Burned Roundhouse Not Much Loss.

The square roundhouse, which excited the mirth of a Dominion cabinet minister of the old regime, was not much of a building and its burning will not prove a very great loss, although there will be inconvenience as a result. It is to be hoped that the railway company will now see its way clear to erect a proper building, suitable to the needs of the port. It is possible that the drydock machine shops may be utilized for the work. At any rate, doubtless, the railway management will take such steps as will serve the interests of the company best and we shall have a roundhouse after many years of waiting.

Advise Perusal Of Contractor's Statement.

Those interested in civic affairs, and especially in the Booth School trouble will do well to peruse carefully the statement issued today by Colonel McMordie in regard to the building of the school and his conduct therewith. It sheds light on many things not hitherto explained and is well worthy of the time and effort required to read it.

Colonel McMordie says he would like to have gone into some of the matters at greater length but knowing the limitations of a newspaper he tried to hold himself down to the essentials.

Many people will be glad that the Colonel has taken the trouble to clear himself of some of the aspersions which have been cast upon him and his work in connection with the contract.

Will Not Discuss Civic Servants.

Outside of the statement that the Daily News is in favor of strict economy in the civic service, this paper refuses to be drawn into any controversy in regard to the right or wrong of the action of the city council in its dealing with officials or employees at this time. The mayor and aldermen were elected by the city to carry on the work in the most efficient manner possible and it would be most unwise to try to hamper them by interference from the outside, especially from those who have not a full knowledge of the situation. Efficiency cannot be secured if there is to be government by newspaper. The civic situation was discussed at considerable length during the election and the present council is the choice of the electors made at that time.

While the general policy of the council is at all times open to criticism and if there is wrong doing there may well be criticism of the methods used or of any detail of their work, at the same time allowance must be made for individual differences of opinion and members of the council should be allowed unrestricted action just as would a board of directors of a company. If there is to be economy, naturally someone will suffer. There is no other way. All changes involve hardship to some and inconvenience to others. When the Grandby Company was reorganized, the whole management staff was let out and new officials installed, not because they were all inefficient but because they were not in full sympathy with the new order of things. So it has been in many other places. We feel the greatest sympathy with some of the officials who have been let out and would like to have seen things handled differently. Some of them have been friends of members of the Daily News staff, but it would have been most unwise from a civic point of view to have made the dismissal of public servants an issue against the council. They have to get results for the citizens and the ways and means are in their hands. If they do not get results they will have to give place to others at the end of the year.

ASSESSMENT PROPOSITION

Text of Offer Made to City Council by G.T.P. Development Co. Ltd.

The following is the proposition regarding assessment and taxation which has been submitted to the city by the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Co. Ltd. through its representative at the court of revision, W. McLarnon:

"The G.T.P. Development Co. Ltd. holds clear title to 3,372 lots in Sections 3, 4 and 9 in the city of Prince Rupert and I hereby offer on behalf of the company to transfer the whole of these unsold lots to the city for the nominal payment of \$1.00 for the city to use or dispose of as it sees fit, provided—

"First, that the city will either exempt this property from taxation for 1923 or will pay the 1923 taxes itself;

"Second, that the assessment of the G.T.P. Development Co. Ltd. on the following acreage parcels be reduced to the list price of the G.T.P. Development Co. for 1923 and be not increased subsequently unless said list price be also increased.

"The acreage parcels mentioned in the preceding paragraph and the list price thereon are as follows:

"Parcel 1—90 acres, list price \$50 an acre.

"Parcel 2A—24.5 acres, list price \$50 an acre.

"Parcel 30—10.6 acres, list price \$500 an acre.

"Parcel 19—347 acres, list price \$50 per acre.

"The city must also agree to register the transfer immediately upon receipt of same.

"After ten days this offer is subject to prior sale."

This is the proposition which was referred last week by the court of revision to the city council.

COUGAR SMITH KILLS FIVE BIG PANTHERS

Uses Airedales to Tree Big Cats and Then Shoots Them

COURTENAY, Feb. 14. —With five panther skins draped round his car on his way through Courtenay on Tuesday to collect the bounty, Bob Smith, known generally as "Cougar" Smith, of Union Bay, told of his hunting.

He had been told by the game warden at Nanaimo that there were five panthers causing great slaughter among the deer in the Cameron Lake district and he got his brother to drive him out with his three dogs and bagged the lot. He was out ten days but he secured the five big cats within a week. He made his headquarters at Cameron Lake but roamed widely from that point going far towards Cowichan Lake in one direction and Alberni in another. The snow was wet and excellent for tracking. His dogs are two airedales and another little fellow of assorted pedigree. But this pup of unknown parentage saved Mr. Smith a night out in the woods on the day he pursued the biggest of the cats down towards Cowichan Lake. He had lost his way and would have had to stay where he was if the little dog had not taken up the scent and found his way out. It was pretty hard work hunting these panthers. At one place Mr. Smith had to cross a gully 75 feet above water on a none too steady windfall and the going was hard in the snow.

A lot of panther are being killed this year on this end of the island and Bob Smith has secured his share of them. Since the middle of December he has collected bounty on 13 of the big cats and his bag for the year has amounted to 30.

The municipal court of revision is through with the hearing of cases and is now in session considering the appeals with a view to making reduction or sustaining the assessments. Certain properties in Sections 1 and 2 were considered yesterday afternoon and some tentative reductions made. The court expects to finish its work by tomorrow.

STATEMENT BY McMORDIE ON SCHOOL CONTRACT AND HIS RELATION THERETO

(Continued from Page One.)

each showed a lamentable ignorance of life and brick construction. Mr. Jeffers, and Mr. Hugh Whitaker gave unbiased reports. The former is the leading advocate of tile construction in Western Canada, and with the improvements now made by him, Booth School is today a better building than if only the original plans and specifications had been carried out.

Purchased by Tender
1. The material supplied wherever possible purchased by tender and in each case the lowest tenderer received the contract, and the best material obtainable was supplied. The rough lumber was supplied by LePine & Wright; the hardware by Howe & McNulty; the paints and oils by Silversides Bros.; the finishing lumber, cement and lime by Albert & McCaffery, and so on. The pressed brick and tile I purchased myself, as I received prices much lower than any tender. The sand was supplied by V. Basso-Bert, and all the material supplied was selected by the architect, and ordered on his instructions. Mr. Potter acknowledges this in his letter published in the Daily News on the 5th of June, 1922.

2. Regarding the workmanship on the school, I contend that the mechanics employed were as good as can be found in British Columbia, and with the exception of some of the brick-layers, were all local men. Most of the brick-layers employed by Mr. Jeffers, in repairing the wall, were the same men who built the walls originally.

Sub-Contractors
3. Construction. All the work of building the school was let to various sub-contractors, with the exception of the lower part of the brick and tile walls, which were built by myself on day's labor, with J. McGowan and E. Peyton acting as foremen. Steen & Longwill had a sub-contract for roofing, heating and plumbing; Pattinson & Ling for wiring; V. Basso-Bert for the masonry walls; William Watts for the carpenter work, and Fred Godwin for the remainder of the brick and tile work. Architect Jeffers said the roof was the best he had seen in ten years, and I think all credit for this good work should go to Steen & Longwill, my sub-contractors, who did the work. In the same way some parts of the upper brick and tile walls, built by another of my sub-contractors, Fred Godwin, were found to be faulty, but I think, whatever blame there is, should go to him, as the Architect gave his orders direct to the sub-contractors. The School Board should have had a Clerk of the works, on the job all the time and, if Mr. Potter was acting in that capacity, he should have been there to see that the work was done to his satisfaction.

Two Mistakes
In building the upper portions of the brick and tile walls in which defects appeared, two mistakes were made, and they were not made by me. The first mistake was made in using bricks that were wet, and the second was in laying brick in wet and freezing weather. When the brick first arrived on the job, I started to build a house over them to protect them from the weather, but I was stopped by Mr. Potter, and it was not for months, and after the bricks had been soaked by the rain, that he permitted me to put a cover over them. It was then too late. Regarding the second mistake, any one who is conversant

with contracts will know that the contractor is altogether under the orders of the architect. If he says "Stop work," the contractor must stop. If he says "work," the contractor must work, for the architect or engineer, as the case may be, is the final judge on all matters pertaining to the contract. I protested to Mr. Potter against the work proceeding in unfavorable weather, but he said that was all right, and insisted that if he proceeded with, and I was obliged to do as I was ordered. As a matter of fact, on one occasion, I received a letter from Mr. Potter, notifying me that, if the work was not proceeded with immediately, he would obtain other men, and do the work. The part of the brick and tile wall, which I built by day labor has been found to be absolutely good and sound.

Brick Not Suitable
And here I wish to make one fact plain. The kind of wall construction specified for the school, is not suitable in this climate and will not keep out the wet. The Court House walls are of a similar but much heavier construction, and they failed to keep out the wet. The brick are so porous, and the rains are so heavy, that under such conditions pressure the water passes through the bricks. The following is a copy of a letter referring to the school from Mr. McNeil, who built the Court House, and who has probably built more buildings of a construction similar to the school than any other man in Western Canada.

Essondale, B.C.,
Feb. 6, 1923.
S. P. McMordie, Esq.,
Contractor, Prince Rupert, B.C.
Dear Sir:
"In reply to your letter of the 10th inst. I wish to state that from what I know of Prince Rupert weather conditions that the four inch brick and tile construction even built under most favorable circumstances will not keep out moisture unless a glazed or vitrified brick is used.

Vice-Pres. McDougall & McNeil, Limited."

I may say here that the brick used in the school was not the one I had selected—which was a hard burned brick and one that would absorb very little moisture. I am satisfied that if the brick had been kept dry, and wall construction had been proceeded with in good weather, the walls would have been sound, but would have required water-proofing to keep out the wet.

Saved City \$5,000
May I refer again to my contract with the School Board. Under this contract I received from the Board \$197,092.88. The building was complete with the exception of the fire-escapes.
In the construction of the school, there were very few extras, but the extra work done would amount to at least \$5,000 so that I actually completed the school for the price given in the tender received, and saved the city the cost of the extra work.

which would mean a saving of about \$5,000.
Before I was released by the Board, they appointed an auditor who checked over my accounts with the School Board, and I hold a copy of the report which he gave the Board, stating that my accounts were correct, that I had produced vouchers for all expenditures, and paid the parties concerned.

Matter of Profits
Of the total sum of \$197,092.88 received by me from the Board, \$12,748.22 was my percentage on the work done. Out of this I paid my office clerk \$175 per month, paid also for the plant and sundry expenses—a total of nearly \$5,000. The balance was payment for my services for the eighteen months work which I put on the school, and I have paid the City of Prince Rupert, directly or through my agents, more than this amount in taxes since I returned from overseas.
I have been contracting for more than twenty years, and this is the first piece of my work which has been adversely criticized. Let me point out that there was no incentive for me to make a poor job of the school. There was every incentive to erect a building of which we could all be proud. If the work was poorly done, I was the loser in reputation as a builder.
It seems remarkable that defects in the school building, and cost of repairing, should be so severely criticized, when little criticism is made of the excessive cost of the street surfacing of Section 1. The school cost less than \$200,000 and the repairs are said to have cost about \$50,000, an increase of about 25 per cent. The street surfacing was to have cost \$70,000 and did cost \$155,000, an increase of over 120 per cent, and the work of surfacing the streets was no more creditable than the work on

the school. Why not have a little honest criticism of this road surfacing "mess?"

Engineering Joke
What about the engineering joke which is being perpetrated on Fourth and Fifth Avenues? I refer to the "ditch" which is being dug on these streets to serve the residents as a roadway. A new plank roadway there should not have cost more than \$9,000, and would have been good for at least ten years. The roadway, which is being made now, when surfaced, will cost more than \$50,000.
It would appear that the good of the city is not the only important motive actuating some of the critics of the school. In fact I believe that it is generally agreed that much of the criticism originated in the warped minds of petty politicians, who have used the school as an excuse to give vent to their political and personal spite.
W. A. McKenzie, conservative member for Similkameen, brought the matter of the Booth School to the attention of the Legislative Assembly at Victoria. He had in his possession a complete file covering the Booth School, signed by the late city engineer. The late city engineer says he sent nothing to Mr. McKenzie. Who was the local petty politician who did?

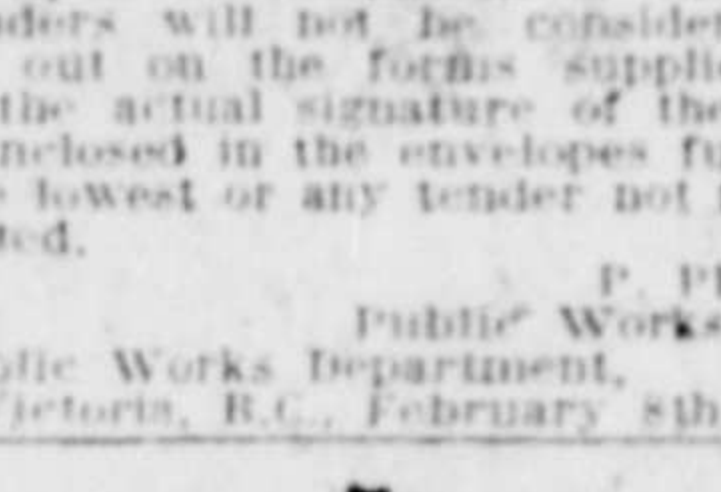

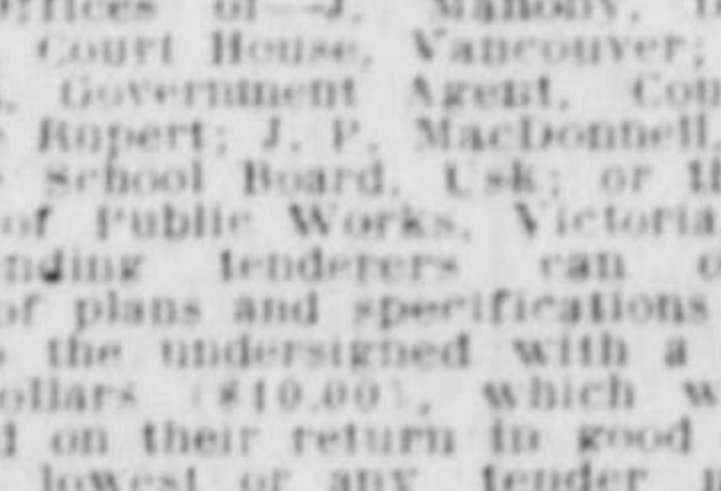

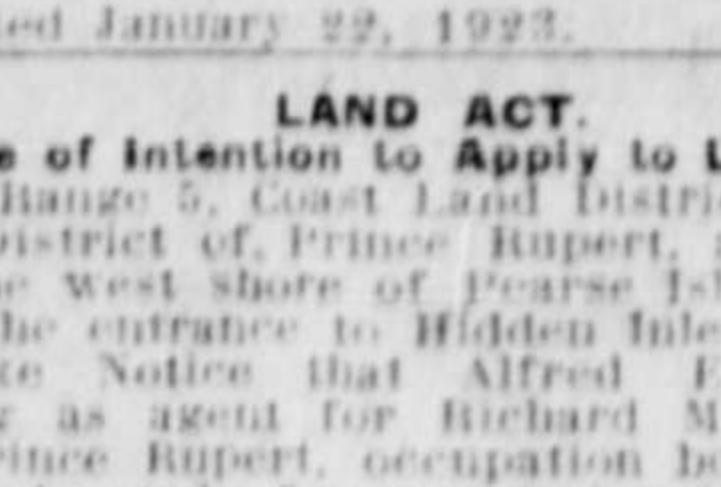
