LLOYD GEORGE OPENS CAMPAIGN IN NORTH ALL POLITICAL PARTIES IN BRITAIN CLAIM TO WELCOME GENERAL ELECTION

Triumphal Progress of David Lloyd George in Touring North England

LEEDS, Oct. 21.—Lloyd George's progress through the north of England evoked remarkable public demonstrations. He spoke five times at railway stations en route and invited public support for himself in the national interests.

The deposed premier said the fact that the Carlton Club did not like him had apparently added to the number of his friends elsewhere. He accused the Carlton Club of putting party first just when Britain was pulling together and said the club had wrecked the organization that won the war.

OCEAN FALLS, Oct. 21.—The plebiscite taken here Thursday on the liquor question resulted as follows: Wets 308; Drys 174. Mr. Halley who has been appointed Government Liquor Vendor for Ocean Falls is leaving for Vancouver today to make the necessary arrangements for shipment of stock and the Government store will no doubt go into operation here on Mr. Halley's return.

WELL KNOWN LOGGER MURDERED IN HOTEL

GRAND FORKS, Oct. 21.—William Patterson, the well-known logger and now proprietor of the Bridgeville Hotel, 69 miles from here on the International highway, was found shot to death in the hotel. The murderers are unknown.

DEATH AT HOSPITAL

Edwin Tanner Passed Away After Long Illness

The death of Edwin Tanner, aged 60, occurred in the general hospital yesterday afternoon. Deceased had been an inmate of the hospital for several months suffering from cancer from which cause he died.

The late E. Tanner was originally from Minnesota, his father having been a clergyman in that state. He had been engaged in the lumber business with the Massett Timber Co., at Massett, for some time prior to his admission to the hospital.

Deceased was a single man, and as far as is known has no relatives in Canada.

The body is in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers and the funeral will take place early in the week under the auspices of the English church.

HENRY FORD LED IN RACE

American Schooner Showing Heels to Canadian Off Gloucester

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 21.—In the international fishermen's schooner race here today the Henry Ford took a lead of 100 yards over the Bluenose at the start of the 40 mile course. Both captains disregarded the race committee's signals to postpone the start to three o'clock owing to the breeze being so light.

Later Henry Ford won the race, but it was declared unofficial because boats ignored judges postponement order. At half course Henry Ford was half a mile ahead. At third mark was 7 minutes and 35 seconds ahead. Wind very light.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—An exchange of telegrams between Lloyd George and William Cosgrave, president of Dail Eireann, expresses cordial humor and the conviction on both sides that the Irish treaty will be ratified on both sides of the channel notwithstanding any political changes.

RED CROSS DOG IS FAMOUS IN DEATH

Peter the Bull Terrier Dies at Los Angeles; Collected Money in Victoria

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 21.—Peter, the famous war dog, although only a little Boston Bull terrier, is dead here at the home of his mistress, Mrs. O. H. Duve.

Peter is credited with having raised \$9,000 dollars toward the war fund in Victoria, B.C. during the world war by sitting on a table every day for three years and "speaking" contributions. He is said to have received a medal from the Canadian Field Comforts Association in England and life membership in the Canadian Red Cross and four other decorations including one from the Yukon battalion.

After the war he went into the movies and gained some fame. He was nine years old.

FISH FOR DOGS

Haysport Expect to go Out During the Coming Week Following Overhaul

Several tons of dogfish for experimental purposes have been delivered at the reduction works at Tucks Inlet but so far no one has been out to fish for dogfish.

The schooner Haysport, which was recently purchased by Coulton Brothers for the business, has had a new tail shaft and rudder at the drydock and undergone general overhaul. It is expected that she will commence traveling during the coming week.

CANADIANS TODAY IN BRITISH POLITICS

Number of Prominent Men in Addition to New Premier Take Part in Public Life

In addition to the new premier, Right Hon. Bonar Law, a number of Canadians are taking an active part in public life. Lord Beaverbrook, who has played a leading role behind the scenes of British politics, has had a spectacular career in the old land since he transferred his activities as a financier from Montreal to London. Sir Hamar Greenwood, a former Liberal Unionist and a classmate at Toronto University of Hon. Mackenzie King, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen and Edward Beatty president of the C. P. R. Col. Grant Morden is another Canadian who is prominent today in British politics.

Another young Canadian who is entering British politics is Col. Maurice Alexander, who has just been created a K.C., and at the same time nominated as the government candidate in Southwest Southwark, a former Labor stronghold.

Col. Alexander is a Montreal boy, born in the Quebec metropolis in 1889. After graduation in law from McGill University he entered practice. He went overseas in 1914, serving for a time on the general staff of the second division. In 1916 he was promoted to be Judge Advocate-General. He was created a Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George in 1917, and the same year was transferred to the general intelligence staff to the imperial war office. Since the close of hostilities he has remained in London, being admitted a member of the Inner Temple in 1920. He has been connected with Sir John Simon and Sir Charles Russell in a number of famous cases.

CAPT. GRIFFITHS S.S. LILLOOET PASSED AWAY YESTERDAY

Body Arrived Here Today Aboard Steamer and Will be Sent South

The death occurred at Queen Charlotte City yesterday of Captain Frederick H. Griffiths, aged 61, skipper of the government hydrographic survey boat Lillooet. Deceased died of apoplexy aboard his boat. Word to this effect was received by wire by Capt. F. T. Saunders of the Marine department, Digby Island, from H. D. Parrizeau, officer in charge of the hydrographic survey on the Pacific coast.

The late Captain Griffiths had been in the employ of the government on the hydrographic survey work for some fifteen years.

Mrs. F. H. Griffiths, and a brother-in-law Dr. W. Russell, resides in Victoria.

The body arrived in port this morning aboard the Lillooet and is in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers, and will be shipped to Victoria for interment on the Prince Rupert to-morrow night.

SLUMP IN MARKS CAUSED BY CHANGE BRITISH SITUATION

BERLIN, Oct. 21.—Forebodings that Germany's creditors will now deal with her more harshly and nervously resulting from the resignation of Lloyd George has caused a slump in the value of the mark. A sovereign is now worth 17,450 marks.

JEFFERSON IS IN TOW

Lost Propeller and Picked Up By Cedar Last Night

The steamer Jefferson, of the Admiral Line, lost her propeller off Lord's Rocks at Dixon Entrance last night. The U.S.S. Cedar, bound for Ketchikan, picked up her wireless message for aid, and took the Jefferson in tow. The Cedar is now on her way north and will, in all probability bring the Jefferson in to the local dock for repairs.

The steamer Jefferson, of 1500 tons, is one of the liners plying between Seattle and Alaska. She called into Prince Rupert twice during the past season with cargoes of herring.

The U.S.S. Cedar was recently on the local Dry Dock and underwent considerable repairs. It is her first trip north since leaving this port.

SERGEANT AT ARMS

VICTORIA, Oct. 21.—Fred McVior of Victoria has been appointed sergeant at arms of the Legislature.

No Wage Reduction for Railway Employees Recommended on the Canadian National Railways

OTTAWA, Oct. 21.—The majority of Arbitration appointed in August to investigate the wage dispute between the Canadian National Railway employees and the company submits the opinion that the clerks and freight handlers, and employees of the round houses, shops, stores, stations and other lesser paid employees of the Canadian National Railway should not be reduced in wages.

George Kelly, representing the railway, submitted a minority report dissenting.

Chairman Costello and the men's counsel, H. S. Ross, find that there has been no reduction in the cost of living during the past year to speak of and a reduction would leave the employees without adequate means of support.

The necessary for hearty co-operation between the road and employees is emphasized.

The report points out that the road was not paying when taken over by the government and could not become solvent immediately. Employees cannot be expected to bear an undue share of the burden which properly belongs to the entire Dominion.

LEEDS, Oct. 21.—Lloyd George, the retiring Prime Minister, speaking at a great meeting of coalition Liberals here this afternoon, declared the "banner of party strife had been hoisted at a recent meeting of Conservatives at the Carlton Club, which voted against continuing the coalition."

"It is for the people of this country to decide whether party comes first or the nation first," he exclaimed. "I stand for the people."

Lloyd George asserted that a completed victory in the late war had been brought to an end, not because it ceased to serve the nation but because of the party not getting enough out of it. He then launched into a vigorous defense of the administration.

"I have sought honestly and sincerely and it has been my dominant purpose to serve my native land to the best of my ability," said he. "In every way my government did everything it could. I am told: You made a very good war minister but you are no good in peace. War is not a bad test and I have done a few things in peace."

The ex-premier was greeted with loud applause. The hall seats 3,000 people and twice that number applied for admission. On the platform with him were Sir Hamar Greenwood and others of the late government.

FINANCIAL BROKER IS RELEASED BY THE COURT OF APPEAL

VANCOUVER, Oct. 21.—J. A. M. Faulds, financial broker, has been released from jail where he has been awaiting sentence on a conviction for misappropriating funds. The appeal court has decided that the evidence in the trial did not justify a conviction by Mr. Justice Cayley nor did it prove Faulds had committed the alleged offense. He ordered Faulds released.

EXPLOSION KILLED NINE

MCCURTAIN, Okla., Oct. 21.—The gas explosion which wrecked a coal mine here killed nine people including the president of the Progressive Coal Company.

LANGLEY TO BE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE

Is President of Navy League in This Province; Formerly Liberal Candidate

VICTORIA, Oct. 21.—Major W. H. Langley, a native son and lawyer of this city, is to be the new clerk of the B. C. Legislature, succeeding the late John Keen. The appointment carries with it a salary of \$900.

Major Langley was Liberal candidate in 1918 by-election and is president of the B. C. division of the Navy League.

ALL PARTIES ARE HAPPY

Profess to Welcome Election in Britain: Probably Nov. 18

LONDON, Oct. 21.—All political parties welcome the prospect of an immediate general election, which it is recognized, could not have been long delayed. Conservatives especially say it will greatly strengthen their administration if they are able to get a definite mandate from the country.

Did British Conservatives Make A Mistake?

In view of late despatches many people are wondering if the Conservatives of Great Britain made a mistake in deciding to set Lloyd George down from the premiership. It is of course very difficult to tell at this distance what is transpiring and nothing is so uncertain as an election, as we all know here, yet despatches indicate that the former premier still has the people with him. If it should prove that the Welshman is still the kingpin in that country, it will be a curious condition that has arisen, and the old line Conservatives will wish they had not acted so precipitately.

It is extremely difficult for men who live in rich men's clubs and associate only with people of their own stripe to get an estimate of the popular feeling. It is to be supposed they do it through their political agents, but even those agents are likely to be misled.

Near Home All Is Well.

A recent arrival from the south says that the opinion is general there that the Provincial Government has never been so strong as it is today and that there is no likelihood of an election in the near future. The Government may go for three years without another election. The member for this district who has been away in England looking after the affairs of the province there, should be back on the coast in a few days and will be looking after the interests of the district in the Legislature at the session which opens October 30.

Keep Up To Date And Hold Our Own.

The tendency in the building up of a new city is for the pioneers to be crowded out by the influx of new people. That is especially true in a place that goes ahead fast.

The probability is that Prince Rupert will make rapid progress in the near future and the recommendation is made that local people now in business or holding positions of importance try to keep right up to date in methods and refuse to slow down. There is such a tendency, away from the rush of the big cities to get slack and not to put our best effort into our work. This affects us all. We do not realize that we are drifting instead of exercising power in a definite direction. If we drift we shall be easily overtaken by the new people that come in.

Recently a number of old timers have been leaving the city. Their places will soon be taken by others. We shall welcome newcomers and try to make them feel that there is a place for them here, but we must also try to learn from them and endeavor to hold our own in the race of life.

In order to avoid drifting it is necessary not only to keep fit in body and brilliant in mind, but also we must study through books and by personal contact with those outside. Any person who thinks to make a mark in the community must go outside occasionally to brighten up. No one can afford to remain indefinitely in a small town without getting that personal contact with the moving, struggling world and feeling the inspiration of men and women who are really doing things.

Paralyzing Effect Of Monotony.

Monotony has a paralyzing effect. We tend to do the same things every day in the same way until our habits become so set that it is very difficult to change. We look with suspicion on new things and new ways of doing things. We are apt to feel almost aggrieved at innovations. That is when we are in danger. So often it is seen that the moment a town begins to move, the strangers with abundant energy and initiative arrive, introducing new methods and new life into the community and the old timers go down and out. It is sad but true. It is not necessary, but there is a great tendency in that direction. In order to prevent it we have to be constantly on the alert—watchful, energetic, keen, receptive to new ideas but careful.

You should also get in touch with the newspapers and endeavor to have them give this subject some attention from time to time between now and the 31st instant.

I bonded the Henderson property to J. F. Duthie last June 21, and they have over 70 tons of high grade ore here at Smithers and about 10 tons already sacked up at the mines. I ought to know for I get 50 per cent of Smelter returns until I am paid for my property.

WEAR POPPIES ARMISTICE DAY

I.O.D.E. Will be in Charge of The Armistice Day Poppy Sale, Assisted by G.W.V.A.

The aid of local merchants is being sought by the local command of the G.W.V.A. in putting over Poppy Day, which is scheduled to take place on November 11.

Preliminary arrangements for the event, to commemorate the deaths of the immortal Canadian soldiers who died in France, have already been made by the G.W.V.A.

Two ends are attained by the Poppy Day effort. In the first place the wearing of the red flower of Flanders is symbolic of the sacrifice made by the 50,000 Canadian heroes who paid the price of world freedom with their blood. Poppy Day serves to keep alive the memories of the gallant men who left congenial surroundings at home in order that the security and independence of their homeland might be maintained and who now sleep beneath the poppies in Flanders field.

The second commendable object of Poppy Day is to raise funds for relief work among the scores of veterans' families, which are in need of assistance, and also for the extension of aid to all who are needy or destitute within the city. Lord Byng's injunction to "honor the dead by serving the living" is thus being carried out in a practical and beautiful manner.

Daughters of Empire

The Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire will have sole charge of the sale of Flanders Poppies on Armistice Day which will be on sale at all stores the same as was done last year.

The special Poppy Day committee of the G.W.V.A. will work in conjunction with the I.O.D.E. This committee comprises R. James, Jack Kelly, and Ralph Le Pine.

The poppies to be sold this year will be manufactured in Canada entirely by Canadian labor.

PARENT TEACHERS MEETING AT ANYOX

Hear Interesting Lecture by Robert Manzer, Principal of Anyox School

ANYOX, Oct. 21.—The monthly meeting of the Anyox Parent Teachers Association held in the new school Tuesday evening was well attended, the president, Mrs. W. Hoffman, in the chair. An informal talk by Robert Manzer, principal of the Anyox School, proved very interesting and there were also piano, violin and vocal solos. Refreshments were served at the close.

Progress Made

Mr. Manzer touched very briefly on the general progress of the educational system covering a period of from 20 to 25 years. Changes had been made during that time without loss by experimentation and the continuity of the system has been preserved. He said that British Columbia had kept step with the eastern provinces with the exception of Winnipeg and Toronto, which were more advanced. He mentioned Dean Hogarty's lectures and the benefits derived from them and touched on the state of the rural schools in British Columbia compared with the United States. The British schools he considered were more advanced.

Mr. Manzer urged the importance of the summer schools where material assistance was given teachers by the department of education.

During later years such organizations as the B. C. Teachers' Federation, the Parent Teachers Association, and School Trustees Association had been formed. Every teacher had to be a student. Teachers controlled their own conventions and having the confidence of the department of education their combined efforts made for improvement.

FOUR BOTTLES OF EXTRACT

Sailor Tells of Drinking Lemon Before Shooting Occurred at Massett

EVIDENCE OF DEFENCE

Several Witnesses Called to Show That McEachern Was Intoxicated

In the assize court yesterday afternoon, before Mr. Justice Murphy, the case of Rex vs. McEachern was continued. McEachern is charged with shooting at Mate Matthews of the whaler White at Massett on August 21.

A. Donaghy, Terrace, appeared for the crown and Milton Gonzales, for the defence.

The first witness called was Provincial Constable Ponder of Massett who took prisoner into custody on the day of the shooting.

The constable said he saw prisoner about 11 o'clock in the morning on the day of the shooting, and they talked together for half an hour on active service conditions. He had to go up the inlet to an inquest and was out in his launch about a quarter of an hour when he saw the White pulling out. Upon arrival at the inlet he had a telephone message to return, and upon reaching Massett he took the prisoner into custody.

Cross examined by Mr. Gonzales, Constable Ponder said it was about 4 o'clock in the afternoon when he returned to Massett. He saw prisoner in a private house lying down.

Mr. Gonzales: "Drunk or sober?"

Witness: "He appeared dazed."

Mr. Gonzales: "Did he have control of his senses?"

Witness: "Not completely."

Mr. Justice Murphy: "What time was this?"

Witness: "Sometime after 4 o'clock."

Mr. Gonzales: "Did you find anything on the accused?"

Witness: "Yes, two bottles of extract, one of which was lemon, on his hip."

Mr. Gonzales: "How long did you stay with him?"

Witness: "About five minutes."

Mr. Gonzales: "What state was he in?"

Mr. Gonzales: "Explain what happened, as far as the accused is concerned, in the cell that night."

Witness: "He was very sick."

Witness: "He was very sick and did not want to eat. He seemed to have gone all to pieces."

Mr. Gonzales: "Did the make any statement at that time about Capt. Anderson and Mr. Matthews?"

Witness: "Yes. After I had told him that I was a provincial constable, and warned him, he said that he could not understand why he had done it."

Mr. Gonzales: "You say he was still in a dazed condition."

Witness: "Yes."

Birch's Evidence

Richard Birch, a seaman on the whaler White, was the next witness called. On being questioned by A. Donaghy for the crown he said in giving his evidence that he and accused had been in conversation over the question of wages some time ago.

At that time he had told prisoner that Capt. Anderson had said that there was money coming to them that they would get it, and that whatever the company

was paying other ships it would pay to their ship.

Mr. Donaghy: "Did that satisfy the accused?"

Witness: "No."

Mr. Donaghy: "How long before the shooting did that conversation take place?"

Witness: "That conversation was held in June."

Mr. Donaghy: "When the boat pulled out, where were you?"

Witness: "I was asleep in the bunk."

Witness said that the prisoner had come down the companion way into the cabin and had awakened him. Accused commenced to talk about the sailors on such and such a boat getting more money. However, witness was in no humor to talk. Prisoner then went to the opposite bunk and I took down a rifle which he commenced to load. In doing this he got the bolt jammed but fixed it again in a few minutes and took it on deck. Just after McEachern had gone on deck he heard the rifle explode. Then he jumped up and went on deck. On reaching the deck he saw accused over the side. The captain ordered the small boat lowered, and with assistance he lowered the boat and helped Captain Anderson to bring him back to the ship.

Had Been Drinking

In replying to cross examination by Mr. Gonzales, for the defence, Birch said that he had known McEachern since May of this year. They had always got along all right together, and he had nothing to say against him. When accused had come down to the cabin for the rifle he knew that he had had a drink.

Mr. Gonzales: "After accused was taken out of the water he was pretty drunk then, was he not?"

Witness: "Not to my knowledge."

Mr. Gonzales: "You would not say he was sober."

Witness: "He wasn't drunk, anyway."

Mr. Gonzales: "Have you any reason to think that prisoner would shoot Capt. Anderson or Mr. Matthews if he had been in his right mind?"

Witness: "None whatever."

Mr. Gonzales: "When you woke up in the cabin you were kind of hazy."

Witness: "Yes."

Mr. Justice Murphy: "Had you had a drink?"

Witness: "No."

The Judge: "There is no disgrace if you had had one."

H. T. Cross Called

H. T. Cross, Customs appraiser, was called to give evidence for the defence. He said that he had analysed the extract on exhibit. The vanilla extract he found contained 58.2% alcohol. A bottle of lemon extract he had tested he found contained 72.6% alcohol, or proof spirit.

Mr. Gonzales: "Is that the same kind of alcohol they have in whiskey?"

Witness: "I could not say at all. It is about the same strength as

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ordinary bottled whiskey."

Mr. Donaghy: "It is not quite as strong as Jamaica rum?"

Witness: "No, not by any means."

Doctor L. W. Kergin was the next witness called by the defence.

Dr. Kergin spoke on the action of lemon extract on a man's mind which he said affected different people in different ways.

Mr. Gonzales: "Would it be possible for a man to commit a crime without being able to distinguish between right and wrong at that time?"

Dr. Kergin: "Yes, quite possible."

Special Constable

E. W. Singer, special constable at Massett, was the next witness for the defence.

Mr. Gonzales: "I understand that in August last you were appointed special constable and took charge of McEachern on August 21?"

Witness: "Yes, sir."

Mr. Gonzales: "What condition was he in?"

Witness: "He was under the influence of liquor and appeared to be dozy. I took him up to my house, made down a bed on the floor and he slept for half an hour. When he woke up he asked me how his clothes had got wet and I told him that he had shot the mate of the White and had then jumped overboard."

Mr. Donaghy: "Was he raving?"

Witness: "I could not understand what he said."

Mr. Gonzales: "Did he say anything regarding Captain Anderson or Mr. Matthews?"

Witness: "When I told him he had shot the mate and jumped overboard he said, 'What, Mr. Matthews! He would be the last man in the world anybody would shoot.'"

Cross-examined by Mr. Donaghy for the crown, the witness said that the prisoner was handed over to him, at the wharf by the magistrate, and he walked along with him to the house with handcuffs on.

Mr. Donaghy: "You did not caution him against talking?"

Witness: "Yes, I did."

Bought Extract

W. Raybourn was the next witness called who said he was a sailor on the W. Grant, which boat was owned by the same company as the whaler White.

pany as the whaler White.

He had met McEachern in Martin's store at Massett, who was buying clothes, cigarettes and tobacco. Witness had bought some tobacco and a bottle of lemon extract. This they both drank together outside and then went back and bought three more bottles of extract, which they drank.

Mr. Justice Murphy: "What the three?"

Witness: "Yes, sir."

Witness continuing said that McEachern then bought one small carton of vanilla extract and some lemon extract. They both then went outside the store but he, witness, did not remember much more.

Witness did not remember where McEachern went and did not remember going back to his boat. The first thing he could remember was when the W. Grant was going into Naden Harbour.

Mr. Gonzales: "How many bottles do you know of that were consumed by you and McEachern?"

Witness: "Four at least."

In reply to questions put by Mr. Donaghy, for the crown, witness said that he had known prisoner before, having worked with him at the same station. He had never drunk lemon extract before, and that it was on his suggestion the extract had been purchased in the first place.

Mr. Donaghy: "You and the accused drank four bottles of it?"

Witness: "Yes."

Mr. Justice Murphy: "Before the shooting?"

Witness: "Yes, before the shooting."

The hearing was adjourned until 11 o'clock on Monday morning.

The secretary to the Admiral of the Mosquito Fleet reports that fish arrivals have been light this week consequent upon the fact that a number of the smaller boats have tied up for the winter and on account of the stormy weather that has prevailed on the high spots. The weather is of course the greatest factor in the fishing game. With a heavy sea running and the wind blowing a gale it is waste of time and effort, to say nothing of the added danger to an already dangerous calling, to monkey around after halibut with small boats.

The coast has a great variance of weather conditions, and while it may be quite like summer in one place it will be blowing a storm in another. The majority of the boats of the American fleet, which went north from Seattle recently, seem to have struck bad weather. On Thursday morning several of the larger boats came in with catches totalling 87,000 pounds and reported that all the schooners were new out on the high spots reaping the harvest of the seas with better weather prevailing.

It is reported that from now on this fish will be arriving in greater quantities.

Prices High

The small amount of fish marketed has meant that the prices have remained firm. The highest price paid was 19c, and the record price of 13.75c, for second class fish was paid. This time last year fish was selling for 15c and 16c.

During the past week 303,100 pounds of fish has been marketed through the Fish Exchange, and ten carloads have been shipped to eastern points up to Friday night.

New U.S. Patrol Boat

The latest boat to join the American patrol fleet in the Alaska service is the Widgcon, formerly a yacht and used by the U.S. navy during the war. She is equipped with twin 60 h.p. engines, and makes a speed of about twelve knots. Another new boat, the Kittiwake, will soon be sent up from the south for use on the Alaskan coast.

Shipbuilding Spurt

The hammers, saws, and other miscellaneous tools required in the shipbuilding are coming in for quite a lot of use in the local shipyards.

The N. M. McLean shipyards are busy again. Ald. Theo. Collart, familiarly known as "skipper" Collart, is having his power boat, The Leinsh, thoroughly overhauled by Mac. An entirely new cabin and top is to be fitted on her, and the latest improvements, including cook stove, sink and toilet will be installed. The Leinsh is a very sturdy boat and measures 36 feet long by 9 ft. 6 in. beam, the cabin measuring 12 feet by 8 ft. She is fitted with a 12-14 h.p. Regal engine which gives her a speed of between 8 and 9 knots per hour. Mr. Collart, who does a big insurance business in the outlying districts, will use his cruiser, when completed, for visiting those places. It is expected the new work will be finished in about a week from now.

The halibut boat White Lilly is also being overhauled at these yards ready for the spring business. The White Lilly has been in the hands of Captain Finlayson for the past season who has been using her in the halibut and trolling fishing game.

Suga Yards Busy

A new trolling boat keel has been laid down at the Suga yards. This boat when completed will measure 33 feet over all by a 9 foot beam. No decision has been made as to the kind of engine that will be fitted.

This yard has also just completed two similar trolling boats to the one mentioned, which only requires the necessary machinery installed. There are two 10

h.p. two cycle engines at the yards which will probably be fitted to these hulls.

Maevie Tied Up

It is understood from secret service sources that the Maevie, skippered by Alex. McDonald, has been tied up at the East India dock, Cow Bay, for the remainder of the season.

Blondin & Pierce Unite

The crews of the halibut boats Joe Baker and Maud have joined forces, contracts of unity having been signed in the presence of the Admiral this week, and the Joe Baker will in future be the main boat of the fleet. Cap. Pierce, of the Maud, otherwise known as Red, intended to finish up the season on his last trip but having a few loaves of bread and a quarter of a pound of butter doing nothing and the Joe Baker desiring to make a last dash to the high spots, it was considered a good idea to load the bread and butter on the latter craft. Articles were therefore drawn up that provided if Red would ship out on the next trip with Fred that they would try and make a killing of fish, and then go to their winter homes in Rupert. Tommy Smith and Geo. Hicks have also joined in the contract, and the Joe Baker left port yesterday morning with flags flying full mast.

Early in the week the party went out on the Joe Baker on a three days hunting trip and were successful in bagging 50 ducks, of a very fine variety. Owing to the weather being so extremely good on the trip, not a breath of wind to be had at any price, the deer hunting was off. The stillness was not at all suitable for the sport. As Red said, "You couldn't get near a deer with rubber heels on," so that end of the sport had to be passed up. However there was a good cook aboard and the duck for dinner is to be the main menu while away.

Dixie Sneaks Out

The Dixie, Capt. Geo. Newcombe, is causing a lot of uneasiness in nautical circles, and it looks as though the fleet sub chasers will be put into commission again. The Dixie sneaked out of port twice this week on some secret mission. The Admiral has a lot of faith in George and is of the opinion that he is hunting for a special kind of fur which he has promised to a lady in the old home town for a muff.

Ringleader Through

The old reliable halibut chaser Ringleader, Capt. Leo Sandar, is to be tied up for the winter, according to the latest information to hand. Cap. has been at the fishing game pretty steadily for a long time and is in need of a real rest. It is understood he will winter on Wolfe Island in his palatial residence and will spend his spare moments in feeding wolves.

Inez H. Outfitting

The Inez H., Capt. H. Ness, is undergoing an outfitting stunt in Cow Bay preparatory to leaving for the high spots over the week end.

Too Much Pump

Cap. Dolph Dixon of the Bertie B. has found an invention quite by accident which is guaranteed to sink a boat faster than any other contrivance yet known to man. It appears that while out on business recently Cap. thought it would be a good idea to take a little of the surplus water out of the hull which had gathered at the stern. He got his usual pump to work on deck, which is connected with a long piece of rubber hose to the bottom of the boat. He was busy

pumping, as he always did, not noticing anything in particular other than that the water did not seem to be coming out particularly fast. He continued to pump and after a few hours noticed that the boat was getting lower in the water.

On going below he was astounded to see the cabin full of water and the boat gradually sinking by the bow. This was too much pumping for Dolph who in utter disgust threw the pump overboard, and started in at great speed to bale her out with his hat, the old familiar bucket being at the bottom of the cabin. After another few hours of exertion he was able to get things righted. Although he has sat up at nights trying to figure out what happened the pump, he had not yet solved the mystery. He says the D. pump must have reversed somehow or else he was holding his mouth wrongly. Just to prove to himself that he is right he has got into the habit lately of daily spinning down in a car, which he says is the doctor's orders. The boys are inclined to think that he is quite right in that statement because he has a doctor as a chauffeur. It has not been learned who actually owns the car or whether the taxi account is billed by the day by distance travelled, or by the month or year.

Another Just It

Capt. Kohrt, world famous as the skipper of "Just It," is considering the building of a new craft which will be entirely different from previous attempts in that the new boat is to be christened another name. The new boat will be of the trolling class and will be built entirely on a speculation basis.

It will have a speculation hull, a speculation engine, one of those engines that speculates in gas, and the only thing that will not be a speculation is the architect. The new boat will eclipse anything yet built by this well-known builder. With this object in view the Kohrt shipyard in Bone Yard Creek are to be entirely remodelled and it is understood that the original plans of the dry dock will be used.

FREEDOM OF TRADE BUT NOT POLITICS

Must Not Talk Write, or Think in Russia Today

(Associated Press).
MOSCOW, Oct. 20.—The Soviet government's recent action in exiling abroad or to Northern Russia many educators, publicists and professional men who were unable to reconcile themselves to the Soviet regime, came like a bolt out of the blue and has left thousands of others of the "intelligentsia" wondering if their turn will come next.

For many months, since the development of free trade and the recreation of a class of rich speculators, it has been evident both to opponents of the government and to the communists themselves, that thousands of Russians were beginning to forget they were in the hands of a proletarian dictatorship, and were beginning to become as "bourgeoisie" as ever.

Prompt Punishment

Thinking that the new freedom of trade might mean freedom of politics also, scores of college professors and some organizations of professional men began to talk, write and think freely again. The more timid did this secretly, while some plucked up enough courage to lampoon the government's activities openly in pamphlets and in the class room. One group of college professors even dared to strike—and strikes usually bring prompt punishment in Russia.

Premier Lenin openly announced, last spring, that the retreat toward capitalism had reached its limits, and both the Genoa and

League conferences established that the Soviet government was standing pat on the main principles of the proletarian dictatorship, even if it was inclined to make individual concessions to capitalists or foreign governments here and there.

Speculators

Within Russia, however, such leeway continued to be allowed to speculators. Gambling casinos were opened, racing flourished, and so many new commercial undertakings were launched that very few Russians realized that the communist party had determined absolutely that the pendulum, having swung so far to the right, now had to swing back to the left until the Soviet clock kept proper Bolshevik time.

Communists explain that so long as efforts of individuals, however profitable to themselves, continue to be immediately or potentially advantageous to the government in its scheme of reconstructing Russia, these individuals are to be given wide scope in freedom from interference. But when the work of the individual does not fit into this general scheme, or when an individual works against the government, then his activities are to be cut short and the offender punished.

Warning to Others

The recent decrees of exile, says the newspaper Pravda, are only the first warnings to the intellectuals who remain. The Soviet government will, as in the past, value highly the support of those representatives of the old "intelligentsia" who will loyally work with the government, as the better part of the specialists do now, but it will, as before, root out every attempt to utilize the legal possibilities for an open or secret struggle against the government and for the restoration of a "bourgeoisie regime."

"There is no hope for a return to the past," The Pravda warns.
