Eight Hour Day Bill Effective Year from Now: Amendments to Other Bills Voted Down Yesterday

VICTORIA, Dec. 19 .- The eight hour day bill, which is to be introduced into the Legislature shortly, is, according to draft of the bill, to become operative on January 1, 1925. It will affect all major industries in the province with special provision for overtime in seasonable industries.

TANGIERS, Dec. 19 .- Raisuli, the notorious Moorish bandit chieftain, is dead.

wipe out the traffic altogether and turn once more to prohibition as the solution. If the people decide, as they are very likely to do, that they want beer by the glass, greater activity will be shown immediately to rid the country of the traffic, possibly by Dominion enactment.

It would have seemed the right thing to have had a plebiscite on prohibition at the same time that it is given on beer selling. The only supposition is that the financial demands of the government make them slow to take action along those lines. While it is very doubtful if prohibition would carry just now, there seems no good reason why the people should not have it if they want it. The agitation for prohibition has been even more pronounced than has the demand for beer. As a matter of fact there has been no demand for the sale of beer by the glass except from those who are financially interested.

The plebiscite, if favorable to beer, will be the first nai in the coffin of the so called Moderation Act.


