Sons of Canada are still at the top of the standing and their position seems pretty secure, although the Sons of England and the Grotto still have a chance with the Calles out of the running. To put the Sons of Canada out, however, either the Sons of England or the Grotto would both have to win their remaining games and the Sons of Canada would have to lose the two fixtures in which they have still to play. One more win for them will clinch the honors.

Many Canadian cities are now in the throes of the great summer epidemic, lawn bowling, and there is scarcely a city, town or village through the eastern provinces that does not boast its bowling club and greens. The popularity of the game increases year by year and as a result the competition at the various tournaments becomes keener. This year the big tournament conducted by the Ontario Bowling Association at Niagara-on-the-Lake opened on July 3, while the Dominion Lawn Bowling tournament, which takes place on the links of the various clubs throughout Toronto, during the week of August 12, and it is expected that these will be "bigger and better" than ever.

It would be difficult for one unacquainted with the history of bowling to believe that such a pleasant pastime could ever have come under the displeasure of the authorities to such an extent that a ban would be placed upon it. Such was the case, however, in the early days, as during the reigns of Edward III., Richard II. and other monarchs, statutes forbidding it and other sports were passed, on the ground that it was feared that the popularity of bowling was interfering too much with the practice of archery, which was then so important in battle. By an act passed in England in 1514—and which was not repealed until 1815—artificers, labourers, apprentices, servants and the like were forbidden to play bowls at any time save

Christmas, and then only in the presence of their masters. It was further enjoined that anyone playing bowls outside of his own garden or orchard was liable to a penalty of 6s. 8d.

It was well on in the 19th century that bowling acquired popularity in Scotland. It had been known there since the close of the 16th century, when the Glasgow kirk session fulminated an edict against Sunday bowls in 1955, but greens in those days were few and far between. The early clubs did nothing towards organizing the game and it was not until 1848 and 1849 that meetings of the various clubs in Scotland were held in Glasgow to promote a national association. To the secretary of the association, W. W. Mitchell, fell the duty of preparing a code and this was adopted immediately in Scotland as the standard laws of the game. In the meantime bowling in England had fallen into disrepute through excessive gambling but the action of the Scottish bowlers had a good effect and saved the game.

The appearance of women on the bowling green is not to be regarded as an innovation of recent days, nor an invasion of man's sporting domain. They took part in the bowling on the green as far back as the 16th century.

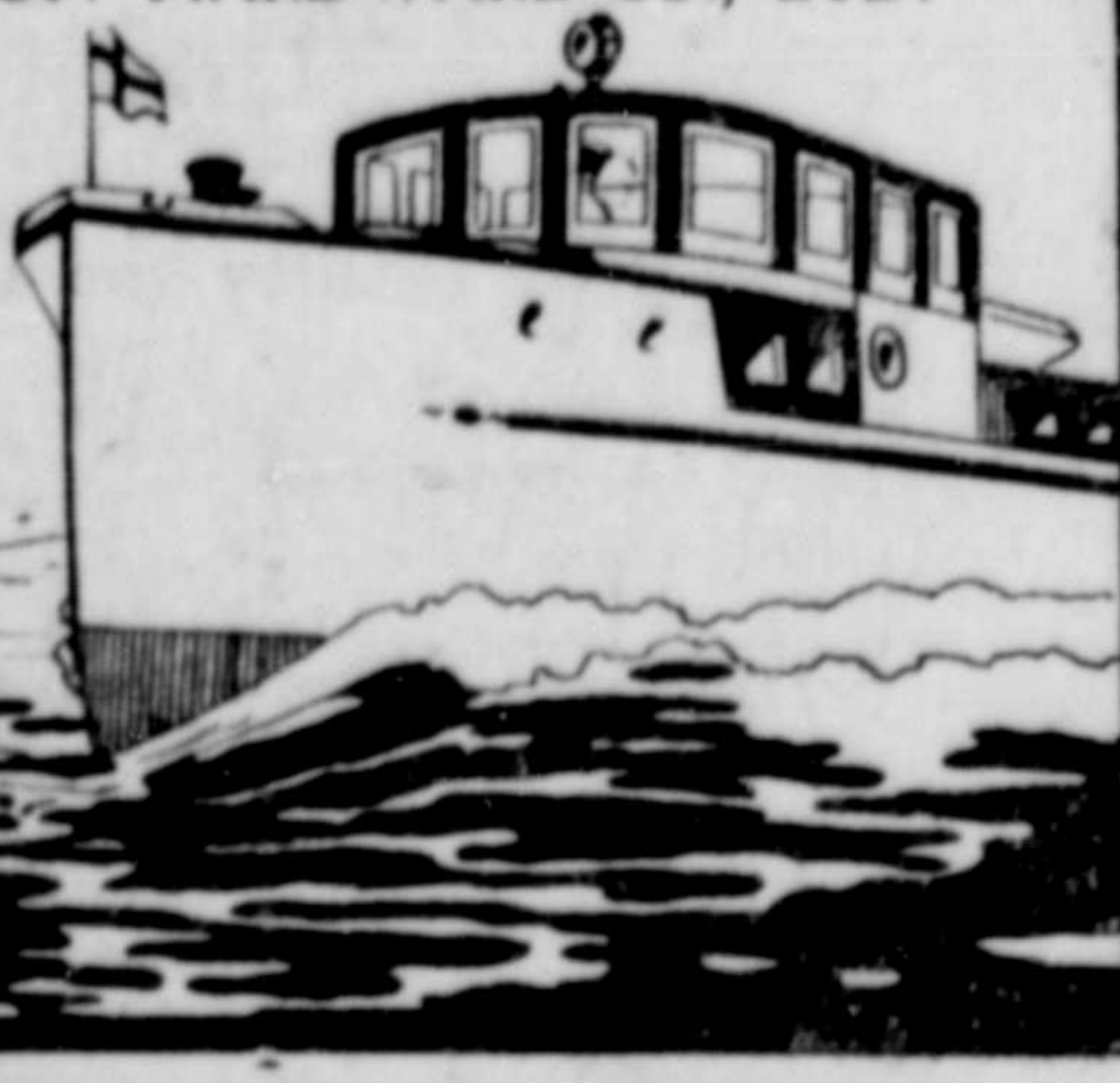

Waterfront Whiffs

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet Which Is the Chief Source of Prince Rupert's Prosperity

The Admiral of the Mosquito Fleet reports that during the week some 372,000 pounds of halibut and 5,700 pounds of salmon has been landed by his merry men during the week, and that 10 carloads have been shipped to eastern points.

This is 79,000 pounds in excess of last week, which the Admiral says "is on the right side of the Admiralty fish ledger."

Fish prices have been better this week than last, the highest price paid being 12.70c and 5c, the lowest 9.40c and 3c; as against last week high 11.20c and 4c, low 9.40c and 3c.

The landing of fish at this season of the year has a tendency to be on the light side. This is explained by the fact that during the summer months a number of the fishing boats of the fleet sell their fish at Seward, Sitka, Ketchikan and other points, which is frozen for winter requirements. Every year the remotely situated cold storage plants take up a percentage of fish during this season. During the past week the arrivals in Seattle have been heavy owing to a number of boats fishing on the southern banks, and a number of the boats have gone into the salmon packing game. When the boats go into the salmon fishing and packing during the summer it naturally takes a number of boats out of the halibut fleet. In distributing a fishing fleet between Seward and Seattle the area of water covered is a colossal one to say the least. On the other hand at certain times of the year practically all the boats fishing north of Seattle come into Prince Rupert. As soon as the northern points have got their quota of fish the boats will naturally come into the best market, which is Prince Rupert.

Although her stern was rather badly damaged she was able to continue into port all right and neither the crew nor the cargo were damaged. The little ship is undergoing repairs in the dry dock.

ALD. COLLART WILL MOVE FOR DEMOLITION OF PHOENIX THEATRE

Ald. Theo. Collart is to bring his views regarding the old Phoenix Theatre before the city council in the form of a motion, notice of which has been posted as follows:
