Seven Additional Corpses Are Found in Bay of St. George, Newfoundland—Twenty-Five in All Believed to Have Perished

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 7:-Several additional bodies from the ill-fated steamer Sandbeach, which is believed to have been wrecked off the coast of Newfoundland, were found on the shores of the Bay of St. George today. So far, seven bodies have been recovered, twenty-five members of the ship's crew having supposedly lost their lives. Whether the steamer was wrecked during the week-end gale or blown up by a store of gun cotton she had on board has not yet been ascertained.






