BROUGHT PONY SAFELY ASHORE

Fisherman on Lake Manitoba Had Narrow Escape When Ice Broke Up

DRIFTED ASHORE

Battled With Flies for Seven Hours But Stuck to Pony

WINNIPEG, Dec. 20.—After a seven hour battle for life on drifting floes in Lake Manitoba, E. Erickson of Lundar, a fisherman, reached shore last night, bringing to safety his pony that was on the ice with him.

Erickson and his companion were fishing from the ice some distance from shore when a sudden storm caused the thin ice to break up. His companion was on a fragment which drifted to shore at once but Erickson was carried out into the lake. Leading his pony, he jumped from one ice floe to another until he made shore.

ECLES GOES HIGHER COURT

Dry Policeman Committed by Magistrate in Victoria on Charge of Perjury

VICTORIA, Dec. 20.—In the police court yesterday F. W. Eccles, special agent of the narcotic drug detection squad of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, was committed for trial charged with perjury and released on bail. No defense was entered at this stage of the proceedings.

The charge arose out of evidence given by Eccles at the trial of himself, Fernandez and W. L. Smith in the police court here on charges of illegal possession of fifty cans of opium in August last. Eccles, when charged by the prosecution stated that he at no time owned a green engined canoe and had not been in boats on Vancouver's water-front.

ANOTHER MEETING OF FISH INTERESTS

Decision Reached to Call Gathering of Boat Owners, Fishermen and Business Men

Fisheries committees of the Board of Trade and city council and representatives of the boat owners and fishermen met last night in the city council chamber and the present halibut situation was again fully discussed. There was no other decision reached, however, than to call another general meeting of Canadian boat owners and fishermen to which local business men are to be extended an especial invitation. Ald. S. D. Macdonald presided at the meeting last night.

VICTORIA HOSPITAL GETS \$75,000 RESULT DRIVE JUST ENDED

WOMAN DECLARES HUSBAND WISHED TO SELL HER TO NEGRO

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 20.—Mrs. Helen La Maier, applying for a divorce, says her moving picture director husband Elmer La Maier, has been trying to sell her for four years to a Negro of the Mexican underworld for half a million dollars, of which he offered her \$150,000 and got angry every time she refused.

GOVERNMENT IS NOT BEHIND STEEL COMPANY

Premier Objects to Alleged Mis-statement of Facts in Efforts to Raise Money

VICTORIA, Dec. 20.—In addressing the delegation from the Coast Range Steel Co. which approached the Government recently asking for a guarantee of bonds Premier Oliver said among other things:

"The Government realizes the desirability of having an iron and steel industry, but I do not know of a single instance where there has been a Government guarantee but that the Government has had to pay in the end," he declared. "There has been a public sentiment stirred up in this regard through misstatements, and I have reason to believe that the Coast Range Steel people have been disposing of some of their stock and have raised money on the representation that the government is behind them. The Government must be very careful to guard against any company going out in this way and raising money by the sale of stock in this way."

MORE AMERICAN HALIBUT BOATS IN WITH CATCHES

Five large American halibut schooners marketed catches totalling 192,000 pounds at the Fish Exchange this morning, there were no Canadian arrivals. Owing to the supply being better, prices took a drop and 13.5c was the highest bid for first class fish.

Arrivals and sales: Panama, 42,000 pounds, at 13.5c and 9.5c, to the Pacific Fisheries.

Yakatla, 60,000 pounds, at 13.1c and 8.5c; Gladstone, 36,000 pounds, at 13.3 and 8.5c, and National, 16,000 pounds, at 13.5c and 9.3c, to the Canadian Fish & Gold Storage Co.

President, 38,000 pounds, at 13.5c and 9.6c, to the Booth Fisheries Canadian Co.

BY-ELECTION IN PROGRESS TODAY

Member Being Elected in Kent County, N.B., to Succeed Late A. T. Leger, M.P.

VICTORIA, Dec. 20.—A drive for funds for an addition to the Jubilee Hospital in this city has closed. The amount subscribed was \$75,000 whereas the amount asked for was \$125,000. It is expected that a Government grant will swell the amount considerably and that the addition to the building will be erected although perhaps with modified plans.

EXTENSION OF WATER SYSTEM BYLAW KILLED

Finance Committee Opposes Adding to Debt of City

The bylaw for the funding of water extensions which was introduced at the meeting on Monday night by Ald. Munro and Ald. Perry with a view to submitting it to the people at the next election was killed at a special meeting of the council last night when the council arose from committee on the bylaw without reporting.

The bylaw met stiff opposition from the finance committee both Ald. Stephens and Ald. Collart opposing the idea of adding to the funded debt by means of it.

Stating that he was against anything that could be avoided which would increase the city's debt, Ald. Stephens expressed the opinion that the work already done on Fifth Avenue West and on First Avenue which the bylaw sought to fund was a matter of maintenance. It had been already agreed to pay for the Fifth Ave work from general fund and he did not see why the plan should be changed. "It is an unnecessary bylaw and not in the best interests of the city, anyway," he declared. In any case it should have been submitted to the finance committee.

Ald. Collart opposed the bylaw.

The city already had a debt of two million dollars.

Ald. Munro was agreeable to having the work paid for out of general revenue if it were possible. Ald. Stephens said Ald. Munro would have known it was possible if he had consulted the finance committee. The only reason he could see for funding this debt was to have more money in general fund to spend. On motion of Ald. Collart, seconded by Ald. Perry, the committee arose without reporting.

GEORGETOWN MILL IS CLOSING FOR WINTER

George McAfee, manager of the Big Bay Lumber Co.'s sawmill at Georgetown, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon and tonight will proceed south to spend the Christmas vacation with his family at Vancouver.

The Georgetown mill is about to close for a period of two months.

Manson Discusses Hours of Labor Moving Second Reading of the Eight Hour Day Bill

VICTORIA, Dec. 20.—Declaring that if there were fewer Orientals in the industries of the province there would be less agitation for an eight hour day and expressing the hope that if it were actually necessary that the Oriental must remain here that he would eventually reach a higher standard of living, Hon. A. M. Manson in the Legislature yesterday in moving the second reading of the eight hour day bill went fully into the industrial conditions in British Columbia. He reviewed the history of such legislation elsewhere, emphasizing that Great Britain, with its strong labor sentiment, had not been able to get a bill of this kind through parliament and that Sweden's bill allowed a leeway of 200 hours a year.

The minister pointed out that in 1922 in this province returns were received from 2,808 industrial employers of 76,301 employees and of these latter 42,413 had a working week of 48 hours or less and 34,188 a working week of more than 48 hours. The general average for all industries was 51.15 hours.

The lumbering returns, Mr. Manson said, gave returns slightly higher. He quoted statistics to show that a compulsory 48 hour week would mean cutting down of the period of work by from three to eight hours weekly in the busy season of the year.

BRITISH MEMBERS OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED

Montagu Norman, Sir Josiah Stamp and Reginald McKenna Will Examine Germany's Finances

PARIS, Dec. 20.—The British members of the expert committee to examine Germany's financial situation under the reparations commission will be Montagu Norman, governor of the Bank of England, Sir Josiah Stamp, economic statistical authority, and Reginald McKenna former chancellor of the exchequer.

JUDGE MCPHILLIPS FLAYS POLICE FOR ARREST OF STAYER

Says They Would Have Had Themselves to Blame If Fatality Had Occurred

(Special to Daily News)

VICTORIA, Dec. 20.—A scathing indictment of the operations of a posse of police who attempted the arrest of Jack R. Stayer on August 23 last at Francois Lake was incorporated in a judgment by Mr. Justice McPhillips on that hearing. The posse, composed of six men of combined forces of the provincial and Royal Canadian Police, could give thanks that it was alive and had fatality occurred, states the judgment, the police would have had only themselves to blame for what His Lordship terms "crass blundering."

Stayer, wanted on a charge of pointing a weapon, was sought by six officers at his home in a deserted portion of Francois Lake district at night. The posse surrounded the house and called on Stayer to open the door. Inspector Ackland, of the R.C.M.P. demanded adittance "in the name of the King." This was unjustified as the officers had no warrant for the arrest. Stayer was accused of firing at the police in an attempt to resist lawful arrest and a charge of shooting with intent to harm added. On the latter charge Stayer was sentenced to one year's imprisonment. In dismissing the appeal the majority finding of the court upheld the trial judge in imposing the conviction and sentence.

TENDERS CALLED ALASKA STEAMER

B. C. Keeley, C.G.M.M. Pacific Coast Manager, Makes Announcement

That the Canadian Government Merchant Marine Limited will shortly call for tenders for the construction of a 340 foot steamer costing in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000 for service on the Alaska run out of Vancouver and Prince Rupert was the announcement made in Vancouver this week by B. C. Keeley, Pacific Coast manager of the company, on his return from a conference at Montreal with company officials. The speed of the new ship will be about 23 knots and the style of engines to be installed is yet to be decided upon. It is possible that internal combustion engines may be selected though reciprocal engines and turbines are also under consideration.

Encourage Art
In The Schools.

By the musical and dramatic training given a number of the scholars in the public and high schools of the city, the pupils are being trained in an appreciation of art, something which is sorely needed among the coming generation. Reading, writing and arithmetic are often accounted too important in connection with school education. Life does not depend on all or either of these. It is quite as important that young people be taught to appreciate the beautiful in life and to help make life more beautiful as it is to take part in commercial life or in any other way to make a living.

The study of music in the schools is one way in which the tone of life can be elevated and some of the jarring notes of life be eliminated. If children are taught to seek harmony in their youth it should have an effect as they grow older. To seek harmony in everything instead of strumming on the discords is one of the chief objects of education. That is what the framers of the educational system have had in mind. Then comes someone and scoffingly refers to these important things as "frills" and an effort is made to have them eliminated.

What Is Man
Without A Soul?

A man with no appreciation of beauty is a man without a soul. He is an animal. If the schools through their nature studies, their drawing classes, their literary studies, their musical training, their wood working classes, and their training of the general attitude toward the beautiful in life can lift us out of the sordid and place us on the mountain tops where we may get the vision, they will have achieved a great part of their purpose. It is necessary to read, to write a good hand, to manipulate figures and be able to know something about commercial life. It is also very desirable that girls should know the simpler arts of domestic economy. None of these things can safely be neglected. The mathematical training is chiefly useful in teaching a child to reason things out for himself. Literary training gives him power to acquire knowledge and writing to impress it.

Expression Is
Very Important.


Many a man who spends his life in study passes away without being able to impart to the rest of the world the result of what he had learned. He has never been trained in the art of expression. Composition and essay writing provide training in one mode of expression while public speaking, declamation and debating are training for another form. Expression is almost a national feature of the people of the United States. To be able to hold one's own in debate, to carry on a lengthy conversation and to put over to the multitude by word of mouth any truth that has been discovered is worth more than tongue can tell. This is part of the education that is due to every boy and girl in the country. Every boy and girl should be a politician, trained in the science of government, else how can democracy be a success.

Should We Train
For Business Life?

Usually the schools are managed by businessmen and they look at everything from the point of view of the businessman. Yet after all, the commercial section of the community is but a small one and many people doubt if the schools should be utilized just to train boys and girls to become clerks and typists. These are professions and businessmen should train them if they wish that particular kind of training. It is evident that boys cannot be trained for every walk of life. Why then select one or two to the exclusion of the others?

When an employer tells you that it is disgraceful to think the boys who come to him make mistakes in their additions and know little of interest and commissions and stocks and bonds, it is evident that the schools are doing better work than we thought because they refuse to devote their whole attention to one branch of learning to the exclusion of others.

GIFTS THAT LAST

RUSSIA AS COUNTRY HAS CEASED TO EXIST

Soviet No Longer Uses Name But Includes Bulgaria in Union of Soviet Republics

LONDON, Dec. 20.—"There is no Russia," says a news article in the Daily Mail. "A strange statement but true." Russia has officially ceased to exist as a name in the mouths of those who now control the destinies of that country.

About three months ago they took a decision which has remained strangely secret. They notified the various nations with whom they have trade relations that the title of their government was changed from that of the Russian Soviet Republic to the "Union of Socialist Soviet Republics," contracted after Russian fashion to U.S.S.R. The word "Russia" was dropped completely.

Hammer and Sickle

At the same time the emblems upon their official newspaper, the crossed hammer and sickle, were now surrounded by a semi-circle of labels bearing the names of the various parts of the country and its adjacent territories, wherein "independent" local Soviet governments have been formed, such as "Ukraine," "Azerbaijan," and so on. But not only these, for the name "Bulgaria" was astonishingly added, the name of an entirely independent State!

From this it is clear that the authorities in Moscow regard themselves as potentially the masters of everywhere, and not at all limited by the boundaries of Russia. Needless to say the British government in its dealings with the Soviet government has never accepted or used this predatory title.

WORKMEN'S HOTEL UNDER SALVATION ARMY

Edmonton to Have Finest in Canada with 57 Bedrooms

EDMONTON, Dec. 20.—Between \$8,000 and \$9,000 is now being spent by the Salvation Army on the renovation and improving of the Cook Block, on Namayo Avenue, where will shortly be established the finest Workingmen's Hotel in Canada. Authority was given for this expenditure by Commissioner Hodder and Brigadier Sims on their recent visit here, it being the intention of these officers to make the Edmonton establishment the finest in the west and a type of home on which other similar institutions can be modelled. The new hotel has 57 bedrooms, in each of these there is hot and cold water with also a bathroom on every floor. The first floor will be opened on January 1, the second a month later and the other two floors in the spring.

There was a large gathering of Japanese present and also about 20 leading members of St. Andrew's Anglican Church including some officials of the Women's Auxiliary.

Archbishop DuVernet, who presided, announced that the land had cost \$1,500 and the building \$5,000 and that there was now a debt of only \$1,225 remaining to be paid. The Japanese people had contributed \$1,500 toward the cost and had promised a further \$400.

John Shimizu gave an account of the canvass among the Japanese.

Miss Lenox, lady missionary who has lived for ten years in Japan, spoke of the unifying power of the Christian religion.

PROMISE TO MARRY GIVEN

Ottawa Civil Servant Jilted Girl and is Sued for Breach of Promise

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—Pending further consideration of the provisions of the statute of frauds, Judge Wright, presiding over the non-jury sittings of the Supreme Court of Ontario, withheld his decision in the breach of promise action brought by Miss Desanges Cyr, of Eastview, against Auguste Dufault, a local civil servant.

Except for any provisions in the statute of frauds, which might cause him to decide otherwise, His Lordship said he was prepared to hold that there had been an agreement of marriage, and that there had been a breach of the contract of marriage on the part of the defendant. He, however, said he would withhold his final decision until he had reviewed the statute of frauds, and also withheld any amount of damage he might award.

The big point at issue in the case was whether or not there was an actual marriage contract, or only a promise to marry upon certain conditions. Miss Cyr claims \$2,500 damages.

Mentioned Marriage

Miss Cyr told of having met Dufault in October, 1921, and about 15 days later, he had first mentioned marriage to her, telling her he had serious intentions and that he had something to say to her later. About four weeks later, she said, she had become betrothed to Dufault, on the understanding that they would be married in May, 1923. The betrothal was, later announced to the parents of the plaintiff, who did not object to it.

fault and Miss Cyr had perused a catalogue of a mail order house with a view of picking out furnishings for their future home. After a courtship of about six or seven months, Miss Cyr received a letter from Dufault, informing her that he could not continue to "humbug" her, and notifying her that it was all over between them, and also informing the girl that Dufault had become betrothed to another woman.

Married Another

"Kindly send me my pictures and my song book, that is all I ask of you," was one of the extracts from a letter written by Dufault to Miss Cyr. Dufault was married to another girl in May this year.

Mr. William Cyr, father of the girl, told of Dufault calling at his house and having tea there on Sunday evenings, and on several occasions having seen Dufault coming out of the kitchen with his arm around the girl and exclaiming "Look at my little wife." He also told of the adventures of the pair with the mail order catalogue. He and his wife both fully considered that their daughter was engaged to and was to marry Dufault.

If She Pleased Him

Dufault's story was largely similar to that told by the girl as to them having met and having spoken of marriage about two weeks after they had made each other's acquaintance. Dufault had told her they might become betrothed if everything went well between them. He also admitted that he had told her he would marry her in May, 1923, if she continued to please him. Everything depended on pleasing him, he said, and that this was the conditional understanding.

In regard to looking at the mail order catalogue, he said it had only been for fun. Later on he told the court he had really intended to marry the girl, providing the conditions were fulfilled and everything went well. He had gone with two girls before, one for three days, and the other for two and a half months. He admitted that he had lied in a letter he had written Miss Cyr in regard to breaking off the conditional engagement.

Memory Poor

Romeo Beaudoin of Hull, the young man with whom Miss Cyr had been keeping company with previous to meeting Dufault, was called as a witness. He was asked if he remembered what Miss Cyr had told him on the last occasion she had seen him, previous to her beginning to keep company with Dufault. He said he could not remember, which caused His Lordship to remark: "That is not a pleasant thing for anyone to remember, anyway."

During the argument of counsel, the point was raised on behalf of the defence, as to whether or not the provision of the statute of frauds, might not bar the right of action, as to the existence of an actual marriage contract. Part of the provisions of this statute relate to marriage contract being renewed by a note or a memorandum within the period of one year. The defence claimed that Miss Cyr had first known Dufault was not going to marry her on May 12, 1922, and that Dufault's conditional promise of marriage had stipulated the pair were not to be married before May 15, 1923.

Mr. Henri St. Jacques represented Miss Cyr, and Mr. Joseph Sauve appeared for the defence.

PROHIBITIONISTS NOW HAVE PLENTY OF CASH

Funds Forthcoming For Campaign in Ontario Says One of Leaders

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—Very solemn and earnest warning was given here by Rev. Dr. Ernest Thomas, of Toronto, field secretary of the department of evangelism and social service of the Methodist Church of Canada, in respect to the prohibition issue in the province.

Rev. Dr. Thomas said that in the last two campaigns the temperance forces fought against an empty exchequer but they would not so fight this time, but against a full exchequer. He was not prepared to say definitely where the funds were emanating from, but he was definite in his assertions that the prohibition forces were in for a big fight against an internationally supported evil.

Dr. Thomas declared the prohibition forces would have won in Alberta in the recent fight if they could have got the facts across with regard to the benefits in dry areas in reduction of crime, etc.
