

General Von Schleicher Is Named German Chancellor; Appointment Is Acclaimed

BERLIN, Dec. 3:-General Kurt von Schleicher was commissioned by President Paul von Hindenburg yesterday to assume the chancellorship of Germany and to form a cabinet responsible to the presi-

Von Schleicher's administration is expected to assume the form of a virtual military dictatorship. The new chancellor had succeeded this afternoon in forming a new ministry whereupon President von Hindenburg signed his appointment as chancellor.

The Berlin press greets the appointment of von Schleicher to the chancellorship with almost unanimous favor. Hopes are generally expressed that, under his administration, political and economic calm shall be restored to Germany.

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




