# HUNGER MARCH NEARS WASHINGTON

## POSTPONEMENT OF WAR DEBTS AGAIN ASKED BY BRITAIN

### Authorities of United States Capital Discuss Handling of "Army"

Federal Troops Will Not Be Used But Police of Capital Will Be Fully Armed—Concentrations and Parades Are Prohibited

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 2.—A special police conference was held here to discuss plans for dealing with an army of "hunger marchers," the vanguard of which is expected to reach the Capital on Sunday. The conference agreed against the use of federal troops in handling the situation although the police will be armed with all instruments of destruction which, however, they must not use unless absolutely necessary. The marchers will not be permitted to mass up in concentration camps and no street parades will be allowed.

### DEFAULT OF CITY

Announcement Made in Toronto That Prince Rupert Defaulted On Its Bonds

TORONTO, Dec. 2.—The Canadian Bankers' Association today confirmed as correct reports which were current in financial circles that the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert had defaulted on some \$32,000 of bond payments on principal and interest which fell due yesterday.

The above dispatch received by the Daily News through Canadian Press today confirms reports which have been current since yesterday that the city had defaulted in its bond payments. On inquiry being made of Mayor C. H. Orme, today, the report was confirmed. Meantime, it is understood that the city has transferred its bank account from the Royal Bank of Canada to the Bank of Montreal. The \$32,000 is subject to American exchange.

### Toronto's Largest Political Meeting Assails Old Parties; Bloodless Revolution Urged

TORONTO, Dec. 2.—In one of the largest political rallies this city has ever seen, the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation on Wednesday night cast down the gauntlet of battle to the two old line parties of Liberalism and Conservatism and definitely declared itself in favor of a "bloodless scientific mental revolution" whereby, the reins of power would be seized by the Federation through the ballot boxes.

### Philadelphia Is In Difficulties

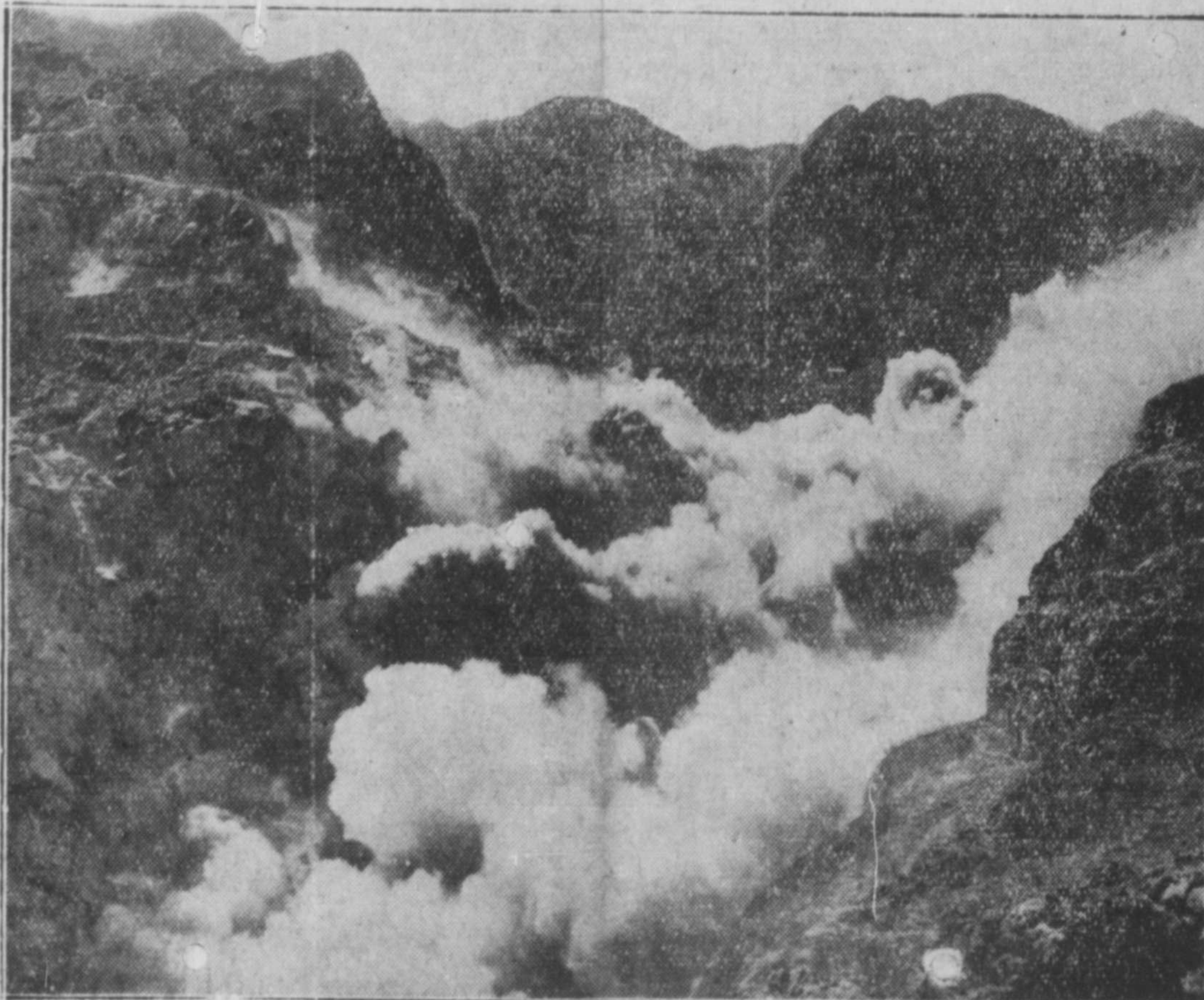
Third City of United States Unable to Meet Payroll Which Became Payable Yesterday

### BEER VETO IS MOOTED

Some Doubt, However, Exists As To President Hoover's Intentions—Modification Bill To Be Presented

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 2.—Congressional leaders have advised yesterday that President Hoover will probably veto any beer or farm relief bills that may be presented to him for signature following passage at the short session of Congress this winter. Such action on the part of the president would wreck the Democratic program of legislation and would probably result in a special session of Congress being called next April soon after inauguration of the new administration for the purpose of passing legislation along these lines.

### REVENUE HOLDS UP

Depression Does Not Seem to Be Affecting Customs and Excise Collections Seriously

In spite of the depression, customs and excise collections for the port of Prince Rupert are holding up well this year, the revenue for 1932 to date aggregating \$122,653.20 as compared with \$125,907.53 in the first eleven months of 1931. For November this year the revenue amounted to \$8,406.02 as against \$4,484.94 in November 1931.

### Southwest Gets Its First Snow

From One to Three Inches Falls in Arizona, Nevada, Colorado and New Mexico

PHOENIX, Arizona, Dec. 2.—Arizona, Nevada, Colorado and northwestern New Mexico had their first snowfall of the season yesterday, between one and three inches being reported from various points. There was three inches of snow in the Grand Canyon. Roads were reported to be all in good condition in spite of the snow. Further snow and colder temperatures are predicted.

### CRICKET STARTED

English Bowlers Are Too Good For Australians on Opening Day of Test Matches

SYDNEY, New South Wales, Dec. 10.—Against a devastating attack by the English bowlers, the famous Antipodean batsmen failed in the opening day's play of the first cricket test match between England and Australia today. When stumps were drawn home, the English players had compiled 290 runs for six wickets.

### Is Taken Ill

As a result, several of Miss Barrymore's engagements have been cancelled.

### Ben Schulson Laid at Rest

The funeral of the late Benjamin Schulson, who passed away earlier in the week at the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for nearly five years, took place this afternoon from the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers to Fairview Cemetery with Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook officiating. In attendance at the obsequies were a number of friends and acquaintances of deceased who had lived in Prince Rupert for many years. Hymns were "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" and "Lead Kindly Light." Pallbearers were W. Goodmans, Harry Goodman, J. Larsson, Albert P. Eyoifsen, A. Eyoifsen and H. Eyoifsen.

### INDUSTRIALS SHOW GAIN

Most Decisive Advances in Two Weeks in Yesterday's Trading

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Most decisive gains in two weeks were recorded by many industrial issues during yesterday's trading on the New York Stock Exchange although there was a drop before the close when the average was 58.02, up 1.67. The utilities average at closing was 26.06, up .52, and rails, 25.75, up .71. The day's turnover amounted to 748,550 shares.

### REPEAL IS ADVOCATED

American Federation of Labor Takes Stand For First Time Against Prohibition

CINCINNATI, Dec. 2.—Taking a stand for the first time in its history on the issue of prohibition, the American Federation of Labor, at its annual convention here, went on record as favoring immediate modification of the Volstead Act and repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. The resolution to this effect was approved by William Green, the president, and the executive council before being presented to the convention.

Another resolution urged the government to put into effect as soon as possible a plan of unemployment insurance.

### JAPANESE PUNITIVE EXPEDITION MOVING ON NORTH MANCHURIA

MUKDEN, Dec. 2.—A Japanese army was moving on north-west Manchuria yesterday determined to wipe out the Chinese bandit army which recently captured 200 Japanese soldiers and which, despite repeated warnings, has refused to release them.

### England Gives Reasons Why Suspension Seems To Be Most Desirable

Note Does Not Say Specifically That Old Country is Unable or Unwilling to Pay—Co-operation of Two Nations is Advocated

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 2.—"Great Britain would be pleased to have a further postponement of payments due December 15 pending a thorough survey of the whole war debt question." So says the second British note to the United States in reply to the demand of this country that payments due this month be made at maturity. The British note was delivered to Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson last night by Sir Ronald Lindsay, British ambassador to the United States. The note does not state that Great Britain is unable to pay. Nor does it declare specifically that Britain is unwilling to pay.

The note, however, contains a carefully worded but, nevertheless, significant warning that, if the United States insists upon payment of the December 15 installment, the United Kingdom will be forced to take measures restricting the imports of American goods. It emphasizes the fact that the United Kingdom is America's best customer and the results "could not fail to be unpleasant."

The missive points out that payment of the debts would have disastrous consequences as far as the economic structure of the world was concerned and would result in a further serious decline in the exchange rates of the world. If the United States insists upon payment the whole system of European confidence, so laboriously built up and so precariously balanced, would crash. Further, if Great Britain was compelled to make the payments, revision of the Lausanne agreement in the matter of German debts would become necessary.

The note further declares that the interests of both United States and Great Britain would best be served by co-operation of the two nations for a revival of world trade. The taxpayers of the United States would not benefit by payment of the debts, the note asserts, pointing out that Great Britain is not asking the United States to make any greater sacrifice than she has already made herself. The position of the United States taxpayer is no different than that of the British taxpayer.

The note points out that, while the British debt constitutes only forty percent of the total war debts to the United States, British payments to date have constituted eighty percent of the total payments.

### France Asks Postponement

PARIS, Dec. 2.—Reiterating this country's request for postponement of the obligations, France's note to the United States in reply to the demand for war debt payments amounting to \$19,500,000 on December 15 was cabled last night to Paul Claudel, French ambassador to the United States, and will probably be delivered to the State Department at Washington tomorrow. A short summary of France's position is contained in the document which consists of six pages. It is understood to express the view that the interests of all concerned would be best served by postponement.

### Governor-Elect Of Washington Visits Olympia

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 2.—Governor-Elect Clarence D. Martin, who is a resident of the Spokane district, arrived here yesterday to confer with Governor Roland H. Hartley, retiring chief executive of Washington, on state matters. Mr. Martin will take up residence here following his inauguration as governor.

### Scores of Montreal People Are Thrown Into Panic By Repeated Severe Explosions

MONTREAL, Dec. 2.—More than 100,000 people living in the dense portion of the city centering around St. Debis Street North were terrified Wednesday night as scores of explosions in the sewer system threw manhole covers into the air, crumbled three dwelling houses into ruins, destroyed a gasoline station and inflicted injuries upon twelve persons, seven of whom required overnight hospital treatment.

Infraction of the bylaws prohibiting gasoline and other combustible materials being poured into sewers was given as the cause of the explosions. The damage is estimated at \$25,000, the destruction not being as extensive as was at first thought.

**EXAGGERATED REPORTS**

Exaggerated reports from Germany have led to the idea that the whole country is in a turmoil but it is not, according to a recent Canadian visitor to Berlin who went to investigate at first hand. There is political instability but the fact that the fascist movement has recently lost ground and that the communistic leaders are much at variance with the communists of Russia and are very moderate in their tone, leads to the belief that very soon, possibly under new Chancellor von Schleicher, the country will settle down to industrial pursuits and will forget the political difficulties of the year 1932.

All information from London is to the effect that the little disturbance there a few weeks ago affected only a few dozen people and was nothing to what the country has seen on various occasions during depressions or times of political or industrial excitement in the past.

Both in Germany and England the desire of the people seems to be to get back to work. That too is the condition in Canada, and the expectation is that the New Year will see a great improvement in the situation.

**PROVINCIAL SITUATION**

The Vancouver News, the new morning newspaper of the big B. C. metropolis, discussing the political situation in the province says in part:

"The Premier knows, as everybody else knows, that, although not killed outright, the union government proposal has been so effectively chloroformed that it will presently pass quietly away.

"It might have had a chance at one time, but it can have none whatever after a session during which the antagonisms of the men who would have to come together to form a union government have been intensified by exchanges of attacks and counter-attacks.

"Possibly Dr. Tolmie is to some extent to blame for an impasse that ties his own hands at a time when vigorous leadership is most sorely needed. Having made up his mind that union government was the way of salvation for the province, he should have acted at once on his own responsibility; union government should have been almost an accomplished fact before any but those immediately concerned knew anything about it."

The Democrats declare that legislation of sale of beer and light wines is necessary for revenue purposes. The only alternative to a beer tax in balancing the budget, would be a sales tax, they assert.

The President is reported to have said that all proposals he has so far heard of in regard to beer legislation would amount to nullification of the constitution and he does not interpret the result of the election as being a mandate to nullify the Eighteenth Amendment.

There is some doubt, however, as to the authenticity of the report that the President would actually veto beer legislation. Immediately after the election, he stated that he would not introduce a beer legislation measure, he would sign it should such a bill be passed at the short session which opens next week.

**Garner is Confident**

Meantime, Speaker John N. Garner, leader in the movement for modification and repeal, had completed a congressional canvass of repeal sentiment as a result of which he declares that he sees no reason why he should not introduce his bill for modification and repeal on the opening day of the short session next Monday as he is assured that it will receive at least the two-thirds vote required for its passage.

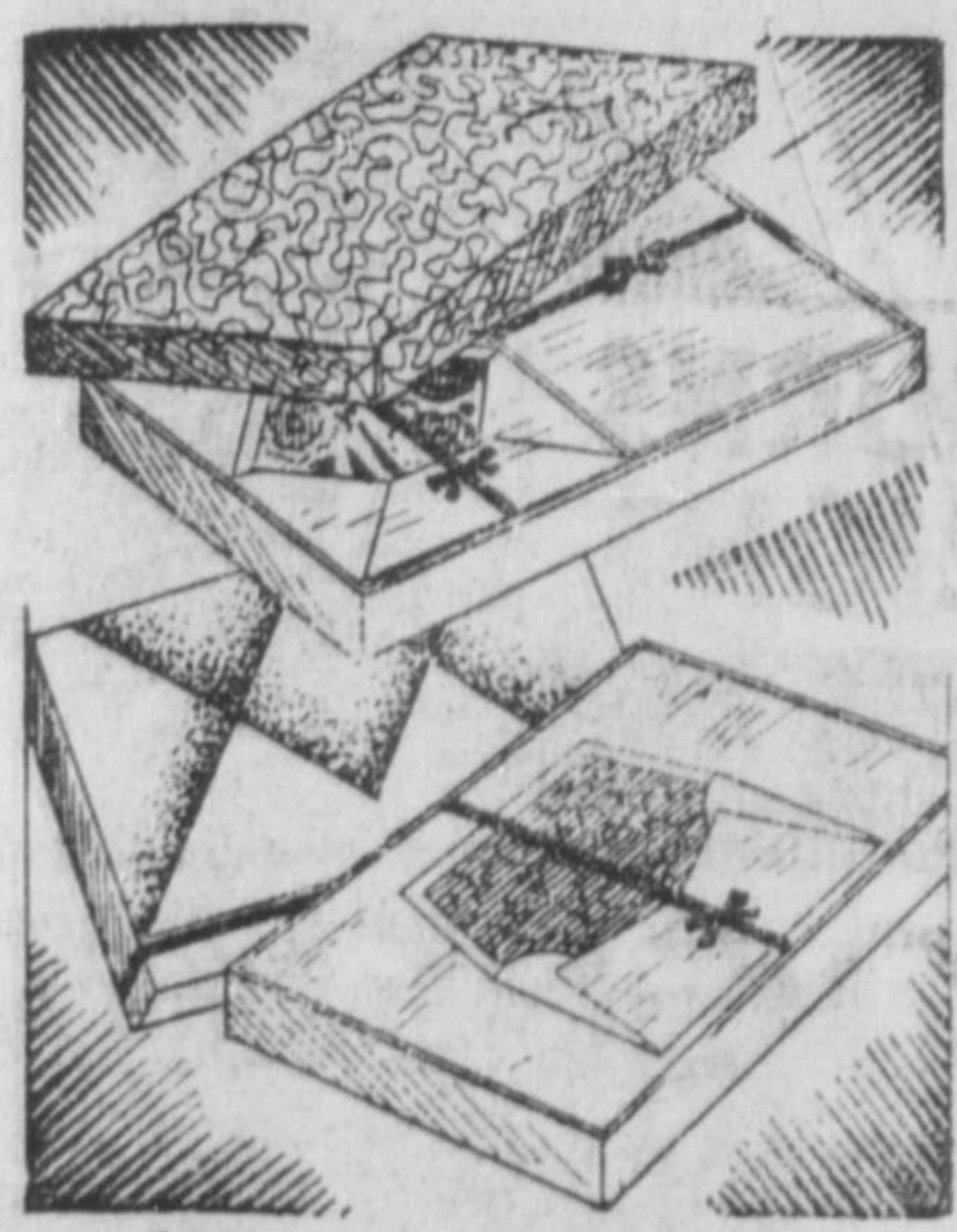

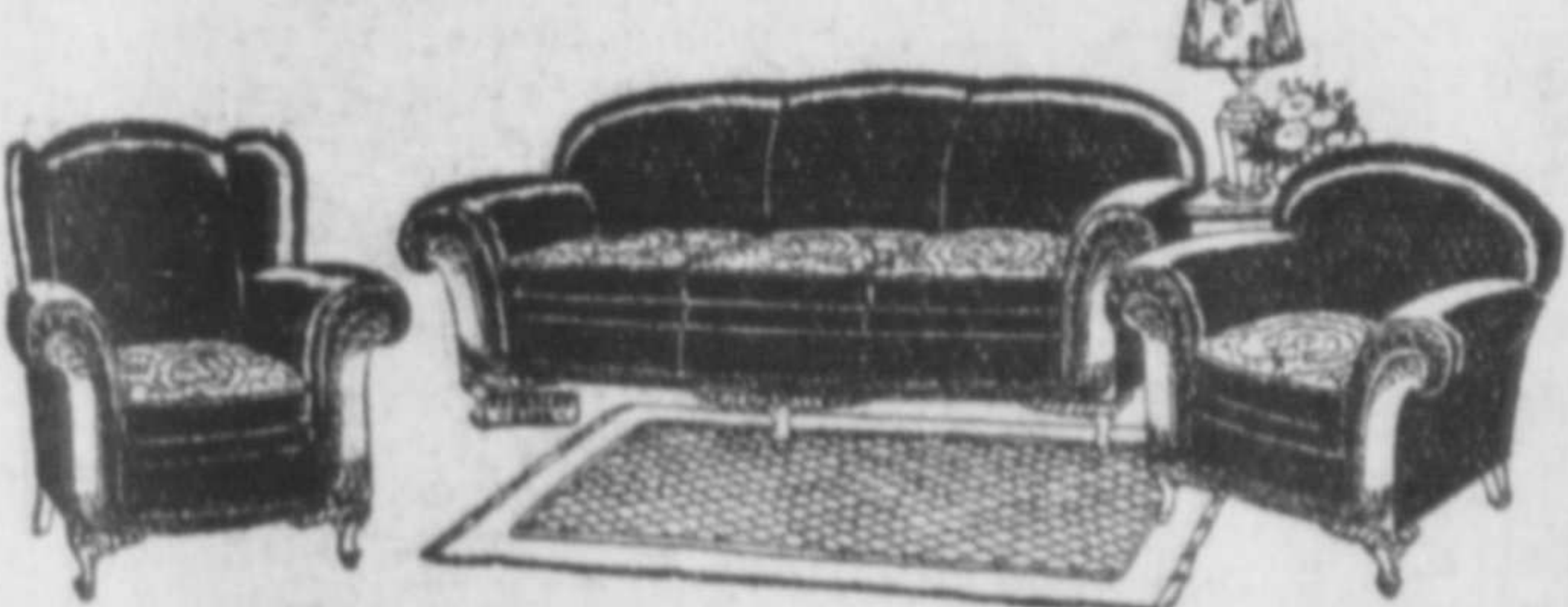
