May Be Crisis British Government LABOR LOST OUT IN LONDON MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS YESTERDAY

Premier Lloyd George Is Carrying Resignation in Pocket; Ultimatum Soon

LONDON, March 3.—Wednesday, March 8, is the day that is set by Premier Lloyd George for the fulfillment of his ultimatum to Hon. Austen Chamberlain. If he has by that time not received satisfactory assurances of support from Coalition Conservatives he will present his resignation of the Premiership to the King.

Premier Lloyd George is, figuratively speaking, carrying his resignation in his pocket now.

OFFICIAL OF IRELAND WAS SHOT TODAY

Max S. Green, Chairman Prison Board, Killed by Fleeing Fugitive.

BELFAST, March 3.—Max S. Green, chairman of the Irish Prison Board, was shot and killed in Dublin today. The shooting was done by a fugitive who fired on his pursuers after the official ministry of pensions had been robbed. A second man was wounded.

Green was a son-in-law of the late John Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader.

WIRELESS CALL VESSEL GONE

Norwegian Vessel Reported Herself in Distress and Cannot Be Found.

HALIFAX, March 3.—According to a wireless message received from the steamer Esthonia, which responded to a call from the Norwegian freighter Grontoft no trace of the vessel can be found at the point given in the message. There is also no trace of the crew.

The Grontoft reported herself sinking yesterday and said the life boats had smashed.

The vessel carried 20 men and was a 1200 ton craft.

RANCHERS BURIED UNDER SNOWSLIDE

Two Men Near Nelson Trained to Edge of Enormous Avalanche

NELSON, Mar. 3.—Two ranchers of this neighborhood who have been missing are thought to have perished under an avalanche. The men, Thomas Oliver and Frank Martin, were trailed to the edge of the enormous snow slide under which they are apparently buried.

ADJOURNMENT OF DAIL EIREANN UNTIL APRIL 25 AGREED ON

Motion to Give Franchise to Women Before the Big Election Is Defeated.

DUBLIN, March 3.—The Dail Eireann adjourned until April 25 under an agreement between the two parties after a motion to postpone the election was defeated on a division. The postponement amendment which was defeated, was designed to hold over the election until the franchise had been extended to women and until they could have the opportunity to register.

FREDERICK IVES PASSED AWAY IN LOCAL HOSPITAL

After Long and Painful Suffering, Massett Telegraph Operator Died Last Evening.

After a long and hopeless fight with death which was borne with patience and fortitude, Frederick Ives of Massett, who was severely burned in a gasoline explosion at Port Clements on September 11, passed away at the General Hospital last night at 9 o'clock. After the accident hope had been held out for Mr. Ives' ultimate recovery, but more recently it was seen that recovery would be impossible and, after weeks of terrible suffering, death came mercifully.

Mr. Ives had been a resident of Massett since boyhood, having gone there with his parents several years ago. He was about 25 years of age and was the son of the late Arthur Ives and Mrs. Ives. In the early days his father conducted an hotel at Massett. Deceased leaves to mourn his loss a widow, mother, three brothers, Arthur, of this city, and Samuel and Charles of Vancouver, and a sister, Mrs. L. A. Graef of Hazelton. The mother, Arthur Ives and Mrs. Graef are at present in the city. His wife is at present in Vancouver.

Telegraph Operator.

Deceased was a telegraph operator by calling and before going overseas was on the permanent staff of the Dominion Government Telegraphs. He was severely injured by wounds from his over-seas service and suffered considerably after his return. Of recent years he had been on the relieving staff of the government system and was engaged at various points on the Queen Charlotte Islands and near Smithers.

The accident which resulted in Mr. Ives' death occurred in the residence of A. Robinson at Port Clements over six months ago. Deceased had been lighting a fire and a can of gasoline became ignited. Almost immediately the explosion occurred and Mr. Ives' clothing became ignited and he was seriously burned about the arms and body. The nearest physician, Dr. Briggs, was some 28 miles distant at Massett and he was immediately summoned. In the meantime Miss Woods, a trained nurse of Victoria, rendered first aid and nursed him for several months during his illness.

Skin Grafting.

About a month after the accident Mr. Ives was brought to the local hospital for treatment. Several skin grafting operations, for which his brother and citizens gave skin, took place and recovery was at first hoped for, but the grafting did not take to good effect and hope was finally despaired of.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

LABORITES ARE BADLY WORSTED

Carry Only 17 Seats in London Municipal Election Out of 85

LONDON, March 3.—Laborite and socialist candidates were badly worsted in the London municipal elections. The municipal reformers carried 67 seats, laborites 17 and independents, 1.

HER TRIAL RESUMED.



The trial of Madalynne Obenchain, charged with the murder of J. Belton Kennedy, broker, near Los Angeles, last August, has been resumed in the Supreme Court in that city. Arthur C. Burch, her co-defendant, was recently tried for the murder, and the jury disagreed.

MORE KILLED AUTOMOBILES THAN IN WAR

NEW YORK, March 3.—During the 18 months that the United States troops were engaged in war overseas 48,000 soldiers lost their lives on the battlefields. In exactly the same period, according to the New York Herald, 91,000 persons, of whom 25,000 were women and children, were killed by automobiles on the United States highways.

COAL STRIKE INEVITABLE

Miners of Western Canada Refuse to Accept 35 Per Cent Cut in Wages.

CALGARY, Mar. 3.—The Western Canada coal operators have refused to consider the demands of the miners and have posted an alternative agreement providing for a wage cut of approximately 35 per cent containing a cost of living clause which would automatically adjust wages at intervals.

The officials of the miners refuse to consider the operators' proposals and a prolonged and bitter clash is inevitable.

WATCHMEN'S STRIKE LETS THIEVES BUSY

BRESLAU, Mar. 3.—The watchmen's union, which nightly patrols the streets of Breslau and guards the business houses, struck last night. Thieves immediately started an organized drive, robbing houses and emptying show windows.

GRAND JURY PRESENTMENT

Sitting at Ketchikan It Declares for Better Patrol of Coast Against Liquor.

A United States grand jury at Ketchikan, Alaska, took cognizance of the liquor business being done with Alaska from this port in the following pronouncement: "From evidence presented to the grand jury and from facts within the knowledge of the members thereof, it has been demonstrated that the main source of supply of liquor coming into this division of Alaska are Prince Rupert, B. C., and Stewart, B. C."

"By reason of the location of these places, their proximity to American territory, their geographical situation with respect to waterways over and by which liquor may be transported from Canadian into American territory, this traffic has assumed considerable proportions and the configuration of the coast line, with its innumerable inlets, renders the apprehension of the violators of law in this regard extremely difficult, well nigh impossible without some adequate means of enforcing the same by the capture of vessels engaged in this traffic. It is therefore the recommendation of this grand jury that either the customs service, the department of justice, the prohibition commissioner or such other department as may be considered as best adapted to the suppression of this traffic, be equipped with adequate means in the way of a vessel or vessels for the patrolling of that stretch of water along the international boundary line of approximately sixty miles in length, to act in co-operation with the Canadian patrol boats charged with similar duties."

NELSON, March 3.—Peter Veregin was re-elected president of the Canadian Doukhobors.

SHAUGHNESSY AS GOVERNOR

Head of C. P. R. Suggested as the First Official Head of Irish Free State.

LONDON, March 3.—The Manchester Guardian says it understands that Lord Shaughnessy's name is before the cabinet in connection with the governorship of the Irish Free State, and that he has powerful backing for the position.

"It would be a bold step," the Guardian says, "but these are the days of bold steps."

The Guardian notes that Lord Shaughnessy has always held strong views on the governing of Ireland and has steadily contributed to the Irish funds, latterly having changed his subscriptions from the Nationalist to the Sinn Fein party. "He is advanced in years," the Guardian continues, "but it is understood he would accept the new position as a labor of love."

The fact is pointed out by the Guardian that the Irish cabinet has expressed clearly its desire for a commoner as governor, but the paper concludes that this was before Lord Shaughnessy was considered as a possibility.

No confirmation of the Guardian's story is available at present. Lord Shaughnessy has repeatedly affirmed that he is in this country merely on a holiday.

MAN WHO HELD UP SID WINSBY GETS 5 YEARS

Bank Robber Sentenced by Magistrate Primrose at Edmonton.

Edmonton, March 3.—A term of five years imprisonment in the penitentiary was the sentence imposed by Magistrate Primrose on James E. Crawford, the man who robbed the Union Bank of North Edmonton recently.

Manager Winsby was held up at the point of a shotgun and something like \$1500 was stolen from the teller's cage. The robber got away to Vancouver where he was apprehended and confessed to the crime.

Winsby was alone at the time of the holdup, his assistant having stepped out for a couple of minutes.

VICTORY FOR LLOYD GEORGE

Amendment to Irish Free State Bill Defeated by a Large Majority.

LONDON, Mar. 3.—The House of Commons last night defeated by a vote of 254 to 65 an amendment to the Irish Free State Bill introduced by Sir Frederick Balfour, Unionist, which sought to place on record the suggestion that the Anglo-Irish treaty was negotiated with Southern Ireland and not with all Ireland. The vote is regarded as a victory for Lloyd George.

NEW LANGUAGE TRADE PURPOSE

Professor Falconer Intimates That One Will Likely Be Used Soon.

PHILADELPHIA, March 3.—A universal language for trade purposes was predicted last night by Sir Robert Falconer, president of the University of Toronto, in an address before the Philadelphia Society for the Promotion of Liberal Studies. The new language, he said, would be adopted only by persons engaged in international commercial pursuits, while race and national pride would preserve the mother tongue in each country.

LADY SCOTT, WIDOW EXPLORER, MARRIES YOUNG FINANCIER

LONDON, Mar. 3.—Lady Scott, widow of the late Captain Robert F. Scott, the Antarctic explorer, who with four members of his party perished during a blizzard on his return from the South Pole early in 1913, was married today to Lieutenant Commander E. Hilton, a young financial secretary of the Treasury.

Women Invade House of Lords.

Lady Rhonda has been granted the privilege to sit in the House of Lords. She will be the first lady to take a seat there. In granting her the right the British Government is once more falling in line with the spirit of the times and adapting itself to changing conditions. It is an indication of the adaptability of the British people to modern conditions. The British have always led in the matter of democratic government, and today we find them practically leading the world along this line. In the United States republic there is as yet no lady senator, neither is there a lady in the Canadian second chamber. It remained for old conservative Britain to make way for the innovation, breaking down all her traditions and leading the way in allowing a lady to sit in the second legislative chamber.

Rate of Exchange and Fluctuations.

Many people are interested in the rate of exchange and curious in regard to the fluctuations of which they hear. The Wall Street Journal in a recent issue traces the various movements within the last couple of years and then says:

"Rise of sterling recently has had a sympathetic effect on the discount rate. Ordinarily there is a three-cornered trade and commercial relation between England, Canada and the United States. Canada buys more here than she sells to us, and England buys more than she sells in Canada. England, instead of paying her balances to Canada, sends the sterling here, thus balancing Canada's U. S. debts and Britain's in Canada. As sterling is at a discount in Canada as well as here, it is too expensive for England to make any remittances not absolutely necessary, which, together with post-war disarrangement of trade, puts the Canadian dollar at a discount. However, as sterling rises the normal condition tends to return, and consequently Canadian exchange better.

"Present high value of Canadian funds is influenced by the fact that Canadian foreign trade figures for 1921 showed a favorable balance of about \$17,000,000 when most authorities had expected a deficit at end of the year. Another factor which aided in the rise during early winter months was the shipment of American wheat to Canada for milling, due to a strike in the mills in this country. Normally the movement is the other way.

"Prospect for a reorganization of finances through a large Dominion bond issue has also helped to lower the discount rate. Present talk in Canada is to consist of a \$400,000,000 internal loan and \$100,000,000 more to be sold in New York.

"It is also thought that, due to easiness of money here, some investors are buying Canadian internal bonds, sending money there for that purpose. Likewise, there has been a drift of Canadian funds, temporarily on call here, back to the Dominion. Wheat shipments to United States are also being made in fairly large volume.

"Bankers seem to be rather reluctant about predicting future course of Canadian rate. Fluctuations are expected during the next few months, owing to the fact that American exporters who left their balances in Canada rather than transfer them to this country when the rate was high are expected to begin withdrawals on a fairly large scale, which may have a depressing effect.

"However, the consensus of opinion seems to be that the discount will disappear within the current year, for the upward tendency of sterling and the course of trade between Canada and the United States are both favorable to Canada.

"Tariff policies of the two countries is the factor causing uncertainty at present. The new Canadian government is in favor of reduction of tariffs, which is not calculated to be of much assistance in raising the favorable trade balance. Our tariff policy also is expected to be unfavorable to an increase in Canadian exports.

"Much also depends on the speed with which the deflation in Canada proceeds. In the western provinces war prices still prevail in large part, and farmers and manufacturers both are reluctant about taking their losses and coming back to normal."

Much Speculation Regarding Fielding.

The minister of finance has been to Washington to talk over trade and finance matters with the members of the United States Government. According to press despatches he has suffered a rebuff. The probability is that he made no proposals but was simply enquiring into the general attitude of the United States Government toward ours. Such information is very desirable and the King Government will no doubt govern itself accordingly.

While close trade relations with the United States are desirable, they must be formulated, so far as we are concerned, with our own interests in view. The people of the United States do not hesitate to legislate to benefit themselves, regardless wholly of the effect it will have on this country. So Canada must be guided by her own interests. There is no golden rule apparently in diplomacy. Nothing but selfish interests rule. Men who are intensely human and sympathetic as individuals find themselves everything but that when they become diplomats. If there is to be fiscal warfare it is well to know it at once so that we may guide ourselves accordingly.

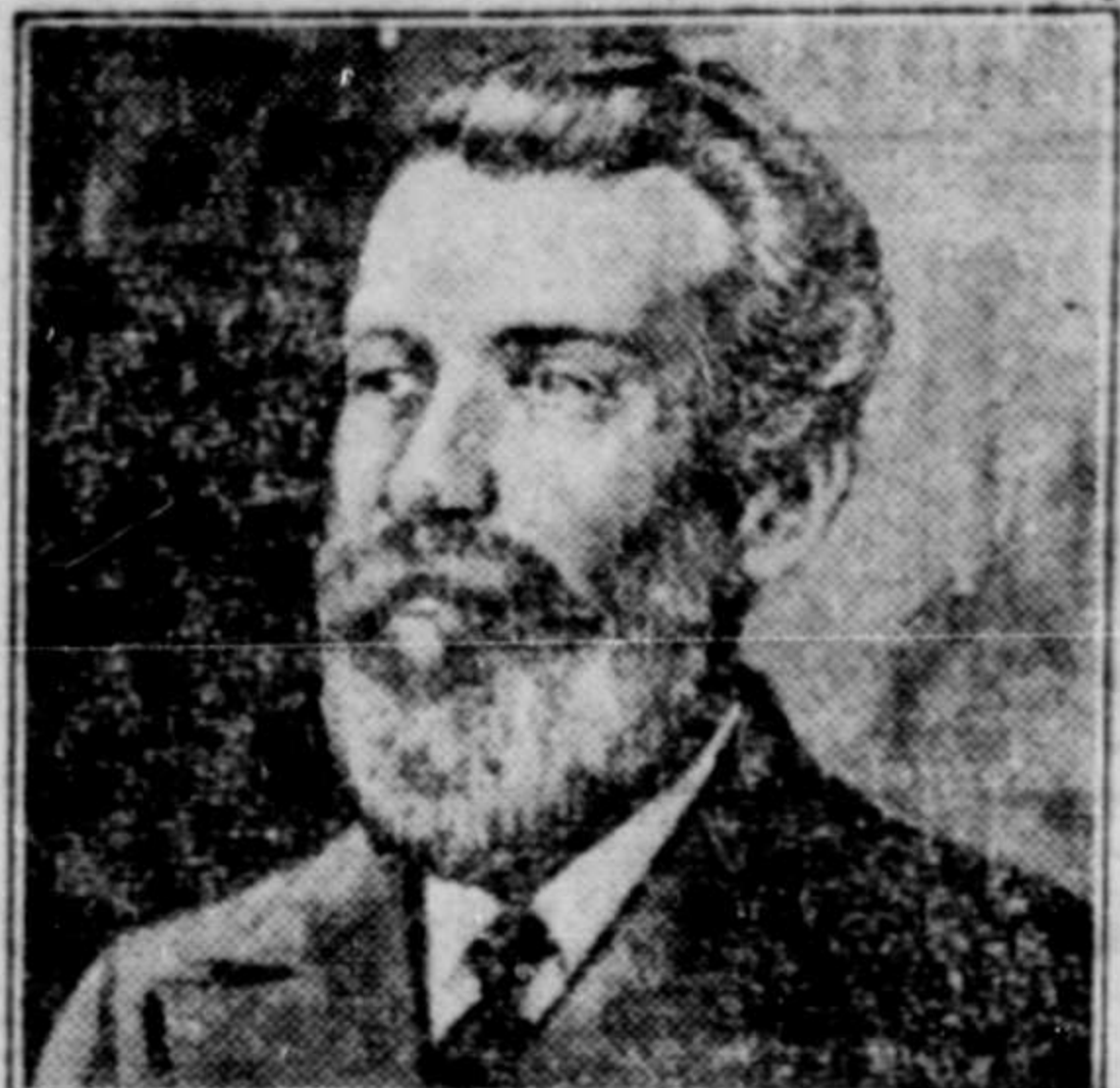

ELKS OFFICERS ADDRESS CLUB

W. J. Cash and Milton Gonzales Speak at Rotary Club Luncheon on Work of Order.

Two representatives of the Elks in this city were yesterday the guests of the Rotary Club and gave interesting talks on the work of the order. They were W. J. Cash, past exalted ruler, and Milton Gonzales, exalted ruler. They were each given a good reception, and at the close were thanked for their addresses.

Mr. Cash sketched the early history of the founding of the Elks order in the United States. It was founded by an English actor who gathered around him a group of others of the same profession with a view to mutual assistance. The movement spread and today the American Elks are one of the strongest of the fraternal orders.

Canadian Order.

The Canadian order was started in Vancouver. It advanced rapidly and today it had become a national institution. Two years ago a lodge was instituted here. It had already done considerable community service and had established an Elks Home with a gymnasium. It also did national and patriotic work. Considerable relief work had been carried on. The winter had been a strenuous one, but now things were looking brighter. Mr. Cash considered it a compliment to the order to be invited there for that occasion. He thanked the members of the club for their courtesy and said he would be able to go back and tell the boys that there were others outside the order who were interested in what they were doing.

Milton Gonzales spoke of the similarity of aims of the Elks and the Rotary Club. The mottoes of the two organizations were similar and he hoped they would in

future have many opportunities of co-operating in good work.

All Classes.

The Elks took in members from all respectable walks of life and lawyers. The order was open to men of every faith or political color. They had recently decided to ask the government to give the land whereon the government buildings now stood to be used as playgrounds for the children. They had been told it was too expensive, but they did not think anything could be too expensive for the children.

Speaking of the order, Mr. Gonzales said they did not allow gambling in their club rooms and no liquor was allowed there. They were in the city to stay and he hoped they would be able to assist the Rotary Club in improving conditions here until every need of the city was fulfilled.

Edward Lipsett of Vancouver, who was also a guest, extended an invitation to Prince Rupert Rotarians to be present at the forthcoming celebration in that city.

Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Wray and family sailed on the Prince Rupert this morning for Vancouver. Mr. Wray for some years has been connected with the mechanical engineering department of the local shipyard.

"Business is fairly good considering the general world conditions. Farmers are not getting much for their produce and of course that means less business done. Next year they will have a boomery at Francois Lake. The farmers are determined to have it if they have to put up all the money themselves. They are practically a unit in their demand.

License Application.

"Oil? Some people smile when it is mentioned but it is understood the Gerow brothers have had a good offer for their holdings and there are a lot of people who confidently expect to get oil there. Everything within nine miles of the town is now staked and even out in the Uncha valley the country is blanketed with applications for licenses.

Mr. Beckstead looks to see great developments in his district. He sees Burns Lake as the centre of things, it being the outlet to the lake country to the south and to the Babine to the northward. He says people are already coming in this spring, mostly people who located their land a couple of years ago. He is particularly pleased with the co-operative spirit shown by the people of Prince Rupert.

Yesterday Mr. Beckstead was a guest at the luncheon of the Rotary Club here.

TERRACE SAWMILL OPERATING FULL BLAST ON BIGGER SCALE THAN BEFORE DISASTROUS FIRE

The new 35,000-foot sawmill at Terrace, owned and operated by George Little, the pioneer timberman of the western end of the Canadian National Railways, is the only sawmill that is running at the present time on the railway between Prince Rupert and Prince George. Although the present plant is an entirely new one, having been rebuilt on the site of the old one which was destroyed by fire last summer, it may really be described as the second oldest mill in Northern British Columbia, coming second to the Big Bay mill at Georgetown.

The Terrace sawmill was built in 1912 by George Little and operated the same year for the first time. The capacity of the mill was 20,000 feet per day. It ran continuously without a shut-down until June 27, 1921, when a fire, originating from a defective door in the boiler furnace, swept the entire plant out in short order while all the crews could do was to get out of the place and watch it go up.

Undaunted by his misfortune, Mr. Little at once got busy on plans for rebuilding and within six months a more modern and completely up-to-date plant was standing and operating phoenix-like on the same site as the old one.

A Better Mill

The new mill is a better and a larger one than the first. While the machinery is about the same, it is equipped with an outside resaw and trimmer which were not in the old mill. The boilers and engines are heavier but of the same make. There is also an electric light plant and a shingle mill as in the old one. One feature of the new mill which the old one did not have is the automatic waste conveyors and a brick burner which is not yet completed but is being used.

There are about 50 men on the payroll of the Terrace mill at the present time and a neat little industry is here alone provided for the town of Terrace. Of course, there are a few men more employed in the winter than in the summer because it is while the snow is on the ground and the weather is hard that most of the logging is done. Right now there are over one million feet of logs in the yards and more are being brought in steadily.

Three Million Feet

Mr. Little expects to cut three to three and a half million feet of lumber at the mill this year. Spruce, hemlock and cedar are cut in about equal proportions. The main and most important business is the spruce which is shipped to the New York market in both clear and common grades. This is the best open market which, at the present time, is offered to the Terrace mill. The hemlock and cedar, at present, is disposed of on the local market and Mr. Little has two lumber yards along the line of the Canadian National railways, one at Smithers and the other at Vanderhoof. With the establishment of a lumber assembly wharf at Prince Rupert, the Oriental cedar market would be offered to the Terrace mill as to all others in the district. It is necessary to cut spruce, hemlock and cedar at Terrace on account of the timber stands.

Shingles from Terrace are also in good demand although there is only one machine in the mill now. In the summer time there are frequent cuts of cottonwood to supply the local box demand for Terrace is the strawberry centre of the district and a good many boxes are required.

Logs for the Terrace mill are taken out in the immediate vicinity and, although there are long hauls, they can be brought in for \$7 a thousand.

Manages Himself

Mr. Little manages his own mill and is in active charge of operations himself. He manages to make the mill go and pay its way although there is probably not another mill in the district that can do so under the present conditions.

Mr. Little has been in the country ever since 1905. At that time he was following the occupation of a prospector and also worked for the government until he started taking out ties for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway which was then under construction. His trip up the Kitsumkalum River and Lake in 1905 was perhaps the first move towards taking up land and timber in the Kitsumkalum and Lakelse valleys. At that time there were hardly any whites in

the country outside of squawmen. In 1908 Mr. Little became established at Terrace in the tie and pole business. He located the town of Terrace and put the townsite on the market. When the railway was completed a station was put in and since that time it has grown into one of the best towns along the line. There is a large population in the district now.

Besides his manifold other interests in the district, Mr. Little also operates, in partnership with Mr. Giggey, a small mill with a capacity of 10,000 feet three miles west of Terrace towards Kitsumkalum. It is running now.

Lakelse Lumber Mill

In partnership with J. R. Gordon and George Dover, Mr. Little is also interested in the Lakelse Lumber Company mill at Amshury, about ten miles west of Terrace. This mill has been closed down for the winter on account of the deep snow which comes there and prevents logging operations. It will reopen again in about a month, however, and will run all summer. This plant was built about four years ago and has a capacity of 20,000 feet.

"Although they have been none too good of late, conditions are improving," says Mr. Little, "and there is likely to be number of mills in the district opening this season. The Lakelse mill and the Royal Mills will run but I do not know definitely about the others. That is their business."

"Now that the Pitman Spur (Royal Mills) mill is temporarily closed down, mine is the only sawmill running on this end of the line. This is an unenviable position that I have been in a number of times during the past ten years. It goes to show how difficult it is, under present conditions, to successfully operate an industry of this nature in this section.

Twenty Mills Started

In the past ten years there have been no less than twenty sawmills, started between Prince Rupert and Smithers and, although they are in one of the greatest timber areas in the province, all these mills are either idle or have gone to the wall. Instead of our prospects improving we are getting in a worse position.

"The Forest Branch gives us trouble. They have a lot of very complicated regulations which are altogether excessive for this part of the province. They have a little army of employees who hunt up the operators like a bunch of detectives. The woods are lousy with them and their foremost interest is the collecting of revenue. I venture to say that nine operators out of every ten feel that they are being hounded and treated with suspicion by the Forest Branch. I

would like to see the present staff cut down twenty-five per cent. Then they would have some Honest-to-God work to do and it would be a great deal better for all concerned.

Railway Troubles

"Then we have our railway troubles. The railway does not have to treat one with suspicion for it has the throttle hold all the time. It has the advantage and takes it. The way collections are made and bills are paid is an example. I appreciate some of the efforts that have been made to supply proper cars but there is no doubt that they only supplied them as it is convenient. In other words, the car worries are the mills troubles and directly the tables are turned. When they come it is up to the operator to clear them of ice and snow or else pay freight on it. We may have a load waiting for weeks but if there is any delay in loading we are liable for demurrage.

"The high freight rates are, of course, the real source of our troubles at the present time. New York is our best spruce market but the freight absorbs sixty-five per cent of the value of the lumber at its destination. Before we will have any hope of developing the lumber industry here we must get back to the eighty-cent rate to the Atlantic Coast. This would give us about a fifty-fifty break with the railways which have the lumber industry penalized at present. We have to work for low pay and economize in every way to exist while the railway workers get better pay for much less work and are, naturally, in a much more independent position.

Should be Operating

"We should have some big mills such as the Kleanza Company at Uka, the Kitsumkalum Lumber Co. at Remo, and the Prince Rupert mill. There are large mills with practically all their resources untouched. They should be operating to capacity and this would mean, naturally, a lot of money for the railway company and would benefit the district generally. To accomplish this it is essential that we obtain a much lower freight rate than the present one and it is my opinion that the sooner this rate is lowered, the sooner will conditions improve all along the line.

"A lumber assembly wharf at Prince Rupert is also needed so as to provide opportunity to get into the Oriental trade which affords the best market for our cedar and hemlock.

With this obtained, together with lower freight rates and more co-operation with the Forest Branch, the lumber mills would reorganize and the industry here would become stable and flourish for a great number of years."

MATRIMONIAL AGENTS IN GERMANY TRAVEL SEEKING "GOLDFISH"

BERLIN, March 2.—Travelling matrimonial agents constitute the very latest idea in Germany, where keen competition has developed among matrimonial bureaus because of the great surplus of women, partly due to the war.

The matrimonial agents go from one town to another seeking "gold fishes," as the Germans call them, or, in other words, women with money who are desirous of obtaining true love and a good-looking husband, though poor.

Both men and women have taken to the work of nuptial agents and operate on the trains as they travel, seeking the acquaintance of likely-appearing candidates to whom they explain their propositions when given even less than half a chance.

The matrimonial agents carry a "sample case" in the form of a large album, leather bound, with handles, and which is nearly as large as a suitcase, the album containing photographs of men who have registered as being in the market for a "goldfish" wife.

These agents work on a commission basis, being paid by the bureau managers, who when a match is made charge 1 per cent of the woman's wealth, payable immediately after the marriage takes place, the bureau also receiving a certain percentage from the successful man candidate, payable in installments, a certain length of time after the wedding date.

One matrimonial bureau advertised recently that the names of 5000 marriageable women were listed on its books and that there were only 133 men candidates to meet the emergency.

FEW CLERGYMEN FOR ANGLICAN CHURCH

LONDON, March 1.—The Bishop of Durham says the Church of England cannot find ministers enough to fill its pulpits. The number of men annually ordained since the war has been less than one-third of those annually ordained before the war. Because of the poverty to which so many of the clergy have been reduced by the war, many parents have ceased to regard the church as providing desirable careers for their sons.

There are 4,000 fewer clergy working in the parishes of England than in 1914.

If the Church were to meet its requirements, the Bishop said, it would have to make way for democracy. The last vestige of caste and class distinction should disappear from the ministry and ordination should be as open to the sons of the artisan as of the squire.

WONDERFUL JACKDAW

Bird in England with Intelligence Almost Human; Fond of Football.

DENHAM, Eng., March 3.—(By Canadian Press)—A Jackdaw with remarkable powers of intelligence and a love for children so devoted that it follows them to school and even visits them in sickness, is the property of George Wilson, an ex-navy man, who reared the bird tenderly when it had not a feather on it, and to whose kindness it probably owes its life.

Wilson brought the bird home from work one day and just let it run about his house free and unfettered.

"It follows the children to school every day," said Mr. Wilson. "It enters by the door, perches itself solemnly on the schoolmaster's desk, and plays and comes home with the children. It knows all the children, and has a particular friend in a boy named Evans. One day it missed Evans from school, and it flew to the boy's home over a mile away and began talking to him through the bedroom window."

Jack's vocabulary includes "Come," "Go Away," "Fred," "Shan't," and "Good Night." The bird's great delight is to attend local football matches. He hops and flies up and down the line, and when his side scores a goal his jubilation takes the form of little aerial circles round the opposing goal, accompanied by enthusiastic cries of "Oi, Oi." Sometimes he makes a dash for the ball, but instead of kicking it hops or flies over it.

"Jack" is said to behave very well in school hours, but sometimes tries to drink the school ink.

"His intelligence is almost human," said Mr. Wilson. "Sometimes he perches on my son's desk with a pen in his beak just as if he were giving him a hint to work faster."

This wonderful bird has some of the mischievous traits of his species. He has hidden Mr. Wilson's tobacco box, opened Mrs. Wilson's purse and hidden pennies under the mat, and has taken a shilling from the schoolmaster, flown away with it, and returned it ten minutes before closing time. He flies considerable distances round about the district, accompanies friends on errands and journeys, and occasionally swoops down over the heads of passers-by chuckling "Oi-Oi."
