## HOSPITAL FINANCES REPORTED TO BOARD

**Japanese Association Make Good Donation to Local Institution: Collections Made**

At the meeting of the hospital board last night, president D. G. Stewart in the chair, the finance committee reported that during the month of August there were more patients in the hospital than had been the case before this year the number of hospital days in the aggregate being 1359. This had brought down the cost per patient to \$3.00 on the average.

The committee also reported on collection trips to the Skeena River made by Secretary Birch. He had gone there four times and had collected accounts amounting to \$901.15 as well as one membership fee and two five dollar donations from Japanese.

The officers of the Japanese Association of Port Essington had recently visited the hospital and paid up old Japanese accounts amounting to \$211.80 and at the same time given a donation to the institution of \$148.20, making a check in all for \$360. This was much appreciated by the board and an acknowledgement will be made through the secretary.

The salaries for August amounted to \$1,749.84.

### POLYTECHNIC CLASSES TO START OCTOBER 8





Doings of the Mosquito Fleet which is the chief source of Prince Rupert's prosperity

The Admiral of the Mosquito fleet reports that the fish arrivals during the earlier part of the week have again been light while the prices for fish offered have remained high. Reports to hand indicate that this condition of things is due in a measure to the aftermath of the heavy wind storm which struck the deep sea grounds some two weeks ago and considerably tied up the fishing operations. It is also reported that the big schooners have been experiencing some difficulty in obtaining fresh bait in the north, and in some cases boats have been held up for a week waiting for the necessary hook food. However, the fresh bait shortage has been remedied and the schooners are now busily engaged again in regular fishing on the northern banks. Incoming skippers say that the weather conditions now prevailing on the deep sea grounds are all that can be desired and predict heavier arrivals of halibut in the near future. The waterfront business started off well on Monday when 170,200 pounds of halibut was landed. On Tuesday the landings dropped to 71,000 pounds and the prices went up with a bang on the Fish Exchange, the American schooners obtaining 17.2c for first class fish while Canadians got 14.5c. Only four fishing boats put into port on Thursday, one American and three Canadians, with a total of 28,000 pounds, the American schooner Success receiving 17c and 11c, and the Canadian schooner Rover 15.4c and 11c. Yesterday proved a busy day in nautical circles when 251,000 pounds of fish arrived in port, and prices dropped.

There is a lull in shipyard activities along the waterfront which is usually the case at this time of year.

The Indian flootilla, anchored in Cow Bay base for the Fair week, left for home ports on Monday. These boats have returned to the Naas, Kitkatla and Port Simpson.

A strange visitor arrived on the waterfront this week from the West Indies to be introduced to Herb Hampton, but Herb was not particularly impressed with its presence. The visitor was a huge spider of the tarantula species and arrived addressed to Herb in a box of bananas from his friend the Indian prince of West India fame. Our hero first noticed the spider when it put out its mitt to shake hands while clinging to a banana with the other. Herb wasn't having any handshaking that day and quietly but bravely put the insect-eating monster into a glass jar. The spider has caused a great deal of interest on the waterfront but owing to its venomous nature has been kept at a respectful distance. It is a weird looking object measuring approximately some six inches when fully expanded and has a wicked looking headpiece and is covered with hair of a reddish color. These large venomous spiders are found in the southern part of Italy, South America, the West Indies and Texas. They subsist on insects. It may be that when the spider has become a little tamer Herb will get a silver collar and chain for his pet and keep it in the yard in a kennel. It would certainly tend to keep away undesirable visitors and others.

It is a little story about three well known local sportsmen who went to Porcher Island last week to hunt deer. The party comprised Harry Welford, Jack Lindsay and Don Crerar. All went well, in fact a little too well for Don. The morning broke full of sunshine and the hunters started out bright and early with pockets full of lunch and boots full of feet. As the day wore on the hunters began to wear out but mid-before three fine deer had fallen to their artillery. With the sun shining hotly and the bush getting bushier, the high boots which Don had donned, began to feel rather cumbersome and the dead deer seemed as far away to him as though they had been shot across the Atlantic ocean.
