GLASGOW, Sept. 25.—Seventy lives are believed to have been lost early today in one of the worst colliery disasters in the history of the Scotch mines, when a deep pit at James Nimmo Company's colliery near Falkirk was flooded.

The water which flooded the pit broke through the walls adjoining the mine. The working pit was flooded so quickly that there was no opportunity to warn the miners. Only one man escaped after the rush of waters began and there is but little Pete Johnson Raced Against hope of saving any of the unfortunates now below.

School expenditures increased 591,642 last year. They represent today an expenditure greater than that devoted to streets, fire, police, health and salaries.

In 1922 the expenditure on streets was \$2,218,066 compared with \$1,266,277 four years ago and \$2,144,368 in 1915.

Mr. Baird reports another increase in the amount of money received from public utilities by the municipalities of the province. The amount received during 1922 being \$3,038,124 compared with \$2,911,165 the pre-

vious year.

Greenwood again has the highest tax levy of 64 mills, the same as last year. The second on the list is Slocan with 54. The lowest tax rate among the cities of the province is that Courtenay with 24 mills. South Vancouver leads the list among municipal districts with a tax rate of 55 mills. Point Grey comes second with 43 and Summerland third with 40.





THE OFFICIAL OPENING of the Canadian portion of the Pacific Highway between New Westminster and Blaine, Washington, with nearly twenty miles of concrete road, seems an opportune time to give a short history of the cement industry in British Columbia. Its career has been a very chequered one, and for the amount of capital required to establish a cement plant, the results on the whole have been disappointing, hard-earned savings.

It is just twenty years ago that a Mr. J. K. Fisher built a small cement plant on False Creek with the idea of supplying the local demand in the province. This industry early got into financial difficulties and was sold to the Canadian Pacific Railway, who, however, abandoned the project after a short

The next plat was built by

Mr. R. P. Butchart and associates in 1904, at Tod Inlet about fifteen miles from Victoria. Mr. Butchart is one of the pioneers in the cement manufacturing business in Canada, baving established a plant Owen Sound, in Ontario, over thirty years ago. Later, Mr Butchart, in association with his friends, established a chain of cement plants in Montreal, Que., Lakefield, Ont., Calgary, Alta., capacity was three hundred bar-Hy increased until 1912, when ts capacity was entarged to three thousand barrels per day.
