

While the men of Anyox, led by General Manager Munro heroically fought the fire, five hundred women and children fearing the blowing up of the magazine, camped all night on the slag pile or remained in boats at a distance from the town. At the mine settlement they took shelter in the glory hole, every moment fearing that an explosion would take place and that their men would be in danger and possibly their homes destroyed. 




