

The totem pole which the Prince Bupert Board of Trade obtained for the city and which will arrive here from the Queen Charlotte Islands by the steamer Prince Albert early next week is said by Thomas Deasy, Massett Indian Agent, to be the oldest and best carved native relic of its kind that could have been obtained on the Islands. 


