Big Military Operations In Ireland

EXPORT LUMBER CONDITIONS IN DISTRICT ARE NOW IMPROVING

Michael Collins Commands Irish Free State Forces Military Operations Soon

LONDON, July 13.—The provisional Irish Free State Government's decision to concentrate its energies on overcoming the republicans and establishing order throughout the country before summoning the new parliament is taken to indicate that military operations on a large scale are impending.

The republicans, since their defeat in Dublin, have strengthened their position in the southwest and are now prepared to put up a big fight. Michael Collins has been appointed commander-in-chief of the Government forces.

Premier King Proposes Revival of Treaty with States Regarding Defence

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Premier Mackenzie King and Hon. George Graham representing Canada proposed to Secretary Hughes of the United States in conference yesterday that the Rush-Bagot treaty of 100 years ago be revised into a permanent treaty conforming with the provisions of the Washington disarmament conference.

It was intimated that several other subjects, including the Pacific Coast fisheries, will be discussed between the statesmen.

The Rush-Bagot treaty was negotiated in 1818 by Richard Rush at that time minister to Great Britain. He worked in collaboration with Albert Gallatin. It settled the boundary between Canada and the United States following the war of 1812 and dealt with other matters in dispute between the two countries, including the defences. Rush was before that attorney general under President Madison.

MEN NEEDED FOR HARVEST

Twice as Many Required From East This Year as Went Last

MONTREAL, July 13.—The demand of the western harvest fields this year exceed that of other years. Last year the number of men going from the east was 30,000. This year in all probability according to the official, the C.P.R. requirements in the west would be about 60,000. The first harvest trains leave about August 11 or 12.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND UNEMPLOYMENT

Sum of \$1,300,000 Spent Last Winter for Purpose by Dominion.

OTTAWA, July 13.—The liabilities of the Federal Government in regard to unemployment relief during last winter are estimated at approximately \$1,300,000, half of which was direct relief and the other half the federal share of the excess of public work undertaken by local authorities.

POSTPONE MEETING IRISH PARLIAMENT FOR A FEW WEEKS

DUBLIN, July 13.—The provisional Government has decided on the postponement of at least two weeks of the meeting of the new parliament owing to the unsettled condition and the interrupted transportation.

BISHOP OPENS A NEW CHURCH

Memorial Edifice to Soldiers Who Fell During Great War.

BUILT AT ENDAKO

Was Gift of People of Lisburn Ireland—Women Gave Vessels

The first and so far the only church building in Endako, was opened by Archbishop DuVernet, assisted by Rev. William Sweetnam, the clergyman in charge on Sunday morning when there were baptismal, confirmation, and communion services, and on Sunday evening a special dedicatory service attended by nearly all the people of the place irrespective of denominational differences.

The Bishop explained that the building was to be known as the Lisnagarvey Memorial Church for it was through the generosity of friends belonging to the Cathedral, and the Parish Church of Lisburn, Ireland, that it had been erected as a memorial to the soldiers who fell in the Great War. Lisnagarvey was the old name for Lisburn.

Mothers of Lisburn.
In addition to the gift of the church a baptismal bowl and ewer made out of shells from the battle field had been given by the mothers of Lisburn who had lost sons. The communion vessels and the Irish linen were also memorial gifts from Lisburn parishioners.

While Endako is a Divisional Point on the Canadian National Railway and must always have a nucleus of people, it has not grown much since it was founded. For eight years Rev. Mr. Sweetnam, who is an Irishman from County Cork, has been the only resident minister of any Church.

BUILDING COMMISSION HAS BEEN APPROVED

Board Will Now Deal With All Building Matters in City—Board of Works Report Adopted.

The report of the Board of Works recommending the appointment of a building commission was adopted by the city council last night. The following will be the members of the commission: City Engineer, Fire Chief, Medical Health Officer and Ald. McLeod and Ald. Collart. It shall be the duty of the commission to sit once a week. All building applications will go before it before permits are granted and it will act as an advisory board to the building inspector and the city council. All matters affecting building in the city will come under its jurisdiction.

In connection with the same report it was recommended that the building inspector and the wire inspector be appointed assistant fire marshals and that no buildings in future be allowed built within the fire limits unless of slow burning materials. These recommendations were also adopted.

ROOF OF MOSQUE FELL; KILLED 14

CAIRO, July 13.—Fourteen persons were killed and 20 seriously injured through the falling of a roof of the Abu Elcla Mosque during a religious celebration.

FINED FOR BURNING.

BARKERVILLE, B. C., July 13.—H. Rivers was fined \$40 and costs here yesterday for burning without a permit in contravention of the forest act.

BANK OF ENGLAND THREE PER CENT RATE ESTABLISHED

LONDON, July 13.—The Bank of England today lowered the discount rate to three per cent, a reduction of one half per cent from the figure established on June 15. There has been a steady decline in the rate which is back to normal now.

FOUR B.C. MEN ON COMMISSION

Fred Stork One of Members to Inquire Into Fisheries of B. C.

BOATS ON THE SKEENA.

Proposal to Prohibit Export of Fresh Fish to U. S. Canneries.

OTTAWA, July 13.—A committee of seven parliamentarians have been appointed a Royal Commission to inquire into the fisheries conditions in British Columbia headed by William Duff of Lunenburg, chairman. Four of the seven are British Columbians, they being Fred Stork, of Prince Rupert, H. H. Stevens of Vancouver, A. W. Neill of Comox and G. H. Dickie of Nanaimo, one Liberal, one Progressive and two Conservatives. The committee will report to the minister of marine and fisheries the result of the hearings which will be open to all witnesses interested.

Two points to be inquired into particularly are whether export should be permitted for purposes other than supplying fresh fish markets with fish other than sockeye and whether motor boats should be permitted in salmon drift net fishing of the Fraser River district will be investigated.

FISH ARRIVALS

Alaska, 70,000 pounds, to the Pacific Fisheries at 10.1c and 4c. Augusta, 14,000 pounds, and Toadie, 15,000 pounds, sold to the Booth Fisheries Canadian Co. at 10.9c and 4c.

DEADLOCK AT HAGUE BUT NOT BREAKDOWN SAYS LLOYD GEORGE

LONDON, July 13.—Premier Lloyd George told the House of Commons this afternoon he was afraid a deadlock had occurred at the Hague but he had no information that there had been a breakdown of the conference in regard to Russian affairs.

The barge Belingham, belonging to the Sunny Park Packing Co., is expected from Ketchikan today to go into the dry dock for cleaning, painting and overhaul.

B.C. PILOTS MAY UNITE EFFORTS

Movement Afoot For New Organization to Join Forces With Association.

VICTORIA, July 13.—An effort is being made to absorb in the older association the recently formed Vancouver Pilots, Ltd., headed by Capt. Barney Johnson and with Capt. Robertson as his close associate. As a matter of fact the new organization has been running the older one close for business of southern British Columbia with the result that the B. C. Pilotage Association is beginning to feel the pinch.

The new organization has not been cutting rates but has simply been hot after the business and they have been getting a large amount of it. The result has been beneficial to the shipping interests generally.

Conferences are being held with a view to an amalgamation of interests although it is stated that the new organization is not anxious to join interests with the other. However the way has been opened for union by Capt. George Roberts leaving the B. C. Pilotage Association and taking over the pilotage of the Canadian Pacific Steamships on a salary. This has weakened the old association and has made a vacancy in the ranks which could be filled by uniting the two organizations.

FISHERMAN DIED HERE LAST NIGHT

Carl Alverstad, Who Fell Off Wharf Saturday Night, Expired in General Hospital.

Carl Alverstad, the fisherman who fell off the Government wharf on Saturday night, expired in the General Hospital last night suffering from pneumonia and complications. He was 37 years of age, was a native of Norway and resided at Petersburg, Alaska.

McIntosh, Vancouver, and Walter Black, of Mill Bay, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Black, Cortez Island, Ven. Archdeacon G. A. Rix officiating. The couple were attended by Mrs. D. D. McIntosh, the bride's mother, Mrs. P. J. Ryan of this city and William Adamson, of Port Edward.

Tomorrow Mr. and Mrs. Black will sail on the Venture for Mill Bay where they will reside for the summer, Mr. Black being accountant for the Northern B. C. Fisheries there. Mrs. Black was a resident of Vancouver although she has visited in this city before.

Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Kwapi, and son, leave tonight on the steamer Prince George for Wenatchee, Washington, where Mr. Kwapi has taken an interest in the Calacum Lumber and Box company. Mr. Kwapi was identified with F. G. Dawson Ltd., for some eleven years. He and Mrs. Kwapi will be missed by a large circle of friends.

Lumber Prices Advance for Foreign Market but Local Demand not Good

Prices on the foreign market for lumber have advanced 20 per cent in the past year, the prairie trade is looking better and prices have advanced some \$4.00 a thousand in the past two months but the local demand is poor and the prices are very low. That is the report made by mill operators of the district on market conditions for lumber at the present time.

Supplying of lumber for local business is the poorest proposition the mills have just now. The low price of \$23 and \$24 is prevailing for shiplap and dimension lumber. Rather than advance, the tendency of the local market has been to drop in price. A quiet season as far as local business is concerned is looked for.

There has been a very fair spring trade with the canneries but that is practically all over now with the exception of a few odds and ends that may be required from now. All building for the season in the canneries was practically completed before the salmon season opened last month.

With Prairies.
Better business with the prairies for common lumber is expected. The price is steadily advancing and the increase in business during the past year has been noticeable.

The prices for clear rough spruce stock to the Old Country, in random widths and thickness, have advanced considerably from last year. The price for the foreign market is about 20 per cent higher than last year and from \$45 to \$60 f.o.b. at point of shipment is being received.

AMENDMENT MADE POWER AGREEMENT CITY AND SHIPYARD

A clause has been inserted in the proposed power agreement between the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Co. Ltd. and the city of Prince Rupert providing that the charge of \$50 every time the pontoons at the dry dock are raised will not be allowed to run the total charge to an excessive figure or over what the company would be required to pay on a maximum demand basis.

J. H. Pillsbury, manager of the plant, met the city council yesterday afternoon asking that such provision was made. Superintendent Duncan assented to it and the council, after discussion decided to comply with the request. Provision has been made in the agreement that the company must notify the city when it proposes to use the extra amount of power required for the raising of the pontoons.

FAIR PRIZE LIST FOR 1922 IS JUST PUT OUT

Meeting Last Night Names Committee to Look After Rock Drilling Contest — Fire Protection Provided

A special committee consisting of Jack Venables, Ald. G. W. Kerr and one other member not yet named was delegated by the Fair Board at its meeting last night to take care of the rock drilling contest which is to be held in connection with the exhibition.

The matter of fire protection at the Agricultural Hall was also taken up and it was decided, on recommendation of Fire Chief McDonald, that four fire extinguishers be placed in the building.

The 1922 prize list has just been finished by the printers and was released this morning. It contains 72 pages of reports, programs, rules and regulations, prize awards and advertisements and the alterations decided upon for the year are embodied in it.

CHILDREN WERE BLOWN TO BITS

Dud Shell Exploded When Used to Keep door open.

WATERTOWN, N. J., July 13.—Edward Workman picked up an unexploded seventy-five millimetre shell at a military target practice grounds, recently and used it as a weight to regulate the closing of the back door. Yesterday it suddenly exploded and blew eight children to bits. The kids were playing in Workman's back yard when the explosion took place and after it was over bits of their clothing fluttered from the tree tops and fragments of flesh were found on the barn roof.

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DEVELOPING COAL ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE'S SKIDEGATE INLET

Work is proceeding on the State Chuch property at Skidegate Inlet, some twelve men being employed there. The property was recently staked by W. G. Morris, who is in charge of operations with a view to developing a shipping coal mine at that place.

Some work was done on the property thirty or forty years ago and coal was taken out but not in large quantities.

TRAIN WRECK.

KANSAS CITY, July 13.—Five persons were killed and forty injured in a train wreck near here.

German Firms Offer Goods On This Coast.

Last night the Daily News received an offer from a German firm at Essen to supply newsprint on which to produce this paper. While we do not propose to do business with Germany just now, the suggestion is interesting, especially in view of the knowledge that manufacturers in other lines are also pushing their goods on this coast. A regular campaign of selling is going on and before long the Germans will have again secured much of the business which was theirs before the war.

There is no objection to doing business with Germany for those who are inclined to do so. While some of us are sentimental, others are not. If Germany is to pay her debts she must do business. Still many of those who went overseas or who sent sons to the war will regret to see the former enemy getting the business away from our own people.

Vancouver Newspaper Discusses Rupert's Prospects.

Says the Vancouver World of recent date: "Great traffic from the North Pacific fisheries will always move through Prince Rupert; but this will be the smallest part of the commerce of the city once the Canadian National Railway builds some branch lines for the development of the interior country, which will find the shortest haul to tidewater via Prince Rupert."

"Location and construction of a branch line from the Canadian National to the northward so as to pass through the agricultural lands in the valley of the Naas river, and then on into the Groundhog Valley, with its immense coal deposits, would induce large agricultural and mineral developments, would bring a large and well-paid population into these two valleys, and bring a great increase of commerce to Prince Rupert. No great expense would be involved in a careful system of survey so as to ensure location of the branch line along the line of greater development and maximum traffic."

"Further east a comparatively short railway mileage would ensure development of the wonderfully fertile Francois Lake and Ootsa Lake districts. There is a large area of rich, arable land around these two lakes, equal in point of fertility to any of the choice areas in the valley of the Sacramento or the San Joaquin in California."

"The large capital expenditure on the Canadian National from the eastern boundary of British Columbia to Prince Rupert can be placed on a basis of substantial earning power by the construction of the two branches indicated."

"The benefit of adding this great volume of non-competitive business to the assets of the Canadian National will not be local but, on the contrary, of direct benefit to the whole of Canada. Bringing a large and prosperous population into these Northern Valleys will make of Prince Rupert a great city and will assist in making the Canadian National a profit-earning railway system. At small initial cost large and permanent national benefit can be obtained."

Liquor Business Is Increasing.

The liquor business of the province is increasing and at the same time the bootlegger is doing a good business. This is not altogether in the best interests of the country. The aim of the liquor department of the provincial government is not to boost sales but to fill a reasonable demand. Profits will come, of course, but they should not be sought by trying to push the sales.

Of the bootlegger there is nothing new to say. He is running grave risks and if the attorney general is sincere in his statements, and we believe he is, there will be some of the bootleggers on the carpet before long. Liquor selling benefits no one, not even the one who sells it. It is degrading all round. While the people are not at present in the humor to turn again to prohibition, it will take only an orgy of heavy drinking to make them sweep the whole business from the country.

Reasonable Way To Settle Difficulties.

Premier Mackenzie King is taking the reasonable method of settling the difficulties outstanding between the United States and Canada. Tariff reprisals help nobody but they do injure the trade between the two countries and they foster suspicion and ill feeling. Between close neighbors this should not happen. There should be co-operation between the two nations and if Mr. King can bring that about he will earn the gratitude of the people of both countries.

WARNS AGAINST FISH DEPLETION

J. T. C. Williams, Former Inspector, Fears For Future of Industry

After twenty-seven years' service, J. T. C. Williams, inspector of Northern British Columbia fisheries, has, at his own request, been superannuated, says the Vancouver Province.

From Cape Caution to Portland Canal, the extent of territory under his jurisdiction, there was no more popular government official than Mr. Williams. He enjoyed the respect of the department and the confidence of both canners and fishermen.

District No. 2, of which he was the head, embraces the prolific salmon fisheries of Skeena River, the Naas River, Rivers Inlet and Bella Coola. It also includes the halibut fisheries visited by both Canadian and American trawlers.

Mr. Williams is a pioneer of Vancouver and Prince Rupert, and has watched the latter city grow from a few tents on a heavily timbered slope to an important centre, whose principal activities are its fisheries. Previous to the founding of Prince Rupert he was stationed at Port Essington, then the headquarters of the northern fisheries trade.

Favors Boat Rating

During his regime, Mr. Williams' principal energies have been devoted to combating the depletion of the salmon fisheries. Twelve years ago a commission was appointed, upon his recommendation, to curtail and regulate salmon fishing in the North. He was chosen one of the commissioners, the other being John P. Babcock. The commission came to be known as the Williams-Babcock Rating Commission on account of its findings, limiting the number of fish boats for the canneries.

"If this boat rating had continued it would have afforded adequate protection to the salmon fisheries," states Mr. Williams, "but unfortunately, through political or other influence, during the past four years the fisheries have been thrown open and excessive fishing has resulted. Previously the fall fish were not being depleted and the run of cohoes, chums and pinks was satisfactory. The sockeye catch only showed a falling off, and no alarm was felt for the salmon fisheries generally throughout the district. Since, however, the salmon fisheries have been thrown wide open there has been a noticeable decrease in the run of not only sockeye but other varieties."

Decrease in Run

In the opinion of the former inspector, it is a matter of a short time when the valuable halibut fisheries will be depleted beyond recovery. Mr. Williams explained the situation, familiar to all experienced halibut fishermen. The halibut is a slow-growing fish and during the past fifteen years the catches have decreased not only in amount but in the size of fish caught. These factors, in his opinion, are both strong indications of depletion. Today the halibut trawlers have to go further and further afield. Before satisfactory catches can be obtained they must steam 400 to 500 miles north of the Skeena River. No protection is afforded the halibut and they are slowly but surely being exterminated.

Canada and the United States have been unable to reach an international solution of the problem.

Discussing hatcheries, Mr. Williams states that while they have to a limited extent proved successful, as far as the sockeye are concerned, he is of the opinion they have not achieved their purpose of increasing the supply of that variety. The system of retaining the young fry in ponds is an improvement upon hatcheries, he says, and the difficulties to be overcome are the expense and comparatively small number of fry which can be handled. The retaining pond method would not be possible in the North because the fry would have to be liberated before they were sufficiently grown, owing to the ponds freezing over in the early winter.

Issues Warning

"Having supervised the salmon and halibut fisheries of Northern British Columbia for the past twenty-seven years, I would warn those interested that these fisheries, the most valuable in the

world, are being depleted to an alarming extent," states Mr. Williams. "Fishing operations should be curtailed, I particularly refer to the necessity of limiting salmon, gill-net and seine licenses. Otherwise, like the Fraser River, it will be too late."

Mr. Williams will be recalled by the city's old-timers as a member of the firm of Williams Brothers, land surveyors and real estate agents. He came to Vancouver in 1887 and two years later entered into a partnership with the late Sidney Williams.

In his younger days Mr. Williams excelled at sports and in 1888 won the lawn tennis championship of British Columbia. For several years he was one of the mainstays of the Vancouver Cricket Club's team. He joined the Dominion Fisheries department in 1894 and ten years later was appointed inspector of the northern district.

BEAR STORIES FROM INTERIOR

The youngster was whimpering from the pain and the forester took pity on it and lashed it to his speeder.

The patrolman started on his journey only to discover that the mother bear had appeared and was in hot pursuit. As the track ran uphill at this point, the bear, making long strides, gained steadily and the need for strategy was clearly indicated. The forestry book of instructions does not cover a situation such as this, but the ranger was resourceful and decided that the best plan would be to throw the cub off the car. His attempts to untie the knots on the lashings which secured the youngster to the machine, however, proved futile.

Pursuer and pursued came to a yet steeper grade, with the advantage all with the former. Finally, with one mighty effort the old bear threw herself on the back of the speeder, holding on by her claws and paws.

Resigns in Favor.

This is where the forester decided to resign in favor of the enemy. He dove off the car, and regained his feet in time to see it continuing its journey eastward, with a mother and child happily reunited as its passengers.

Later the speeder was found, run down and everything intact except the side of the seat where the cub had been tied, the old bear having torn it out to release her offspring.

GOLDSKEISH MINE IS AGAIN OPERATED

H. Heiman is in Charge of Work at Property Three Miles From Anyox.

The Golkskeish mine, situated at Deep Bay, about three miles from Anyox, has again resumed operations after a close down of some months, says the Alice Arm Herald. H. Heiman is again in charge of operations, having arrived from Vancouver two weeks ago.

A new cylinder for the semi-diesel oil engine and a new hoist is being installed. It is the intention of the company to concentrate on development work this summer, with a view of proving up ore bodies and later, shipments will be made to Anyox smelter as was done in the past.

The majority of the stock of the Golkskeish Mines, Ltd., is held in Vancouver. The financial position of the company is in first-class condition. All the equipment at the mine has been paid for from ore shipments, and the development work being done this year should prove a valuable asset to the company.

WOMEN CHAMPION CAUSE OF FLAPPERS AND BOBBED HAIR

CALGARY, July 13.—After being ridiculed, laughed at, talked about and generally made fun of, Canadian flappers will be

glad to know that at least they have some sympathizers who are not against the bobbing of hair.

It is declared to be a strictly personal matter by the local Council of Women and the Calgary flappers have a strong champion in the Council. They have been advised to go ahead and bob it regardless of what the newspapers or the men have to say about it, and if they lose their jobs because of the length of their hair, the Local Council will stand behind them in their protests.

Men, it was most emphatically declared, have no right to dictate to women how they shall wear their hair. "I wonder what would happen if we started in telling the men how they should do their hair," was asked by several speakers at a recent meeting.

The decision to champion the cause of the flappers followed a rumor that Calgary employers were discharging girls because of their abbreviated tresses.

WELSH CHURCHES EMPTY TODAY AS MINISTERS LEAVE

LONDON, July 13.—Hundreds of Welsh Nonconformist churches are at present without pastors, and the Welsh pulpit is losing its best men. The preachers are migrating to English churches, where there are better salaries and more amenities, both being strong inducements.

The Congregationalists, for example, have approximately 250 pastorless churches, and other denominations are similarly placed. A remarkable feature of the situation is that, while there are so many "vacant" churches, there is only a small number of ministerial students at the Welsh colleges, and for those who are there completing their training, fewer "calls" than ever are forthcoming.

Synchronizing with the departure of some of the most powerful of the pulpites for England is an exodus of ministers from the areas of South Wales to the agricultural counties. This is apparently due to the low wages prevailing in the coalfields, which make it impossible for churches to guarantee permanent and adequate salaries to ministers. It is also due, to some extent, to the general unrest there.

PROFESSOR SAYS HE WILL SEEK REDRESS FOR HIS DISMISSAL

WINNIPEG, July 12.—Prof. W. G. Smith, of the philosophy and sociology department of Wesley College, whose dismissal was announced officially by James H. Ashdown, chairman of the college board, will seek redress from the highest courts of the Methodist Church, and failing there, will carry his case to the civil courts of Canada, he declared.

He will charge the Wesley board with breach of a five-year contract, which he claims to have obtained from it last fall. He has served one year of this term. The board does not recognize the existence of any contract between itself and Prof. Smith, and has "let the professor out," Mr. Ashdown declared.

Insultation is the cause of the professor's dismissal, according to the board's announcement. It condemns his attitude at the recent Methodist conference, when, following Principal J. H. Riddell's report, he attacked the atmosphere of the college, and the practicability of the administration. Prof. Smith and Principal Riddell also have been at loggerheads several times during the term, it was said.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and second-class to be \$10 an acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be allowed to obtain a pre-emption certificate of intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$20 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$1000 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained by settlers on pre-emptorial and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial site on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions of payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Relate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving within the limits of the Act. The one within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by settlers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of monies accrued due and been paid since August 6, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces or those who acquired direct or indirect benefit from an investment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1922.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1915, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
