SPEECH FROM THRONE IN BRITAIN TODAY

GERMAN TOWN MUST PAY HUNDRED MILLION MARKS SHOOTING FRENCHMAN

British Parliament Opened Today With Reading of King's Speech Labor to Play an Important Role

LONDON, Feb. 13.—The Ruhr question was stressed in the speech from the throne at the opening session of parliament today. The address declared that although the British government was unable to concur or participate in the Ruhr operations, it was acting in such a way as not to add to the difficulties of the allies.

His Majesty welcomed the United States debt settlement, affecting the determination of the people to meet their obligations. The remainder of the speech was devoted largely to the expression of the hope that the Ruhr question would be settled and to domestic problems, particularly unemployment. The session opened with the usual ceremony and promises to be of exceptional interest. It is generally conceded that the Government faces an exacting task. Laborites make no concealment of the fact that they enter the session in a spirit of aggression, determined to force the issue and arouse Parliament in an unprecedented manner.

Labor's great plank, that of "no conscription of capital," will be aggressively pressed. Ramsay MacDonald is expected to call upon the Government to take the initiative with the co-operation of the United States, if possible to bring about the evacuation of Ruhr.

OLD PARTIES ARE TOGETHER

Vote Against Proposal to Change System of Responsibility in House

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—A motion by Irvine, labor member for East Calgary, in the House of Commons, declaring that the dissolution of the government measure should not be considered sufficient reason for the resignation of the government unless followed by a vote of lack of confidence, was defeated last night by a vote of 103 to 52, the government and conservative members uniting in voting against the resolution.

FAVOR STATES GRAIN ROUTE

President of Milling Company Alleges Discrimination Against Canadian Port

WINNIPEG, Feb. 13.—Discrimination against Port Colborne in favor of Buffalo in the matter of lake freights on wheat forced the closing down of the Maple Leaf Milling Company's Ontario mills last summer, so James Stewart, president of the company, stated in evidence today before the Royal Commission to investigate the alleged combine of Great Lakes interests.

DIED FROM BURNS WHEN CLOTHING CAUGHT FIRE

CHILLIWACK, Feb. 13.—Miss Mary Muirhead was so badly burned here when her clothing caught fire from a stove, that she died today from her injuries.

BIG FIGHT AT SHELBY

Montana Oil Town Raises Big Guarantee For Meeting of Dempsey and Tom Gibbons

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Feb. 13.—The oil town of Shelby near here will furnish Jack Kearns, Jack Dempsey's manager, with a guarantee stipulated by Kearns for a meeting there on July 4 between the champion and Tom Gibbons. Kearns required the posting of a check of \$100,000 as a guarantee that the bout would go through and an additional \$50,000 as a forfeit to the boxers in case the proffered purse is not raised. The amount has been subscribed.

CAPTAIN SWANSON WEDDED IN SOUTH

Skipper Expected Home Tomorrow Morning on Prince George With Bride Formerly Miss Eckstrom

Capt. Alfred Swanson, proprietor of the Prince Rupert Boat House, was married in Tacoma three weeks ago to Miss Marie Eckstrom, formerly of the Knox Hotel staff. They have been honeymooning since and are expected home tomorrow on the Prince George to take up their residence here. The doughty captain's friends along the waterfront are preparing to give him and his bride a royal reception on their return to the city.

LABOR APPOINTMENTS BRITISH UNIVERSITY

LONDON, Feb. 13.—Colonel J. C. Wedgwood, labor member for Newcastle-on-Tyne and W. Adams, labor member for West Fife, Scotland, have been appointed governors of the Birmingham university. This is the first occasion for labor representatives to be appointed to this kind of office.

Two Daring Daylight Robberies in Los Angeles; Bank Messenger Killed; Diamond Shop Plundered

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 13.—Samuel McGree, bank messenger, was shot and killed today in a daylight robbery by two automobile bandits who escaped with a bag containing bank funds, the amount of which is not definitely known. There were 150 registered packages in one parcel. Sol Cohen and two employees were held up in his store known as the Diamond Palace in the heart of the business district. The robber dashed from the shop with \$75,000 worth of diamonds and \$2,000 worth of gold. The bandit threw the diamonds in the face of a pursuer but escaped with the gold.

BONAR LAW IS HOPEFUL

But Feels That Actions of Germans or French Make Cause Breaking up of Entente

LONDON, Feb. 13.—Premier Bonar Law said in the House of Commons today that he still hoped it would be possible to retain the British troops in the Rhine valley but either the French or German governments could make it impossible. It would be a great misfortune if it became necessary to withdraw them, for it would mean the end of the Entente.

SIKI TO FIGHT FRENCH CHAMP

Ban on Negro is Lifted and General Amnesty for Fighters Declared

PARIS, Feb. 13.—The boxing federation has lifted the boxing ban on Siki, voting a general amnesty. M. Brouillet, Siki's manager, was delighted and said he planned to have Siki reconquer his forfeited championship as soon as possible. He will deposit with the federation a challenge for the light heavyweight championship of France. "As soon as Garpentier is finished with Beckett after May 11, he will be at the disposal of Siki," observed Francois Deschamps, Garpentier's manager.

DR. MAHAN'S DEATH DUE TO CARBOLIC POISONING

VANCOUVER, Feb. 13.—That the death of Dr. J. W. Mahan, whose body was found in Hastings Park, Saturday, was due to carbolic poisoning administered by himself while in a dazed condition brought on by chronic diabetes, was the verdict of the coroner's jury yesterday afternoon. Dr. Mahan had been missing from his home since January 31.

COLD STORAGE APPEALS TAXES

Court of Revision in Session Again This Morning Hears Waterfront Cases

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. Ltd. represented by J. W. Nicholls and W. E. Fisher, made appeal against the assessment of its property at Seal Cove at the court of revision this morning. Protests were entered at the valuation set on its waterfront charged against it. Mr. Nicholls stated that up to 1919 a fixed valuation of \$16,100 had been placed on the waterfrontage. In 1920 the valuation had been increased to \$52,500 but an appeal had been entered at the court of revision and reductions to \$25,300 had been obtained. In 1921 and 1922 the waterfrontage had been assessed at \$50 and \$40 a front foot but the company had been unable to appeal as the charge had been made against the railway company and in turn on the fish company. This year \$10 a front foot was the valuation which he considered 50 per cent too high. There was no reason why the assessment should jump from \$20 in 1919 to \$40 now. The value of industries to the city should be considered since rentals were based by the railway company at 6 per cent of the assessed value, his company being the only one at the present time to be exempted from that rule.

Improvement Value Speaking of improvements, Mr. Nicholls stated that the property had been appraised three years ago and its value was certified at from \$250,000 to \$300,000 as against the assessed value of improvements placed on the city assessment roll at \$500,000. Mayor Newton asked why protest was made at the valuation of improvements when no levy was made upon them to which Mr. Nicholls replied that it was merely to guard against the possibility of the city at any time making an improvement levy. Ald. Stephens and Ald. Colhart were inclined to sympathize with the view of Mr. Nicholls.

Assessor McLennan explained that the valuation of improvements had been originally arrived at, he understood, on the basis of building permits. It had been carried on from year to year and this year had been merely copied from last.

Improvement Tax

There was some discussion of the possibility of imposing improvement taxation and Ald. Colhart expressed favor for a plan of reducing improvement assessments from year to year over the city generally in view of deterioration. The case was laid over for decision until a later date, pending discussion.

The Imperial Oil Co.'s appeal was again dealt with this morning by the court and was referred back to the assessor for report.

Representatives of fish companies with premises at the government wharf, who were also heard today, contended that they should not be assessed on a waterfrontage really basis owing to their wharf frontage being a public thoroughfare. These cases were referred to the city solicitor for attention. The court adjourned shortly before 12 until 2 this afternoon. Present at the court this morning were Ald. Stephens (chair-

German Town Fined by French for Shooting Gendarmes when Car was Stopped by Police

DUSSELDORF, Feb. 13.—The town of Gelsenkirchen has been fined 100,000,000 marks to be paid tomorrow in consequence of an incident between the German police and French gendarmes. The burgomaster, chief of police, and policemen believed to be guilty of taking part in the affair, have been arrested.

PARIS, Feb. 13.—A German policeman was killed and two French gendarmes were wounded in an affair at Gelsenkirchen in Ruhr, says the French official report. A policeman stopped the gendarmes' car and threatened them with a revolver. The gendarmes fired on the policeman who fell. Six policemen from a nearby post thereupon fired upon and wounded the gendarmes.

NOTHING NEW SEATTLE BAIT

Difficulty There is to Get the Herring As None Caught Near Port T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company, on being shown the press telegram from Seattle this morning in regard to bait, stated that there was nothing new in the announcement. Seattle had been putting up bait for years whenever they could get the herring but it was difficult to get them on. Alberni, on the west coast of Vancouver Island, was the nearest point where herring were found and those were Canadian herrings.

Mr. Johnson said their seining boat, the Fredelia, had already taken one lot of fresh herring and was out after more. This was rather early for these fish, and he did not expect any large quantities for some time. They had plenty for the needs of the fishermen, however.

THORNTON IS ENTHUSED AT GREAT WEST

Says Mineral Development Will Equal Agriculture and Possibly Excel it TORONTO, Feb. 13.—Referring to his recent trip in the West, Sir Henry Thornton, addressing the Canadian Club here said there existed in the West mineral development which in importance would in time equal if not excel the possibilities of agricultural development.

FOOTBALL SECRETARY COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Charged With Theft of Over Four Thousand Dollars Funds of Organization WINNIPEG, Feb. 13.—David W. Roy, former secretary of the Dominion Football Association has been committed for trial on a charge of theft of \$4,157.63 of the funds of the football organization. The accounts of the association did not account for the money which it is charged Roy appropriated to his own use.

Protected Harbor Benefit To Place.

It is a great thing to have a protected harbor. There have been times when small boats have been injured by a south-westerly gale, but the wind seldom blows from the southwest here and when it does, only small craft are likely to be injured and then only when not properly moored. There never has been anything happen here such as was reported from Seattle yesterday. The harbor is much better protected than is Seattle harbor. When the big gales blow up that harbor, even large vessels find it difficult to make a landing. Prince Rupert is said to have the fourth best harbor in the world and this, fact should count in thinking of shipping prospects.

British Method Is "Leave Nothing To Chance."

The British are supposed to do things in a happy-go-lucky manner. British people sneer at their governments and at their own methods of doing things. Yet when it comes to matters of peace and war, such as that presented in the Near East today, they have shown on most occasions that they are ready for every contingency. Just now they are moving their warships up in the direction of Turkey so that if it should be necessary to strike a blow they may strike quickly and with no uncertain force.

Every country makes mistakes. There have been all kinds of grave mistakes made by even the best organized countries. Germany made the mistake of underestimating some things and over estimating others. The result was disastrous to her. The British authorities are aware of the value of preparedness and the present Turkish rampage is to be no exception to the general rule.

Shivering People But Mercury High.

People here have been shivering for the past day or two, yet the cold has not been at all intense. The mercury has kept well above the zero point all the time, while almost everywhere east of here they have been having from thirty to forty degrees more cold. Cold is largely comparative. The present snap is colder than we have had for some years so we notice it more than usual. If it was customary to see the mercury sink below the zero mark we should not think this cold. We should wear furs and woolen clothes and not mind the cold. As it is, we are not prepared for the cold and we shiver and wish for a change. Einstein's theory of relativity is illustrated in this.

Picturing Canada For The Movies.

The United States has been exploited in the movies to such an extent that now the people of that country are turning to Canada. They have used up Alaska until Alaskan pictures have become dead monotony. In this country, however, they can still find thrills.

We would like to suggest to the movie producers that Prince Rupert offers opportunities for novelty in movie making. Stories based on the halibut fishing industry of this place and with scenic effects based on the surrounding country might well take their place among the great pictures of the day.

An attempt was made by the United States protectionists to exclude Canadian pictures from their market. This was prevented by the united efforts of the producers. A recent editorial in the Moving Picture World sets out their point of view:

"There is in our opinion no nationality in art, in sculpture, in painting, in music, in literature, in the drama or on the screen. To interfere with the development of moving pictures by protective tariffs is commercial blundering which America cannot afford to share. It has been the profound and often expressed belief of this publication that all the world should be kept in free and open competition in screen production."

"The screen's debt to Canada is heavy. Mary Pickford and Bert Lytell are only two instances. Ralph Connor and Sir Gilbert Parker are illustrious cases in point. Mack Sennett and Ernest Shipman offer fine examples as the producers of successful pictures."

"Canada should make her own pictures for a free and unhindered market. Canada can make her own pictures as is proved by such productions as 'Back to God's Country' and other James Oliver Curwood successes, 'The Sky Pilot' and other Ralph Connor productions."

"The picture industry in the United States cannot be linked with the tariff politicians. We welcome Canada and its product."

BOXING OUTLOOK FOR YEAR 1923

Five Champions it is Expected Will be Dethroned—Will be Interesting Season

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Five of the eight universally recognized boxing champions are likely to be dethroned this year in the opinion of ring critics, while title-holders in the other three divisions probably also will face strenuous opposition in an effort to retain their laurels. The general outlook is for one of the most interesting fight programs in many years.

Pugilistic kings considered to be in imminent danger of losing their world crowns are: Jimmy Wolfe, of England, flyweight; Joe Lynch, of New York, bantamweight; Johnny Kilbane, of Cleveland, featherweight; Johnny Wilson, of Boston, middleweight; and Battling Siki, of France and Senegal, light heavyweight.

The other titleholders—Benny Leonard, of New York, lightweight; Mickey Walker, of Elizabeth, N.J., welterweight; and Jack Dempsey, heavyweight—are favored to stay at the top, but while the opposition in their respective ranks is not considered more than threatening, there is always the chance that any of them will receive a fatal tap on the chin.

Interest in Dempsey Chief interest promises to center upon Dempsey, who plans an active outdoor campaign after a lapse of nearly two years since his memorable fight with Georges Carpentier. Several of his challengers may make it more than interesting for the champion, but the present prospect is that he will successfully retain his laurels. He is to fight Beckett in New York in the summer but no change is expected.

Wildie, who has been inactive for some time, has been challenged for a title match by Pancho Villa, the scrappy Filipino who took the American flyweight title away from Johnny Buff last year. Villa not only has taken the measure of the best American flyweights, but he has frequently gone out of his class with decisive success.

The Filipino is ambitious to duplicate Buff's feat in holding both the flyweight and bantamweight belts and has a following which would be ready to back him strongly in a title bout with Joe Lynch. The latter faces two other formidable challengers in Carl Tremaine, hard-hitting Clevelander, and Irish Johnny Curtin, of Jersey City, N.J.

Kilbane to Fight Kilbane has agreed to stake his featherweight title against the Frenchman, Eugene Ciriqi, holder of the European championship, in a match at the Polo Grounds on Decoration Day. Ciriqi, young and aggressive, will have much in his favor against Kilbane, who has slowed up as a result of a long period of inactivity.

Wilson, another inactive champion, will have difficulty retaining his title if he accepts the challenges of several formidable 160-pound boxers, including Tommy Loughran, of Philadelphia, Harry Greb, of Pittsburgh, who also holds the American light heavyweight title, and Bryan Dowsey, of Cleveland. Wilson is not recognized as champion in a number of states because of his tactics in avoiding championship matches.

Gold is still recognized in this country as the champion despite the ruling of French authorities depriving him of the title because of alleged improper conduct. Reports have been current that he intends to seek several bouts in the United States during the summer.

Leonard's Many Rivals Benny Leonard faces several strong contenders in the lightweight ranks, including Lew Tindler, of Philadelphia; Sailor Froedman, and Charley White, both of Chicago. But the fact that he has previously conquered all three inclines critics to the opinion that he will continue to remain supreme. The suggestion has been made frequently that Leonard, however, may find difficulty keeping inside the lightweight limit of 135 pounds and eventually be compelled to seek honors in the welter-weight division. Although he failed last summer in an attempt to take the title from Jack Britton, losing to the veteran on a foul, Leonard would be a formidable opponent for Walker, who captured the championship from Britton. Dave Shade, of California, and Andy Thomas, of New York, are other top-ranking welter-weights.

APPLICATIONS FOR CITY JOBS

Will be Called for Council Decided at Last Night's Meeting

The city council last night decided to advertise for applications for all positions in the city service now held by employees under notice for February 28, applications to be in by February 26. A motion to this effect which also set out that no less than \$75 would be paid for stenographers and no less than \$125 would be paid clerks was submitted by Ald. Collart and Ald. Stephens, and passed by the council. Ald. Mackenzie and Ald. Macdonald voting against it.

In speaking to the motion, Ald. Collart explained that it was the intention to have the city reorganization settled definitely at as early a date as possible. This would also give the new heads a better chance to effectively reconstruct their departments.

Ald. Mackenzie and Ald. Macdonald took the view that the heads should at first be allowed to see what they already had before calling for applications.

Ald. Mackenzie was strenuously against positioning for applicants for positions already held by efficient employees giving good service. Ald. Stephens felt that calling for applications would have no detrimental effect on the present employees.

Ald. Munro criticized the setting out of salaries but it was explained to him that the appointments would not necessarily be made outside of the present staff just because new applicants might choose to apply at the minimums. The setting out of the minimums, Ald. Collart explained, was more a matter of information and applicants would not be required to state salaries expected.

Ald. Stephens felt that more clerks and fewer sub-officials with titles would give the city more efficient and less expensive service.

NEW BRIDGE BYLAW READ

Property Owners to Vote on \$23,500 Structure Instead of \$47,000 One Already Endorsed

The city council last night put through its first reading a by-law for the construction of a \$23,500 timber bridge across Hays Creek instead of the \$47,000 steel composite structure which was endorsed by the property holders at the recent civic election. It is proposed to have the by-law voted upon on March 1, and at the same time a by-law calling for endorsement of the \$50,000 expenditure for the reconditioning of the Booth Memorial School may be presented.

There was some discussion as to the matter of the contracts for the first by-law and the mayor wanted to be sure that there was no chance of legal technicalities arising therefrom before the new bylaw was proceeded with. Ald. Munro assured his Worship that the city could be cleared of the old contracts. The bylaw will come up for final reading next week and, in the meantime, the city solicitor will prepare a report on the original bylaw and the contracts.

RAILWAY COMPANY CLAIM REFUNDS

Overcharges in Connection with 1921 and 1922 Taxation Are Alleged in Letter to City Council

The tax commissioner of the Canadian National Railways is asking the city for refunds in connection with certain of the company's water-frontage taxation. A letter setting out the claims was received at last night's council meeting and referred to the Finance Committee for report.

The first claim is that for the years 1921 and 1922 taxation was duplicated on land leased by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., both the railway company and the Gold Storage Company being assessed. A refund

or deduction on this year's assessment is requested.

The second claim is that the railway company was assessed for 1920 feet of waterfrontage in 1921 and 1922 when the actual measurement was 719 feet. Based on the mill rates of the two years, refund of \$163.81 for 1921 and \$349.31 for 1922 are asked for.

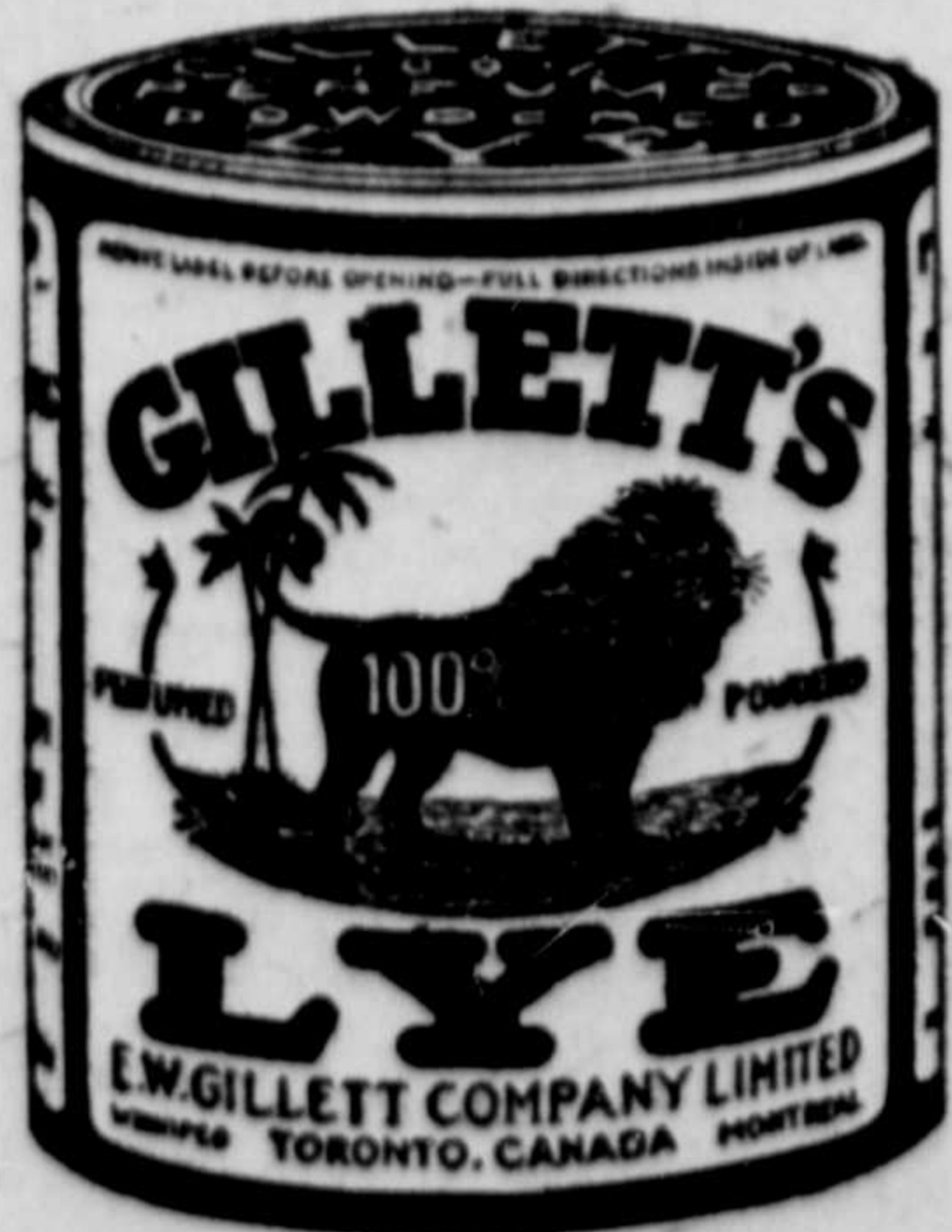
The plan, while it calls for a reduction in salaries at the present time, provides for salary increases with each year of service, something which has never been in operation in England before.

SMOKE OGDEN'S CUT PLUG

BLINDPIGGERS AND BOOTLEGGERS HAVE FLOURISHING TIME

So Attorney General is Told by Investigators: Buy All Liquor Wanted

VICTORIA, Feb. 13.—Bootlegging, high-jacking, liquor dealing and liquor consuming are all running wild in Vancouver, according to information given to the Government by Lynn Browne and A. E. Johnson, who have been investigating conditions in order to voluntarily to assist Attorney-General Manson in enforcing the law.

They told the Government that they found bootleggers and blind-piggers flourishing in parts of downtown Vancouver and specified the Georgia and Robson street districts, where they said they could take Cabinet Ministers to dozens of places and buy them all the liquor they wanted to drink or carry away. They asserted that one of the features of this liquor they could get in this wet district was without the Government label.

They also made a written statement that liquor gangs in Vancouver were now so daring that they held daily sessions in a leading hotel of that city.

ONE SHARE C.N.R. STOCK IS HELD BY ENGLISH INVESTOR

Canada Owns Whole Road With the Sole Exception of One Hundred Dollars

TORONTO, Feb. 13. — The Canadian Government has owned all the capital stock of the Grand Trunk Railway system for some time, and when this week the Minister of Finance, representing the only shareholder, voted to exchange his holdings for stock in the Canadian National Railways there was no change of ownership; merely a formal act. But the case of the Canadian Northern Railway system is different. Here there is presented one of the most amazing circumstances that could be imagined.

Partner With Dominion Canadian people think they own the Canadian-Northern Railway system. They are wrong. Canada is merely the majority stockholder in the line. The Minister of Finance representing the people of Canada holds \$100,000,500 of the stock of the railway. A certain individual, an English investor, holds \$100 of this stock. This person is partner with the Dominion of Canada in the ownership of a railway system 10,000 miles long. True, the proportion of his holdings of stock to those of Canada is less than 1 to 1,000,000 but so long as he holds his stock he is one of the two partners. His stock is not earning any dividends. Its value is problematical except insofar as a man might feel some pride in being the only stockholder in the C.N.R. outside of the Dominion of Canada.

Others Sold Out The manner in which this individual became possessed of his single share of stock is this:

when the C.N.R. was built one of the securities issued to raise capital was the convertible debenture stock, the 5% income charge issue. A total of \$25,000,000 was issued, all of it convertible up to a certain date in common stock. Only 8000 was converted before the date of expiration of the privilege. Of this, 8500 was held by a California investor and 8100 by an English investor. The 8500 held in California has been bought in by the government but it is un-derstood that the 8100 held in England is still outstanding although, of course, there are negotiations under foot seeking to purchase that share for the Minister of Finance.

But until it is definitely purchased, the entire question of the amalgamation of the various government lines remains—in a strictly legal standing—in abeyance.

NEW CATHEDRAL FOR VICTORIA IS PLANNED

Bishop Schofield Urges That Time Has Come for Great Work

VICTORIA, Feb. 13.—Speaking to the Diocesan Synod Bishop Schofield in his charge referred to the new cathedral buildings scheme. The Bishop said: "The time has come, when I truly believe God means us to undertake this great work to His glory, and the good of the church in this place. Four years ago we deliberately put our building scheme upon one side until we had done our share in the Anglican Forward Movement. Again we delayed it that we might do our long delayed duty regarding the stipends of the mission clergy. With God's blessing upon our efforts these matters have been put right, and having provided in what all must recognize as a trying year, that our current obligations on the increased basis can be sustained, it were cowardly and faithless not to hear God's call to undertake these new buildings, so much needed for worship and service. "If by beginning soon we can help even in a small way to provide employment when it is so sorely needed, the circumstances will supply additional emphasis to the call which I am endeavoring to interpret to you. Those of us who by self denial or special effort can contribute now will do so the more willingly if thereby we can help those in need of work."

NEW SAWMILL FOR PORT ALBERNI IS PLANNED BY SPRATT

VICTORIA, Feb. 13.—Construction of a sawmill which will rank among the largest lumber-producing plants on Vancouver Island has been started at Port Alberni by G. J. V. Spratt, lumberman and President of the Victoria Machinery Depot, Ltd. Under plans announced by Mr. Spratt, the mill will produce 100,000 feet of lumber a day. This output will be shipped by rail and boat to Canadian, American and overseas markets. Mr. Spratt explained. The mill will have rail connection with Canadian Pacific Railway system by the Esquimalt & Nanaimo Railway and wharves at which the largest lumber-carrying vessels can berth. The new mill should be operating late in May. Mr. Spratt stated. Construction of the mill foundation has been started with the driving of piles on the Port Alberni waterfront.

Five Logging Camps

Five logging camps at various points on the Alberni Canal will supply logs for the mill. The operators own extensive holdings of fir and timber. The cedar cut on these holdings will be used to make shingles in a shingle mill, which will form part of the plant.

Construction of the new Port Alberni mill is a result of the present big boom in British Columbia lumbering operations. Present marked activity in lumbering was caused chiefly by enormous demands from the Atlantic seaboard which is now consuming a large part of the output of British Columbia mills.

COLLEGE STUDENTS FINANCE THEMSELVES

Cudgets Taken up in Defence of Men Who Attend University

TORONTO, Feb. 13.—Aided and abetted by the movies, popular fiction and the ubiquitous college comic joke, the general public has formed a unique idea of the average university student. It is granted by some that his main characteristic is ability to tell dad how to run things. He is an ultra-up-to-the-minute lad who wears distinctive clothes and plays the banjo or ukelele. He is a person who has a great deal of theory and little practical knowledge.

A rough and ready census of

the University of Toronto is apt to deal a body blow to this long cherished opinion. Getting a college education is an operation that requires a certain amount of financial backing and ninety per cent of the male students at the University of Toronto finance themselves to some extent at least. Furthermore a large percentage of this ninety per cent are working at some outside occupation during the college year. Working at some outside occupation necessitates rubbing shoulders with a bit of the unacademic world and learning a number of things that the student would not have learned if he had gone directly into some office or business after leaving high school.

JEW IN PALESTINE

White Paper Just Issued by British Government Deals With Subject

In a white paper just issued by the British Government reference is made to the policy of the British towards Jews in Palestine as follows:

(1) His Majesty's Government reaffirm the Declaration of November, 1917, which is not susceptible to change.

(2) A Jewish National Home will be founded in Palestine. The Jewish people will be in Palestine as of right and not on sufferance. But His Majesty's Government have no such aim in view as that Palestine should become as Jewish as England is English.

(3) Nor do His Majesty's Government contemplate the disappearance or subordination of the Arab population, language or culture.

(4) The status of all citizens of Palestine will be Palestinian. No section of the population will have any other status in the eyes of the law.

(5) His Majesty's Government intend to foster the establishment of a full measure of self-government in Palestine, and as the next step a Legislative Council with a majority of elected members will be set up immediately.

(6) The special position of the Zionist Executive does not entitle it to share in any degree in the government of the country.

(7) Immigration will not exceed the economic capacity of the country to absorb new arrivals.
