PREMIER TOLMIE ANNOUNCES PLAN

FORMER C. N. OFFICIAL URGES REAL UNION OF RAILWAYS

Election To Be Held In Spring Following Convention, Meeting In Vancouver Is Told On Friday

EX-SERVICE MEN MEET

Are Opposed to Cut in Relief Scale From 40c to 30c Per Day

The Working Class Ex-Service-men's League held a meeting last night in the Canadian Labor Defence League Hall.

A resolution was passed protesting strongly against the latest cut in relief from 40c to 30c per day. Under the new relief scale a veteran's wife will be allowed \$3 a month to subsist on. It was declared that criminals cost the taxpayer \$1 per day, Doukhobor children \$4 per week while the children of unemployed returned men receive only \$1. It was unanimously agreed that the league would support the National Unemployed Workers' Association in resisting the cut. Two delegates were appointed to attend the meeting of the Workers' Unity League on Tuesday next.

TROY IS FAVORED

Democrats of Second Alaska Division Want Juneau Publisher For New Governor

JUNEAU, Nov. 26.—Unanimous endorsement of John Troy, Juneau publisher, for appointment as Governor of Alaska in succession to Governor Parks was voted by members of the territorial Democratic committee in the second division, word from Nome said yesterday.

RATIFIED BY SENATE

Red Chamber Approves Trade Treaties Without Division on Thursday Night

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—Four bills implementing trade treaties between Canada, the United Kingdom, British Free State, South Africa and Southern Rhodesia were all passed in the Senate Thursday night without division.

This language would consist of 850 words and would be so simple as to permit students of language to perfect themselves in it within two months.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 26.—Addressing the annual meeting of the British Columbia Conservative Association yesterday, Premier S. F. Tolmie definitely announced that there would be a party convention before an election in the spring. He declared that, after the next session of the Legislature, the present government would resign, a union government would be formed and then there would be an election. If the new government returned its followers, then they would be at liberty to name their leader.

The Bella Coola River, which had inundated surrounding country for miles, is now running in its proper channel.

As a result of the floods, two bridges were washed away and considerable damage was done to cultivated land. Property damage was, fortunately, light.

SEARCH IS FRUITLESS

A SATURDAY SERMON

The Light of Life

(Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook, St. Peter's Church)

On November 25, 1820, a young man of twenty-eight years stood on the Gloucestershire hills overlooking the Cotswold. The sun was setting in autumnal splendor and, just as it was about to dip behind the western horizon, an evening cloud intervened shutting out its radiant glory. The watcher—one of the cleverest young men Oxford ever graduated, for at the age of 18 he had taken double firsts in classics and mathematics, a feat equalled only by Sir Robert Peel—his poetic instincts stirred by the appealing phenomena, expressed his feelings thus:

"Tis gone that bright and orb'd blaze
"Fast fading from our wistful gaze,
"Yon mantling cloud has hid from sight
"The last faint pulse of quivering light."

Nature's picture suggested its spiritual analogy and, as he wended his way homeward in the twilight, he composed that well-known and well-loved hymn, "Sun of My Soul."

The passionate love of John Keble for his master, Jesus, and the souls of men is well known. The world held out to him many alluring offers but he believed that he could serve God best and man most as the incumbent of a parish, so he settled at Hursley, near Winchester, and bent his splendid talents to a great but humble task—the living and teaching of Christ.

The hymn is an experience and a prayer. It is catholic in its appeal. Personally, I know of no Christian denomination that does not include this poem in its hymnology. All Christians sing it, all love it. Its teaching is fundamental. Surely it suggests the vision of a time when Christian divisions will have ceased.

The first stanza—
"Sun of my soul, thou Savior dear,
"It is not night if thou be near
"O may no earth-born cloud arise
"To hide Thee from thy servant's eyes."

—gives the key to the reason not only of the soul's separation from God but also the church's discord and lack of practical charity.

The cloud between the soul and the Sun of Righteousness is sin in its various subtle forms, pleasure, sometimes pain, worldly interests and the lusts of life. The cloud that shuts out the "Light of Life" from flooding the church with its beams is worldliness, loyalty to creed rather than to Christ—minute man limiting the operation of the infinite God. Thus and thus only can a man get light, cry the contending sects, so chaos reigns and the world is being lost.

The sun has no favorites neither has the Sun of Righteousness. "Learn to detach yourself from all that is capable of being lost. Bind yourself only to that which is absolute and eternal."

D. Fraser of Fort St. James spent a few days in Smithers during the week on business.

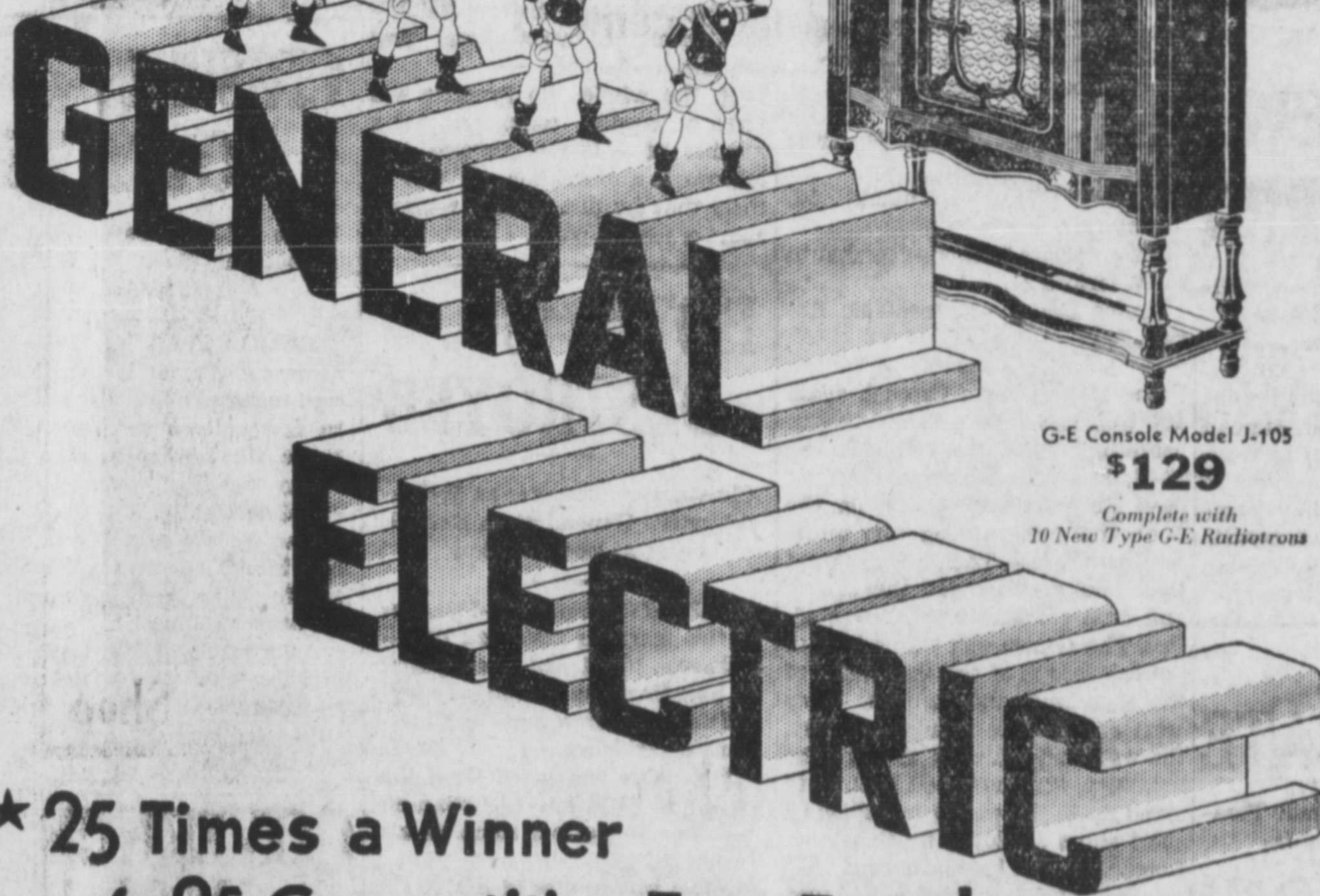
R. D. Prosser of Francois Lake and Sivert Anderson of Decker Lake were among business visitors in town during the week.

A perplexing problem is facing the Smithers council through the failure or inability of some private citizens and business men to keep up with taxes and service charges imposed by the municipality. Quite a number of trades licences are in arrears.

Agents for the Jenkinson property on First Avenue have made application to the town council for an extension of sidewalk to give access to that house. The council will, however, be unable to carry out the work this year owing to shortage of funds.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Cold Storage Head Advocates "Halibut Year"—Troller Sunk By Tanker in Harbor—Cohoos Still Running on Queen Charlottes

T. H. Johnson, general manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., believes that the regulation of the markets and the ends of conservation would be served with a restriction of the Pacific Coast halibut catch to approximately 35,000,000 pounds annually. At present the quota is 46,000,000 pounds for the two major fishing areas of the coast. Mr. Johnson favors the opening of the halibut fishing season about March 1 with the catching of the prescribed total to be taken in the twelve months following. There should be no closed season, in Mr. Johnson's opinion, but when the catch limit for certain areas is taken, then those areas should be closed to further fishing during the remaining period of the "halibut year" or until the March 1 following. In Mr. Johnson's opinion this would simplify the task of the International Fisheries Commission in its efforts to conserve the fishery. It would allow the fishermen to determine when it would be most advantageous to fish and the dealer would be able to intelligently plan his production and storage and distribution of both the fresh and frozen stock in line with possible requirements of the market. Mr. Johnson's views seem to be quite in line with those expressed by local halibut fishing interests at the meeting early this week of the International Fisheries Commission.

Struck a short distance forward from the stern and almost cut in two, the well known salmon troller Bear, owned by Capt. Gust Quist of Oona River, was sunk in the harbor off Cow Bay on Monday evening of this week in collision with the Imperial Oil Co.'s tanker Marvolite. The Bear, running without lights, is understood to have attempted to cross the bows of the Marvolite in the dark while the latter vessel was entering the harbor. Immediately after the collision, the Marvolite came to a stop and picked up Capt. Quist and his companion on the Bear.

Silver bright echo salmon continue to run in Skidegate Inlet, according to reports received here from the Queen Charlotte Islands. However, there are no buyers which condition of affairs again reminds Islanders that a good cold storage plant in Skidegate Inlet would be

the makings of the Queen Charlotte Islands. Southern fishermen and police are inclined to discount the authenticity of a bottle message which was picked up at Terra Nova, near Vancouver, this week, allegedly from a fishing boat, which read as follows: "Gasboat No. 316-203, wrecked at China Hat, B.C. Two men drowned, Jack Smith and Tom Brown. Rough weather. March 19. Please notify Seattle." The message is believed to be a hoax although further investigations are being made. China Hat, better known as Klemtu, is about 100 miles down the coast from Prince Rupert.

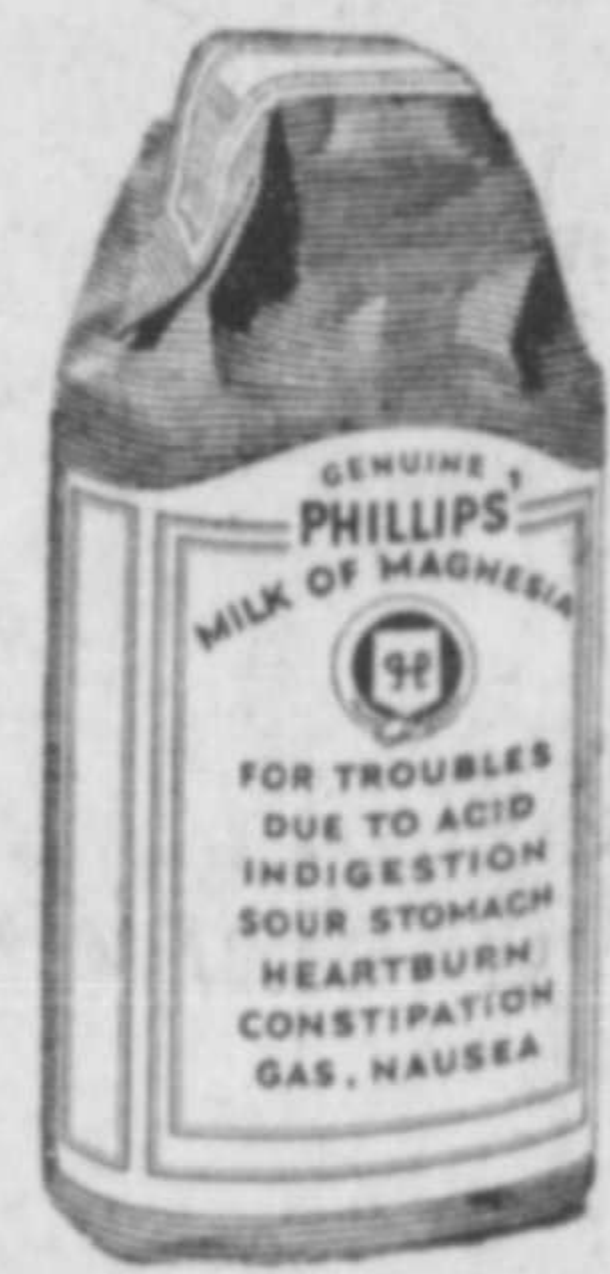
