New Leader
Farmer Party.

General A. D. McRae of Shaughnessy Heights, reputed multi-millionaire and former organizer for the Mackenzie and Mann companies, has been chosen tentative leader and presumably financier for the new farmer party, the executive of which was formally named at a meeting in Vernon. Mr. McRae is a clever man and an able organizer. He it was who organized the Canadian Collieries after it was purchased from James Dunsmuir for \$11,000,000 and loaded on to the British public for \$20,000,000. Another exploit was pouring water into the Pacific Whaling Company at Victoria so that a previously profitable concern went to the wall and the shareholders lost everything they put into it. There was also a big milling concern at the mouth of the Fraser River that was also reorganized by General McRae, then Mr. McRae, and it was not an unbounded success after it had been properly watered. These are not monuments to the McRae ability except as they affected the pockets of the organizer and his principals.

In the war the General is said to have carried out his organizing with excellent effect, this time to the discomfiture of the Boche. He has wonderful ability but this ability has not always been well directed. He is hardly the man that the people of British Columbia would trust with its affairs. The buying public trusted him once when he offered them watered stock and they lost everything. Who knows but the farmer stock is watered!

Nothing New In
Farmer Program.

There is no intention to knock this embryo party, but attention must be drawn to the fact that the program is just the same old one that has served both the Liberal and Conservative parties for years past. Look at it for a few moments. Their program makers seem to have sat around a table and said to themselves: Now let us look up a few vote getters. There is first the dissatisfied Peace River country. We can get their votes by promising them transportation. It is safe to talk reduction of freight rates because in the first place it is a railway commission matter and, in the second the battle has been well fought by John Oliver who is still on the job.

"A wise policy of colonization" is quite safe, because everyone thinks his own policy is the safe one. There is of course always to be a sop to returned men. No program would be complete without it. The G.W.V.A. has to be propitiated.

Publication of the names of contributors to campaign funds is not a new proposal. It has been made often and has passed through the fire of party conventions but so far has not reached the stage of legislation.

The independent audit plank has done duty since the audit was first invented. It is a political chestnut. So is the fair wage clause in public contracts.

Then of course there is the final shot, the climax of all good things the abolition of patronage and the doing away with the personal property tax. Surely we have heard of those things before! Parties have been built up on them, nurtured and brought to maturity and have passed beyond the divide with them on the lips of the leaders. That is the farmer program. That is the General McRae's. Those are the general orders issued from military headquarters and the people are ordered to bow down and worship them.

New Party If
Not New Program.

If the program is not new, the party is at any rate a new one. Unfortunately the telegraph did not bring us the full list of members of the executive or the reason for transferring the activities from Vancouver to Vernon. It looks very much like the old Joe Martin Progressive party or the other numerous parties of discontent which have arisen from time to time but which have never made any great mark in the political life of the country. Possibly the new party will also be like a meteor coming in contact with the air and dissolving as it mingled with oxygen.

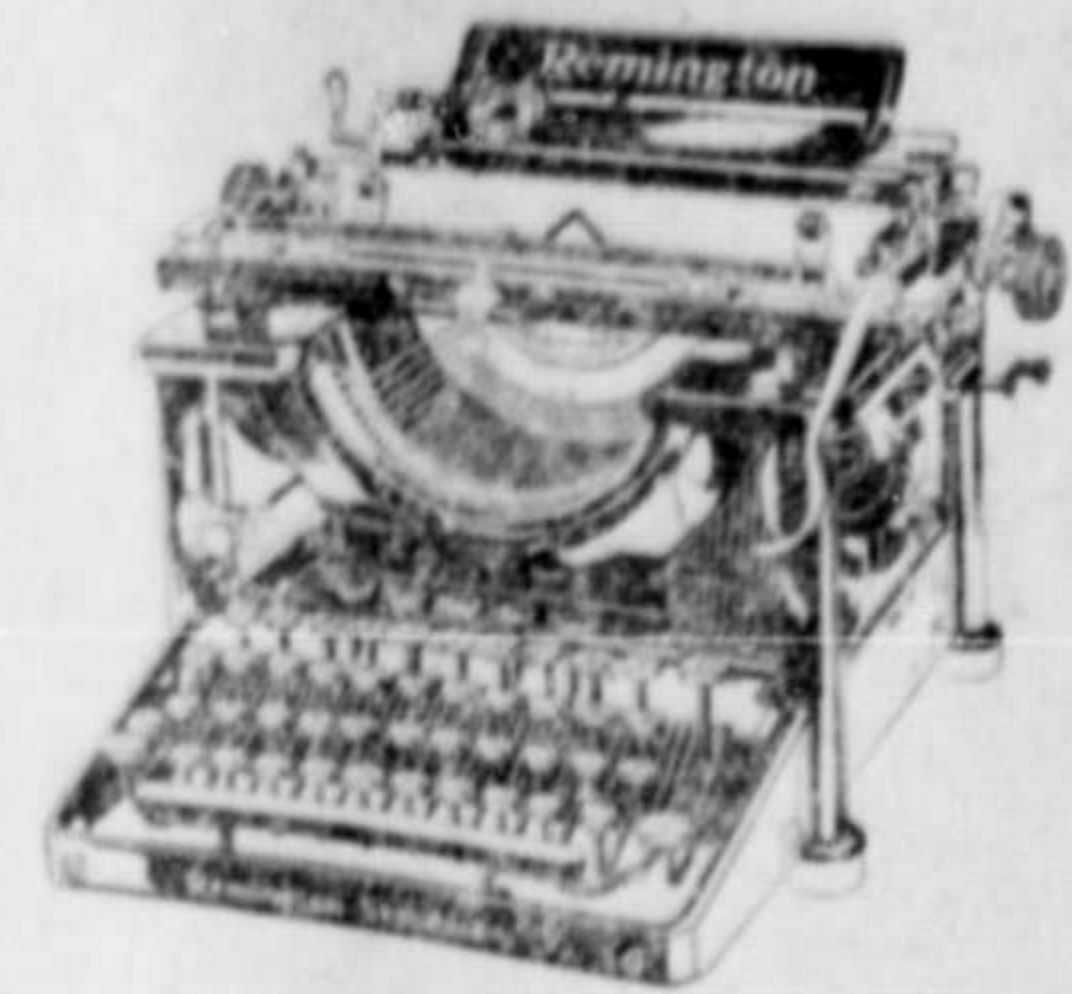

COLLIER CAESAR IS TO BE ORE CARRIER

Purchased by Coastwise Steamship Co. for B.C. Alaska Trade

SEATTLE, Jan. 16.—For operation in the Puget Sound-British Columbia-Alaska routes, James Griffiths and Sons have purchased the former naval collier Caesar from R. W. Crosby, head of the Crosby Marine Corporation, of Seattle. Mr. Crosby bought the vessel from the Navy Department December 19.

Capt. James Griffiths, head of the Coastwise Steamship Co., bought the Caesar for use in the ore-carrying trade. She is a built carrier, making her an ideal ship for that purpose. She also is equipped with a powerful towing machine, and will tow Griffiths barges in her voyages to and from British Columbia and Alaska. The towing machine was installed a number of years ago by the Navy Department at a cost of \$30,000, so that the Caesar could tow the huge naval drydock Dewey from the Atlantic coast to Manila, via the Panama Canal. The Caesar handled the tow, one of the greatest feats of the kind in maritime history, without trouble.

The Caesar was equipped with new boilers last year. She served for years as a naval collier on the Atlantic and the Pacific, continuing in operation until last July, when she was laid up at Mare Island. She is a carrier of 5,926 tons displacement, with a length of 322 feet, a beam of 44 feet and a draft of 28.9 feet.

RACIAL EQUALITY IS AIM OF JAPANESE

TOKIO, Jan. 12.—Japan will have her last opportunity of introducing the question of racial equality next year when her representatives meet with delegates of the United States to negotiate for renewal of the commercial treaty between the two countries which expires at that time.

That is the contention of Kotaro Mochizuki, member of the Japanese House of Representatives, who has been a leader in Japan's agitation for equal citizenship rights in foreign lands.

He declares Japanese diplomats made a great mistake in concentrating on the disarmament question at the Washington conference rather than discussing citizenship rights and racial equality.

When the trade agreement is renewed, he says, Japan should make a strong effort to secure for her nationals right of naturalization in the United States.

MOTOR FERRY KEEL LAID AT ESQUIMALT

Vessel is to Carry Autos Between Victoria and Bellingham for C.P.R.

VICTORIA, Jan. 16.—The keel of the new motor ferry being built at Yarrow for the C.P.R. has been completed and work will be rushed on the vessel so that she may be ready for service by the first of May. She will carry from 40 to 50 autos and 250 passengers and will ply between Bellingham and Sidney.

There are already two ferry boats plying between Anacortes and Sidney.

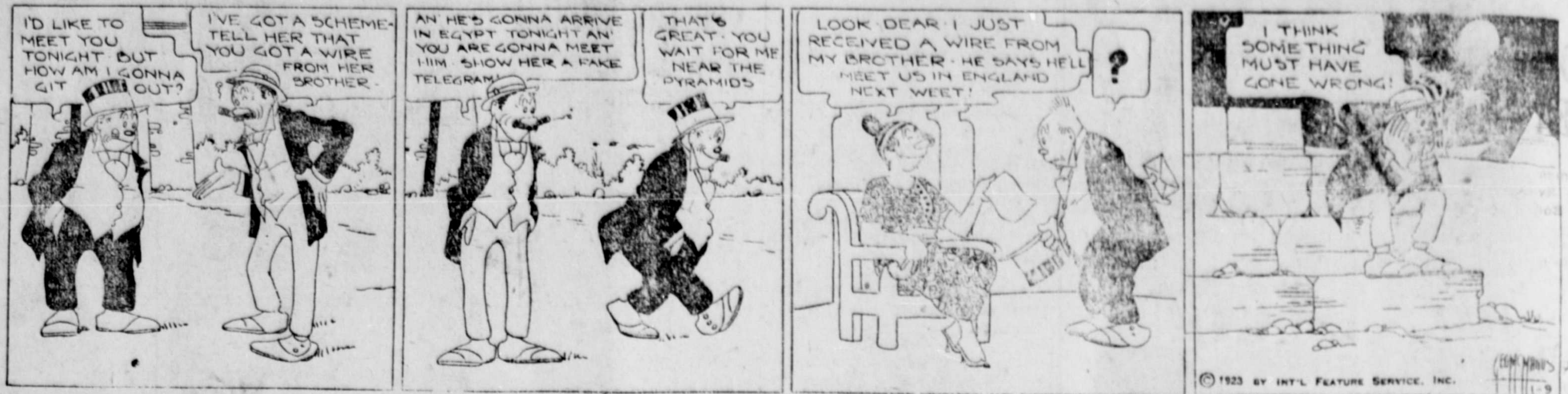

Valuable Photograph Discovered by George Cunningham and Taken to Victoria

STORY OF THE BEAVER

First Steamship to Ply Pacific Called at Skeena River Port

A tale high as romantic as that of the search for the treasure-filled tomb of King Tutankhamun in Egypt was unfolded here in the office of the Pacific Steamship Company, when Geo. Cunningham of Port Essington, B.C., walked in with a picture of the historic steamer Beaver under his arm, found after a search of forty years among the Indians of the north coast says the Victoria Times.

The picture, which appears to be a photograph of a water color, shows the Beaver in a mild gale on the West Coast in the year 1865, when the vessel was engaged in survey work for the Imperial Government. Shortly afterwards in course of a trip to the North, she stopped for a time at Port Essington, and during the actual exchange of compliments and gifts, the picture came ashore and into the possession of an Indian princess.

Sought as Boy

Mr. Cunningham, the son of a pioneer trader of the North, in his youth heard much of the princess' souvenir and eventually decided to secure it for himself. This, however, he found to be no easy matter. The Beaver had been regarded with veneration by the Indian tribes, and although the picture often changed individual Indian hands, it was retained tightly by them as a people. At one time, during his long search Mr. Cunningham went to the length of employing special agents to locate it, but with no success. It was only a few months ago that his long hunt was crowned with success, and the prized portrait was delivered into his possession.

During the past month it has been in the Provincial Museum here, while Mr. Cunningham has been in California. Yesterday he returned from the South, regained his treasure and walked in with it to his old friend W. M. Allan, of the Pacific Steamship Company, in whose window, at 911 Government Street, it will be displayed until Mr. Cunningham takes passage home for Port Essington on Monday.

Although it is a far cry from the old Beaver to the great liners of the Admiral Line and other companies of today, it is safe to say that when the latter have passed away and been forgotten the memory of the Beaver will be as green as it is at the present time. As is common knowledge, the Beaver was the first steamer that ever entered the waters of the Pacific. She was built in 1835 on the Thames by Green, Wigram & Green, and from the day that her keel was laid until she went down the English Channel and was lost to view on the trackless ocean she was watched with the greatest interest. Over 150,000 people, including King William and a large number of the nobility, witnessed the launching, and cheers from thousands of throats answered the farewell salute of her guns as she sailed away for a new world. But little was known of steam marine navigation at that time, and the far-off Pacific Northwest was even more of a mystery, consequently much speculation was indulged in as to the success of her cruise. The machinery was placed in position but the sidewheels were not at-

ached, so she was rigged as a barge and started for her destination under canvas, with Capt. David Home in command.

Visit to Crusoe

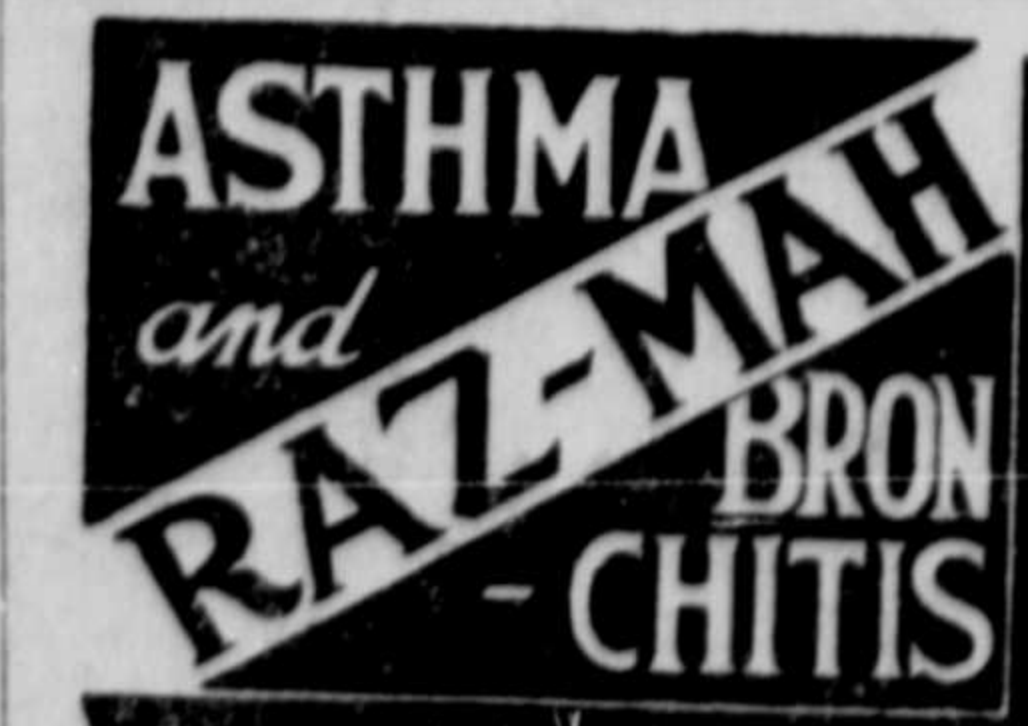
She sailed from the Thames August 29, 1835, escorted by the bark Columbia, and reached Robinson Crusoe's Island via Cape Horn on December 17, 1835, and Astoria, at the mouth of the Columbia River, on April 4, 1836. She came up to what is now the City of Victoria on March 14, 1843, to establish Fort Camosun. Her trading grounds up to 1859 were Puget Sound, the Fraser River and all the waters up to Sitka, Alaska. In that year the Beaver was relieved of the northern work by the Labouchere and later on by the Officer. She then spent several years in the survey service and finally in 1874, after 40 years of very useful service to the Hudson's Bay Company, was sold to George Riddell and John Stratford. In the same year her register was changed from London to Victoria. She was eventually wrecked in the First Narrows, Vancouver, on July 26, 1888, at the age of 53 years, having still her original engines in her. The boiler, however, was a new one, installed in 1856, while she also had new masts, cut in Wark's Canal and installed at Fort Simpson in 1857.

When first launched she carried 5 nine pounders and carried a crew of 26 men. Her dimensions were: length, 104.5 feet; width, inside middle boxes, 20 feet; outside, 33 feet; depth, 11 1/2 feet. The engines were built by Boulton & Watt, London, the first makers of steam engines, 35 nominal horsepower each. The total weight of the machinery was 63 1/2 tons.

FIRST SESSION OF GOVERNMENT GREAT BRITAIN

London Times Gives Short Summary Sympathetic to Bonar Law

Bonar Law's comment on his nomination on the morning of the opening of the new parliament was characteristic. "I don't think it is a bad government," he said, and he went on to say in the first-class lobby of his hotel, "I am a loyalist of his colleagues, and I am glad to see the new methods of doing public business have been introduced to promote efficiency, which will bear fruit in the coming trade revival." The same Minister modestly underlined the position which the new government has won for itself in public opinion. The first session, which opened swiftly upon the election, was not likely to be a "one" day. Though faced by a new opposition new to its responsibilities, and including in its ranks extremists of advanced views, and by Lloyd George's maneuver at losing its dominant position, Bonar Law and his colleagues have fully justified the country's choice.

Bonar Law's Success
The Premier, in foreign and domestic politics alike, has shown that he cannot be stampeded. When parliament met, a group of politically organized agitators were demonstrating in the first flag. Bonar Law has made his decision that the government must deal with the issue for labor, though a strike might have resulted. In face of the fact that the labor extremists were promoted by the labor extremists in parliament at the end of the session, he maintained the same calm. He has shown that practical measures for the relief of distress were being worked out. His departure at the London conference and his support of Lord Curzon at Lausanne have demonstrated the soundness of his policy. The new parliament



has found that his word is to be trusted implicitly. The atmosphere of intrigue has been banished. Parties and members know where they stand.

The Opposition
Lloyd George's groups in both Houses of Parliament have suffered a severe rebuff through the amazing mistake over the Gounarits correspondence. It was not merely that ex-ministers proclaimed that they had never received important documents which they had put away unread, but that they showed a willingness to attack the former colleague, Lord Curzon, at a critical moment instead of waiting until the end of the Lausanne Conference. The National Liberal vote in the House of Commons has proved an invaluable factor. It was thrown solidly against the Government on occasions; on others it was solid, and occasionally it was split altogether. Ramsay MacDonald has acquitted himself remarkably well in the difficult position of leader of the labor opposition, but the indiscretion of his party weakened his hand. Outbursts of the extremists have more than once brought discredit on the cause which he represents. The demonstration in favor of Mr. Asquith, who met and demolished the insinuation of a new labor

member on the question of the Sudan deputation, showed the House of Commons at its best. Taken as a whole, the opposition parties did not strengthen their position during the short session. The real test will come next year.—London Times.

MAYOR FAVORS RACING AT WILLOWS TRACK IN OAK BAY, VICTORIA

VICTORIA, Jan. 16. — Mayor Hayward declares himself as in favor of horse racing here under the pari-mutuel system of betting provided the races are run in a clean, properly organized way.

The mayor stated his position frankly when Dr. J. F. Grant, president of the newly formed Victoria Riding and Driving Club, conferred with him regarding the official City Hall attitude towards race meets.

"So far as I am concerned, any organization that can show proper credentials and can give a guarantee that horse racing under their supervision will be properly conducted, will have the sanction of the city to stage meets here," the mayor told The Colonist.

"I am willing to accept the people's verdict, which I believe is truthfully expressed at the plebiscite held last year. Everyone knows, however, that the mayor is not the only person with authority in this matter. Even the council is somewhat restricted, although I think the majority are in favor of clean racing. The question rests with Oak Bay more than with any other authority."

The mayor said that, while the appointment of a racing commission had been urged upon him, he would take no action in that direction until it had been determined whether or not there would be racing here.

SEPARATE CLASSES FOR BOYS AND GIRLS

That is Plan Which Has Proved Success in Victoria High School and Will be Extended

VICTORIA, Jan. 16. — Experiments in separate education for boys and girls have been carried out at the Victoria High School this year and have proved successful, it was announced at the City School Board offices after Trustee H. O. Littlefield had suggested at the board's meeting that the boys and girls of the High School should be segregated.

During the last term at the High School there have been two classes, in one of which the students are all girls, trustees explained. These classes were started last fall so that the school board could see whether separate education was more efficient than co-education.

Favor Extending System
According to reports laid before trustees by school officials the separate classes in the High School are doing excellent work. So satisfied are the trustees with the experiment that the idea of extending the system to embrace all the students in the school is strongly favored by members of the board. The separate class system could be installed next September without interrupting the school's work seriously, it is stated.

The separate classes in the High School, it is explained, eliminate the distractions that are bound to exist in co-educational classes where the boys and girls waste time in talk and flirtation.
