PUBLIC ACCOUNTS INVESTIGATION IS OVER FRANCE AND ENGLAND CANNOT AGREE ON GERMAN REPARATIONS MEASURES

After Weeks of Trying Opposition Unable to Find Anything Wrong

VICTORIA, Dec. 11.—Led by H. F. Kergin, Liberal member of the public accounts committee three hearty cheers and a tiger were given this morning, when the committee concluded its sessions without discovering anything injurious to the government.

At the concluding session, Col. Gordon was called to refute evidence given by a former witness, W. D. Johnson, regarding unseemly language used by Purchasing Agent Patterson. "It looks to me as if there was a frame-up with this man Johnson," said Chairman Buckham to Mr. Pooley. The latter expostulated and decided it was not meant seriously—the suggestion that there was not much wrong with Johnson's evidence.

A general discussion followed, all members speaking at one. This ended with putting Mr. Patterson back on the stand to swear he had never used such language as was attributed him.

So ended the public accounts investigation with the interring of the bonnets of the opposition.

Morning sessions commenced in the House tomorrow in an endeavor to bring prorogation about as soon as possible. There is not much business left.

NEW GOVERNOR NORTH IRELAND

Duke of Abercorn, Former Member of Parliament For Londonderry, is Appointed

LONDON, Dec. 11.—The Duke of Abercorn has been appointed Governor General of Northern Ireland. He was born in 1869 and succeeded his father to the dukedom in 1913. He was member of parliament for Londonderry from 1906 to 1913 and was treasurer to the King's household from 1903 to 1905.

TURKEYS TO BE CHEAPER

Because Hungarian Birds Are Making Their First Appearance in Canada Now

TORONTO, Dec. 11.—Hungarian turkeys are being introduced to the Canadian public for the first time this winter. One hundred thousand pounds have arrived. The importation will cut the price of domestic turkeys to six cents a pound.

NEW WARSHIPS FOR BRITAIN

Premier Announces Construction of Two Vessels is Decided Upon

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Premier Bonar Law announced in the House of Commons today that the government had decided to begin construction of two new battle-ships allowed under the Washington Naval Treaty.

PROPERTY OF IRISH FREE STATE HEADS BURNED AND BOMBED

LONDON, Dec. 11.—The residences of J. J. Walsh, postmaster general of the Irish Free State, and other government officials were damaged by fire set by armed men.

The home of Walsh's secretary, Fitzgerty, was raided by armed bandits and fitted with gasoline.

A bomb was thrown into a shop owned by Senator Mrs. Wyse Power.

The house of John McTiard, Dublin member of parliament, was burned and his wife and two children were injured in the flames.

Bands of Turks have destroyed the railroad near Deadgatch in Western Thrace and the Armenians are fleeing.

CANCELLING FRENCH DEBT

Bonar Law Says Government Willing to Consider Question Again

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Premier Bonar Law, of Great Britain, caused a sensation at the second session of the Allied Premiers' conference Saturday night when, replying to Premier Poincaré's moratorium plan, he gave clear indication that the British government would be quite willing to reconsider the question of cancelling the French debt, provided such a step was made possible by a reparations settlement satisfactory to Great Britain.

MUNICIPAL COURT OF REVISION SAT

Three Names Were Struck Off List—Total Qualified to Vote is 2,116

Three names were struck off the municipal voters' list for 1923 by the court of revision this morning and a query about another man was launched. There will be in the neighborhood of 2,116 people entitled to cast votes in January.

Mayor Rochester, Ald. Dybbhavn and Ald. Collart with City Clerk E. A. Woods constituted the court.

The name of Henry Cameron was struck off on the information that he was dead. Peter Nelson's name was erased on account of death while Elias Skog will not be allowed to vote as he is not a British subject. Ben Baxter's name was struck off, his declaration for a vote being incorrect.

EDWARD TULK PASSED AWAY

Prominent Vancouver Barrister and Business Man Died Yesterday

VANCOUVER, Dec. 11.—A. Edward Tulk, aged 44, a prominent barrister and business man of this city, died yesterday.

Mr. Tulk was born at Hamilton, Ontario, on December 25, 1879 and was educated in the public schools of that city. He graduated from McGill University and was articled for three years with Hon. C. J. Doherty in Montreal. He was called to the Quebec Bar in 1910 and to British Columbia's in 1911. He was married and is survived by a widow and two sons and one daughter. The late Mr. Tulk took an active interest in military affairs and was officer commanding of B. Squadron, 31st Regiment, B.C. Horse. He was a Conservative in politics, a family home, "Rosemary," Anglican and resided at the Shaughnessy Heights, Vancouver.

RUSSIA VERY DISSATISFIED WITH TURKEY

Foreign Minister Tchitcherin Indicates This in Speech at Lausanne

LAUSANNE, Dec. 11.—Proof that Bolsheviki Russia is highly dissatisfied with Turkey because Ismet Pasha has abandoned the Russians on the question of the control of the Dardanelles was furnished Saturday night when Tchitcherin, the Soviet foreign minister, in a long speech to Turkish journalists, warned them of the dangers of placing their trust in the Allied nations. He said that the Allies wished to separate Turkey and Russia and afterwards they would defeat Turkey and Russia separately.

PEACE PRIZE AWARDED DR. FRIDTJOF NANSEN

In Recognition of Relief Work in Russia and Asia Minor For League of Nations

CHRISTIANIA, Dec. 11.—The Nobel Peace Prize was today presented to Dr. Fridtjof Nansen for work in relieving the starving population of Russia and Asia Minor on behalf of the League of Nations.

ACQUITTED MAN IS SHOT AND KILLED FOLLOWING TRIAL

Son of Murdered Man Takes His Own Revenge on Alleged Killer of Father

GRAYSON, Ky., Dec. 11.—Harrison Blanton, aged 24, shot and killed Paul Herron on the steps of the court house here on Saturday a few minutes after Herron had been acquitted of killing Blanton's father.

TO SAIL KETCHES ACROSS ATLANTIC

Final Arrangements For Odd Race Between Duke of Leinster and William Nutting

LONDON, Dec. 11.—The Duke of Leinster sailed on Saturday for New York to complete arrangements for the proposed race across the Atlantic next year against William Nutting. Each man is to sail a twelve ton ketch single-handed.

POLAND CHOOSES ITS PRESIDENT

Gabriel Narutowicz is First Head of Newly Formed Republic

WARSAW, Dec. 11.—Gabriel Narutowicz, foreign minister, has been elected first president of Poland by the two houses of the newly-elected Polish National Assembly which met at the week-end for the first time. Narutowicz rival for the presidency was Marshal Joseph Pilsudski, chief of state.

ANOTHER CHILI 'QUAKE

SANTIAGO, Dec. 11.—Strong earth shocks were felt here this morning, the tremors lasting for half an hour.

Conference of Premiers at London will Adjourn so as to Prevent an Open Rupture

LONDON, Dec. 11.—An adjournment of the Premier's Conference tonight till January 2 in order to avert an open rupture between England and France over the question of German reparations has been decided upon to take effect at 6 o'clock.

The British cabinet rejected measures of force for the Ruhr district upon which Premier Poincaré, of France, insisted. Premier Bonar Law informed Premier Poincaré that British public opinion was overwhelmingly opposed to any military measures against Germany. Premier Poincaré had made the demand for the occupation of the Ruhr as a guarantee for a German moratorium.

It is stated in authoritative American circles that the chief hope of bringing the British and French together in the period of adjournment lies with the United States. It is said that England adjournment lies with the United States government if it is willing to cancel French debts to the United States provided England in turn cancels French debts to Britain and enters into a definite agreement with the United States government ultimately to pay the British debt to America.

BODY OF AL. GREEP IS HERE

Provincial Police Officers Return From Wark Canal With Remains of Trapper

Constable Harry Martin, of the provincial police, returned to the city on Saturday bringing the body of Al. Grep who died on December 3rd in Wark Canal. Deceased was trapping with a man named Mangel and was found dead by the latter on board his boat, Teddy, in Canoe Pass.

Mr. Grep had been suffering from bronchitis for some time and was last seen alive by Mangel on the afternoon of December 3, when he was lying sick on his boat. Mangel, according to Constable Martin was preparing to go trapping but had furnished Grep with a supply of fuel earlier in the day. The body is now lying at the B.C. Undertakers awaiting burial.

PATRICIAN ARRIVING

Destroyer Reported by Wireless Due at 3.30

The torpedo boat destroyer, H.M.C.S. Patrician, reported by wireless early this afternoon that she would reach this port about 3.30 this afternoon from the south. Mayor Rochester, Fred Stork, M.P., and Major J. H. McMullin will meet the Patrician on her arrival. It is not known how long the vessel will remain here but according to her schedule she was to stay for two days. The Patrician left Lowe Inlet at 10.30 this morning after spending Sunday in travelling from Bella Bella. She will tie up at the government dock.

VALOROUS ALL SAFE

Johanna Brings Word of Safety of One Fishing Boat and Loss of Another

The fishing vessel Johanna which made port Sunday from the fishing banks brought word of the wrecking of the American halibut boat Washington off Kodiak Island. The crew, however, were saved and taken into Seward, Alaska.

In Friday the Johanna passed the Valorous and reports that everything is safe on the boat, despite the fears that she had been lost. The Johanna lent her a supply of oil coming down.

FISH SALES BIG TODAY

Ten Boats Marketed 380,000 Pounds of Halibut at Exchange

The largest quantity of fish marketed at the Fish Exchange here for some time was put on sale this morning, ten boats disposing of 380,000 pounds. The selling took an extra long time but owing to the large quantity of fish, the prices were not very high. The highest price was 10.5c for first class and the lowest 7c for second grade.

Irish Events

Are Disappointing.

Those who have been following Irish affairs, with hope that peace was about to be restored in the troubled isle, cannot but feel disappointment at the events of the past week. It had been confidently anticipated that the enactment of the Free State bill by the British Parliament would have done much towards healing the sores of Ireland but recent happenings do not indicate that it is meeting with much success in this regard. The measure, prepared as it was with all the skill of the late coalition government and approved in short order by the new administration, seemingly meets with acclaim neither in the north nor the south.

Answering Death With Death In South.

Although its connection has not been especially marked, it may be assumed that events of the week in South Ireland have been in some way occasioned by the signing of the bill. Of course, the Republicans are irreconcilably opposed to any such measure. Their policy is complete secession from the Empire, and they say nothing less will do. That being the case, their reported objection to Timothy Healy as governor-general is just a piece of byplay in line with their rule of opposing everything that emanates from the British parliament.

The Dail Eirann is an unsafe place these days. Regardless of the warnings issued by the Free State government and the summary death penalties that have been imposed during the past few days on leaders of the Republicans found guilty by court-martials of hostile acts, the murders of Free State leaders still goes on. Where it will stop no one knows. In the meantime the lives of all the members of the Dail seem to be in danger at the hands of the rebels. It has come to a point where death must be answered by death—ruthless murders, with ruthless reprisals. The Free State is taking a terrible course, but one which it seems cannot be avoided.

Ulster Wants No Free State.

The refusal of Ulster to participate in the workings of the Free State bill came somewhat as a surprise to many. Apparently the north objects to any autonomy for its neighbor. They will deal with no other than England and there seems to be no question of their attitude on the matter. Perhaps, it is because they do not wish for any more active hostility with the south which might be occasioned by attempts at negotiating the border question direct with the Free State.

Free State Bad, Republic Worse.

Britain's effort, through her parliament, has been to give Ireland some method of government that would operate peacefully. The government is now faced with the situation of having done all that could be done with peaceable methods and still success seems far away. Creating a republic in the south would probably be no more effective in producing tranquility than making a Free State of it. That is as far as the south is concerned itself. Then, of course, there would be the question of Ulster which would oppose a Republic to the last ditch. The north might oppose a Free State passively but it is a pretty certain premise that she would oppose a Republic with her life blood.

So a Free State still seems the most promising solution, although it is not immediately successful. Therefore, it is apparent that the strife must continue. One arbitrary man is hard to handle but when thousands, little recking of their lives, go in with the reckless intention of killing their countrymen the situation is almost uncontrollable. That is the situation that Britain has to cope with in setting up the Irish Free State.

ALL SERENE AT VICTORIA

Opposition's Little Firecrackers Not Blowing up the Government

VICTORIA, Dec. 11.—Every thing is going smoothly here. While there are fireworks at times they are meant only to be firecrackers and there is no sign of dynamite in their makeup. So far nothing has happened to disturb the serenity of the Government. The public accounts committee is each day the scene of some spectacular outburst with Messrs. Bowser, Pooley and Jones as the actors-in-chief. They try to trip unwary witnesses and now and then, lawyer like, become loud in condemnation of some supposed neglect of a public servant or some alleged overpayment for goods purchased for the liquor board. Then the Government brings other witnesses who show that the price paid was perfectly fair and the best that could be obtained at that time.

Mr. Bowser and Mr. Pooley take turns in examining witnesses and, session after session, try to trace up some alleged overpayment by the purchasing agent or some irregular action but up to the time of writing nothing has been revealed. Even if there had been anything wrong it would have been by the error of a civil servant. Even that has not been disclosed so far, however.

It is difficult to understand the amount of interest taken here in the chiropractic committee. There is always a crowded committee room and on the streets of the city the rival claims of the doctors and chiros are fully discussed. While no one expects the bill to pass this session, the investigations will be made public and will give people an idea of what is meant by the system and by the bill that it is asked shall be passed.

J. W. deB. Farris, in discussing the resolution asking Ottawa to give the province the sole right to import liquor, spoke forcefully. He is a powerful and sympathetic debater. His sentences are clear cut, his logic sound and his voice convincing. He is undoubtedly one of the best debaters on the floor. Like the present attorney-general, however, he lacks humor. Both of these men take themselves rather too seriously. A touch of humor now and then would add much to the interest in the addresses. When a man speaks for an hour, he needs to brighten the proceedings now and then with a touch of wit or a humorous story.

Mr. Farris in his speech showed that he had a strong fellow feeling for the present incumbent of the office. He said he now understood that the attacks made on him were not personal but directed at whoever happened to hold the office of attorney general. The fact that successive holders of the office were victims of calumny brought home to every person that the attacks were simply envy in a distorted mind and without any foundation in fact.

The minister of mines, Hon. William Sloan, in urging on Tuesday the passing of the resolution requesting the Ottawa government to bring into force a system of old age pensions, state health and disability insurance and unemployment insurance, told of the way in which it worked in the Old Country and the benefits accruing to the employees. He showed that this was a federal matter and not provincial.

CHINESE FROM RUPERT HANGED HIMSELF ON VANCOUVER I.D. TRAIN

Mah Lee, a Chinaman said to have hailed from Prince Rupert, committed suicide under peculiar circumstances in an Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway car at Courtenay, Vancouver Island, last Tuesday. Shortly after leaving Courtenay, the conductor of the train found that some obstruction was preventing the door of the men's retiring room from opening. Forcing his way in, he was horrified to find the lifeless body of the Chinaman suspended from a coat hook. He had used his necktie as a halter and had hanged himself.

FISHERMEN'S HOME TO BE ERRECTED IN ALASKA'S KEY CITY

Official Announcement Made That Ketchikan is to be Site of \$30,000 Institution

KETCHIKAN, Dec. 11.—Official announcement has been made by Ed. Brokke, representative of the Norwegian Young People's Society of the United States, who is now in Ketchikan, that Ketchikan has been chosen as the site for the Fishermen's Home to be built by the organization. The institution will cost approximately \$30,000, it is estimated, and will be intended to give the comforts of home to many fishermen who come here regularly, periodically or occasionally, and who now do not enjoy them.

The organization which Mr. Brokke represents is affiliated with the Lutheran Church.

The matter of building such a home has been under consideration for some months and the location was to be either at Prince Rupert, Ketchikan or Petersburg. After due investigation it was decided that Ketchikan was the most logical point.

The business men of Ketchikan have given their hearty support to the proposal from the first and have pledged themselves to lend all possible assistance in getting the institution which will be equipped with a good library, dining room and living quarters. Plans are now under way for the raising of the money throughout the country by the society and it is hoped that the institution will be under way before many months.

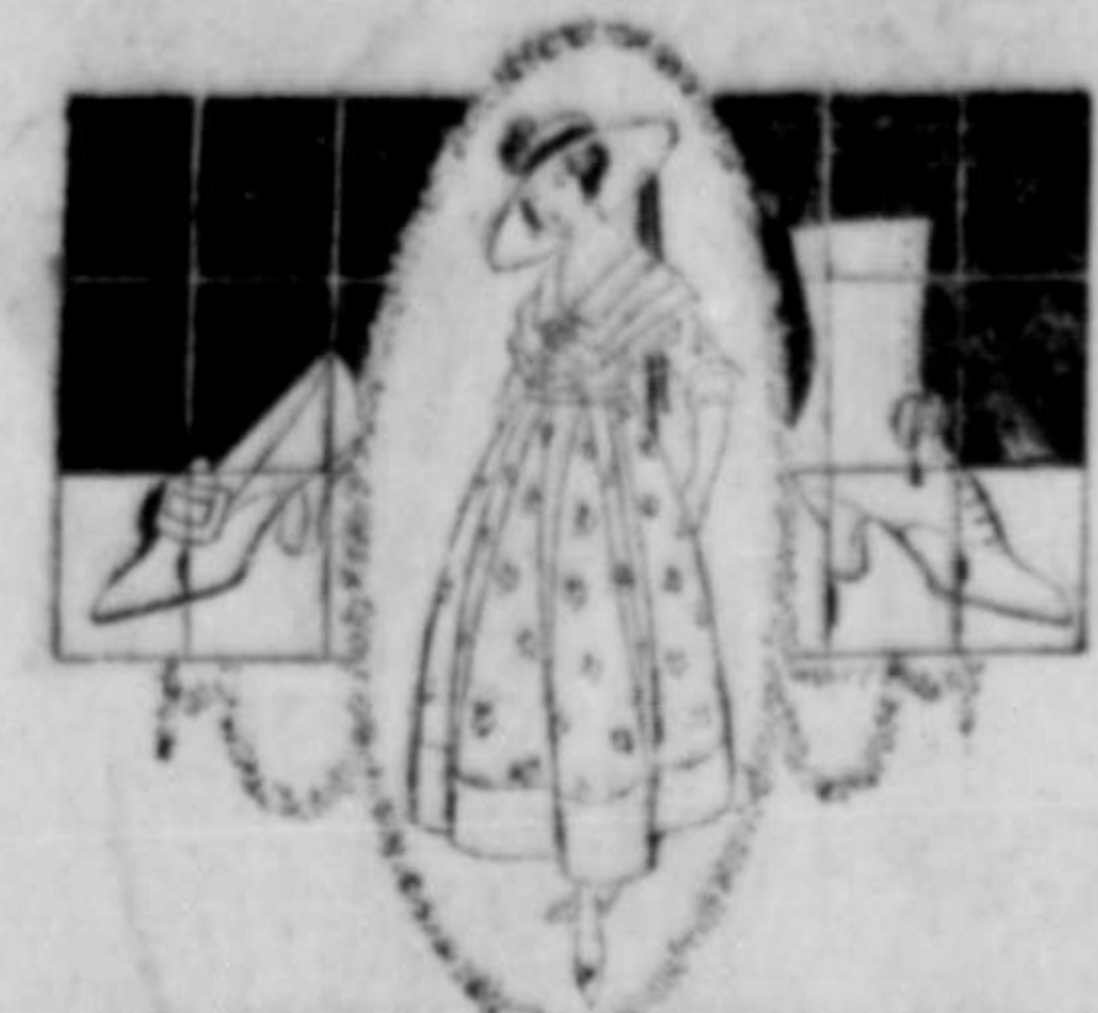

NO WHISKEY RING HERE

Paterson Denies That He Paid More Than Market Value For Any Liquor

VICTORIA, Dec. 11.—Searching back into the records of about the time when the Liquor Board was established, an attempt was made by H. H. Pooley, Conservative member for Esquimalt, to show that the purchasing agent had paid more than market value for liquor. Quotations were produced, but these it was shown, were all qualified and the purchasing agent stated that none of the agents were able to guarantee delivery. The board had to get whiskey and they purchased a lot that was offered from New Zealand.

Mr. Paterson asked permission to make a statement. He said he had been instructed to stock up and accordingly he was anxious to get the liquor. Some offers made were conditional on the board buying gins and other liquors as well. One man from whom he ordered 600 cases shipped only 300.

He further explained that there were ten agents trying to sell liquor for one from whom they purchased. These were complaining because they did not get any business and the ones who were getting business complained because they were not getting more. He suggested that Mr. Pooley was not fair in his questions. After Mr. Pooley had made a few of the dozens of suggestions he made to witness, Mr. Paterson said:

"I suggest to you Mr. Pooley that if you want to buy goods at a certain time you have to pay the market price. I say yet we have been buying at the lowest prices obtainable. It is absolutely wrong to state that we have been paying more than market prices."

AMENDMENTS MADE TO FORESTRY ACT

Provide for Greater Protection of Life and Property From Fire

VICTORIA, Nov. 14.—With regard to forestry protection, new legislation introduced by Hon. T. D. Pattullo provides where the safety of life and property in any section of the province is threatened through the occurrence or spread of bush fires the Lieutenant Governor in Council may, by proclamation, declare that section a closed district in which all operations in, or within half a mile of any forest, shall cease forthwith until the danger is, in the opinion of the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council, abated. It also provides an obligation on every resident of the province who is aware that a fire has started or exists in any forest or wood-land to immediately notify the department. An amendment to the Act also prohibits smoking in the woods during the close season and makes it an obligation upon the person in charge of any lumbering operation to maintain notices throughout the operation calling the attention of their employees to the require-

ments of the Act and designating a place where their employees may smoke.

The provision covering the sharing of costs of fire fighting is being amended so that where a fire originates in a person's operation he will be responsible for the controlling of it, and will not be entitled to receive 50 per cent of his expenditures from the Forest Protection fund.

Another amendment provides that the forest protection officer of any operator, private timber holder or municipality, who has been approved by the minister, will have the same authority as an officer of the department in regard to calling out men to assist in controlling bush fires.

SUICIDE CAUSED BIG EXPLOSION

That is Conclusion Reached in Regard to Blow-up at Premier Mine

It is believed that the explosion at the Premier Mine last Sunday morning was the successful suicidal attempt of Carl Booy, an Austrian, to end his life and in doing so he injured three others and damaged a part of the mine.

G. F. Thomas, one of the men who was working near the place where the explosion occurred, was a passenger on the Prince Rupert last night when she sailed for Vancouver. He is going to Vancouver for treatment having suffered a fractured skull although he was several hundred feet away from Booy at the time.

The force of the concussion was so great that air pipes and track for a distance of about 100 feet were bent and twisted. The same fate befell the steel cars that were being pushed into the mine and in some cases they were badly shattered. It was while pushing these cars that the four men were injured.

Was Premeditated

Passengers on the Prince Rupert last night in speaking of the disaster were inclined to the belief that Booy had planned the explosion for some time. He had not spoken to his fellow workers for some time previous and was very moody.

Clifford Cox, chute man on No. 2 level, in giving evidence at the inquest stated that shortly before the accident he had taken Booy to Chute 21 and told him to load his car from B. When he was leaving the man he noted a peculiar look in his eyes but thought nothing of it at the time.

About six minutes later, when at Chute 6, he felt a shock which put the lights out. Shortly after he was told there had been an explosion and that the temporary magazine had blown up.

On reaching the room off the tunnel that contained the powder it was found that Booy, instead of loading his car in accordance with instructions, had run his car down the track almost to the magazine.

Blown to Pieces

There were about eight barrels of powder stored in the magazine. After finding a piece of an explosive cap near the scene afterwards, the officials were inclined to the belief that Booy tried to connect this fuse with the powder but it went off. All that was found on the spot where Booy was standing was a piece of metal from his lamp, a piece of metal from a watch and a wheel which was found stuck in the rock on the other side of the tunnel. Human hair was found on the roof immediately over the spot where the powder had been and immediately under it was a piece of flesh. It is thought that this flesh came from the deceased's foot.

As it was a coroner's inquiry, no verdict was pronounced but the facts as brought out would indicate that the powder was directly exploded either by intent or accidentally.

ARBUCKLE'S SUN IS SET

His Career on American Screen Irrevocably Closed, According to Press Opinion

Rosebud ("Fatty") Arbuckle's career as a motion picture star on the American screen is irrevocably closed, according to a press report which appeared in the New York dailies recently. The press account states that this information emanated from the Famous Players-Lasky headquarters in New York and quotes officials of that company as declaring that the American public, and not any indelible factor of the motion picture industry, is primarily responsible for the drastic and permanent quietus imposed on Arbuckle's ambitions to return again to his former status of a popular screen idol.

The registration of the public's aversion to Arbuckle's "come back" as motion picture star is said to have been effected by sounding out screen patrons in all parts of the country. Officials of the Paramount organization are reported by the press account as stating that managers of motion picture theatres in all sections of the nation have been taking an unobtrusive vote from members of their audiences with a view to ascertaining just how they felt towards the return of the rotund comedian as a screen player. The sentiment expressed is said to have been overwhelming against the exhibition of motion pictures in the future which presented Arbuckle as a member of the cast.

Newspapers Verdict
 Following "Fatty's" acquittal on the charge of second degree murder in connection with the death of Virginia Rappe, much discussion was precipitated as to whether or not the former star would be permitted to regain his lost status as a screen player. In several cities newspapers presented the question for the answer of their readers, the verdicts rendered were of conflicting character, no complete unanimity being shown either in favor of his return or his rejection. The New York Globe pronounced the question in its "The Inquiring Reporter" column, and the answers elicited showed about an even division of sentiment for and against. Many of the newspaper readers felt that despite his acquittal, his connection with the tragedy disqualified him from playing again before the picture-going public. Others expressed the opinion that he was but the victim of unfortunate circumstances and that his acquittal should close the chapter and not figure in the question of his return or absence from the motion picture screen.

At the time of Arbuckle's trial in connection with the death of Miss Rappe three pictures with "Fatty" in the featured roles were completed and awaiting release. The three productions were titled "Gasoline Gus," "Freight Prepaid" and "Leap Year." These subjects were withheld from release pending the outcome of the trial. They were estimated to possess a potential value of two million dollars a year and much interest centered about their ultimate disposal.

George Beban declared recently that eighty per cent of the screen actors could not act on the legitimate stage—that the profession is cluttered up with a lot of pretty women and handsome men whose ability to act is determined by their good looks. He must remember that as long as their voices are silenced the average fan is not worrying much whether one of them could give a correct dramatic reading of Hamlet's Soliloquy or Juliet's wail over the loss of her dear Romeo.

The public, however, is discriminating. It has already discovered the genuine from the imitation. And if some of the weak brothers and sisters are riding on the crest of popularity it is because they are either opportunists or possess something in the shape of personality. They will have their brief hour and then make a real fade-out while the true artists will continue to have their following, which is certain to be increased once the public appreciates their real values.

Time was when the "supes" of the big dramas were passed by the casting directors as potential stars. And there are a few dandies whose glory is found in their golden or raven tresses who are temporarily in popular favor. But with each succeeding picture their value is decreasing.

Screen a Magnet
 Meanwhile both stage and screen will continue to act as a magnet for those who imagine they self blessed with personality, good looks and talent. The parade goes on and the ranks must be filled to make a decent showing. There are only a few great ones in the profession—there are only a few great ones in any line of endeavor. A man may be able to turn an electric light switch, but that doesn't make him an Edison; a man may be able to register paths, but that doesn't make him a Mansfield. Some of the boys and girls are forced to play atmosphere. And a few are getting away with murder. But "murder will out" and the public, the Grand Jury, is gradually collecting all the evidence. It cannot convict where there is the least semblance of doubt.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS
 Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre, second-class to \$2.50 an acre.
 Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
 Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
 Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with total residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
 Pre-emptors must secure claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least one acre before receiving Crown Grant.
 Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of health or other cause, be granted a temporary certificate of pre-emption and transfer his claim.
 Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation, and residence of at least 2 years and required.
 Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may second another pre-emption, if he receives land in satisfaction same before without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
 Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
 For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 400 acres may be leased to one person or company.
 Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased; conditions include payment of stamp duty.
 Natural gas pipelines, inaccessible or existing roads, may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them, the site of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price is made.
"PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT."
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and working with His Majesty's Forces. The one within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.
 No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Fees are required for five years.
 Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.
 Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from an October 1, 1920.
SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS
 Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers, who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.
GRAZING
 Grazing Act, 1915, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stockowners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for hunters, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

CURIOUS THEATRICAL RELICS TO BE SEEN
Clouds Attached to Chariots for Use of Gods of Olympus.
 STOCKHOLM, Dec. 11.—Costumes and other relics of the two Swedish nightingales, Jenny Lind and Christina Nilsson, will be displayed along with a collection of other treasures of theatrical history in Sweden's first Dramatic Museum which will be opened during the latter part of August. The collection is being installed in the historic old Royal Theatre in the Castle of Drottningholm, which was patronized nearly 200 years ago by King Gustaf III, a famous protector of drama and the arts.
 Among the interesting stage "props" that delighted the gallery gods of the 18th century, and have been stored away ever since in the mouldy vaults of the castle, are a dust-covered set of ocean waves and a couple of chariots, with clouds attached, for the exclusive use of the gods of Olympus. The picture collection, which includes stage settings, costume plates, portraits, etc., covers the theatrical history of various countries, and with respect to certain periods of French history is the most complete in the world. The theatre itself and the stage machinery will be restored to its original character.
 Jenny Lind, it will be remembered is the singer who gave music in America its first great impetus when she appeared at Castle Garden, New York, in 1850 under the management of P. T.
