Andrew Bonar Law Dies in England Aged Sixty Five; a Striking Figure

LONDON, Oct. 30 .- Right Hon. Andrew Bonar Law, for seven months Prime Minister of Great Britain, died at his home at three o'clock this morning following an acute attack of septic

The ex-premier's daughter, his only relative left in England, was with him during the last days of his illness. His two sons were killed in the war, a sorrow from which Bonar Law never recovered. When he accepted office a year ago his friends well knew his health was precarious. He suffered from throat trouble which prevented him from speaking.



ANDREW BONAR LAW DIES IN ENGLAND AGED SIXTY FIVE: A STRIKING FIGURE

was singular. He was 42 years of age before he entered politics. A successful Glasgow iron merchant who had been born and educated in Canada, his rise to eminence in the British Parliament began with his election in 1900 as a Unionist from the Blackfriars Division of Glasgow. Strong for tariff reform, he soon became noted for his clear reasoning on that subject, and as result was made Parliamentary Secretary of the Board of Trade. Later he successively became leader of the Unionist, or Opposition party in the House of Commons, Secretary of State for the Colonies. Chancellor of the Exchequer, Lord of the Privy eal, and finally Premier.

Primarily a business man, he employed the tactics of business rather than the strategy of polities in dealing with national problems. With the advent of Lloyd George as Premier, he became the Welshman's Jonathan. and was referred to as his "Man Friday." As a member of the war cabinet, as Chancellor, and as the Coalition government's leader in the House of Commons, he enjoyed the fullest confidence of his famous chief.


