FRENCH NOTE DISAPPOINTMENT TO BRITAIN

DELEGATES TO MUNICIPALITIES CONVENTION ARE ARRIVING IN CITY TODAY

France Stands Firm on all Points in Answer to British Note on German Reparations

PARIS, Aug. 22 .- The French government's reply to the recent reparations note asserts that France refuses to withdraw from the Ruhr except as she is paid and that she rejects. the plan for an international re-estimate of Germany's capacity

The reply maintains that the French occupation of Ruhr is absolutely legal. It offers to consider the best method of exacting payment from Germany when resistance has ceased and expresses willingness to continue recent discussions with Great Britain.

The men charge that advertisements posted in the Old Country stated no experience was required. They charge that they were brought to Canada under false pretenses.



VICTORIA, Aug. 21. In conheetion with a controversy between some of the senators and Hon, A. M. Manson as to the power of the province to prevent theithe operations of export warelater houses, a letter from the deputy x 5343, minister of justice at Ottawa is quoted as follows :

"Neither the Government of British Columbia nor this government has power to prohibit District Forester, the establishment or maintenance of export liquor warehouses. Importers have the right under section 81 to enter the imported the goods "for warehouse," subject only to such rules and regula tions as are from time to time! prescribed by the Governor-in-Council in that behalf.




