ASSEMBLY VOTES FOR CONCILIATION

UNITED STATES AGAIN INSISTS ON PAYMENT OF DEBTS

Great Britain's Second Postponement Appeal Is Rejected by U.S.

Hoover, However, Is Willing to Have Complete Survey of Situation—French Action Will Depend on Chamber of Deputies

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Insisting that payment be made of the \$95,500,000 in war debts due on December 15, the United States government's reply to the second request of Great Britain for postponement of the payment was made public here last night. The note was signed by Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson who answered arguments advanced by the British government that the payment of the debts would serve only to make the depression that much deeper.

Britain Will Pay

The American missive announced that President Hoover was agreeable that a survey of the whole debt situation be made and to consider anything that might be deemed necessary to restore the stability of the currency of the nations and to revive world trade. Further, the United States was prepared to do anything that might assist the debtor nations in making their payments.

Reply to France

PARIS, Dec. 9.—The reply of the United States to France's second note appealing for postponement of war debt payments due December 15 was delivered yesterday in Washington to Ambassador Paul Claudel who transmitted its contents by cable to the French government. The contents are believed similar to the note to Great Britain.

Premier Eduard Herriot stated last night that the action to be taken by France would depend upon the attitude of the Chamber of Deputies which will assemble next Monday to discuss the debt issue. Premier Herriot, it is believed, is disposed to recommend the payment of the amount due on December 15, insisting, however, on a drastic revision of the whole debt structure before further payments fall due.

Transfer of Funds

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Following the announcement by Prime Minister MacDonald yesterday, after a conference in Paris with Premier Eduard Herriot of France, that Great Britain would pay her war debts of \$95,500,000 due on Thursday of next week, there was speculation in financial circles.

Manchurian Dispute Referred To Special League Committee With Request for Report Soon

Decision of Geneva Body is Regarded as Success For Policy of Arbitration With Support of Larger Powers Except Japan

GENEVA, Dec. 9: (Canadian Press)—The Assembly of the League of Nations, closing its eventful debate on the Manchurian situation, voted today to refer that issue to the conciliation committee of nineteen with the request that the committee report as soon as possible on the proposals by the Assembly for a settlement of the dispute between China and Japan. This procedure was regarded as a success for the policy of conciliation with the support of the big powers.

Japan has already expressed its objection at the proposal to refer the dispute to the conciliation committee.

BRITISH ULTIMATUM ISSUED TO PERSIA

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Great Britain has notified Persia that, unless the cancellation of the Anglo-Persian Oil Co.'s concession there is withdrawn within a week, this country will refer the dispute to the Hague Court. Announcement of this effect was made to the House of Commons yesterday by Capt. Anthony Eden, under secretary for foreign affairs.

SEVENTEEN ARE DEAD

Thirteen More Bodies Taken Out of New Mexico Colliery Following Blast on Wednesday

MADRID, New Mexico, Dec. 9.—Rescue workers succeeded yesterday in opening up the wall of rock which had fallen as a result of an explosion in a colliery here and took out the bodies of thirteen more miners who lost their lives in the blast. These were in addition to four bodies which were taken out the day previous.

WARSHIPS ARE HELD

British Cruisers Patrolling Persian Waters—Soviet Denies Complicity

KARACHI, Dec. 9.—In view of the dispute between the British and Persian governments over the cancellation of the Anglo-Persian Oil Co.'s concessions, British cruisers are being held in Persian and Indian waters. One cruiser moved yesterday to the head of the Persian Gulf near where the company's operations are situated.

DENIAL BY MOSCOW

MOSCOW, Dec. 9.—Suggestions that the Persian authorities were inspired by the Russian government to cancel the oil concessions of the Anglo-Persian Oil Co. in Persia were vigorously denied by Soviet spokesmen yesterday.

JAPAN THREATENS LEAGUE ASSEMBLY

GENEVA, Dec. 9.—Yosuke Matsuoka, Japan's special counsel to the League, yesterday threatened "unforeseen consequences" if the assembly of the League of Nations should adopt a proposed resolution, as suggested by the Lytton Commission's report, condemning Japan's policy in Manchuria.

Is Retiring

British Pound and Canadian Dollar on New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—The British pound sterling closed at \$3.25 1/2 on the local foreign exchange market yesterday. The Canadian dollar closed at 85 3/4c.

BANDIT WAS DESPERATE

VANCOUVER, Dec. 9.—Harold Knight, 24-year old bandit, who held up the Sixteenth Avenue and Oak Street branch of the Royal Bank of Canada on Wednesday and was captured by Manager G. E. Devereaux, on being arraigned in magistrate's court yesterday, said that he had been driven in desperation to the deed as his wife and child were starving. He hoped, Knight said, that his family would be looked after when he went to the penitentiary.

Copper Refinery On This Coast Is Urged by Resident Engineer

Possibilities of Lead, Zinc and Silver Refining Are Also Alluded to By Dr. J. T. Mandy in Speaking Before Rotary Club

A strong argument in favor of the establishment of a copper refinery on the Pacific Coast, with the possibilities of refineries for lead, zinc and silver and the establishment of works for the processing of copper and other metals, was made out in an address to the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at its weekly luncheon here yesterday by Dr. J. T. Mandy, resident mining engineer. He showed that in 1930, the latest figures available, the production of copper at Anyox amounted to approximately 23,500,000 pounds and at Britannia 22,500,000 pounds. There were all kinds of potential sources of supply on Vancouver Island, at the Queen Charlottes and at other points.

For the other metals mentioned there was an available supply just as soon as the market improved sufficiently to make it worth while mining and the market would return, he believed, just as soon as industrial conditions improved.

Dr. Mandy showed that it was a hardship for producers on the coast to have to ship to Trail or to other smelters or refineries. He had been told that, if Britannia stopped shipping to Tacoma, the smelter there would have to close. This showed the possibilities in British Columbia, with two such large sources of supply. There were at present only three copper refineries in Canada—at Trail, at Copper Cliff and at Montreal, Noranda, with an output of 65,000 tons, kept up a smelter, a refinery and a processing plant. If such were established on this coast it would mean a tremendous impetus to business generally. People had no definite comprehension of the possibilities. With the new Empire market and with the water-powers available on this coast, he said he saw a picture of tremendous industrial expansion and a new era for mining in British Columbia.

Not Retiring

DEEP SNOW SAVED TOWN OF STEWART FROM MORE SERIOUS DAMAGE IN FIRE

Further Details of Big Conflagration Brought to City By Arrivals From North Last Night

The fact that there was snow to the depth of two or three feet on the roofs of the buildings prevented even more extensive destruction being wrought by the \$60,000 fire which visited the town of Stewart on Tuesday morning, it is reported by arrivals in the city last evening from the Portland Canal mining camp. The deep snow made it impossible for flying embers and sparks to ignite the roofs upon which they fell.

The government liquor store at the far end of Fifth Street beyond the centre of the conflagration was saved by dynamiting the old Campbell and Duke store and thus breaking the course of the blaze.

The King Edward Hotel, on the opposite side of the street from the buildings which were destroyed, caught fire no less than three times but was saved.

RALPH CONNOR AGAIN

Ralph Connor has written a new book, "The Arm of Gold." It is a worth while book, very different from the ordinary run of new novels. It deals with life in a highland village in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, and its word pictures of the life there, of the religious prejudices and the sterling qualities of the people are really wonderful.

Like most of the books by this author the kirk and the meenister loom large in the story. Religious subjects are discussed but are not thrust into the book in an unnecessary way. The characters are all real people, flesh and blood people, with all the passions and prejudices of the race. There is the millionaire from New York and his daughter who in spite of the drawback of wealth prove to be real people and who give the proper touch of modernism.

To some thoughtful readers the scraps of philosophy which he book contains will prove as interesting as the story. Here is part of a paragraph:

"In nations as in men the ultimate objective, the fundamental driving force was in the last analysis, not the noble passion for the things of the spirit as truth, freedom, honor and the like, but a lust for power to command things material in life, territory, raw material, trade routes and trade concessions, opportunity to exploit secondary peoples. The high sounding utterances of statesmen and parliaments about national honor, integrity and freedom, or about international peace and amity, were merely the fanfare of war's trumpets, stimulating the ambitions and passions of trusting and honest souls to the madness of deluded and frenzied devotees of false gods."

The need of any community forgetting its grievances against other people or places and trying to help itself is emphasized when one of the characters in the book says: "That's what's killing whole sections in our country. Shooting off their mouths about their wrongs when all that's wrong with them is in themselves." And again: "That is the curse of this country. The government! For any sake let us try to do something for ourselves for once. The government and politics are the ruin of Cape Breton—yes, and of Nova Scotia. Let's see what we can do by pulling all together for once in this business."

But these quotations are simply incidental to the story which is engrossing, full of pathos and humor and with a sufficient measure of excitement to make the reader forget time and circumstance and sit up late to finish it. We strongly recommend this book.

COLD WAVE CONTINUES

Death and Suffering Follows Snap in Middle West

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—With death and suffering following in its wake, the mid-west's cold wave was continuing unrelentingly yesterday with below zero temperatures general both in Canada and the United States between the Great Lakes and the Rocky Mountains. Fires resulting from overheated stoves were reported to have driven hundreds of people in various parts into the streets to freeze.

Superior, Wisconsin; Miles City, Montana, and Duluth, Minnesota, all reported temperatures of 22 degrees below zero. Kansas City reported 10 above zero and Helena, Montana, 15 below. In Chicago it was 6 above and at St. Paul, 6 below. In Canada Winnipeg had 24 degrees below zero and The Pas, 30 below.

Cold Gale in Seattle
SEATTLE, Dec. 9.—A frigid 36-mile northerly gale brought a minimum temperature of 17 degrees above zero to Seattle yesterday and caused considerable damage. A fish boat from Astoria was blown out to sea. Three fishing vessels went around as did a large fish barge. A Bremerton navy yard provision barge lost some of its contents. The ferryboat Kitsap was grounded for five hours.

Six above zero was recorded in Spokane, 12 above in Bellingham and 10 below at Pocatello, Idaho.

ancial circles as to how the transfer would be effected. It is expected that payment will be made entirely in gold or in gold and dollars.

The cabinet was to meet today to prepare a note to the United States informing that country how payment would be made.

Negotiating For Payment

LONDON, Dec. 9.—(Canadian Press)—It was learned officially today that the British and United States governments are now negotiating to find methods whereby the British war debt payment due next week may be made.

Political circles professed disappointment at the United States' refusal to postpone the December payment as stated in the United States note. Nevertheless, it appeared that the United States government had seized upon what is regarded as the fundamental point of the Anglo-American debt problem. It was reasoned that the most essential point of the second British note was the request for a review of the whole debts question and that the reply of the United States virtually granted this.

The British government appeared to be prepared for criticism because it was not insisting upon the French debt payment to the British in March. The government's position appeared to be that this policy was aimed to save the Lausanne reparations agreement which scaled down the German reparations payments.

In advising Britain that the December 15 installment must be met, Secretary of State Stimson said he was confident that Congress would be willing to consider any reasonable suggestion from the British government which would make it easier to remit the \$95,500,000.

The United States has also replied to the French note but the reply has not yet been made public.

The Stewart Hotel, hundreds of fire fighters continuing their feverish activities until 8 o'clock when the dying flames were finally extinguished completely. Some thermometers in the town were registering ten below zero during the fire.

Practically the entire town was engaged in fire fighting although some people are reported to have slept through the excitement of the spectacular conflagration.

James McAleenan, the only person to suffer injury as a result of the fire, jumped from the second floor of the Stewart Hotel, of which he was proprietor, and landed on the ground without injury, only to have ribs broken when another person jumped and landed on him.

THE 25% CUT

Editor, Daily News:—

I have been reading through your paper for the last six months grievances of the unemployed, also numerous remedies, but so far nothing has been done and the unemployed are forced to carry on with the very lowest kind of existence that a civilized race of people would put up with.

The latest move that we have no say in at all is a 25% cut in food rations. This cut was based on a 40-cent a day allowance which seemed to drop as the authorities saw fit. Just try and imagine people eating nourishing food, that which does not sicken them in a short time, bought at 30c per day, at high prices quoted in the interior of Prince Rupert. If any readers happen to think so, make a test of it and I am sure your opinion will soon change.

This 30c a day idea does not stop here. We are required to put up an equivalent of labor for such. This is forced upon us without necessary clothing to withstand the interior climate.

This last cut seems to be a freeze-out for us whose persistent demands for a living, not an existence, will not be met by the government.

REPEAL IS RESISTED

Anti-Saloon League Opens Convention in Washington Today—Beer Bill Going Ahead

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 9.—Under the auspices of the Anti-Saloon League, a "resist repeal" convention was opened here today for the purpose of launching a campaign against any move to repeal the Eighteenth Amendment or modify the Volstead Act.

As the convention opened, Congress, both in the Senate and House of Representatives, was preparing to put through a beer bill at the present short session. Hearings prior to the passing of the bill are now being held.

CAUSE WAS RIGHTEOUS

All Japanese People Behind Campaign in Manchuria, League of Nations Assembly is Told

GENEVA, Dec. 9.—The united Japanese people are convinced of the righteousness of the Japanese policy in Manchuria, Japan's special counsel to the League of Nations, told the League Assembly yesterday in declaring that "unforeseen consequences" might ensue should the Assembly adopt a proposed resolution condemning Japanese policy in Manchuria. The whole Japanese nation was behind the activities of Japan in Manchuria, Matsuoka declared.

Matsuoka further stated that Japan had originally joined the League of Nations because it believed United States would also be a member. He made this comment in conveying Japan's threat to withdraw from the League.

The Assembly has postponed until Monday its reply to Matsuoka's protest.

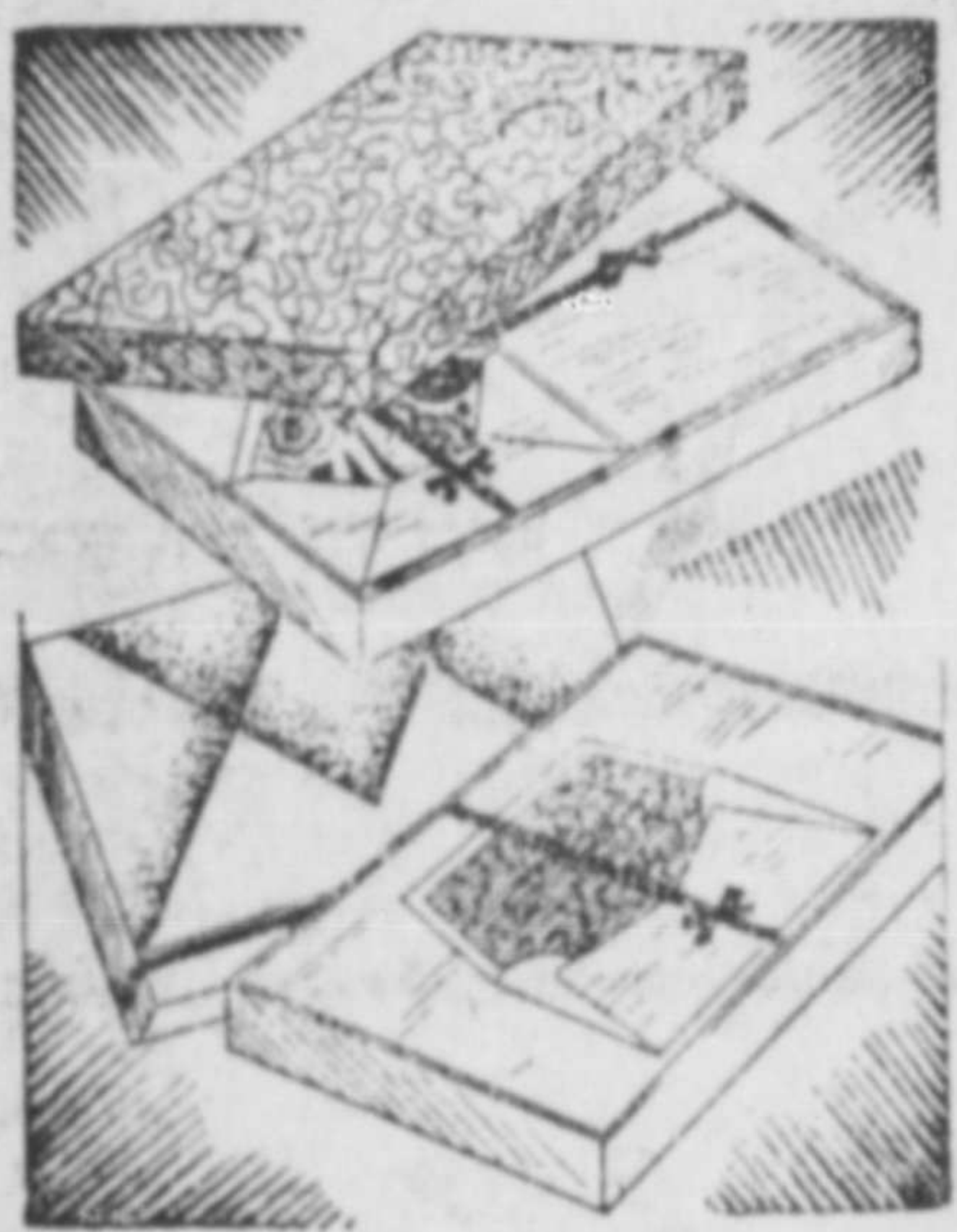

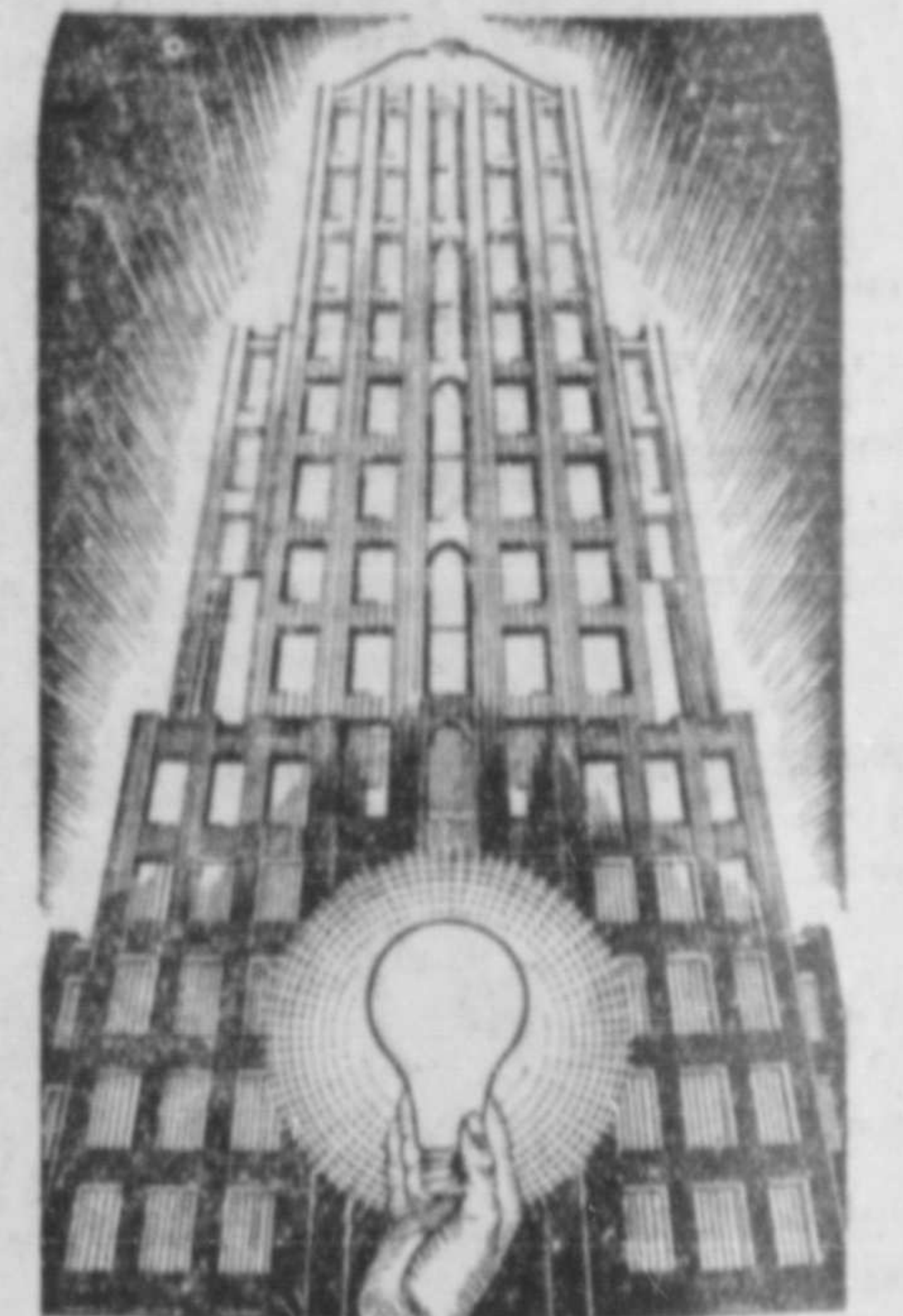

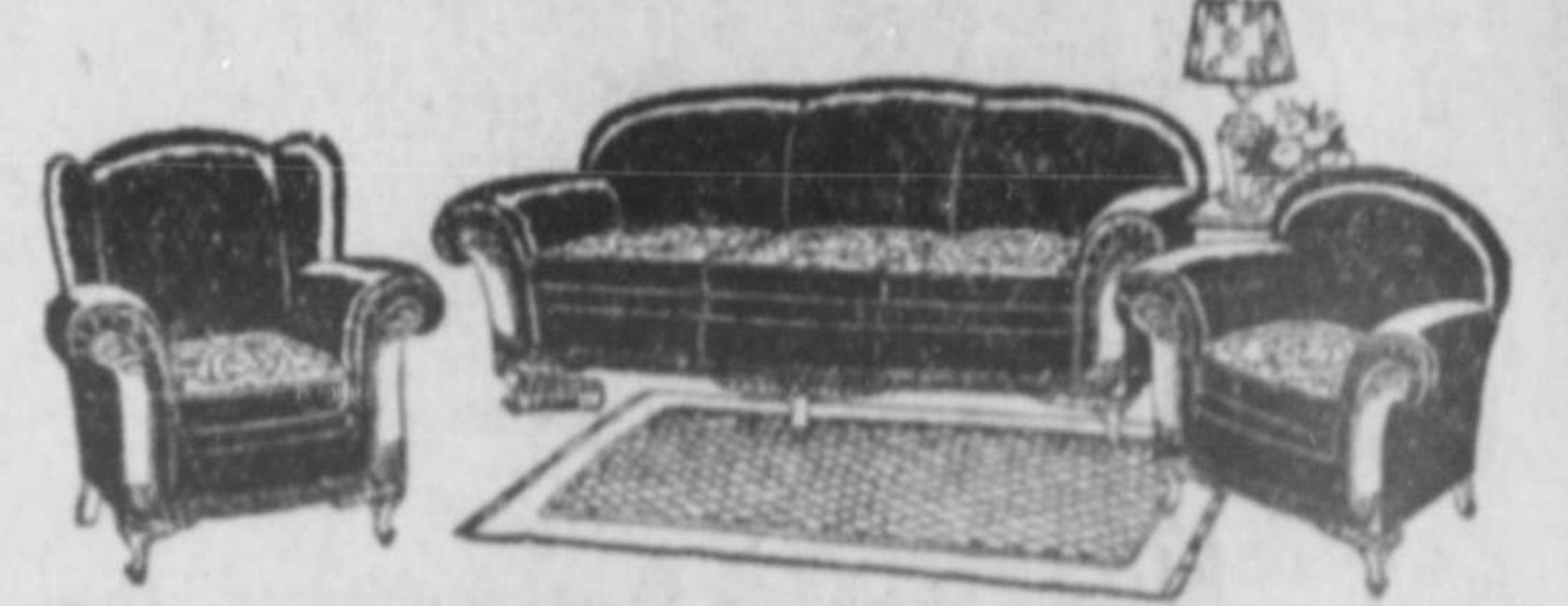
