## GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE TO PAY

### FILIPINO RUNS AMOK IN SEATTLE, KILLS SIX WITH KNIFE

#### War Debts To Be Met On Time Next Month, State Dep't Learns

Decision Followed Conferences Yesterday Between Secretary Stimson and Ambassadors Paul Claudal and Sir Ronald Lindsay

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 25.—Great Britain and France have agreed to make war debt payments due to the United States on December 15, it was announced yesterday by the State Department. Great Britain will pay \$95,000,000 and France \$19,000,000. The payments will be made in gold bullion, it is expected. All other countries except Greece, which has already given notice that it must default, will meet their payments, it is anticipated. For three of the smaller nations, postponement had been previously agreed upon.

#### SAYS WAR NOT LIKELY

General Pershing Gives His Views On European Situation

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—General John J. Pershing, commander-in-chief of the United States Expeditionary Forces in the Great War, landed here yesterday from the liner Manhattan after having spent some time in France in connection with the work of the Battle Monuments Commission.

In reply to questions by newspapermen, General Pershing made his first statement in regard to military matters since the war. Asked if he considered an early outbreak of war in Europe possible, the famous American military leader stated that he considered such a conflict unlikely.

#### Heat Wave Still On In California

Thermometer Hovers Near Ninety Degree Mark at Los Angeles—Bush Fires in State

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 25.—The unprecedented November heat wave is continuing in Southern California. The thermometer again approached the ninety degree mark in Los Angeles yesterday. There are bush fires in the neighborhood of San Diego and elsewhere in the state.

**GASOLINE PRICES ON OTHER SIDE ARE CUT**  
SEATTLE, Nov. 25.—Thanksgiving Day brought welcome news for Seattle motorists in the announcement of reductions in gasoline prices of from 1c to 4 1-10c per gallon. The new prices, including 6c tax, are 13 9-10c per gallon for third structure gas, 16 9-10c for first grade and 19 9-10c for ethyl.

#### JAPAN HELD RESPONSIBLE

Dr. Wellington Coe Describes That Country as "World's Trouble-Maker"

GENEVA, Nov. 25.—Dr. Wellington Coe, spokesman for China at the League of Nations, yesterday described Japan as the "world's trouble-maker" and declared that "if the world is to have peace, Japan's challenge to the League of Nations cannot be allowed to go unchallenged."

Dr. Coe held Japan's "aggressive tactics" responsible for recent warfare in the Far East.

#### AIRSHIP IS UNDER WAY

Macon, Sister Ship of Akron, Expected to Be Completed in Six Months

AKRON, Ohio, Nov. 25.—The giant airship Macon, sister ship to the United States Navy dirigible Akron, will be ready for service within six months, it was announced here yesterday. The structural steel skeleton has received its outer covering, five of the eight engines have been installed and fuel tanks and ballast bags have been put in place. Other structural material and equipment is being fabricated and assembled.

**LIBERALS FORESEE FEDERAL ELECTION**  
OTTAWA, Nov. 25.—In the expectation and hope of an early election, Liberal members of the House of Commons are beginning a campaign. Although the Bennett government can continue in office for at least two more years, if it so desires, there is a feeling in some political quarters that it may go to the country before the legal expiry of its term.

#### Col. Robins Now At Florida Home

Amnesia Victim Will Recuperate There Following Recent Lapse of Memory

BROOKSVILLE, Fla., Nov. 25.—Col. Raymond Robins, who was found a few days ago near Asheville, North Carolina, suffering from amnesia, from which he is now recovering, arrived here last night to complete his recuperation at his home.

#### Seattle Bishop Has Been Priest For Fifty Years

SEATTLE, Nov. 25.—The fiftieth anniversary of the ordination of Bishop O'Day, head of the Roman Catholic Church for this diocese, was celebrated with special mass in St. James Cathedral yesterday. Bishop O'Day was in receipt of a personal message from Pope Pius XIII who extended pontifical blessings.

#### Conditions Better in Canada Than in United States; The Country is Very Optimistic

T. H. Johnson, Manager of Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Gives Interesting Luncheon Address Before Rotary Club

All degrees of optimism and pessimism were found in various parts of Canada and the United States by T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., during his recent tour, he told the members of the Rotary Club at their luncheon yesterday afternoon in the Commodore Cafe. On the whole, he found Canada better than the United States.

Going into more detail the speaker mentioned that there were many pessimists in Southern Saskatchewan as a result of the series of bad crops followed by the season of poor prices. In Manitoba things were a trifle better but business was poor generally. The northern sections of the prairies were in better condition owing to their having had better crops and higher grades of grain.

#### HAS LANDED IN ENGLAND

Victor Smith, Young South African Aviator, Completes Flight From Capetown

LONDON, Nov. 25.—Victor Smith, youthful South African aviator, landed in England yesterday after a flight from Capetown during which he was missing for five days in the Kamerun Mountains when some anxiety was felt as to his safety.

#### Thanksgiving Day In Puget Sound City Is Darkened By Tragedy

Eleven Persons Injured as Mad Laborer Dashes Through Streets Wielding Huge Bolo Knife—Finally Taken in Custody

SEATTLE, Nov. 25.—Thanksgiving Day in Seattle was marred late yesterday afternoon by a ghastly tragedy in Jackson Street district when Julian Marcelino, a Filipino laborer, ran amok in the crowded streets with a huge bolo knife, stabbing six persons to death and injuring 11 others before he was taken into custody. The dead include a bystander, named Frank Johnson, one other white person, three Filipinos and a Chinaman. The injured persons are expected to recover with the possible exception of one.

#### LABORITES' CONVENTION

Renewal of Militant Campaign in United States Urged Upon Indianapolis Convention

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 25.—Renewal of a militant labor campaign in this country such as was waged in pre-war days was urged upon the convention of the American Federation of Labor here yesterday. Capital was charged with imposing unreasonable wage cuts upon labor and with broken contracts. The convention is continuing.

#### ROOSEVELT HOLIDAYING

President-Elect of United States to Spend a Couple of Weeks at Warm Springs, Georgia

WARM SPRINGS, Ga., Nov. 25.—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, President-Elect of the United States, accompanied by his wife, daughter and party, arrived here amid a steady downpour of rain yesterday and was acclaimed enthusiastically by a crowd of several hundred Georgia Democrats.

#### Lumber Delegation Is Given Luncheon

LONDON, Nov. 25.—The British Columbia lumber delegation, which is visiting the United Kingdom with a view to promoting trade for the industry, was tendered a luncheon in the House of Commons yesterday.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Mary Garden, noted American operatic singer, who has been on a trip to Europe, landed here yesterday from the liner Manhattan. She expressed regret at the closing of the Chicago opera, in which she had long taken leading roles.

**AIRPLANE CRASHES IN RIO JANEIRO STREET**  
RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, Nov. 25.—After the motor had stopped while the machine was being flown over the city, an airplane came down into a street here yesterday. The pilot was killed in the crash but the passenger was saved by being caught in telephone wires before the plane hit the ground.

**WITHDRAWS PASSING OF  
 FROM HERE OLD TIMER**

Canadian Pacific Express Co. Leaving Local Field in Favor of Canadian National

In line with the policy of co-operation in elimination of duplication which is being adopted by the two major railway companies of Canada, the Canadian Pacific Express Co. will withdraw from business at Prince Rupert at the end of November, leaving the local field to the Canadian National Express Co.

Similar moves are being made by the express companies at all other competitive points in Canada, except the larger cities. It is understood. The company which has the smaller business at each point is withdrawing, leaving that place to the company which has the larger business.

The Canadian Pacific Express Co. has operated an office here ever since the very early days. H. B. Rochester having been the first agent. R. M. Smith is the present agent.

Harry C. Evans, well known pioneer resident of Prince Rupert, who followed the calling of a piano tuner in this city for more than twenty years, passed away at the Prince Rupert General Hospital at 5 o'clock this morning after having been a patient in the institution since last June. He succumbed to the effects of gangrenous diabetes. Some time ago it became necessary for surgeons to amputate one of his legs. Recently it had been realized that recovery could not be hoped for.

The late Mr. Evans was a native of New York and was 71 years of age. He was unmarried and, as far as is known, had no relatives hereabouts. He was of a genial and kindly disposition and had many friends who will regret his passing.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of Haynor Bros., undertakers. Deceased was a member of the Eagles' Lodge.

**Spiritual Source of Doctrine From Which Fascist State Emerged on Parting Company With Socialists**

(By Victor Basso-Bert)

To elucidate, to discern and individualize the fundamental idea of the corporative state established in Italy by Mussolini it is necessary to make a short dissertation on the vast field of the various efforts made by men to find a way out of the present crude capitalistic system.

In 1848 at the Congress of the First Internationale, Marx and Engels, socialists, emerged victorious over Babouine, the anarchist, and Mazzini, the republican. Ever since then Marxism has been the dominating school of socialism but there have been other contributors to the main thought—Engels, with "Origin of Property," "Family and State;" Antonio Labriola, with "The Materialistic Conception of History," and countless others. As a result of the various schools, socialist parties were organized in practically every country. The labor organizations, imbued with Marxian philosophy and dialectic of the class struggle, were directed toward the political conquest of the state.

In some countries, labor organization has been purely economic. The great British trade unions were slowly permeated by the gospel of Marx and are now socialistic. In continental Europe the gospel created the fact of the organization while in Britain the fact moved to the idea.

A well differentiated branch of the school of socialism called Syndicalism was cohabiting in the international family of Socialism. This school was sponsored by Sorel Peguy and Lagardelle of the "Mouvement Socialiste" in France, Orano, Olivetti, Labriola, Leone and Mussolini in Italy. This particular school had a peculiar conception of its own to solve the social problem. It was aiming to organize production and control it through the syndicates of the various forms of labor in a centralized and unitarian way, without the mastodon bureaucracy that the socialist ownership of the means of production and exchange would involve.

As a point of reference Lenin and Trotsky were pure Marxian and the Russian revolution is a fruit of Marxian dialectic.

It is interesting to observe the spiritual source of the two great revolutions, one in Russia, the other in Italy, their march and the influence they will have on human destiny.

After assuming the reins of power in Italy, Mussolini immediately started his task. In the laborious and numerous sessions of the Fascist grand council, the new corporative state gradually emerged. One of its first laws, the basic and fundamental one, was comprised in the thirty declarations of policy of the magna charta of labor, now the corner stone of the corporative edifice.

While in the east Mr. Johnson said he had attended a number of dinners. He was present at the annual fish dinner in Montreal with 150 present including many notables. He had been given an opportunity to advertise Prince Rupert in a brief speech. Another fish dinner at Boston gave him another opportunity to bring publicity to Prince Rupert.

In Montreal he attended a Rotary luncheon at which Prince Rupert halibut was served.

A dinner given by the Canadian Club of Montreal was addressed by the Marquis of Reading, who discussed English political affairs and mentioned the recent little disturbance in London over the Meins Test. Lord Reading had said that the world was today full of inflammable material and it was the duty of each one to preserve a proper mental attitude toward peace.

In Ottawa Mr. Johnson met Oief Hanson M.P. and lunched with him and later listened to a debate in the House-of-Commons. One of the jokes he heard while there was a proposal to trade the Irish Free States for the Panhandle of Alaska.

Mr. Johnson brought best regards to Prince Rupert people from S. K. Campbell, formerly manager of the Bank of Commerce in Prince Rupert. He had recently been appointed assistant to the manager of the largest branch of the bank in Montreal and was on his way to take the position when he met him.

At the conclusion Mr. Johnson was thanked by President Woodland for his interesting address.

Many big hotels and apartment buildings had gone into the hands of receivers and business had been badly handicapped by bank failures. However, everywhere in Canada and the States he found people optimistic, although in many cases the optimism was not borne out by the facts. ## FIRST GOLD ON ISLANDS

First Coal in British Columbia Also Found There—Pioneer Railway at Skidegate

SKIDEGATE, Nov. 25.—The first gold discovery in British Columbia was made at Port Kuper, Queen Charlotte Islands, in 1852 by Capt. Mitchell who was dispatched to that point by the Hudson Bay Co. in the brig Una.

First coal discovered in British Columbia was in Skidegate Inlet in 1859 by Mr. Downie and party.

The first railway to operate in British Columbia was in Skidegate Inlet, this road having been a narrow-gauge one, one mile in length, which was operated by the Queen Charlotte Mining Co. Ltd. of Victoria in 1865 at the coal mine known then as the Cowgitz coal mine. Coal was shipped to Victoria from this mine in 1869.
