POLITICAL CONTROVERSY ON IN ENGLAND

CHAMBERLAIN ASKS CONTINUANCE OF COALITION AGAINST LABOR MENACE

Austen Chamberlain is out for Continuance of British Coalition Govt.

BIRMINGHAM, Oct. 13.—Austen Chamberlain, government leader, addressing the Midland Conservatives here yesterday declared it would be criminal to break up the present coalition in view of the labor menace.

"I do not pretend to say when an election will occur. It is undoubtedly right that the Premier should choose," he said. Another point made by Mr. Chamberlain in his speech was, "I worked with Lloyd George in perfect harmony. He has told us he did not know when the election would come."

Mr. Chamberlain's speech had been eagerly awaited here in the hope that it would indicate what would be the premier's political stand in the event of a general election and how far the Conservatives, of whom Mr. Chamberlain is the leader, would support Lloyd George.

Mr. Chamberlain's declaration is believed to mean that the Premier would fight for the coalition and that Austen Chamberlain would give him support.

POLITICS IN ENGLAND IS MUCH ALIVE

Conservatives Are Demanding That Chamberlain Cut Away From Coalition

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Discussion of the political crisis again fills columns of the newspapers this morning. The outstanding feature of the situation is the increased hardening of the Conservative opposition to Austen Chamberlain's continuance as leader of the Unionist party unless he cuts loose from Lloyd George and the coalition. That he will do this seems likely in the best informed circles.

WANTED FLIGHT TO VANCOUVER IN PLANE

Party of Five Too Late to Get Bell's Bus For Flight Southward

The big steel airplane had left town only a few minutes for Hazelton yesterday when a party of five came along and wanted Len Bell to take them to Vancouver. The plane carried E. C. Gibbons and W. C. Hall to Hazelton, getting away from here at 2:10 in glorious sunshine. They arrived at Hazelton at four after a most successful flight dropping down from the Skeena River from over Rochede Boule Mountain.

PORT ESSINGTON, Oct. 12.—Plane passed Essington travelling in great shape en route for Hazelton at 2:18 today.

JOE BECKETT BEATS MORAN

Scores Technical Knockout in Seventh and Bloomfield Stops Wells

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Joe Beckett, the British light heavyweight, scored a technical knockout over Frank Moran, the American heavyweight, when the referee stopped the bout in the seventh round here last night.

In another contest Jack Bloomfield British light heavyweight champion, stopped Bombardier Wells, also of England, in the sixth round.

AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION HEARS REPORT

Meeting Last Night Prior to President Leaving For East

A meeting of the board of the N. B. Agricultural and Industrial Association was held in the City Hall last night.

Those present were F. G. Dawson, president; W. E. Thompson, vice-president; J. McRae, secretary; Alderton Silversides and Kelly, representing the city council; R. E. Benson, W. J. Kirkpatrick, C. C. Mills, director; and J. Venables, manager.

The meeting was called in view of the departure of F. G. Dawson, president, for the east tonight.

The accounts of the association have not yet been completed sufficiently to give a final financial statement of exhibition affairs but it is felt that the result of the past exhibition financially will be very satisfactory in view of the expenditure made on permanent fixture work this year.

The amount of permanent work done this year has been considerable and includes the home cooking section, portable shelving for the mineral exhibit, which can be moved to any part of the hall, the dog house has been built permanently, also the old chicken house was turned out entirely and put in such shape that no more money will need to be spent on it for some time to come. Three new booths were built on the carnival grounds, and the cattle kraal was put into good condition.

Upwards of \$1,000 was spent on a new sewer which had to be run from the exhibition building to a point near the Summit Apartments to connect with the main. The ladies' rest room in the basement was completed with toilet basins, etc. This room will have to be improved next year in the way of furniture. The fixtures for the school exhibit were put in condition and can be used in future without any additional expense. The stands for the district exhibits, which were made this year, will be suitable for use for forthcoming exhibitions.

Annual Trophies

Four annual trophies were purchased this year. The agricultural district exhibit cup, value \$100, the district fruit cup, the district mineral exhibit cup, and the rock drilling shield. These trophies have to be won twice in succession, or any three times, so that these will not need to be replaced for some time.

In addition to these expenses there was the additional expense of getting the district exhibits here in the way of freight and transportation.

Important Work

With the permanent work already completed, there remains one more important thing to be done. The exhibition building is badly in need of paint on the exterior, and the present cave troughs which are perished will need to be replaced. The roof also needs urgent attention in places. With these repairs made the building will be in first class condition.

PRINCE JOHN HERE FROM THE ISLANDS

People Coming and Going From Queen Charlotte Islands

The steamer Prince John Capt. Nedden, arrived in port at 7:30 last night from the Queen Charlotte Islands on her way from Vancouver.

On board were Mr. and Mrs. Schommer of Alford Bay. Mr. Schommer has just completed a season's work with the cannery at that point, and is returning south.

Alf. Moore, in charge of logging operations on the Queen Charlotte Islands for the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co. of Ocean Falls, came up as far as Sedrick Bay from Vancouver.

McKay Smith, of the McKay Smith, Blair Co., of Vancouver, came north on the Prince John as far as Prince Rupert and is registered at the Central Hotel.

A. H. Robson, purser, said that quite a deal of work was going on around Massett, a number of men being employed in erecting fences. He thought that the timber cutting operations around Buckley Bay would be commenced in about a month's time, at least that was the general opinion on the islands. The Prince John will leave on her return trip for the Queen Charlotte Islands tomorrow at 8 p.m. While in port her smokestacks are to be repainted.

DAWSON AND H. H. STEVENS

New Railway Director Telegraphs Vancouver Sun His Reply to Charges.

In reply to a request from the Vancouver Sun asking for a statement to reply to H. H. Stevens' charges, F. G. Dawson last evening sent the following telegram:

"Your wire received. It has never been my policy to allow myself to become embroiled in political controversies but you have requested me to make a statement and out of courtesy to you will say that the statements alleged to have been made by Hon. H. H. Stevens regarding my bringing in quantities of beer illicitly are so utterly ridiculous that they do not merit consideration.

"It has been my pleasure to manage a good many political campaigns but have never had the honor of managing one for Hon. A. M. Manson nor have I had the privilege of even voting for him in the past ten years but I hold him in the highest personal esteem and am very sorry that such unfounded statements should be made about a man whom I believe and I think the public in general believe is conscientiously trying to administer a difficult act. Such petty political slush as Hon. Mr. Stevens emitted is only the frothings of the brainstorm type of politician and will be accepted as such."

GOOD DEMAND STEWART LOTS

W. S. Fisher Sold 53 Parcels in all Yesterday for Provincial Government

Out of 250 parcels of land advertised for the provincial tax sale in this district only 177 were offered for sale, the others having been redeemed before the sale. Of these 53 were sold the rest reverting to the province. The sum of \$1,284.91 was realized from the sale at which W. S. Fisher acted as auctioneer.

Stewart property was in good demand, most of the lots there being bought by John Mellor who took 13 and Kate Ryan bought two.

The four lots offered on the Port Edward townsite were taken by the Porpoise Harbor Land Co., the original owners of the townsite. C. L. Manroe bought two lots at Port Simpson, George Nickerson two at Port Clements; E. C. Manning two parcels on the Skeena River; McOrkendale one in Terrace district; Sam Jabour one, Carl Seaberg one, Moses Sequin one, A. Robertson one. Three lots in Delkalla townsite were sold, two to Mrs. Annie Ritten and one to Mrs. Annie Hall, J. S. Dignam of Toronto bought nine scattered parcels, among them being several large tracts on Queen Charlotte Islands.

Only eight lots went above the upset price and three of those were in Stewart.

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL ON CHARGE OF THEFT

In the city police court this morning, before Magistrate Mr. Clymont, Chas. Stewart, charged with the theft of a valise belonging to Philip A. Green, a native of Port Simpson, containing clothing from a launch at Cow Bay on Oct. 5, was committed for trial to a higher court. Accused was arrested by Chief Vickers yesterday. He had been seen to take the valise from a boat by a bystander and it was on this information that the arrest was made.

NORWEGIAN VESSEL GRABS A BRITISHER CARRYING LIQUOR

CHRISTIANIA, Oct. 13.—The Norwegian government, under laws recently enacted, may now seize vessels of less than 100 tons found within the common territorial frontier carrying liquor in excess of the actual requirements of those on board.

Application was made a short time ago in the case of the motor cutter "Lisbeth" of Guxhaven, England. This boat was stopped off Risoe by the customs authorities and found to have over 300 quarts of liquor on board. The captain was fined, and the cutter and her cargo of spirits confiscated.

Seventy-Six Passengers and Two Hundred of Crew Rescued from City of Honolulu which Still Burns

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—Passengers from the steamer City of Honolulu, which was burned at sea, were transferred to the United States army transport Thomas from the rescue ship West Faralon at dawn today. The Thomas is due in San Francisco tomorrow but it is expected she will be a day later.

The passengers on the City of Honolulu numbered 76, and the crew 200, all of whom were saved. When rescued by the West Faralon the passengers and crew were in lifeboats on a smooth sea. That was late yesterday afternoon.

The Honolulu continued to burn throughout the night, but it is likely the hull will be towed to some port on the coast unless she sinks. The flames appeared to break out suddenly and spread rapidly. The steamer is believed to have burned beyond repair and it will be at least two days before any ship will be able to approach the hull on account of the intense heat.

The transfer of passengers occurred without incident.

INJUNCTION ASKED TODAY

Cunard Line Want U.S. Courts to Rule Against U. S. Government

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Unless an injunction is granted the Cunard Line by the United States courts, the British Government will probably protest formally through the foreign office against the rule prohibiting liquors on foreign ships in American waters, it was stated in official quarters today.

Officials here express the opinion that the injunction applied for will be granted in the United States courts.

METHODISTS AND DIVORCE

Conference Proposes Arbitration Court: Smoking for Ministers Prohibited

TORONTO, Oct. 13.—The Methodist General Conference decided to prohibit the use of tobacco by Methodist ministers in Canada in future.

The conference adopted a recommendation that divorce be discouraged by means of counsels for the arbitration of domestic disputes in an effort to patch up trouble before the divorce courts hear of them.

Dr. Salem Island vigorously opposed the proposal and said that divorce was sometimes only common justice and should be made available to all instead of to the rich as at present.

TAKES OVER BRANCH LINES

Railway to Keep Open Feeders in Alberta and Saskatchewan

OTTAWA, Oct. 13.—After November 1 the first interest on bonds on the branch lines of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway in Alberta and Saskatchewan, formerly guaranteed by the province, will be paid by the Canadian National Railways. These branches will remain open as feeders to the main line.

DANCE IN DE LUXE HALL SUCCESSFUL

The dance held in the DeLuxe Hall last night was a very successful affair between 60 and 70 couples taking part to the strains of Newell's melody orchestra until 1 a.m. this morning. Several private parties put in an appearance and enjoyed themselves thoroughly. It is quite apparent that these weekly dances are becoming very popular among the dancers in Prince Rupert.

CANNED FOODS ARE NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR RECENT DEATHS

LONDON, Oct. 13.—The Liverpool Chamber of Commerce voiced a protest "against the scare broadcast by the press recently regarding the deaths attributed to canned food." The chamber has made elaborate enquiries and has found that the deaths in question were due to other causes, it is stated.

The chamber of commerce suggests that a distinction ought to be made between present day canned food and articles put in tins such as has been the custom in the past.

STEVENS TRYING TO OUST BOWSER

So Says Hon. A. M. Manson in Addressing Liberals of Esquimalt

VICTORIA, Oct. 13.—Hon. A. Manson told Esquimalt Liberals at a meeting last night that Hon. H. H. Stevens was trying to break into provincial politics and was preparing to oust W. J. Bowser from the party leadership. He said that the Stevens charges against the administration of the Liquor Act in the north were false and he prophesied that if Stevens went into the Prince Rupert country he would get a coat of tar and feathers.

Mr. Manson said he would waste no time with the Stevens charges. He had something else to do.

JOHN FOSTER DIED GENERAL HOSPITAL

Was Employed at Railway Shops and Came from Ontario

William John Foster, aged 47, died at the General Hospital last night after a serious operation. The deceased was a single man and had been employed in the Canadian National Railway shops here under J. W. McAuley, locomotive foreman, for the past fourteen months, and lived at 960 First Avenue. He was a native of Clinton, Ont. His nearest relative is a brother, R. Foster of West Toronto.

Prior to coming to Prince Rupert the late Mr. Foster was employed at the Wallace ship yards, Vancouver, from which employment he came to Prince Rupert.

The body is in the hands of Haynor Bros.

Cost Of City

Government High.

Everyone seems agreed that the cost of city government is too high, and the high cost does not seem to be confined to one department. Last night at the police commission meeting Alderman Kerr, who is acting mayor, drew attention to the high cost of the police in this city and compared the cost with that of other cities of the same size and also with the cost of policing the city six years ago.

While appreciating the work the police are doing, there seems some doubt whether conditions are so much worse today than they were six years ago as to warrant such a great increase in the cost of conducting the department as that indicated in the figures quoted by Mr. Kerr. Those who have not read the report of the discussion on another page of this paper should do so, for the matter is worthy of consideration.

Police men are worthy of good pay. It is only by paying men well that good service is obtained. At the same time there seems doubt if we are so much more difficult to police than is Nelson or Nanaimo that we can afford to pay so much more than those cities pay. At any rate the matter is worthy of consideration.

Benefits Of High School Education.

In an address to the pupils of the High School when presenting the Halsey scholarship to Miss Rank, Rev. Dr. Grant said that the boy or girl who possessed the educational equipment secured as a result of attending the school would never regret the time and effort put in to acquire that valuable asset. Nothing worth while in life had ever come to anyone except by long and earnest effort and nothing in the whole world could be compared with the fruits that knowledge brings.

In other words the doctor is strong on education and urges that all who can shall take the opportunities offered here for educational advancement. There are few people that can offer better educational facilities than we have in Prince Rupert. We have first class high school, public schools, Catholic school and night schools, with efficient instructors and very soon we shall have a library in operation. All that is needed now is a desire for knowledge.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

The first shipment of salmon from Prince Rupert to a foreign port will leave here some time this week. The shipment, which consists of over five thousand cases, came in from the cannery at Namu yesterday on the Henriette. It will be shipped from here on the steamship Crown of Galicia, which is expected to arrive in the harbor tonight or tomorrow from Liverpool with a cargo of water pipes for the city.

The shipment has been specially prepared for export and it is altogether likely that it is but the beginning of an important branch of the shipping that is going to make Prince Rupert a busy port during the next four or five years.

Fred Renworth left here this morning on a business trip to Vancouver. During his stay in that city he will meet a number of Eastern shoe travellers and place orders for next spring's stock.

PATROL OF CLUBS IS VERY NECESSARY SAY COMMISSIONERS

Mr. Macdonald Objects To Slandrous Statements in South About Prince Rupert

At a meeting of the Police Commission, held last night in the City hall, Commissioner S. D. Macdonald asked Chief Vickers if the constables were patrolling the clubs and hotels regularly. Chief Vickers said this was being done.

Commissioner Macdonald took strong objection to the assertions recently made in the south about Prince Rupert being wide open. He felt that this statement was absolutely untrue, and believed that this city was cleaner than any other city in the province according to its population.

The commissioner said that an officer of the provincial government, who had been in the city recently to investigate conditions, had made the statement to him that this city was one of the cleanest in the province. It was up to the people who had any say at all to refute the slanderous statements one read about, he said. He wanted the police to do their utmost to see that the liquor traffic was controlled to the letter.

Undesirables

He also referred to the fact that undesirables had a tendency to creep back into the city and wanted the police to see they were got rid of.

Commissioner Shockey referred to the fact that only recently a big drive had been made by the police in this direction. He said that unfortunately the police did not get credit for the good work they were doing as their efforts were never advertised. The idea of licensing the clubs, was so that the officers of the law could go in at any time. He considered it would be of assistance to the people running clubs if they were patrolled regularly.

City Clerk Woods said that according to the club licensing bylaw, clubs must prevent drunkenness. A copy of the bylaw was in the possession of every licensee. The idea of the bylaw had been that the police could have full control of the clubs.

Commissioner Macdonald said that while the city had been very free from drunkenness he had noticed a slight tendency toward it recently and thought that a little extra work on the part of the police would do good in stopping this.

POLICE REPORT

Chief Vickings Says City is Ordinarily Number of Opium Cases

At a meeting of the police commission held in the City Hall last night, the report of Chief Vickings, chief of the city police, was read for the month of September.

The report stated that the total of fines collected amounted to \$1,297.00.

Thirty cases were entered, which is a slight increase for the month of August.

Under the Opium and Narcotic Drugs act there were ten charges entered, resulting in six convictions and four dismissals. The offences were all for having opium in possession, and in each case heavy penalties were imposed. In the case of Lem Gray, an old offender, he was fined \$400.00.

Convictions under the government liquor act numbered nine, with three dismissals.

A juvenile court was held during the month, and four young boys were taken before the magistrate who sent them to His Honor Judge Young's court on indictable charges. They were released on suspended sentence.

Thirty-three offences were entered, twenty-five convictions were made, and eight were dismissed.

The chief stated that the city from a police standpoint was in an orderly condition. The report was adopted as read and ordered filed.

F. T. KING DIED AT VANCOUVER SUNDAY

Was Associated With Hall and Babington in Rock Contract at Smith Island

The death of Frederick Thomas King, of the contracting firm of Hodgeson, King & Marble, and resident of the Contractors' Association, Vancouver, died in St. Paul's Hospital early last Sunday morning. Death was due to heart exhaustion induced by diabetes.

The late Mr. King was well known locally and was associated with Messrs. Hall & Babington in the city rock contract at Smith Island. Also the contracting firm which he represented tendered on the new court house and the big asylum in course of erection at Essondale. He was a frequent visitor to this city, and only last spring visited Prince Rupert on a business trip. He was born at Newport, Monmouthshire, England, in 1833.

His wife died some years ago. There are two children surviving, Donald and Kathleen.

HIGH COST OF CITY POLICE

Acting Mayor Kerr Discusses Matter With Other Commissioners at Meeting

HIGHER THAN OTHER CITIES

Commissioner Macdonald Defends His Action and Gives a Thrust Back

The cost of the police department came in for considerable discussion at the meeting of the Commissioners last night. Comparisons were made with other cities to the disadvantage of Prince Rupert.

Acting Mayor George Kerr said it was the first time he had the pleasure of acting on the police commission and would like to call the attention of the police commissioners to the cost of running the police department. Since taking over the position as acting mayor he had gone into details and noticed that the costs of operating the police department had grown very rapidly.

In 1916 the cost of the police department had been \$9,435.00, in 1919 \$15,823.00, and in 1921, three years later, it had grown to \$26,322.00. Taking as a comparison last year's figures, the cost of operating the police force at Nelson, B.C., was \$7,785.00, and Nanaimo \$41,500. He considered that the local department was all out of order.

Transportation Costs

Commissioner Macdonald: "Perhaps you have not considered that we are some 500 miles from Okalla prison farm to which all our prisoners are taken. A big portion of the amount you have read is taken up in transportation."

Commissioner Shockley asked the acting mayor if he objected to the number of men employed on the local force, and if he wanted the men to work more than eight hours a day and on Sunday. It had been figured to have a sergeant and a man on duty day and night. There had to be somebody on duty day and night and there was a time when there were no policemen outside at all.

Acting Mayor Kerr said he did not object to the method at all. What he wished to emphasize was the growing operating cost of the police department. He understood from the city clerk that this year the police estimates would amount to \$30,000. Reference was made to the provincial and city police.

Conditions Change

Commissioner Macdonald said that the mounted and provincial police were nothing to do with the city. His first action as commissioner had been to bring the working hours of the police down from 10 hours to eight hours a day which he considered was sufficient, and with an eight hour day the city could not be efficiently policed with less than seven men. He pointed out the fact that conditions had changed from six years ago. Prohibition, he said had increased a traffic in drugs which was more damnable than the liquor traffic ever was. One hundred per cent of police work was to obliterate crime.

and other atrocious crimes in this city, and if you are going to give any credit you must give credit to the police for this state of things," he said.

300 Per Cent Increase

Acting Mayor Kerr said he had been on the finance committee for the past week, and speaking as an alderman, the raise of 300 per cent in police department costs was too high.

Commissioner Macdonald: "If you get the same efficient service out of your men that we get out of our policemen, who are delivering the goods, you can make a far better showing than you are making today."

Continuing, he said that probably the expenses of the police department could be cut if the provincial government could be induced to establish a jail in the community so that the money would not go into the pockets of the transportation companies. If he could be shown, and he was always out to be shown, where the costs could be cut to give the same efficiency he was willing to learn. He was out to raise the standard of labor not to lower it. Before a complaint is made you should be able to show us where the money has been wrongly spent."

Spending Too Much

Acting Mayor Kerr: "I say that your department as a whole is spending too much money some place."

Commissioner Shockley: "You say the hours are all right and you should be able to show us where we can economize."

Acting Mayor Kerr: "You certainly do not need seven men."

Commissioner Macdonald: "You say we have too many men on the force. Show me how it can be done with less on an eight hour day."

GEORGE MUNRO TELLS OF GROCERY BUSINESS

Gives Address to Rotary Club and Mentions Some of Difficulties

The work of a grocer is to assemble goods you think your customer would like and to get

the best possible value and distribute them, according to George Munro, who gave a talk about the line of his business at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Munro said it was particularly difficult to get the right goods in Prince Rupert. Fruit and vegetables had to be ordered ahead and often three orders were placed, one ahead of the other. When the first of these was filled, if the quality of the goods was not what was expected, there were two other similar orders following on. Weather conditions affected sales and at this distance from the base of supply it was difficult doing business satisfactorily.

"The main thing is picking the goods," said the speaker. A great many men start in business in a small way on a small capital and without much experience and the public suffer. In groceries there is no standard price. Different wholesalers sell articles at different prices.

Mr. Munro said he started to learn the business in Montreal. Then he worked in a wholesale establishment and later in a wholesale fruit business. After that he started business for himself and had two businesses in the same city until he made a trip west when he decided to sell out and come and throw in his lot in the west. Now he was in Prince Rupert.

SCOTLAND YARD IS BAFFLED

Strong Boxes Rifled and Gigantic Jewel Hauls Are Made; Thousands of Dollars Reward

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Great jewel robberies have been the outstanding features of this London season, robberies so huge that Scotland Yard itself admits that these robberies are the work of a master-mind, a super-crook.

Newspapers are likening this super-crook to Professor Moriarty—Conan Doyle's famous fiction character.

Scotland Yard sleuths have already named the unknown super-thief "Moriarty." They are fully convinced that he is at the head of an international protective organization of crooks, which plans burglary, safe breaking and jewel stealing on an unprecedented scale.

In Best Society "Moriarty," they say, has a town house and a country house, a fleet of motor cars, and a host of friends, straight and crooked, in London's best society. They do not know what Moriarty looks like. He may be a lord, for all they know, but they are convinced that he is a man high in society.

J. W. Bell, one of London's leading assessors, claims to know the man, but dare not give him away. All he will say is that "Moriarty" is the financier and brains of the thieves who work for him.

"Moriarty," Bell claims, has women agents as well as men—some of them, he declares, are titled. They will watch an intended victim for months, trail him across continents, work their way into his homes as maidservants or confidantes, until the time is ripe to strike.

Detectives declare that in all the latest big jewel hauls the victims have been shadowed for months.

Business man's wife robbed of \$20,000 worth of jewels in a big hotel.

World famous collection of old coins stolen from the Albany apartments, London.

Theft of thirty pearl necklaces from a fashionable jewel store.

Robbery of 130 gold snuff boxes and ruby set goblets from a house on the Brighton road.

In no case has there been any trace of the missing valuables. Usually in the case of common criminals at least "part of the booty" turns up here or on the continent.

Every day the newspapers banner-head jewel hauls. Recently two women said to be agents of "Moriarty" walked into a jewelry store and asked to be shown a gold bag. When the bag was produced the two girls, both of whom were pretty and stylishly dressed, asked the shop assistant to weigh the bag. The young man retired to the back of the shop, and the girls calmly put their hands through the partition separating the window from the shop and scooped up two trays full of diamond rings valued at \$95,000.

Smiled Sweetly

When the young man came back he noticed nothing, as the partition had been closed after the theft. The girls calmly asked the weight of the bag, and, being told, declared it was too expensive.

They smiled sweetly and walked out. They have not been seen since, but police say they answer the description of "Moriarty's" most aristocratic women assistants.

London is echoing with the theft from a married couple living in Cornwall of the following: Twelve diamond brooches, rope of 284 pearls, gigantic ruby, formerly in the fez of a famous Shah of Persia; other jewels valued at \$50,000.

And again the police are baffled. Rewards offered already run to tens of thousands of dollars, but the police say such rewards are useless.

The master mind, this Napoleon of crime, pays his agents so well that at a paltry bribe they turn up their aristocratic noses.
