FAMOUS QUEBEC BASILICA BURNED DOWN

GERMANY WILL SUBMIT NEW REPARATIONS PROPOSALS TO COMMISSION

Ancient Edifice With Its Valuable Contents Is Entirely Destroyed

QUEBEC, Dec. 22.—The famous French basilica, built in 1717 and containing some of the richest art treasures of the Catholic Church, was destroyed by fire early yesterday morning. The fire was discovered starting from crossed wires between the roof and ceiling. It made sudden headway and, on account of smoke, firemen could not get in to fight it effectively. Neither could the priests get in to remove the stored treasures or the altar vessels. All they could do was stand and watch the blaze demolish the contents for two hours. Nobody was hurt. The monetary loss has not yet been estimated but it will be enormous. It is largely covered by insurance.

ALASKA LUMBER TO AUSTRALIA

One Million Feet Already Shipped and another Vessel Coming to Ketchikan for Million and Half

KETCHIKAN, Dec. 22.—South-eastern Alaska is taking a high position in the world lumber market. The shipping firm of W. L. Gwynn & Co., Inc., which dispatched the barkentine Anne Gwynn from this port for Sydney, Australia, last September, has chartered the steamship Isomonia and will place the vessel on berth in Ketchikan, where she will load a cargo of 1,500,000 feet of spruce for Australia. A third ship to load spruce in Ketchikan will be fixed in the near future.

Gwynn & Co. have shipped a total of 1,000,000 feet of spruce in parcel lots from Ketchikan to the United Kingdom since last June.

The lumber is cut by the Ketchikan Power Company, which produces an average of 125,000 feet of spruce a day.

REFUSED TO JOIN STRIKE

Vancouver Longshoremen Decline to Hold up Cargo of Steamer Makura

VANCOUVER, Dec. 22.—Vancouver longshoremen voted down the proposal received from New Zealand striking longshoremen that the Vancouver stevedores refuse to unload the steamer Makura when she arrives on Saturday with a scratch crew shipped during the strikes in the Antipodes. The ship will be unloaded as usual.

MC TIGUE TO MEET BECKETT IN BOUT

Irish Middleweight to Have Battle For Heavyweight Title on January 25

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—Mike McTigue, Irish middleweight, and Joe Beckett have been matched to meet for the British heavyweight title in London, January 25, according to a cable received from McTigue by his manager, Joe Jacobs.

CARIBOO ROAD HOUSE DESTROYED BY FIRE

QUESNEL, Dec. 22.—The old 83-mile roadhouse was destroyed by fire this morning.

DO NOT WANT XMAS HOLIDAY

Railwaymen Protest Closing of Shops for Fortnight
CALGARY, Dec. 22.—The shop employees of the Canadian Pacific Railway here have protested against the closing down of the shops for two weeks at Christmas.

FIRE DESTROYS CHICAGO DEPOT

Dearborn Street Station Burned Out and Eight Railways Homeless—Million Dollar Damage

CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—Within a single hour, fire yesterday destroyed the Dearborn Street railway station here and eight railways, including the Grand Trunk, are homeless. Nobody was hurt and passenger cars and holiday mail were saved by the heroic efforts of employees. It will cost \$1,000,000 to replace the station.

TURN HOSPITAL OVER TO CITY

Board Will Consider Recommendation to This Effect at Next Meeting

Duncan McRae, chairman of the finance committee of the hospital board, reported at the meeting of the board last night that his committee at the next meeting would ask the board to turn the hospital over to the city and let it run it.

D. G. Stewart, as chairman of the board, stated that he quite agreed with the idea of the motion. There was a good deal of criticism of the hospital management in the past. "If the city thinks they can run the hospital to better advantage, I for one, am ready to give it to them," he said and added that the hospital board would be donating their assets of nearly \$70,000 and with a clean bill of health, almost out of debt.

THREE WALK ACROSS COLUMBIA RIVER ICE

THE DALLES, Ore., Dec. 22.—Fred Smith, ferryman, and Barney Scott and wife, walked across the Columbia River last week on the ice. They are the first persons to accomplish this for many years and indicates the cold snap being experienced in this section at the present time.

TRAIN VERY LATE

The Canadian National train due here at 5.30 tonight will be twelve hours late according to the latest information received at noon today. Heavy snowslides in the higher passes near Jasper are responsible for the delay, it is stated.

REPUBLICANS OUT OF JAIL FOR XMAS

DUBLIN, Dec. 22.—A large number of Republicans held as prisoners in Mount Joy prison, it is understood, will be released at Xmas, having signed a declaration of allegiance to the Free State. For the remainder no holiday parole will be granted.

MONCTON, N.B., Dec. 22.—As a protest against the enforced closing of the Canadian National shops between Christmas and New Year's Day, several hundred machine shop employees assembled at noon today and memorialized the Labor members of parliament to prevent the recurrence of such a practice.

LAD SUCCEumbed TO PNEUMONIA

Alvin Francis, Son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Brochu, Died Last Night in General Hospital

The death occurred in the General Hospital last night shortly after 6 o'clock of Alvin Francis Brochu, fourteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Brochu, of the Seaview Department store. The lad succumbed to an attack of pneumonia with complications. He was born in Dawson, Y.T., and had been here with his parents for some years attending the public schools on the city. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of Hayner Bros.

RAMSEY MACDONALD NOT IN FAVOR OF INDECOROUS CONDUCT

LONDON, Dec. 22.—Ramsey MacDonald, the leader of the opposition in the House of Commons, gave evidence in a speech made in London that, while he officially disapproves of the indecorous conduct of his followers in the House near the close of the session, he intends to pursue an organized vigorous policy of harassing the government. Outbursts like those of a section of the Laborites in the House, he said, can rarely be indulged in without injuring the party and are far less effective than well controlled action.

"When the next session begins," Mr. MacDonald said, "we are going to insist on the time of parliament being given to the consideration of real social issues and not allow it to be wasted in meaningless debates. If the government, next session, comes out with no greatly changed scheme of housing, we shall use every ounce of our parliamentary powers to harass and worry them until we prevail over their souls."

GENERAL DELIVERY AT POST OFFICE TO OPEN SATURDAY EVE

As a special consideration to the public, Postmaster J. Morrison announced this afternoon that the general delivery wickets would be open tomorrow night between the hours of 7.30 and 10 p.m. This is being done on account of the lateness of tonight's train which will not be in until 6 tomorrow morning, the heavy Christmas mail and the fact of Sunday intervening the day before Christmas.

Central Power Wants Definite Statement on Liabilities so That She May Work to Solvency

BERLIN, Dec. 22.—Germany, it was learned today, is about to present a new set of proposals for settlement by the reparations commission. The principal request will be that the Allies name a fixed and final sum as the German indebtedness, thus giving Germany a chance to work towards a definite goal of solvency. Germany claims that she cannot pay on the installment plan as long as it is unknown when the debt will be settled.

XMAS DINNER FOR PREMIER

Bulkley Valley Growers Send Him "The Best Goose from the Best District."

VICTORIA, Dec. 22.—Premier Oliver has been presented with a goose for Christmas dinner. It arrived yesterday by express from the growers of the Bulkley Valley who said they wanted to honor the premier by sending him "the best goose from the best part of the province."

SHAEFFER WILL MEET CONTI ON JANUARY 8

Two Billiardists Will Play For Right to Challenge Willie Hoppe

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—Jake Schaeffer, former world's 18.2 balk line billiard champion, and Roger Conti, the champion of France, will meet in Chicago, Jan. 8, 9, 10 to determine which shall be privileged to challenge Willie Hoppe, for the international 18.2 balk line billiard title he regained in the recent tournament here. The billiardists will play a total of 1,500 points in the three evenings, in blocks of 500 points each.

CREW THROWS WHISKEY OVER

Big Liquor Runner from Bahamas Has Mutiny of Crew When Supplies Run Short

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—Because the prohibition navy kept up such a close watch, owners could not get supplies to one of the largest vessels in the Bahama whiskey running business. The crew mutinied and threw overboard most of the cargo of 1,700 cases of whiskey worth \$170,000 off the Long Island coast. The ship returned to the Bahamas with short rations of water and food. Officers are now watching the possibility of a bootlegging syndicate trying to recover the whiskey from the ocean bed.

DANISH WANT CANADA'S AID

Two Hundred Families Wanting to Migrate Cable Premier For Financial Assistance

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 22.—Because of unemployment, two hundred families wishing to migrate to Canada have cabled Premier MacKenzie King, of Canada, asking financial assistance for passage money. A reply has not yet been received.

DECISIVE VICTORY OF LABOR IN AUSTRALIA

Polled 100,000 More Votes for Senate Than Did the Nationalists

MELBOURNE, Australia, Dec. 22.—An analysis of the popular vote in the recent Australian elections shows that Labor polled 100,000 more votes in the senate and house elections than the Nationalists. No further developments in connection with the general elections or the political situation in Australia are expected before the holidays. The result of the vote for senators was unknown this week.

SOUTH AFRICAN WIRELESS PLANT WILL BE BIGGEST

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Dec. 22.—Engineer McLellan of the Marconi Company is here to take charge of the construction of the new South African wireless station, which when completed will be the biggest in existence, and will give direct service practically to every country in the world. The agreement with the company has been ratified by Parliament and the work will be started immediately. The station is expected to be ready for service in eighteen months. All materials possible will be purchased in South Africa.

FAMILY SHOE STORE IS NOW INCORPORATED

VICTORIA, Dec. 22.—The list of incorporations this week includes that of the Family Shoe Store, at Prince Rupert, capitalized at \$25,000.

Careless Drivers Menace To Public.

With motor vehicles in such general use in the city, it is nothing less than a matter of miraculous good fortune that Prince Rupert has had in the past so few automobile accidents. This is doubly true because many of the city streets are very dangerous and because there are a number of reckless drivers driving cars on them. Speeding on the finely finished thoroughfares of Second and Third Avenues is bad enough especially in passing built up intersections but it is still graver folly to drive at an excessive rate on the plank roads in the outlying sections of the city where one false move of the hand or some catch in the machinery might precipitate a car over an embankment of bridge causing severe injuries or possibly death to its occupants. There is also the danger of collision with other vehicles or with persons.

If Prince Rupert's enviable record in the matter of traffic or vehicular accidents is to continue here must be some check on the careless drivers. The careful ones, and there are many of them, are themselves running chances unwittingly with the other kind on the public thoroughfares.

Make Advertisements Newsy Also.

Having a fact in every sentence is one of the elementary principles of newspaper practice and the craft of journalism. This applies to the advertising end of the business as well as to the reportorial and editorial. The matter of keeping the news department in compliance with this principle is up to the writing staff of the newspaper. As far as advertising is concerned, this is largely a matter for the advertisers themselves. While the advertising department of a newspaper may give suggestions and may assist in the compilation of the advertisements, the wishes and instructions of the advertisers must primarily be followed. Advertisers can assist the newspaper staffs and improve the general tone of the paper by giving careful consideration to their insertions always remembering that a little news in an advertisement is better than a whole lot of burdensome stereotype matter.

Danger Point In Near East Conference.

The debate between Turkey and Greece over the question of which nation is responsible for the tragedy of Smyrna continues to form a dominant issue at the Near East conference.

Ismet Pasha says he is quite willing that the treaty which the delegates hope to frame shall provide for a system of payment to the Allied nations for the damages their nationals suffered in Turkey during the great war, but that on the other hand he will insist upon reimbursement by Greece for the losses sustained by the Turks in Asia Minor at the hands of the retreating Greek army.

Former Premier Venizelos insists that the Greeks burned only through military necessity. He declares that the real crime of the Asia Minor campaign was the action of the Turkish troops in outraging and shooting Greek residents, sacking homes, and deporting hundreds of thousands of destitute human beings.

If Turkey exacts reparations from Greece, Venizelos says he will present a bill for the horrors and injustices suffered by the Greeks.

The question of the Ottoman debt is developing as a danger point in the negotiations and the bitter Turkish-Grecian dispute, which is based on something more than a question of money, is serving to make settlement of the whole problem exceedingly difficult.

Morbidity Is Handicap To Civilization.

It would seem that a growing taste for the morbid things of life is a concomitant of our advancing civilization. As morbidity had its first popular development under the barbarian regimes of old Europe, it might well have been held to be a natural outcome of modern enlightenment and the elimination of barbarian ideas that this quality would be reduced rather than accentuated in the average individual today. The very reverse is actually the truth. Human nature does not change in its essentials, no matter what the passage of the centuries may do to the world at large. The rush and stress and strain and nervousness of modern life, far from helping mankind away from the morbid side of life, tend to accentuate a feverish interest in all things that are removed from what is sane and healthy and optimistic. We have only ourselves to thank, after all, if we are plunged every now and then into orgies of morbidity from which nothing but a violent effort on our own individual parts can save us.—Montreal Star.

HIGH SCHOOL XMAS CONCERT

BIG AMBITION AVIATOR PREST

Siberia Flyer is Now in United States Planning for Flight Around World Next Summer

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—The record feat of the 98-foot motor cruise Speedjacks, which recently returned here after circling the globe with her owners, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Y. Goumans aboard, was a big and hazardous accomplishment but it will be eclipsed as a spectacle if C. O. Prest, the stout and long distance flyer, succeeds in his attempt to fly around the world which adventure he intends to embark upon next year. Prest recently returned to the United States from Central Alaska after his second unsuccessful attempt to fly to Siberia and it is understood that he is receiving financial backing from American interests for his globe-circling aeroplane ambition in view of the fact that Sir Keith Smith, an English aviator, intends to make a similar attempt next summer.

Prest is the man who flew under the bridge at Niagara Falls, guiding his plane with one hand and turning the crank of a movie camera with the other. He was within ten hours of completing a flight from Buffalo to Siberia last summer when his plane fell in the wilds of Central Alaska. This was his second attempt at Siberia, the first having ended at Prince Rupert in the fall of 1921 when his machine was dashed to pieces in a windstorm after he had returned from making a flight to Alaska where he was unable to find a landing place in a rain-storm. Prest was at one time holder of the world's altitude record and has the reputation of being one of the United States' bravest dare-devil aeronauts. He is 29 years of age and his home is at Las Vegas, Nevada. Before taking up flying he was a motorcycle stunt rider. In his flying career he has piloted thirteen machines all of which were wrecked through the vagaries of the elements. He has never been seriously hurt himself, however.

EXCITING TRIP OF DUTCH SHIP

Vessel Due at Victoria Has Had Voyage Marked With Thrill After Thrill

VICTORIA, Dec. 21.—Life-afloat still has its thrills, according to Capt. Dekker, master of the Dutch steamer Eemdyk, due here in a few days from Europe via the Canal. His present voyage has been marked by thrill after thrill, the first sensation coming with an attempt on the part of one of his men to do away with himself.

When the ship was navigating passage in West Indian waters, young sailor, eating his meals after the striding transatlantic passage, jumped over the side. When he reached the water, however, he changed his mind about drowning and shouted for help, instead, which was soon forthcoming from the ship. Once aboard, he was placed in irons, transferred to the "Himelidk" at Halifax and sent back to Rotterdam under guard.

Ships in Distress
The Eemdyk had scarcely left her last British port of call when wireless appeals for help began to come in. The first S.O.S. came from Bristol Channel, the Shipping Board freighter Remus sending out the call, but omitting to state the nature of the trouble. Four days later the Remus was heard from a second time, the message saying that she had been in collision with the steamer Port Beath off Breaksea Light. She declared the Port Beath was in need of immediate assistance and that she was standing by. The Eemdyk was too far distant to be of service and steamed on her voyage.

Soon afterwards the Dutch vessel picked up an S.O.S. from the British freighter County of Cardigan, the latter stating that she was in heavy weather in 46.10 north and 7.50 west, and in need of tow. Other ships, however, were nearer the scene and Capt. Dekker continued his course.

Unable to Assist
Several days later the Italian steamer Monte Grappa sent out urgent S.O.S. calls, stating she had struck an iceberg, was listing heavily to port in heavy weather and needed assistance immediately. The Eemdyk was 1,500 miles away and powerless to help. Other steamers were in

the neighborhood, however, and reached her in time to take the passengers off. The vessel sank soon afterwards.

ANXIETY FELT FOR PRINCE OF WALES

Ketchikan Motorboat Falls to Report Whereabouts and Anxiety Felt

The motor boat Prince of Wales, Captain Hooper, with one passenger, a crew of six men and a full cargo of mail, express and freight, sailed from Ketchikan last Sunday and has not been heard from since. "When seen today, Billy Neill, part owner of the vessel, expressed much uneasiness as to her safety. Under ordinary conditions she should have reached Craig on Monday night or Tuesday morning at the latest. From the weather prevailing in this vicinity for the past three days it is reasonable to presume the Prince of Wales encountered severe storms outside, and for this reason Mr. Neill is becoming more anxious hourly, as no word from Craig is forthcoming.

HYDER CASE BEING HEARD IN DISTRICT COURT KETCHIKAN

KETCHIKAN, Dec. 21.—A high finance case from Hyder is being tried in the United States district court here. The suit is between William McGrew and Mrs. Dell Wakefield, formerly Mrs. Nicholson, and Miss Billie La Clair. The plaintiff seeks to recover money he alleges he loaned to defendants when they opened the Bungalow Hotel at Hyder in Sept. 1919. McGrew claims that upon making request for the sum due Mrs. Wakefield not only advised him but persistently demanded him to "go to hell."

OLD VESSEL BEING TOWED TO ALASKA

U.S.S. Boxer Going from Newport News to Juneau and Will Be Used There as Store Ship

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 22.—One of the longest towing tasks ever undertaken by the government is being carried on by the navy and coast guard. The U.S.S. Boxer, an old training ship turned over to the interior department, as a store ship, is being towed from Newport News to Alaska. The ship arrived in Eniwaka, Calif., last week in tow of the coast guard tug Tamaroa of Los Angeles.

Most of the towing is being done by coast guard vessels, but through the canal and as far up the Pacific Coast as San Diego, a navy steamer did the work.

At San Diego the Boxer was taken by the Tamaroa, which was scheduled to turn her over to the tug Saganee at San Francisco. But the Saganee had gone to San Luis Obispo on other work, so the Tamaroa had to take the Boxer up to Eniwaka. There another government tug will take her to the next coast guard station and so on up to Alaska.

SPEECH OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR IN CLOSING SESSION

Appreciative Remarks of Valuable Legislation Put Through by Provincial Government

VICTORIA, Dec. 20. — Chief Justice Macdonald, provincial administrator, in closing the session of the legislature last week, made several appreciative remarks of the work that had been done.

The speech was as follows: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly.

"In relieving you from your legislative duties, it is with pleasure that I express my appreciation of the earnestness with which you have applied yourselves to the important questions submitted for your consideration.

"I note with gratification the humanitarian aim of measures to provide for the maintenance of the children of unmarried parents, and for the support of needy parents by their children.

Workmens Compensation
 "The amendment to the Workmens Compensation Act will enlarge its scope and increase its benefits.

"The act to ratify an agreement with the Dominion Government for the examination of the iron-ore deposits of the province marks an important step in the investigation of our iron resources.

"The consolidation and revision of the Public Schools Act places in convenient form the legislation relating to public education.

"The amendments to the Forest Act will provide additional safeguards against forest fires.

"The laws relating to taxation have been consolidated.

Electrical Inspection
 "The Electrical Inspection Act will make for greater safety in the uses of electricity.

"The Conditional Sales Act is intended to define the rights of persons interested in goods subject to conditional sale agreements.

"The Godling Moth Control Act should prove of great assistance in combating a menace to one of the great industries of the province.

"The Act to provide for the establishment of a provincial home for incurables promises amelioration of the lot of the permanently afflicted.

"In conformity with legislation in other parts of the Empire, the Jury Act has been amended to qualify women for jury service.

Advantage to People
 "These, and other Acts passed at this session, will, I am sure, prove of advantage to the people of British Columbia.

"I thank you for the supplies granted for the administration of public affairs, and in taking leave of you I express the hope that your efforts during the session now closed will be followed with the fullest measure of success and result in the continued progress and prosperity of the province."

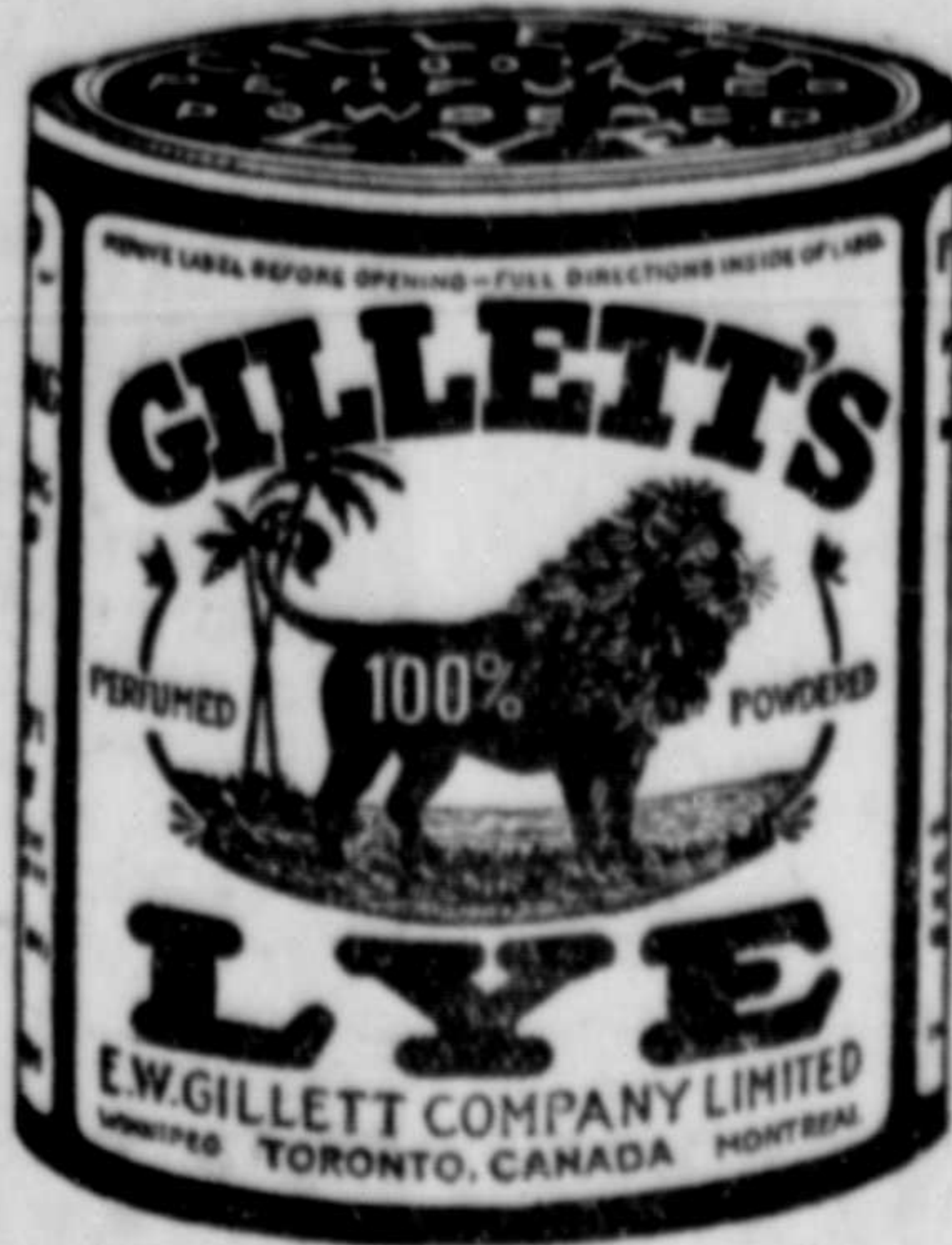
