## HUNDREDS WATCH SEATTLE BANK ROBBERY

### CONFERENCE WITH CITY PREPARATORY TO COMMENCEMENT OF NEW ROAD

#### Bold Robbery at Seattle when Two Bank Messengers Held up on Street and Valuables are Taken

SEATTLE, Nov. 28.—Seven heavily armed bandits held up two messengers of the Bank of California en route to the Post Office at a crowded intersection in the heart of the city and escaped with a registered mail bag containing \$20,000 worth of negotiable bonds and several thousand dollars worth of checks.

A motor cycle policeman following the bank messengers' limousine was covered with revolvers and handcuffed to his own cycle.

Hundreds of pedestrians and motorists witnessed the robbery. The bandits stepped from a small automobile from the kerbstone and from the middle of the street covering everybody who sought to intervene.

All seven bandits escaped and the police have no clue as to their identity.

#### OIL REFINERY IS TO BE ESTABLISHED EDMONTON LOCATION

EDMONTON, Nov. 28.—John I. Mercer, representing a Montana oil company which has large holdings in the Sunburst oil fields in the city looking over prospective sites for an oil refinery which it is expected will be built in the very near future. The company is quite satisfied with the city from the standpoint of location, and if it is satisfied with respect to a site, arrangements for construction of a plant will be started immediately.

According to Mr. Mercer a plant of the nature which they intend to build will require at least forty acres in one block. Several sites were investigated by him, and it is expected that some arrangement will be completed.

The company which Mr. Mercer represents owns some 15,000 acres in the Sunburst fields which they will develop as rapidly as possible. It is the intention to cater to the western trade as much as possible and for this reason proposes to build its refinery at Edmonton instead of at the wells. The cost of shipping crude oil is much cheaper than the refined product and there is the added advantage that there is no duty. Mr. Mercer had gone over the question of a location and states that the only other city which might offer similar advantages from the standpoint of location is Saskatoon. Edmonton, however, has the advantage of being closer to the coast and is the gateway to the north country.

The product of the oil company is largely gasoline. The crude oil when refined is split up into several different oils including various brands of lubricants.

#### LARGE AMERICAN SCHOONERS SOLD HALIBUT TODAY

Four big American schooners, marketing halibut catches at the Fish Exchange this morning, swelled the total of the days transactions to the figure of 226,200 pounds. There were seven boats in, four Americans having 218,000 pounds and three small Canadians, 8,200 pounds.

Pete Peters and Forman Folkinham were arrested this afternoon on Third Avenue by Chief W. H. Vickers following a complaint being laid by Lena Silver. The men, it is alleged, abused the informant on the street and forcibly made their way into her house on First Avenue where they assaulted her and caused general disturbance. Miss Silver complained to the police and gave the description of them whose arrests soon followed. They will answer to charges in the police court tomorrow morning.

#### Conference with Local District Engineer by City Council Regard Building Road to Skeena River

Mayor Newton announced last evening that a telegram had been received from P. Philip, chief engineer for the provincial public works department, inviting the city council to meet on Thursday afternoon with Major R. M. Taylor, district engineer, on the Skeena River road project. The principal matters to be discussed will be the location of the road leading out of the city and the city's connection therewith. The telegram is taken by Mayor Newton as an indication that something is to be done in the near future in the matter of getting the project started. The city council, on at least two occasions in the past, has pledged itself to building a connection with the government road to the city limits.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—Bishop Cohan of Cork refused Christian burial to Commandant Dennis Barry, who died from the effects of a hunger strike at Newbridge and whose body reached Cork last night, says a Press Association despatch from Cork.

#### MOST OF CREW SHINKOKU MARU SAFE CORDOVA

Vessel is Pounding to Pieces on Montague Island; Captain and Five Still Aboard

CORDOVA, Nov. 28.—One member of the crew of the Shinkoku Maru which was yesterday impaled on the rocks at the north end of Montague Island, Prince William Sound, was drowned and the rest are today clinging to the vessel and in a hospital on the margin of the island, waiting for a waning of the tempest to permit the tug Humaconna to rescue them.

CORDOVA, Nov. 28 (later).—Forty-two members of the crew of the Japanese freighter Shinkoku Maru reached here on the Humaconna last night. The purser said the captain, mate and four men were left aboard the boat until the salvager arrived.

The ship is being pounded to pieces on Montague Island in Prince of Wales Sound.

#### STRONG PLEA PEACE RIVER

Perry Urges Opening up District by Railway and House Endorses Project

VICTORIA, Nov. 28.—A strong plea for the settlers who are stranded in the Peace River section and must have transportation facilities, was made in the Legislature yesterday by H. G. Perry, liberal member for Fort George, in moving a lengthy resolution which called upon the Legislature to urge on the Federal Government and directors of the Canadian National Railways the advisability of a searching investigation of the railway route from Prince George to the Peace River area, as affording the most economic means for the movement of grain to the coast and also to open up and develop a greater area of territory having traffic possibilities for Government owned land.

The resolution was unanimously approved by the House.

#### JOINT COMMITTEE TO FORMULATE LAW FOR EIGHT HOUR DAY

VICTORIA, Nov. 28.—That British Columbia lumbermen appoint a committee of three to work with Attorney General Manson in framing an eight hour day law for the timber business, was the suggestion of Premier Oliver to a large delegation of lumbermen who went before the cabinet to protest against a reduction in working hours in sawmills.

Under a conference with the Government, the lumbermen stated that the Premier's proposal will be considered immediately.

#### EDMONTON BOARD OF TRADE DRIVE IS ON

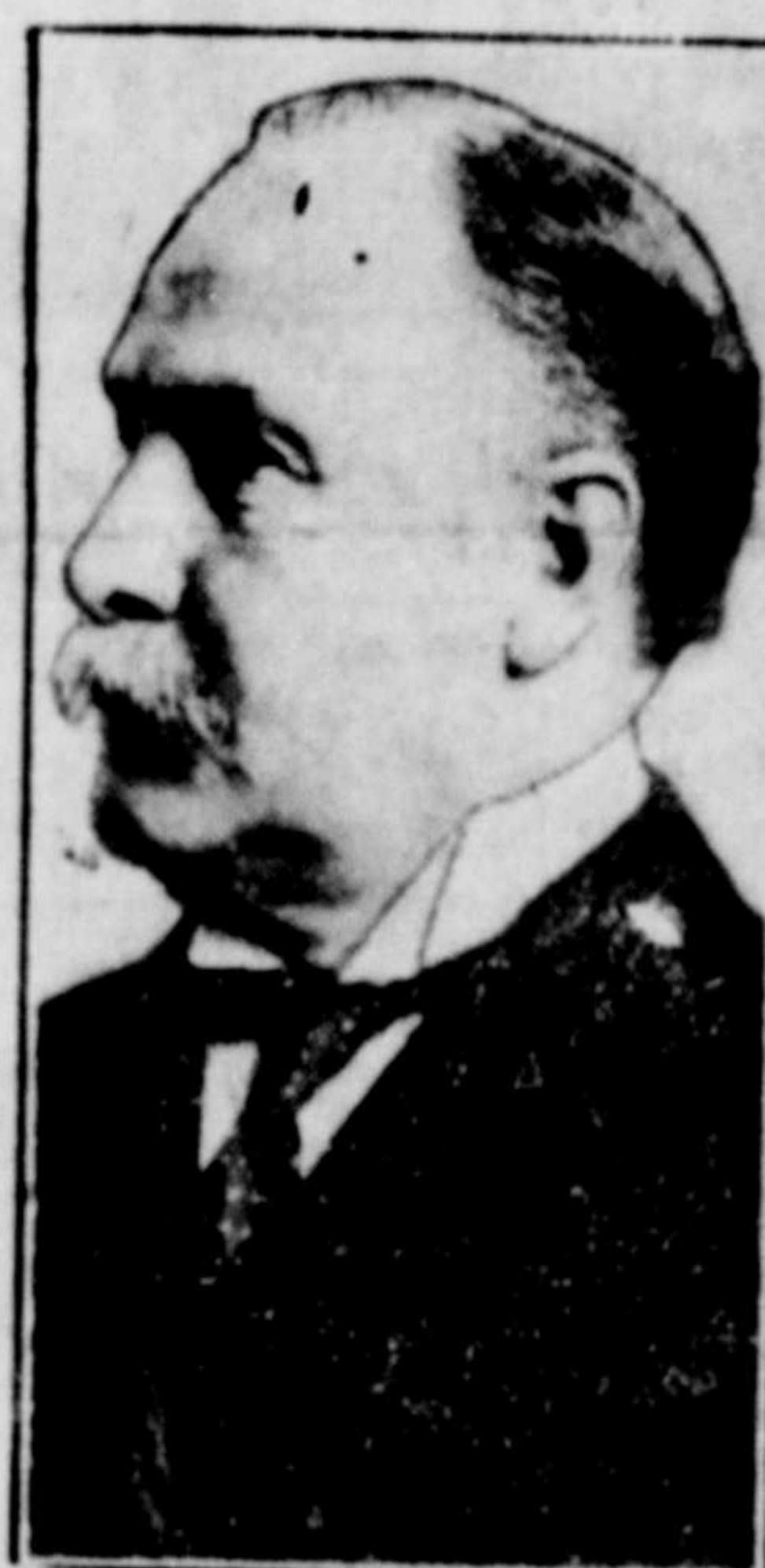

#### V.I. LUMBERMEN GET TOGETHER

Mills in Neighborhood of Victoria to Promote Co-operative Marketing

VICTORIA, Nov. 28.—A plan of co-operative marketing on the part of the lumber mills of this district is engaging the attention with a view to the establishment of a lumber assembly dock at Ogden Point in the near future. Large orders of lumber it is claimed, can be secured here if it can be assembled under one management so that the purchasers do not have to dicker with every little mill in the district.

The lumber men have been watching the success of the fruit growers and others in disposing of their crops and it is reported to the chamber of commerce that the plan is receiving general support.

#### MEN RESCUED FROM LAUNCH

Five Were Caught Aboard Dredge Tender But Luckily Escaped

VANCOUVER, Nov. 28.—The Government launch Roubabout was burned in the harbor today following an explosion of gases from a leaky tank. Five men who were aboard the vessel had narrow escapes.

The boat, which was acting as tender to the dredge Mastodon in the first narrows had put off to the seaward. Capt. Gosse struck a match and immediately the little craft was in flames from end to end.

Tug Trebla went to the rescue and nosed in close enough for the men to be able to jump in safety to her decks.

The tug Roubabout drifted into the harbor and finally sank.

#### VICTORIA WILL WARN RATHER THAN FINE FOR MINOR MOTOR OFFENSES

VICTORIA, Nov. 28.—Following a consultation with the Police Commissioners it is arranged that drivers of automobiles in this city who break some minor regulation will be warned before being summoned to appear before the magistrate. It has been the custom to summon for every offense but from this time on a card of warning will be presented to the driver in case his tail light is out or any similar neglect.

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### Degrading Fate For Useful Vessel.

It was a degrading fate for a member of the coasting fleet of steamers to go into a business bordering on the piratical, where, according to rumor, two men were killed on her decks and thrown overboard. The good little vessel Prince Albert that once carried peaceful settlers to and from Massett Inlet, that carried convivial parties to Stewart or that took cabbages and cauliflowers to the canneries, now is branded all over the coast as a rum runner, a possible high jacker, close associate of the kind of vessel that formerly ran up the Jolly Roger.

And yet many will look on the life of adventure as a rum runner as a life of more or less glorious activity. In days to come, perhaps, the novelist will lend the business a charm of romance and will perpetuate the memory of the days when people were ruled by their thirsts and when they were ready to trade on the thirsts of their less stable neighbors.

### British Election Goes Merrily On.

The British elections take place on Thursday of next week and it is hoped that arrangements will be made to get the returns here that evening. All classes of people and sympathizers are anxious to know what the results will be. Each group there has a corresponding group here that hopes it will win. The majority, however, seem to hope that Baldwin will win and the country will go protectionist. That would affect us materially, but it is hardly to be expected, according to the average free trader from the Old Country. Our opinion is that anything may be expected from an election and that often the people appreciate the bold and courageous thing such as Baldwin has done.

### H. G. Wells Writes About Success.

What is success? Everything depends upon what you mean by the word as to whether you have made a success or a failure of life. H. G. Wells discusses the question in a most interesting manner in the American Magazine for December. He claims that the lives of Lord Northcliffe, David Lloyd George and Lord Beaverbrook, even though the last mentioned wrote a treatise about it, have not been successes, and neither was that of Napoleon Bonaparte, whereas Abraham Lincoln, Lord Bacon, Jesus of Nazareth, Sir Christopher Wren, the poet Shelley, Edgar Allan Poe, Charles Darwin, J. M. Keynes, and Professor Einstein were all successful men. And this is his reason for them all:

"The thing that matters in a man is the thing that is peculiar to him, his distinctive gift and aptitude, however small it may be. To realize that, to develop it to the full and bring it to the completest fruition is at once the full triumph of one's individual self and the supreme sacrifice one can render to mankind."

Of such men as Lord Northcliffe and Lloyd George, Wells says: "They took the world as it came; they took it with entirely prehensile, inartistic hands. I submit they were not successes at all, but the mere spendthrifts of aptitude and good fortune. Their lives have been lives, not of achievement but of inflation. They have known no true satisfactions, and I submit that not only have they never reached Lord Beaverbrook's 'inner shrine of happiness' but that they have never even discovered that the vast, gaudy, ill-proportioned temple into which they have struggled is not even the temple of success at all."

In the article Mr. Wells gives a most interesting personal sketch of Alfred Harmsworth, written to show that he was not a success. He also mentions others. The article is one that is well worth reading and especially worth the while of any young man or woman entering on a career. It is something for the "successful" business or professional man to think about. Possibly it is one of the best things Wells has written.

### Here and There

The season for moose hunting opened in New Brunswick October 1st, and the chief game warden expects one of the best seasons in the history of the province. Game is reported plentiful in all sections.

The drydock at St. John, New Brunswick, is now an accomplished work. It was opened October 29th. The largest drydock in North America, it is capable of accommodating the largest ships of the British Navy.

Speaking in London, England, on October 19th, Sir Lomer Gouin, Canadian Minister of Justice, states that Canada's exports per capita were three times more than those of the United States and her imports per capita four times more. The British Empire was Canada's second best customer.

There are more telephones in Canada per 100 population than in any other country except the United States. This is shown in a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, in which the proportion of telephone users per 100 population is set at 10.53.

A dispatch from London states that a number of cattle from the Prince of Wales' ranch was included in a large consignment of Canadian cattle which reached Cardiff recently. There appeared to be a keen demand for the consignment and 150 heads were despatched to Norfolk farmers by special train.

Members of the Bread and Cake Bakers' Association of Canada, at the closing session of their Toronto convention, pledged subscriptions totalling \$18,000 towards the launching of a permanent institute of baking, in connection with the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. It is expected that the school will be opened early in 1924.

Canadian Pacific Railway figures show remarkable increases in the shipment of grain for the ten week days preceding and including October 15th, this year, as compared with 1922. During the ten days there were loaded for shipment over the whole system a total of 16,195 cars, at the rate of 2,350,000 bushels a day, in comparison with 12,000 cars at 1,753,000 bushels a day last year.

It is expected that by the end of the present month track-laying on the branch of the Canadian Pacific running from Kipawa to the Government dam on the De Quince River, a distance of 69 miles, with a spur from Gaboury to Ville Marie, a distance of 8 miles, will be completed and that by the end of November the whole line will be ready for operation.

A system of education by mail for those who live in remote rural districts out-of-reach of rural schools is being prepared by Hon. Perron Baker, Minister of Education for Alberta, to go into effect this month. The working plan has already been drawn up to run through the winter to the end of the school year. It is expected that from 20 to 40 lessons will be given in the case of each applicant for the service.

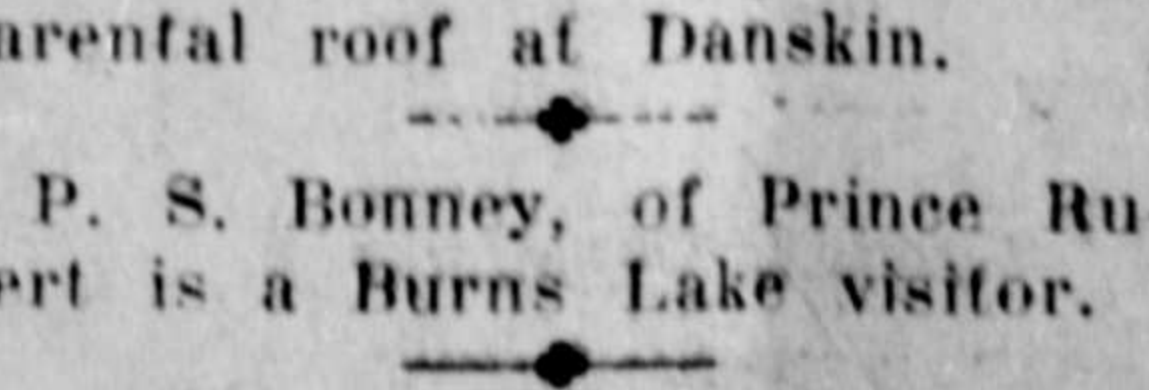

## ALLOWANCE GRANTED BY EDMONTON COURT

**R. A. McKinnon Has to Pay Wife \$100 a Month and also to Pay Back Debts**

EDMONTON, Nov. 28. — A maintenance allowance of \$100 per month was granted Mrs. Isabella Margaret McKinnon as a result of her supreme court civil action brought against her husband Robert Allan McKinnon, tried before Mr. Justice Walsh. Judgment was also granted her for \$1,000, the amount of a loan made to her husband in 1911 for the carrying on of a live-stock business.

The living allowance fixed for her and the two children was to date from June 8th last, \$500 to be paid now and \$100 monthly and to be charged up out of such funds as may be available in court. 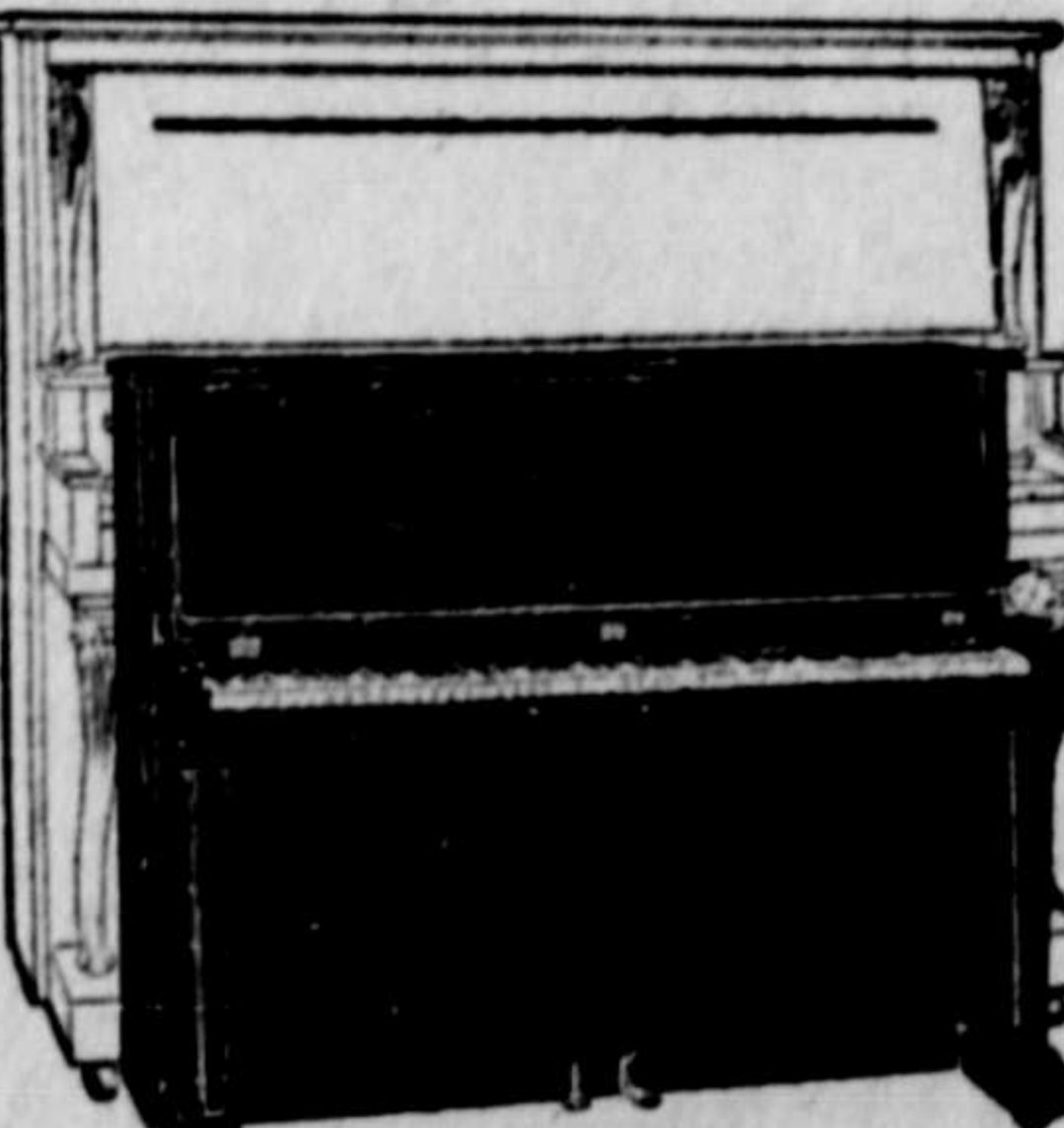
