Arthur Griffith, New President Sinn Fein, Selects His Cabinet

DUBLIN, Jan. 10.—Arthur Griffith, the newly elected president of the Dail Eireann, has selected the following ministers for his cabinet:

Minister of Finance—Michael Collins.
Minister of Foreign Affairs—Gavan Duffy.
Minister for Home Affairs—E. J. Duggan.
Minister of Local Government—William T. Cosgrave.
Minister of Economic Affairs—Bryan O'Higgins.
Minister of Defence—Richard Mulcahy.

TRANSFER COMMITTEE APPOINTED

Churchill, Chamberlain and Greenwood Will Look After Transfer of Authority to Ireland.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—The committee to consider the transfer of government to the Irish parliament has been appointed and consists of Hon. Winston Churchill, president, Hon. Austen Chamberlain and Sir Hamar Greenwood. Department officials state that the committee will hold daily meetings until the Irish delegates arrive.

TROOPS FROM SOUTH IRELAND TO NORTH

Disorders Still Prevail in Belfast—Street Cars Fired on—Girl Wounded.

BELFAST, Jan. 10.—There was considerable firing in the Marrowbone district last night. Street car service was suspended on account of the frequent firing on the cars. One girl was wounded.

It is rumored that the government troops which are being withdrawn from the south are coming to Belfast to maintain order.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—Alfred Crewston, the prominent cotton magnate, who died on October 18 last, has left an estate valued at \$1,955,000.

ARTHUR GRIFFITHS NOW PRESIDENT OF IRISH FREE STATE

DUBLIN, Jan. 10.—At today's session of Dail Eireann, Arthur Griffiths, founder of the Sinn Fein and minister of foreign affairs under Eamonn de Valera, was elected president. He succeeds De Valera, who resigned following the ratification of the peace treaty.

When the vote was taken De Valera and his followers walked out as a protest against the nomination of Griffith. When Speaker McNeill put the motion, the selection of Griffith was voted unanimously.

WORKER ON TELEGRAPH LINE SUDDEN DEATH

VANCOUVER, Jan. 10.—Herbert Baker, of this city, was killed yesterday when he slipped from a G.N.R. bridge at Spences' Bridge and fell a distance of 120 feet in the river canyon below. He was stretching telegraph wire and lost his balance.

OLD NANAIMO MAN DIED YESTERDAY

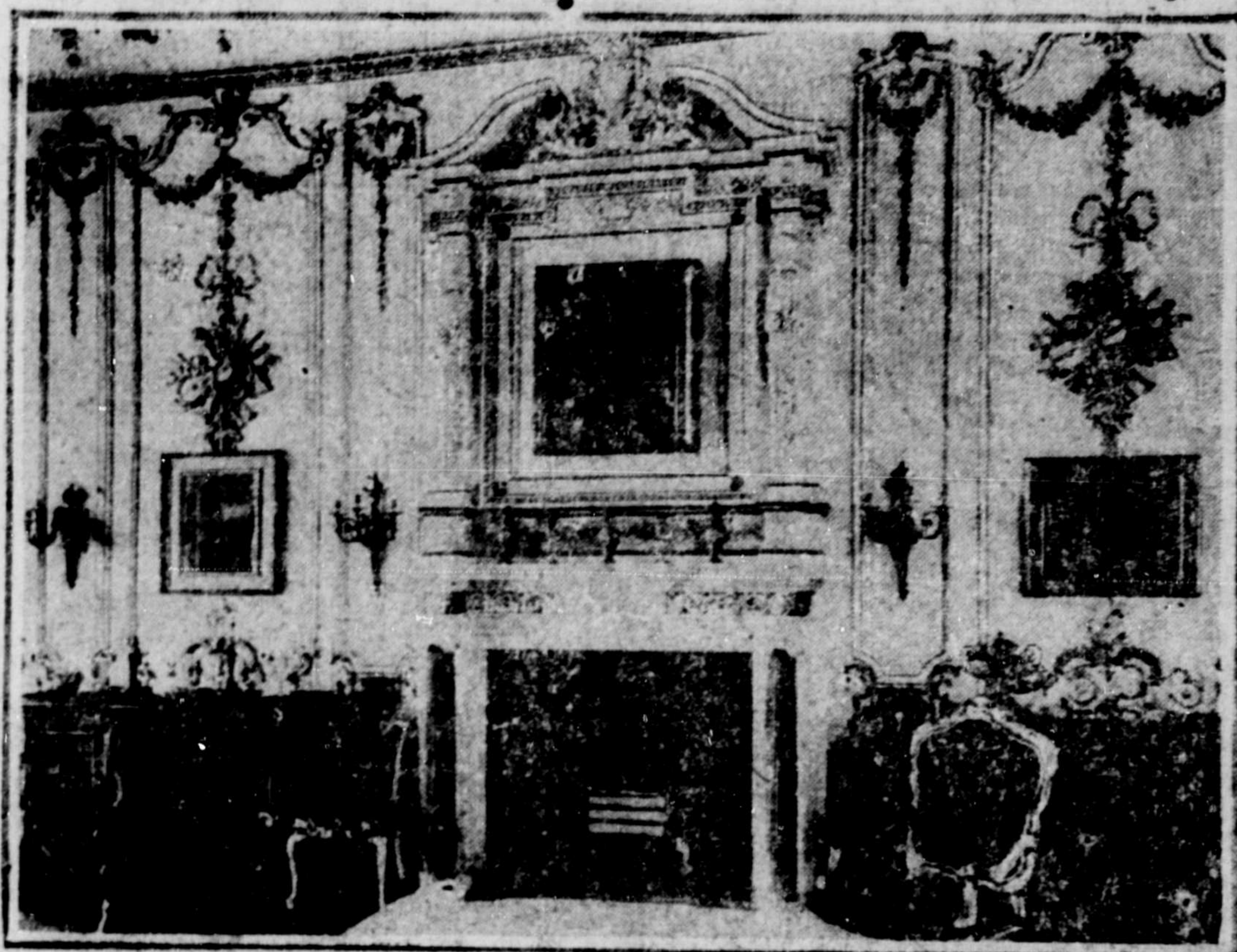
James Lewis Was Crimean War Veteran and Served 40 Years as Alderman.

PATTULLO AT TERRACE

Addressed Two Meetings in That District Yesterday.

TERRACE, Jan. 10.—Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and member of the legislative assembly for Prince Rupert, delivered a very forceful address last night to a crowded house in the Progress Hall. Archie Donaghy acted as chairman and, in introducing the speaker, stated that the meeting was not called for the purpose of holding a political campaign but on account of the desire on the part of the member to find out the needs of the district and the views of the people as to what should be done.

On rising, Mr. Pattullo expressed his pleasure at being able to be in Terrace and then briefly gave a review of the financial problems of the province and the difficulty in getting all that was desired in the way of appropriations to do the work he would like to have seen under way.

Old Country Trip.

He spoke of his trip to the old country, the reason for that trip and the benefits that were accruing to the province from increased export lumber trade to Britain. While in England he had taken up the question of immigration, and had enlisted the aid of the British government in the establishment of a settlement area near Stuart Lake.

Mr. Pattullo explained the underlying reasons why the government were building the big office building at Prince Rupert, stating that the people who had purchased property in that city had been definitely promised the court house by the old government years ago and he had but insisted that the present government abide by the contracts made by the state to the people.

At the conclusion of his exceptionally fine address the member asked for questions from the audience, and among those put forward was the question of a bridge across the Skeena, the establishment of a liquor vendor here and the North and South trunk roads. Prince Rupert Weather Report For 1921 Shows Slightly More Rain Than Preceding Two Years

The weather report for the year 1921 was announced by H. O. Grewe, Dominion meteorologist, this morning. It shows that during the year there was between 3 and 4 inches more precipitation than in 1920. The total precipitation for 1921 was 86.29 inches as compared with 82.67 for 1920 and 82.44 for 1919. The 1921 record was about the same as that for 1918.

The highest temperature for the year was 76 degrees above in May against 74, the highest figure for 1920 in July of that year. The lowest temperature of the year was 14 degrees above, this mark having been recorded in January, November and December. July, with 2.66 inches of precipitation, was the driest month, and February, with 13.34 inches, the wettest.

DEATH SIGN OF BOLSHEVIKI

PORT ARTHUR, Jan. 10.—The death sign of the Russian Bolsheviki, depicting a hammer and sickle, was found yesterday morning painted on the walls in the interior of the Bank of Hamilton and the Imperial Bank building. The sign was also in the doorway of the Finnish Vice-Consul.

IRISH MERCHANT LEAVES MUCH LAND AND MONEY BEHIND

LONDON, Jan. 10.—Henry Musgrave, the veteran merchant and philanthropist of Belfast, who died on January 4, left more than \$1,000,000 to Belfast institutions. He also bequeathed thirty-eight acres of land to be used for public parks.

B. C. MAYORS

George Henderson, Fernie, and J. G. Johnston, New Westminster, Returned by Acclamation.

FERNIE, Jan. 10.—George Henderson was yesterday returned by acclamation for his third term as mayor of this city.

NEW WESTMINSTER, Jan. 10.—Mayor J. G. Johnston was re-elected mayor yesterday by acclamation.

Census Nearly Completed And Estimate Shows That Total Is About 8,500,000

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—The census taking for six provinces is now completed and shows for them a total of 4,545,275 people. The estimate for Ontario, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, which provinces are still incomplete, gives them 4,000,000, making a total of 8,500,000 for the whole Dominion. The figures for the 1911 census were 7,206,357.

Quebec's population established as the basis, the unit of representation for the federal house is now 36,000 instead of 32,000 as formerly. New Brunswick loses one member and Nova Scotia loses two, while Manitoba gains two and Alberta four.

GERMANS REACH PARIS TODAY

Sixteen Delegates Arrive for Conference Reparation Question.

PARIS, Jan. 10.—The German delegation, which is to discuss the German reparations questions with the Allied Supreme Council, arrived in Paris from Berlin today. The delegation comprises sixteen members headed by Dr. Walter Rathenau.

A telegram received by the supreme Council from Foreign Minister Tchitcherine, says that the Russian government considers Genoa, Italy, out of the way for the forthcoming International Financial Economic conference and proposes London instead.

MARQUIS OKUMA DEAD. NICARAGUAN VOLCANO IS ACTIVE AGAIN

TOKYO, Jan. 10.—Marquis Okuma died today after several days illness.

CANADA GIVEN HER FREEDOM

In Connection With Anglo-French Treaty.

GANNES, Jan. 10.—Notification of the endorsement by the British cabinet of the written pledge binding Great Britain to give immediate aid to France to the full extent of her military and naval resources in case of German aggression, is expected from London today. The pact agreed upon by Briand and Lloyd George was telegraphed to the British cabinet ministers last night.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—Complete freedom of action has been reserved for Canada in connection with the new Anglo-French treaty. The feature of the agreement for mutual defence, which in reality is a guarantee for France of protection against further German aggression, is that the British Dominions can remain out or come in according to their desires. The decision as to whether Canada will become a party to the treaty will rest entirely with the Canadian government.

Few Nominations
For Election.

The few nominations which were filed with the city clerk yesterday afternoon for the municipal election to take place next Thursday indicate that the campaign is to be a quiet one and that there is not a great deal of interest being taken in it. The attitude and feeling of the citizen towards civic elections today differs very markedly from the conditions which prevailed ten years ago on similar occasions. Then there was meeting after meeting, everybody got excited, feeling ran high and personal abuse was not lacking. Today it is quite different. People do not seem so ready to express their opinions and those who do, do not get so heated over them. The candidates mix freely with each other and there is a feeling of camaraderie among them. The one who is defeated takes his defeat in good spirit and seems ready to fall in line and lend every assistance to the man who is chosen over him. This is as it should be and will lead to better progress being made by the city and better government being given. Constructive legislation can be better achieved when matters can be freely discussed without personal feeling than when there is irreconcilable antagonism.

Little Interest
Being Taken.

A number of reasons may be ascribed for the present election being so quiet. First of all, a big federal election is just over. The people have been discussing and listening to discussions on great national issues and they find it hard to get down to the smaller questions that affect the city. As a matter of fact, there seem to be few matters of much importance before the city electors at the present time and the duties of the mayor, aldermen and police commissioners, from present indications, will consist of little more than matters which concern administration. Political feelings in general elections are intensified and, this not being the case in municipal elections, they are not brought to bear at this time. Political feeling, it can not be denied, is the chief source of excitement and debate in most elections. A great many people seem to be indifferent as to who is elected mayor or who are to be the aldermen or police commissioners. Whether this condition is good or not is a debatable point. It seems on the face of it, however, that a little more interest in the conduct of the city's business might be beneficial to its proper carrying out. If they think the people are not interested, the legislators will naturally not take their duties so seriously and will be inclined to become careless and negligent. That state of affairs should be avoided.

What There Is
To Choose From.

The electors have before them two candidates for mayor—Colonel S. P. McMordie, D.S.O., and Mayor Harry B. Rochester. Both have had considerable experience as executives and the keeping of city affairs might well be entrusted to either. It is for the voters to choose which one they think will administer the municipal business of 1922 to the best advantage. For aldermen, eleven candidates are nominated, eight of whom will be elected. There will be new blood on the council board, for only five of the present aldermen are running. Ald. S. E. Parker, Ald. George Frizzell and Ald. M. J. McNeill having dropped out. It is altogether likely that the five members of the 1921 council will be returned, and to fill the vacancies good timber is available. Three men present themselves for the vacancy on the police commission. The least that can be said of them is that each will take an interest in the work.

Talking along the line of "backing" we know that no one would back a place that was no good. If it is good it will back itself when you come to rock bottom business. We may not like the weather and our own personal luck but give Prince Rupert its due—if it is two days nearer the Orient it will surely attract capital.

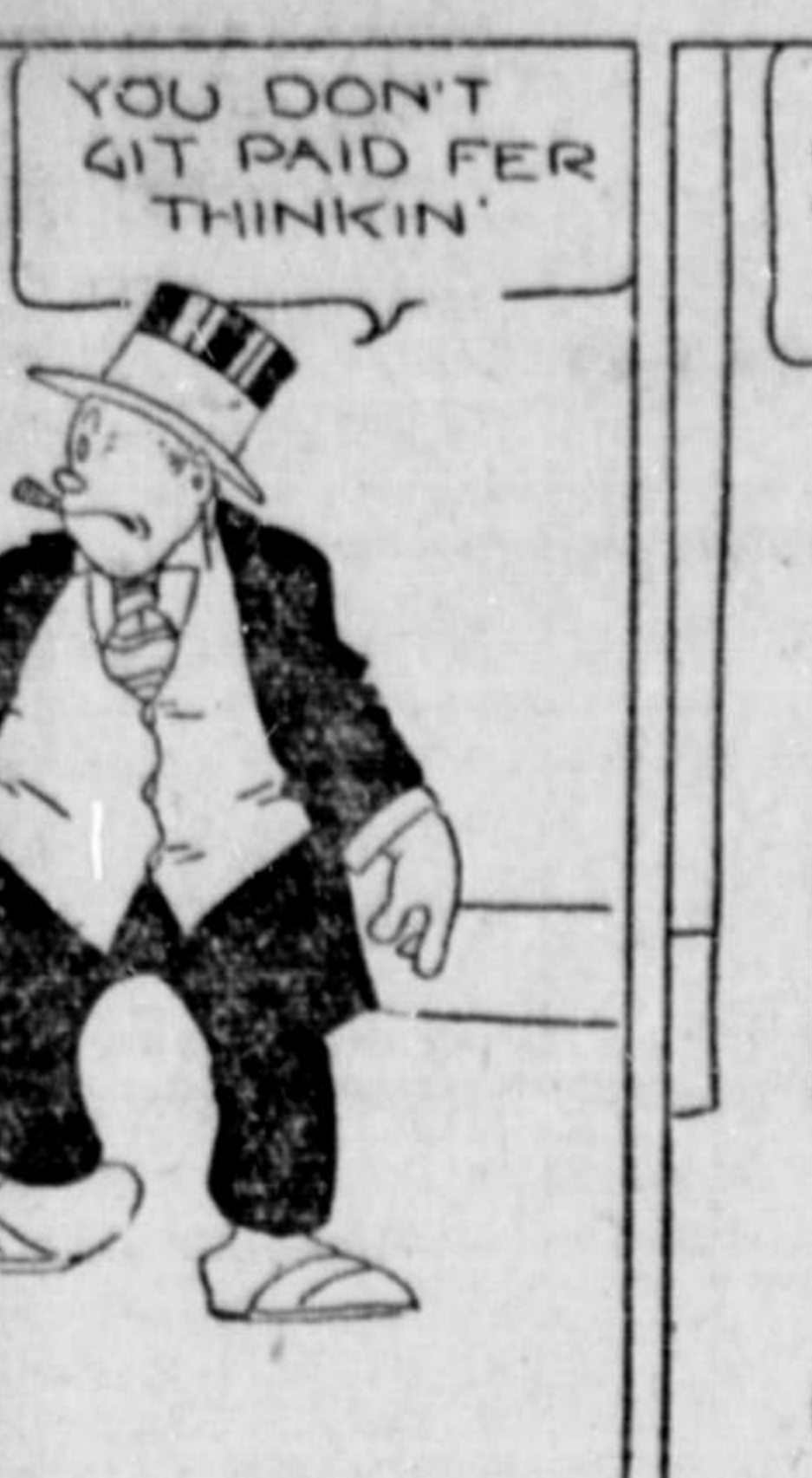

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DELEGATION TO OTTAWA

Board of Trade Went Into Matter Again Last Night—Left Over for a While.

The matter of sending a delegation from this city and district to Ottawa to impress upon the new government the needs and rights of Skeena constituency was again gone fully into at the adjourned meeting of the Board of Trade last evening. There was a large attendance of members and it was decided, after lengthy discussion, to hold the matter over in the meantime and approach the city council in regard to financing the deputation.

The report dealing with the requests that are to be asked of the government was gone over clause by clause and deletions and additions were made. The clause asking for more fish cars was struck out, it being reported by those in a position to know that there was now an ample supply of them to handle the business.

It was suggested by Fred Stork, M.P., that a clause be added requesting the government to put Prince Rupert in its proper status as the terminus of the Canadian National Railways and make the line to Prince Rupert the main line. This proposed clause was ordered inserted.

District Endorsement.
It was also decided to send the draft of requests to all public organizations of the district asking for endorsement and addition of clauses that might be considered necessary. In this connection it was decided to insert another clause in the list asking for an improvement in telegraphic service in the district.

There was a lengthy discussion as to the advisability of inserting a clause asking for the allowing of gas boat and gill net fishing and it was finally decided to also ask for this privilege.

Fred Stork, M. P., the new honorary president, was asked to address the meeting. In doing so, he thanked the board for the honor which had been conferred upon him. He had long been associated with the board, and, in fact, was the chairman of the first meeting ever held in the city. He said that in working for the best interests of the district he would always be prepared to work in harmony with the Board of Trade. There was now great opportunity for the district if all would pull together.

Feeder Lines.

F. G. Dawson spoke to the report urging that the request for branch line feeders of the railway be specially pressed. There were great areas of vast rich agricultural lands in the interior that could be opened up by a few miles of branch lines. He showed as examples the Francois and Ossa Lake countries, Stuart Lake and the Nation Lakes. He was in favor of making far-reaching requests believing that the more that was asked for the more likely the district was to get something which was wanted. Terminal grain elevators was another matter that should be pressed. Mr. Dawson suggested that the sending of the delegation be delayed until February 1. At that time it would be possible to send Hon. A. M. Manson as a delegate and Hon. Mr. Pattullo would also be passing through Ottawa on his way to Europe then. There was no need for sending the delegation immediately as the new parliament was not to be called until March.

J. E. Maguire also spoke urging that the delegation not ask for too much. The matter of signal importance was the establishing of Trans-Pacific shipping. Through this port was the natural route for it and, once it was established the other things would follow. The establishment of grain elevators here should also be pressed for.

Thos. McClymont spoke along similar lines recommending that too much not be asked for. He referred to the Copper River Railway and this brought forth a reply from A. C. Garde, M. E., urging the necessity of this request being granted, giving facts and figures to back it up.

Hon. A. M. Manson urged that the brief to be sent to Ottawa include all things contributing to the success and development of Northern B. C. There might be difficulty in obtaining some of the things desired for the East would view the wants of this district in a different light. There were two great factors that would bring about the solution of the railway problem; first the establishment of short feeding spur lines and, second, the Trans-Pacific trade. The government now was in the position of a man with a promissory note. Its forbears had built the railroad and the present government would have to stand behind it and develop it.

COMMISSARY AT DRY DOCK NOT AVAILABLE

W. E. Hodges Writes City Council That It Cannot Be Used for Housing Unemployed.

A letter from W. E. Hodges, receiver for the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering, in reply to the city's request for the use of the commissary at the dry dock as a boarding-house for unemployed, was received and filed by the council last night. Mr. Hodges pointed out that, as negotiations for the taking over of the plant by the Canadian National Railways were in progress, it would be impossible to tie up the commissary for this purpose. The charge of \$2 a week proposed would also not be sufficient even to pay for heating the building.

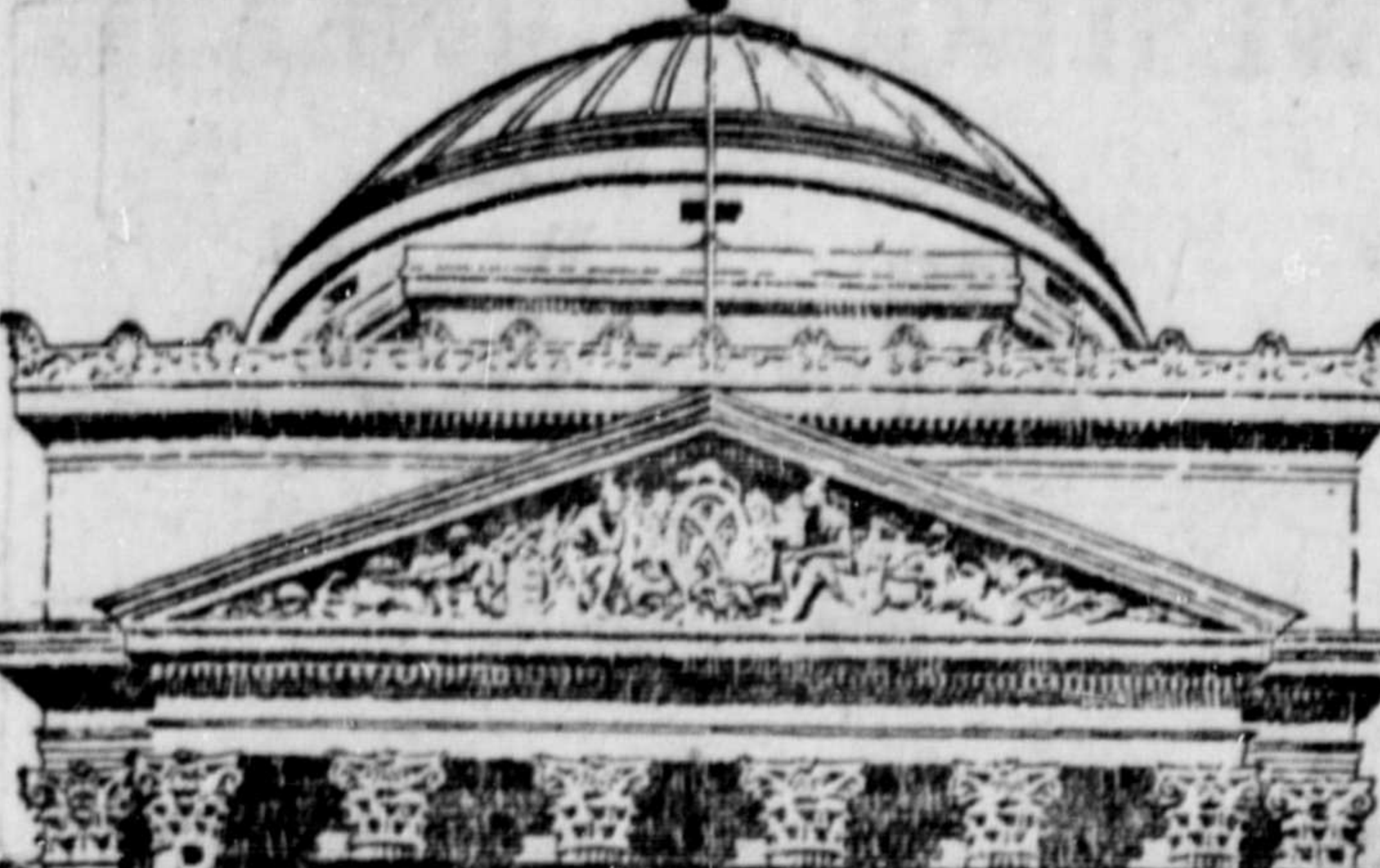

LAUNCH VESTA VICTIM PIRATES

Local Craft Relieved of Valuable Cargo at Whale Island Inlet.

The Vesta, Captain Jimmy Wintermute, had quite an exciting encounter with pirates in Whale Island Inlet, situated some 60 miles north of Prince Rupert, last Sunday evening between 6 and 6:30. The boat left port on Saturday morning with a nice little cargo of some 100 cases of "good stuff," presumably for legitimate delivery. The boat anchored in Whale Island Inlet Sunday evening.

They had not been tied up many minutes when a boat of unknown origin moored alongside, this occurrence not being thought untoward by the crew of the Vesta. Everything proceeded all right when, much to the surprise of the Wintermute gathering, three masked men appeared aboard the Vesta with a battery of artillery in the nature of automatic "gats." The command "Throw up your hands" was given in businesslike tones, but Captain Wintermute thought it was a joke and told the challenger to "come off his perch." However, the pirates were not fooling and started in to plug the pilot house, firing several shots overhead. This put a serious aspect to the matter and the challenged crew had no alternative but to obey. While one of the pirates covered the crew of the Vesta, the other two proceeded to transfer the "joy liquid" to their own craft. This being accomplished, they withdrew as quickly and as silently as they had arrived and left the Vesta and its crew sadder but wiser men.

The Vesta returned to port yesterday, the pilot house certainly showing signs of the heated and one-sided argument. Several holes are plainly discernible. It is evident that the pirate craft had followed the Vesta for some miles. It is thought that it was an American craft, as Whale Island Inlet is directly opposite American territory.

Prince Rupert students have again reflected credit on themselves and their early education here according to the results of the winter examinations of the University of B. C. which were announced last week in Vancouver.

Cedric Duncan, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Duncan, Fourth Avenue East, has especially excelled and the record he made is indeed an enviable one. He obtained first class standings in Physics, Geometry, French, English A and English B, in the latter leading the whole class of 240 students from all parts of the province at the University. He also took second standings in Mathematics (distinction) and Chemistry.

Raymond Fisher, another of Prince Rupert's stars at the university, took first in Agronomy and Animal Husbandry as well as a number of seconds. Raymond is one of the older students and will graduate as B. Sc. in May.

Marjorie Roberts, Alan McNicholl, Margaret Lindsay and Frank Barnsley, other Prince Rupert students, also took the exams with good standings.

DOG TEAMS TRAINING FOR COMING DERBY

Seventeen Teams Already Entered—Record Number Expected to Make Start This Year.

THE PAS, Jan. 9.—Contestants for the fifth dog Derby race have commenced active training, and from now to the date of the race, February 28, the teams will be worked for runs of 50 miles daily. The list of entries on hand indicates that the race will be contested by the largest number of teams that ever competed in a major dog race in this country. Seventeen teams, averaging eleven dogs apiece, make up the entry lists so far, which includes three Alaskan entries.

The ruling favorites are Pagan, McKay, Morgan and Paneroff, all experienced Derby racers. A new competitor, from whom much is expected, is Jack Sinclair, whose team is made up of fifteen Norway House huskies. They are big, rangy animals, and it will be their first experience at Derby racing.

Go to One Window, Get License; Go to Another, Get Married.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—Asserting that getting a marriage license in New York is easier than buying a theatre ticket, two judges in general sessions have come out in favor of a measure which would require publication of the names of persons obtaining licenses and prohibiting the ceremony for a month, during which any objections could be registered. This, it was asserted, would check run-aways and bigamy.

"All you have to do to get married in New York," said Judge Tatley, "is to go to a window in the municipal building and get a license and then go to another window and get married."

His remarks were made in suspending sentence on a married man with two children who alleged he had contracted a bigamous marriage after having puffed at the poppy in Chinatown. Judge McIntyre said 28 persons had been convicted of bigamy here in 1921.

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MAN WHO WAXES FAT CAN BLAME ANCESTRY

Is fatness inherited? Statistics compiled by Dr. G. B. Davenport of the Eugenics Record Office, Long Island, N. Y., show that children of two slender parents and four slender grandparents are rarely fleshy. On the other hand, children of two fleshy parents are usually inclined toward avoirdupois, though they are occasionally lean. In most cases fleshy children have at least one stout parent.

These statistics have been studied from a great number of family records, and all point to the fact that heavy build in forebears is the dominant factor that governs the figures of their descendants.
