VALUE OF SALMON LIVER IS PROVEN

TIMBER NEGOTIATIONS IN GREAT BRITAIN COLLAPSED

Delegation From This Province Fails In Its Efforts in Old Land

Has Found It Impossible For British Columbia to Compete With Low Prices Set For Softwoods By Producers of Northern Europe

LONDON, Nov. 30.—The delegation representing British Columbia timber interests, which had sought an increased market in the United Kingdom for British Columbia softwoods, announced yesterday that its negotiations had broken down. In a statement, the delegation said that, while some progress had been made in the way of extending sales, competition from timber producers of Northern Europe had set such a low level for prices in Great Britain that, unless some change was made in existing conditions, it would be impossible to expect any material increase in shipments of British Columbia timber to this country.

APPROVAL FOR NOTE

British Cabinet Agrees on War Debt Reply and Premier Confers With King

France's Stand

Premier Herriot May Call For Vote of Confidence on His Cabinet's Policy

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Final approval was given by the British cabinet last night to Great Britain's note in reply to United States demand for payment of \$95,000,000 war debts when they become due on December 15. Following the cabinet meeting, Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald conferred with King George. It is expected the British note will be ready to send to Washington either today or tomorrow.

The note is understood to again urge the United States to postpone the payments in the interests of world economic stability.

French Views

PARIS, Nov. 30.—A number of members of the French Chamber of Deputies yesterday expressed the belief that it was impossible for European nations to make payments on war debts due to the United States next month owing to the fact that the question of war debts is linked up with that of disarmament which is yet to be settled.

Premier Eduard Herriot is endeavoring to stave off debate in the Chamber at this time on the question of war debts and it was believed possible last night that he might seek a vote of confidence on Thursday in which case his cabinet would stand or fall on the policies it has adopted on the debt issue. The confidence vote would be on a government motion to adjourn the Chamber, the cabinet falling if the Chamber refused to adopt the motion.

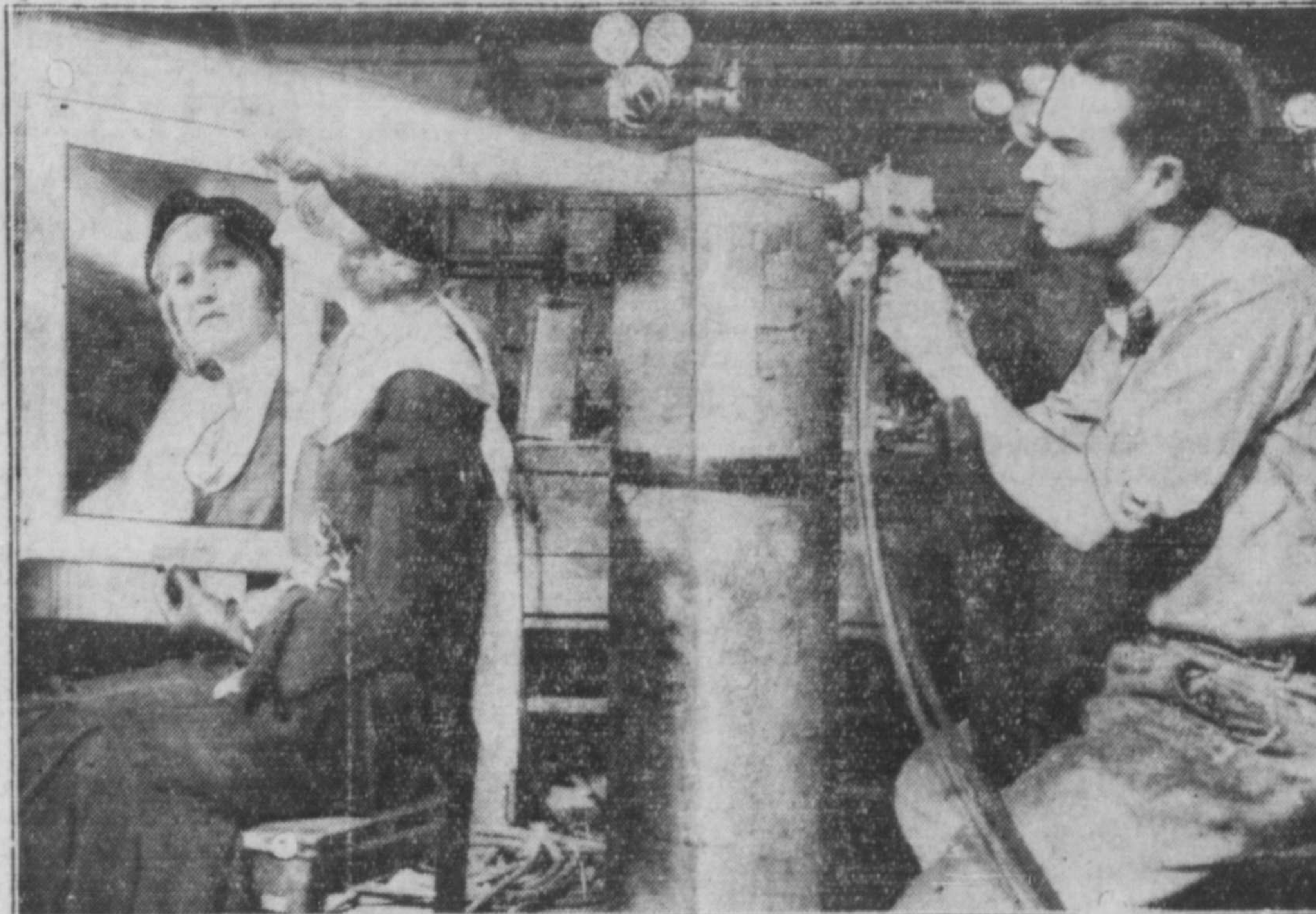
Hoover Meets Cabinet

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 30.—President Hoover conferred again with the cabinet yesterday on the war debt situation. No announcement was made following the meeting.

Representative McFadden of Pennsylvania suggested yesterday that Great Britain might hand over the West Indies and Bermuda to United States in part payment of war debts.

BUTTE, Mon., Nov. 30.—A number of the larger stores of this city were closed yesterday as a result of refusal of clerks to go to work until a new agreement is signed by proprietors of the stores. The proprietors are determined that the working agreement with clerks shall be on a month to month basis. The clerks are equally insistent on an agreement which would be effective for a year.

Henry Ford to Leave Hospital Within 10 Days

DETROIT, Nov. 30.—Henry Ford was so much recovered yesterday from his recent operation for hernia and appendicitis that he was able to receive William Cameron, one of his executives, at the Henry Ford Hospital. Mr. Cummings stated that Mr. Ford expected to be able to leave the hospital in about ten days.

Seattle Wheat Market Is Weak

New Low Prices For This Time of Year Set in Yesterday's Grain Trading

SEATTLE, Nov. 30.—Wheat prices on the Seattle market descended to new low levels for this time of year yesterday. December delivery closed at 41c, May at 45½c and July at 46½c.

SIX BELOW AT DAWSON

DAWSON, Y.T., Nov. 30.—Six degrees below zero was recorded here yesterday, it being the coldest weather so far this winter. There was also a small fall of snow yesterday.

PRODUCING OF COPPER

Continued Curtailment is Advocated at Conference in New York

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—The large majority of copper producers represented at the World Copper Conference, which opened here yesterday, expressed themselves as being in favor of extension of the present agreement, expiring at the end of this year. In view of the low price situation, a further prolonged curtailment of production was urged.

Premier Bennett to Spend Christmas Season Abroad

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—Premier R. B. Bennett has postponed his departure on a trip to England for a few days. The Prime Minister is planning on spending Christmas in the Old Country. He had been scheduled to sail from Quebec this afternoon.

MISSING ON ATLANTIC

VANCOUVER, Nov. 30.—Word was received here Monday that Alexander Dollar, local seedsman, who left recently on a trip for the benefit of his health, was missing from a ship on which he was crossing the Atlantic Ocean to England.

SESSION TO OPEN LATE IN JANUARY

VICTORIA, Nov. 30.—Thirty days' notice will be given by the government to members of the Legislature in summoning them for the next session, Premier Tolmie intimated yesterday. The session will probably open the latter part of January.

NEW LAWS ON LIQUOR

Judicial Committee of United States House to Sit This Week to Consider Legislation

Bolts Foreseen

Splits in Both Parties Over Modification of Repeal Are Propheesied

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 30.—To consider prohibition repeal legislation which has been requested by the Democratic leadership, the judicial committee of the House of Representatives will sit on December 2, prior to the opening of the short session of Congress next Monday, it is announced. A resolution calling for flat repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment with ratification through the state legislatures was personally presented to the chairman of the committee on Monday by Speaker John N. Garner. Meantime, rumblings of a bolt in both parties on the question of repeal or modification are being heard. Many members are in favor of modification of the Volstead Act who will not countenance repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. Senator Norris, chairman of the judicial committee of the Senate, announces that he will support modification of the Volstead Act to legalize the sale of beer and light wines but that he is not in favor of repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment which would permit sale of liquor outright.

The Anti-Saloon League will meet here on December 9 for the purpose of launching a movement to combat any attempt at repeal or modification.

NORTHWEST VERY MILD

Unseasonably Warm Weather Recorded at Salt Lake City and Other Points

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Nov. 30.—Unseasonably mild weather is continuing in various parts of the northwest. The thermometer reached a maximum of 62 here yesterday after having recorded 65 on Monday, a record high temperature for this time of year. At Boise, Idaho, 66 was recorded yesterday, this being the balmiest weather on record for late November since 1872. Rapid City, North Dakota, set up an all time record yesterday of 74 above.

Further Details of Penny Workless Camp Trouble

More particulars have been received here of the recent outbreak at the unemployment relief camp at Penny, seventy-five miles east of Prince George, where the workless occupants were reported a few days ago to have taken possession.

The men, it appears, had asked for certain changes in rations and also for better sanitary conditions. A wordy battle followed and a personal encounter took place between the foreman and a member of the committee of three which withdrew, later to head a group of sixty unemployed which took possession of the camp.

Sergeant McKenzie, provincial police, Prince George, appointed another foreman and peace and order was soon restored to the camp. A health officer will be sent to Penny to look into the sanitary conditions.

Police Court Fines Are Low This Year

Police court fines in Prince Rupert during the month of November amounted to only \$35. Last year in November the same amount was taken in fines. So far this year fines have totalled \$2261 as compared with \$4865 in the same period of last year.

Fish Oils Now Thrown Away Are Very Potent In Treating Rickets

Tribute Paid to Work of Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station in Connection With Important Announcement From Washington, D.C.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 30.—As a result of research work which has been carried out over a considerable period of time, the discovery has been made that salmon oil is twice as potent as cod liver oil in fighting the childhood disease of rickets, it was announced today by the United States Children's Bureau. The salmon oils most valuable in the treating of rickets are those now discarded as waste by the canning industry.

CHINAMAN IS GUILTY

Yuen Suey Convicted on Charge of Assault and Will be Sentenced This Afternoon

Committed for trial by Magistrate McClymont in city police court yesterday afternoon, Yuen Suey, Chinese, who attacked a countryman, John Lien, with a sharpening steel in the kitchen of a downtown restaurant last week, appeared before Judge F. McB. Young in County Court yesterday afternoon and, electing for speedy trial, was found guilty on a charge of assault occasioning grievous bodily harm. Sentence was reserved until this afternoon.

W. E. Fisher prosecuted and T. W. Brown acted as counsel for the defence.

Five-Day Week and Six-Hour Day With No Reduction in Pay Urged Upon A. F. L. Convention

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 30.—Adoption of the five-day week and six-hour day with no reduction in wages was urged upon the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor here as a means of combatting unemployment.

RE-OPEN HEARING

Governor James Rolph Jr. is Asked to Review Tom Mooney Parole Application

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 30.—A petition signed by fifteen prominent Americans, including Fanny Hurst and Aaron Sapiro, has been presented to Governor James Rolph Jr. asking him to re-open the Tom Mooney parole case. It is claimed that all the evidence was not presented when the application for parole was dealt with by the governor several months ago.

Man Killed When Car Is Struck By Falling Fir Tree

TACOMA, Nov. 30.—Louis J. Larson was killed near Elbe, Wash., yesterday when the front of a car which he was driving was struck by a forty-foot fir tree which fell across the road. Alex McEachern, who was riding with Larson, sustained severe injuries. They were on their way to Tacoma.

Pound Sterling Strikes New Low

Sank to \$3.15½ in New York Yesterday—Canadian Dollar Closed at 84½c

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—The British pound sterling dropped to a new all-time low price on the local foreign exchange market yesterday when it sank to \$3.15½, closing at \$3.15½. The Canadian dollar closed at 84½c, a slight gain from the day previous.

BECOMING HUMAN

The government of Russia is gradually becoming humanized. It is adopting itself to conditions as it finds them in place of trying to make over the whole world. The action of the Soviet in arranging a treaty with France for mutual protection is a case in point. It is along the line of capitalistic diplomacy. Gradually, step by step, the republic is evolving or some regard it as devolving. At any rate it is changing rapidly to bring it more in line with its neighbors.

WAS HOWLED DOWN

Recently H. G. Wells addressed a communist group at Oxford University and, when he urged that instead of trying to force the issue they delay the inevitable as long as possible and study how to take care of the affairs of the country after the cataclysm, they howled him down.

Mr. Wells has been one of the most pronounced and prominent socialists in Britain. He has spent a lifetime as a propagandist for a change of system of government and incidentally in doing so, because of the intrinsic merit of his literary work, he has acquired some wealth. Possibly it was this that annoyed his hearers at Oxford. We are told that the controversy became so keen that furniture was thrown and the gathering broke up. There is something intensely capitalistic about this way of settling an argument. It is quite human.

A WORTHY CAUSE

It is doubtful if ever in the history of the country the Canadian people have been appealed to on the present scale to give of what they have for the needy. The long period of difficult times has reduced many people of all classes, from the professional to the laboring, to a state of want, and numerous organizations have sprung up all over the country to grapple with a situation that is unprecedented in its seriousness and acuteness. It will be impossible for all but a few to subscribe to all of the worthy objects that are calling for help but we believe that every citizen who has a little to spare will accept his responsibility and give what he can for the benefit of the less fortunate.

And at a time like this it is well for the average citizen to bear in mind this very important fact; tuberculosis causes poverty and poverty causes tuberculosis. The man who is stricken with the disease generally finds himself before very long dependent on other people; and the man whom misfortune has hit hard for any length of time may easily fall a prey to the tubercle bacillus.

The annual appeal to the public to buy Christmas seals has now been launched. The need for support of the serious work of fighting tuberculosis is greater than ever for assuredly that disease will be given an impetus by the difficult times the world is now going through and will still be a source of danger long years after the business depression has become an unpleasant memory.

Among the many worthy causes the public will be asked to support there is none more worthy than the tuberculosis Christmas seal sale.

**Rights and Privileges of Labor
In Corporative State Regulated;
Private Property and Initiative**

(By Victor Basso-Bert—Article 3)

The relation between labor and capital in the corporative state is regulated in a vast and elaborate enactment covering every phase of the process of production. The Magna Charta of Labor with its 30 declarations of policy regulates that delicate controversial matter. Here are some outstanding features:

"Declaration 6: Private initiative in the field of production is considered most efficacious and useful instrument in the interests of the nation. It is, therefore, connected with the concept of responsibility of the employers in the organization of enterprise face to face with the state, private organization being a function of national character.

"Declaration 7: It is, therefore, obligatory to promote in every way the increment and perfection of production and the reduction of costs. This is imposed on all the association of employers.

"Declaration 8: That in the case of proved insufficiency of initiative the state can, particularly when its political interests are at stake, substitute itself by way of intervention that assumes the form of encouragement or direct administration.

The labor organizations are framed along well known principles and are entirely free. (Declaration 2). Syndicate federations (Labor Unions), confederations and finally corporations form the base of the corporative state.

The abolition of the strike and lockout necessitates the institution of a magistracy of labor to regulate labor disputes.

In case of disputes and conflicts, labor and capital bring their case to court where the presiding judge has power to nominate an advisory board of specialists on the matter in dispute. The award of this court is final and enters as a base of agreement. Such agreements are made by trades, sometimes covering the whole nation.

Labor contracts, either entered into freely or by arbitration, are public and must be registered in court.

The subordination of all classes of producers to established society and state completes itself in the juridical equality of the parties—employer and employees. This is a categorical and invariable principle of the Fascistic state.

The gist of the corporative economy is the co-operation and collaboration of the classes, the subordination of selfish interests, of whatever nature they may be, to the supreme interests of the nation as a whole.

The insertion of the labor syndi-

cate in the state is one of the original realizations of Fascism. The law governing its function has elevated the syndicate to the dignity of a public institution, verified only in the Italian legislation. A comprehension of this fact can only be had by a direct study of the origin and practice of the Fascistic syndicate.

The Fascistic syndicate subordinates itself to society, so it recognizes the superiority of the whole over the part and is compensated by the privilege of legal recognition of only one syndicate for every class of labor, thus assumes legal status.

By insertion of the syndicates in the state with a legal definition of their functions and the definition of private initiative we gradually see the formation of the corporative state.

A law, which is a monument of wise and human legislation, regulates all functions between employers and employees. Jurisprudence has acquired a new field of operation. Corporative right is a new scientific element of teaching established in all Italian universities.

The corporations are regulated by the executive council. They meet singly or with all the other corporations to discuss vital interests concerning themselves or the interests of the nation—co-operation, customs, distribution and preservation of goods—education, technical or professional of the working class. For example the banking syndicates may suggest new financial legislation; all in an atmosphere of co-operation, aiming solely to the common good.

Private property is left intact but regulated to perform a social function. The state and the nation get the benefit of private initiative, private efforts, which are in keeping with human nature. In the meantime they allow an equitable compensation to the producer.

BRAN CORN BREAD WITH BACON
Two eggs (beaten slightly), ¼ cup sugar, ½ cup bran, 1 cup corn meal, 1 cup milk, ¾ cup flour, ¼ teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder, ¼ pound bacon (diced).
Combine eggs and sugar thoroughly; add all-bran, corn meal and milk. Sift dry ingredients together, add to first mixture and pour into greased baking dish (9x12 inches is a suitable size to use). Sprinkle bacon over top. Bake at 400 degrees F. for twenty minutes, then slip dish under broiler for about three minutes to brown the crust and to crisp the bacon.
Yield: 16 servings.
