MAY BE EARLY DEVELOPMENT GROUNDHOG

LORD RHONDDA COAL FIELDS SAID TO HAVE CHANGED HANDS LATELY

Rhondda Coal Claims Have Been Sold to Other British Interests Proposal to Ship Output this Port

VANCOUVER, Jan. 13.—A special despatch to the Province from Winnipeg says all coal properties and claims controlled by the late Lord Rhondda in Central British Columbia have passed into the hands of other British interests. These claims are on Kalm Lake north of Terrace on the G.T.P., 90 miles east of Prince Rupert.

It is expected that a market for the coal will be found at Prince Rupert and also it is hoped that an export trade to South American ports will be developed.

George Clothier, resident mining engineer, stated this morning that so far as he knew all the Rhondda claims were in the Rhondda district north of Kalm Lake.

MONEY DISAPPEARS AT EDMONTON BUT NO INFORMATION GIVEN

EDMONTON, Jan. 13.—The mysterious disappearance of \$18,000 while en route from one branch of the Imperial Bank to another is causing excitement because the police and the bank maintain secrecy. It is supposed that a daylight holdup explains the disappearance but all concerned refuse to discuss the matter at all. It is understood the police and special detectives are investigating.

GERMANY SORE AT OCCUPATION

Premiers of Federated States
Make Protest and Will Seek
Solution

BERLIN, Jan. 13.—The conference of premiers of the German federal states approved the action of the Berlin government in opposing the insults and ravages of France, and voted in favor of a close union, seeking a solution of the difficulties.

Following the submission of the protest to the allied powers, the central government today sent a note to France and Italy simultaneously, replying to their ultimatum yesterday stating that the occupation tactics were an outrage and the economies of international law and was bound to lead to chaos and ruin and make the payment of reparations impossible for all time.

FLOYD JOHNSON IS YOUTHFUL PRODIGY OF SQUARED CIRCLE

Outfought Bill Brennan in Fifteen
Round Bout in New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Floyd Johnson is a youthful prodigy of the ring. He jumped into prominence last night here by defeating Bill Brennan in a fifteen round bout. He is now looked on as one of the leading heavyweights and a probable early opponent of Jack Dempsey. He is only 24 years of age.

Floyd Johnson the Iowa heavy-weight looks today a dangerous contender for Jack Dempsey's crown as the result of his victory over Bill Brennan of Chicago. Fighting as crafty as a ring veteran the young man showed all the equipment of a first class title contender.

We make no claim beyond this.

By a simple mechanical contrivance we have demonstrated again and again with scientific accuracy that thought can be transferred from one mind to another.

Both minds need to be keenly on the alert. Anything like distraction or preoccupation of mind must be avoided. Distance makes no difference. The difficulty does not lie in space but in time. Watches must be accurately adjusted or else there will not be coincidence in time.

THORNTON MORE THAN ENGINEER

London Graphic Has Picture of
Skeena River and Short Article on Head of Railway

The London Graphic is a recent number carries an article on the appointment of Sir Henry Thornton as president of the Canadian National Railways. Accompanying the article is a portrait of Sir Henry and also a view of the Skeena River showing the old and new means of transportation in this district namely, the river steamer and the railway train.

The article is as follows: With his appointment as president of the Canadian National Railways Sir Henry Thornton will have to be much more than an engineer.

It is true that he will be in control of the greatest railway in the world. The C.N.R. have 22,375 miles of completed track, and in 1920, which is the latest return, they carried 25,844,156 passengers and 56,655,264 tons of goods. It takes four and a half days to travel in a direct line over the system.

But Sir Henry Thornton will also have to be a shipmaster, since the C.N.R. possess a fleet of sixty-six vessels, of 100,000 tonnage. Again, in the same organization there are 102,000 miles of telegraph wires; grain elevators, with 56,000,000 bushels' capacity; and a chain of first class hotels from the Atlantic seaboard to the Pacific.

Five Vice-Presidents

In order to keep in touch with these interests, Sir Henry will have five vice-presidents, for:

- (1) Finance.
- (2) Traffic, which is concerned with passengers and goods;
- (3) Operation and maintenance, which covers everything necessary to the smooth-running trains;
- (4) Construction work;
- (5) Purchases, supplies, and stores.

And in addition to these five officials he will have a manager in control of shipping and another in control of hotels.

RED CROSS IS VERY ACTIVE

Public Not Giving Support That
is Warranted by Nature of
Work Being Carried on,
However

An executive meeting of the Prince Rupert Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society was held last evening. It was decided to hold the annual general meeting on January 22, and Walter G. Le, secretary, was also chosen to be the representative of this district for the provincial executive in Vancouver.

There was a general discussion as to the best method of letting the public understand the present peace-time activities of the organization. In view of the poor response to the appeal for subscriptions, it was pointed out that the Society was doing much relief work for returned soldiers and their dependents during the winter and several improvements had been instituted at the General Hospital including the installation of a boiler and complete set of crockery and glass and the semi-private wards had been supplied with curtains and rods. It is the intention to go further but this will be impossible unless better support is given. The Red Cross Society is by no means dormant and it is felt that the 81 subscriptions can be put to better use through the medium of the organization than by persons individually.

As full attendance as possible at the general meeting is being asked by the executive so that the work and usefulness of the Society may be laid before the public.

Comparisons in Price Of Bonds.

It is rather difficult for a layman to know whether the price of bonds is a good one or not. Take for instance the bonds sold yesterday by the provincial government. They are reported to have fetched 97.783. This means of course that one hundred dollars worth of bonds fetched less than ninety-six dollars or a discount of over four per cent. This, compared with a former sale at par or at a slight premium, makes the bonds look cheap. As a matter of fact, however, the price obtained was a better one than the other. Former offerings were mostly six per cent bonds while these pay only five. The actual rate of interest on the money invested is slightly over 5.2 per cent, whereas in former cases it was six. This on two million makes a large saving every year to the province. The finance minister is to be congratulated on having secured such a good price for the provincial securities. Usually the people of the province do not understand the significance of a deal of this kind.

Makes Suggestions For This City.

A correspondent living in Alberta writes to make some suggestions for the development of this city which we pass on for consideration. Some of them have been already considered but not pushed to any extent. He first suggests the development of adjacent coal lands. This is very important and is a matter that it will be well for the city to encourage as much as possible. He points out the thousands of dollars that are sent out of the district for coal which might be purchased at home if it were available.

Then he touches on elevators and flour mills, the securing of which would prove quite feasible. He suggests that in this part of the country there would be a considerable market for flour and some could be exported to Alaska while wheat could be purchased at Edmonton, which is the cheapest market in the world.

The matter of a packing plant is discussed and he suggests that P. Burns Ltd. might erect a plant here to supply the Alaska business.

The correspondent devotes some time to the matter of "free publicity." He suggests as an instance that the Family Herald and Weekly Star contains in its news of British Columbia nothing but Vancouver and Victoria news. He thinks that paper and others should be supplied with news of Prince Rupert. He suggests that much interesting news could be sent out in regard to the northern part of the province including the wonders of the Stewart mining camp and the news of other places.

In regard to a road leading off Kaien Island, the Alberta man thinks it would be a splendid thing to have it constructed, especially he thinks the work should be done at a time when employment is scarce in order to relieve the situation.

Most of the matters mentioned in the letter have been already dealt with in this paper from time to time and have engaged the attention of the Board of Trade but so far nothing has been done. It is well that we should be reminded of these things and especially from a resident of another province who would like to see progress made.

France Established In Germany.

France is already establishing herself in Germany and it will be difficult to oust her from the position she has taken. That is the chief difficulty in having territory of one nation invaded by another. When Japan invaded China she hung on for years and it was only strong pressure brought by outside nations that caused her to let go.

It is to be hoped that there will be no international complications as a result of France's action. The danger is that the trouble will come later. France is not likely to withdraw until the last dollar is paid, not only of the indemnity but of the cost of occupation which will amount to an immense sum.

Good Reports From Dome Mountain.

Good reports have been received from the Dome Mountain mining property, about 22 miles from Telkwa. It is gold bearing ore of pretty good grade and is one of the prospects that is likely to develop into a mine. Very soon we shall have the official report of the resident district engineer of Omineca in regard to it, and it is expected to be an optimistic one.

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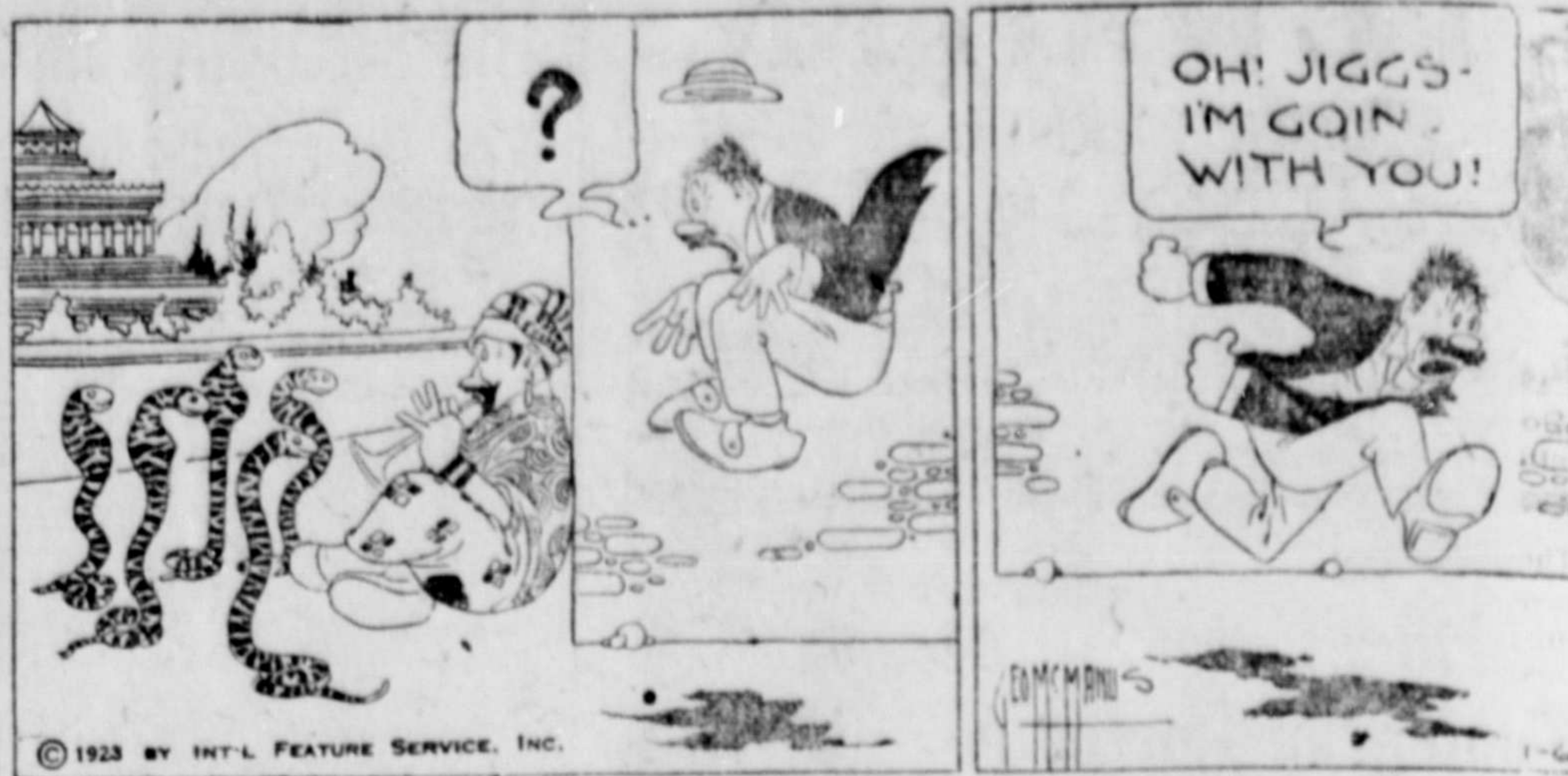

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Doings of the Mosquito Fleet which is the chief source of Prince Rupert's prosperity

The Situation

The fish arrivals have been during the past week, and it is accounted for by the fact that several of the large commercial schooners have come south to undergo repairs and general overhaul. Had the weather been experienced in the deep sea grounds which has been against big catches.

At this season of the year the fellows are giving way to the smaller boats, and while the number of the latter have been going on halibut hunting and the great majority of them are not yet ready to hit the high spots. As a consequence the deep sea grounds are somewhat depleted of the regular quota of fishing boats. Cowley has taken on a very animal-like appearance, which is particularly pronounced this week, and the mosquito fleet proper are putting a hustle on to put their crafts in first class shape preparatory to commencing the season's business. Several boats are already putting out to prospect for salmon. The Admiral of the fleet is very much in evidence and is keeping a watchful eye on all the mechanical preparations. Bombbuilding has been an impetus this week and the well known yards of N. M. McLean are a veritable hive of industry, no less than those which have been now on the ways.

Several trappers have called in port during the week bringing cargoes of splendid fur which has found a ready local market. Business is improving steadily and the Canadian National Dry Goods and in addition to one or two small boats undergoing repairs the Prince Rupert, and Prince Albert are in for overhaul and the Canadian Winner is expected to arrive shortly.

Summing up the situation, there seems to be a general all round tendency for the improvement of waterfront business and an optimistic air prevails among the nautical men for the future prosperity of this fair city.

The repairs to the Albert & McGaffery wharf by Messrs. Boliver & Currie have been completed and the donkey engine has been loaded on a raft preparatory to being towed by the power boat Ruby Mae to Seal Cove. An endeavor is to be made to raise a donkey engine belonging to the Prince Rupert Pulp & Paper Co. which fell into the salt chuck sometime ago.

Malolo in Port

The hand logging power boat Malolo is in port from Swanson Bay, after a prolonged logging cruise in the vicinity of the Queen Charlotte Islands and other outlying points. After taking on supplies and doing minor repair work the owner intends to renew his activities, and will probably leave port over the week end.

Salmon Prospecting

The power boat "Just It," skippered by Capt. Klort, is all in readiness for a salmon prospecting trip. The Just It has been in port for the past two months and Capt. Klort is consequently becoming anxious to be up and doing.

Ethel June Busv

The old reliable shrimp trawler Ethel June, Capt. Ritchie, is busily engaged plying the shrimp trawling business in local waters and from accounts to hand the venture this season

has proved profitable in that it has enabled her owners to keep pace with current expenses. It is anticipated that this well known craft will shortly be undergoing an overhaul in readiness for the more remunerative halibut hunting.

Freeman is Back

Thomas K. Freeman, skipper of the launch Narbethong, who has been on a two months cruise in southern waters, returned to port on Saturday last after a very eventful journey. Cap hit out with a load of the best provisions on earth and visited all the Indian and other villages down the coast as far as Millbank Sound. During the trip he called at Kitimat, Kamano, Hartley Bay, Swanson Bay and China Hat and reports having done very good business. In fact the trip was so successful that it is his intention to reload and do the same thing over and is expecting to get away on Monday.

On leaving Prince Rupert the Narbethong struck a very heavy North wind which necessitated hanging up at Hartley Bay for three days. After giving Kamano the once over Cap left in a strong North wind and shortly afterwards had the misfortune to have one of the exhaust valves break, which shut the engine down. It was necessary to come to anchorage and work all night in an endeavor to repair the damage. After repeated efforts Cap was successful in cutting the broken valve stem off with a hacksaw. Upon going on deck the skipper was very surprised to find himself nicely anchored at the Hot Springs, Gardner's Canal the launch having advanced that far without being told. However the engine was eventually restored to her normal gait and the journey was continued without any further untoward mishap. Speaking of conditions at the outlying points visited, Capt. said he found everybody happy and enjoying life to its fullest extent.
