Flexibility of No Advantage as Long as High Tariff Men in Charge

WASHINGTON. Sept. 1 .- PBy Canadian Press .- Practically all the building. doubt is removed here as to whether the flexible tarriff provisions of the new U.S. tariff law will ever be made real effective in bringing about any considerable changes in rates of duty. The conviction has settled down on Washington that the flexible features of the law, so long as high tariff men remain at the head of the government, will not be permitted to get anywhere.

Not only is the tariff commission moving at a slow pace in making its inquiries into differcourts. This would mean a long this time. period of uncertainty. Whether, t would be practically stopped from functioning while the test in the courts was being made is something not yet clear.

What is clear is that the high tariff elements in Congress and throughout the U.S. are determined to restrict thte workings of the flexible law to the narrowest limits possible. The attitude of President Coolidge is not yet defined but as he comes from a high tariff state and has the backing of high tariff elements, is generally assumed he will not seek to use the flexible tariff to give the country a really scientifie tariff.

OPEN LETTER TO HON. JOHN OLIVER

Provincial Party of British Columbia

Hon. John Oliver, Premier of British Columbia, Victoria, B.C.

Vancouver, B.C., August 24, 1923.

Dear Sir:

Again I am directed to call your attention to our "Searchlight." This time it is No. 3; copy herewith. The financial facts which it d scloses to the electors may interest you, but what we particularly wish to call to your notice is the charge against the Hon, Mr. John Hart, your Minister of Finance, of doing th business of the province with his own firm of Gillespie, Hart & Todd Ltd.

In the election campaign of 1916 and subsequently you most severely denounced Mr. W. J. Bowser for his firm doing business with the Government. You referred particularly to the Dominion Trust fiasco and also the fast that Bowser, Reid & Wallbridge had received \$250,000 fees and disbursements from the P.G.E. Railway, while Mr. Bowser was either Attorney General or Premier of the privince. Your attitude at that time received the unqualified endorsement of the people. Your statement in the House on November 3, 1921, as follows:

'A more immoral condition of affairs could not be imagined than that of an Attorney General or Premier of the province sitting of the one hand as a member of the Government and sitting on the other as a member o a legal firm receiving thousands and thousands of dollars in this way."

Now then, Mr. Premier, please read the ev dence set forth in the enclosed "Searchlight." This clearly shows that Mr. Hart has committed the same offence as Mr. Bowser. There is an old saying, "What is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander." If it was immoral for Mr. Bowser as Attorney General or Premier in 1916 (you said it was and the voters agreed with you, is it not immoral for Mr. John Hart, as Minister of Finance in 1920, before and since. .

The Constitution Act contains the following:

Section 29. No person whosoever holding or enjoying, undertaking or executing, directly or indirectly, alone or with any other, by himself or by the interposition of any trustee or third party, any contract or agreement with His Majesty, or with any public officer or department, with respect to the public service of the province, or under which any public money of the province is to be paid for any service or work, shall be eligible as a member of the Legislative Assembly, nor shall he sit or vote in the same. R.S. 1897, c. 17, s. 29.

Had Mr. Hart been doing business as an individual or as a member of an unincorporated partnership, this section would apply to his case. Technically, however, he has been more careful than Mr. Bowser, as he has sheltered h mself behind a further section of this Act which relieves from responsibility in such cases shareholders of limited liability companies -but you know and the people know that Mr. Hart is a principal in what is really a firm in which the records today show he holds a one-third interest.

Nor is this all. At the time when the business dealings referred to took place, Mr. Hart was a director of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and still is. In referring to the well known contract between the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and Mr. P. Welch, your Legislative Committee has the following to say:

"This contract was in direct contravention of Sections 110 and 118 of the Railway Act forbidding directors entering into a contract with their company, or to hold office if such a contract be made."

Are these principles to apply only to Mr. Welch, and not to Mr. Hart? The situation with regard to your Finance Minister was brought out on the floor of the House on March 5, 1919; on February 18, 1920, and on November 22, 1922. Neither you nor

Mr. Hart had any comment to make. What thousands of electors in B.C. want to know, Mr. Oliver, is, Do you still maintain the high moral principles of government which you so strongly advocated in 1916?

If so, Why have you not asked the Hon. Mr. John Hart for his resignation long ago? Yours respectfully.






