## BRITISH ELECTIONS BROUGHT ON AT ONCE

### CANADA HAS VITAL INTEREST IN CONTEST NOW PROCEEDING THAT COUNTRY

#### Canada is Directly Interested in the British Elections Which are Announced for December 5

OTTAWA, Nov. 13.—Announcement of the British elections to take place on December 5 came as a surprise in political circles here and the surprise increased with the news that former Premier Asquith and former Premier Lloyd George had renewed an alliance against protection.

Canadian interest in the coming election is quickened by the offers of increased preference on Canadian goods made by the Baldwin government at the recent conferences.

It is thought here that victory for the present British government would mean the possibility of extensive development in preferences between the United Kingdom and the Dominions, while its defeat would be regarded as likely to set back the clock of imperial preference for some time.

Though there will be no effort made to bring the recent offers of preference into effect until after the elections, if Baldwin is returned it is expected he will go ahead rapidly with this legislation but defeat for him is regarded as likely to put an end to these offers.

#### DEFENSE LEFT TO DOMINIONS

Each Country in Empire Should  
Defend Own Shores is  
General Principle

LONDON, Nov. 13. — Official summary of the proceedings of the Imperial Conference published showing that great strides were made in matters of trade and Empire development along lines already published in advance stories and that matters of imperial defense decision is left to the parliament of the various countries comprising the British Empire, except that the broad principle is recognized that each portion of the Empire is primarily responsible for its own defense.

Treaty making powers of the various dominions are defined as subject to most careful consideration of its possible effects on other portions of the Empire and extensive consultation with such other countries involved.

#### EX-KAISER HAS HIS PASSPORTS

Crown Prince Arrives at Estates  
and Wilhelm May Follow  
Soon

BRUSSELS, Nov. 13 (a.m.) — Ex-Kaiser Wilhelm has received several passports for himself and suite authorizing his return to Germany and it is understood that he intends to leave shortly.

The ex-crown prince has not yet turned up in Silesia.

BERLIN, Nov. 13 (noon) — The former Crown Prince arrived at his estate at Oels, Silesia, at six o'clock this evening. It is announced.

#### BRITAIN ABANDONS EXPERT COMMISSION GERMAN REPARATIONS

French Premier Announces He  
Will Propose Such a Commission

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The British government announces that it will not pursue the plan for a commission of experts to inquire into Germany's ability to pay the British. Taking notice of the failure of France to agree with the United States she will give up the idea and devote herself to international problems.

Simultaneously with Britain's announcement comes an announcement from Paris that Premier Poincare on his own responsibility will propose the creation of such a commission.

Deceased, who was 65 years of age, is said to have come from Prince Edward Island and has no relatives in this country as far as is known. The remains are in the hands of Haynor Bros., undertakers.

#### MAN WHO FELL OFF WHARF DIED TODAY

SIX SWEDISH IMMIGRANTS  
ARRIVED FROM EAST

Six Swedish immigrants reached the city over the week-end with a view to settling in this district and following either the fishing or farming industries. Three arrived on Saturday's train from the East and the other three arrived last night. They are all direct from Sweden and are now looking over the district before definitely establishing themselves.

#### PRINCESS MAY MET WITH BAD MISHAP

FIVE MEN KILLED WHEN BOILER  
BLOWS UP ON FORMER C.P.R.  
COAST STEAMER

Five men were instantly killed last week in the West Indies when a boiler exploded on the steamer Princess May formerly a well known craft in the C.P.R. coast steamship service and now engaged in the Jamaica fruit trade. The vessel had to be towed into Kingston, Jamaica, after the accident.

#### CONFIDENCE IN POINCARE

PARIS, Nov. 13.—The French chamber of deputies gave a vote of confidence to the Poincare government, the vote being 379 to 165.

#### PROTECTION ISSUE GENERAL ELECTION IN GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The British Parliament will be dissolved Thursday and a general election will be held Wednesday, December 5. The announcement to that effect was made today to Parliament by Premier Baldwin.

Protection will be the great issue before the country.

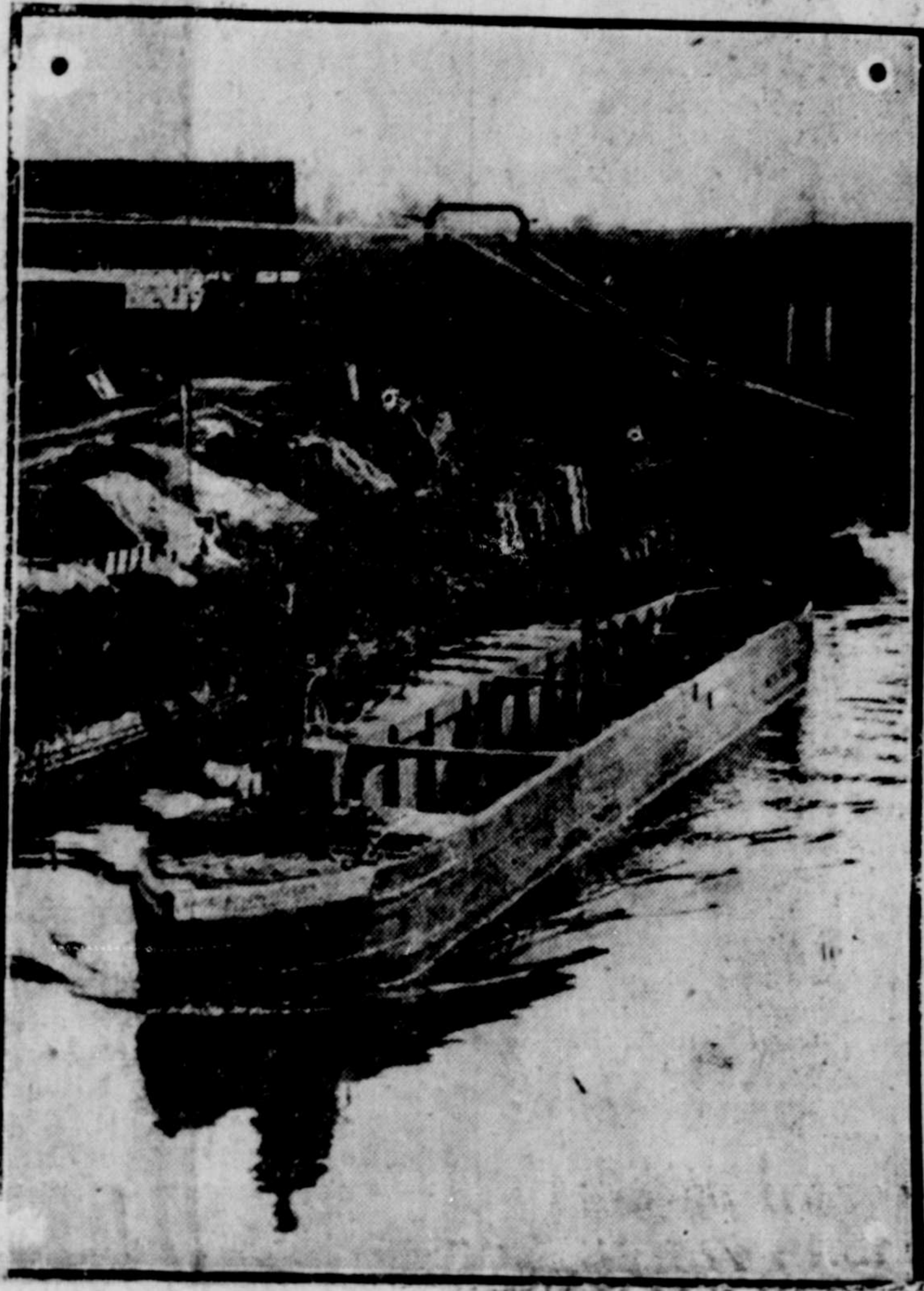

#### BIG ROBBERY AT COW BAY

J. S. Smith of Mug-Up Reports to Police That \$7,000 Was Stolen

J. S. Smith of the Cow Bay Mug-Up reported to the city police on Monday night that his premises were broken into on Thursday night last and \$7,000 in cash taken. The police are investigating.

According to Mr. Smith, he and Mrs. Smith went out to the theatre on the evening in question. On their return they found that the back door had been broken in by means of an axe. The money taken was in American and Canadian bills and was in a bureau drawer. No clue as to the identity of the robbers was found.

#### A FOOTBALL PLAYER SHOT FOLLOWING AN ARGUMENT AND DIES

Thomas Ball Was Centre Half  
Back For Aston Villa; Burton  
of Port Vale Also Died

BIRMINGHAM, Eng., Nov. 13.—Thomas Ball, centre half back for Aston Villa football team, was shot dead at Perry Bar Sunday night following an argument with his landlord, George Stagg, an ex-member of the Birmingham police force.

Another well known player died Monday, Butler, inside left for Port Vale, dying of septic poisoning, which resulted from a fatal accident on the football field.

#### LOST HUNTER WAS LOCATED

After Wandering in Woods and  
Making Improvised Raft,  
Indian Picks up Bartell  
Hedstrom

Found floating in Grenville Channel on an improvised raft, Bartell Hedstrom of this city, who was lost from a hunting party down the coast last week, was located in an exhausted condition by the search party headed by Special Provincial Constable George Grate on Saturday afternoon. Hedstrom had wandered in the woods and when he was found he was some 12 or 15 miles below the point where he had headed into the woods after leaving the rest of his party. He had been out two and a half days without anything to eat. Coming to the beach he had tied two logs together and made the raft from which he attempted to stop the steamer Prince Rupert Saturday. Apparently he was not seen. Eventually he was picked up by a Port Essington Indian named Alfred Innes and later met the search party. Hedstrom had shot a deer but he left it in the woods when he became lost.

#### EACH MAN GOT \$844

Record for Individual Proceeds Set up by American Schooner Majestic

Marketing 55,000 pounds of Halibut at 16c and 10c, a record for share of proceeds to individual fishermen was set up by the American schooner Majestic, Capt. Pete Peterson, on Saturday last. After three weeks fishing, each of the ship's crew of eight men received \$844. The Majestic is one of this year's new boats and this was her fourth or fifth trip.

The Helgeland's crew also received good shares when the boat sold 55,000 pounds at 16c and 8c. Capt. Louis Holmes is master of the Helgeland.

Will Play Thirteen Matches in

WINNIPEG, Nov. 13. — It is announced that the famous Corinthian football team of England when touring Canada next summer will go as far west as the Pacific coast. They will play in thirteen matches on this side.

Special Provincial Constable Grate is leaving tonight for Kwinitsa where he will institute a search for a section man at that point who has not been seen for two days since he left with a double-barrelled shotgun on a hunting trip.

#### British Liberals Unite to Fight Protection in the Election Campaign

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The Asquith and Lloyd George factions of the Liberal party sank their differences this morning and re-united to present a solid front against the Conservative protectionists as well as the Labor party in the coming elections.

Reconsolidation was effected at a meeting of the former premiers Asquith and Lloyd George with Sir Alfred Mond and Sir John Simon.

Arrangements were made at the meeting for a united campaign by all Liberals. The announcement of the reunion formed one of the big sensations of the day. The Evening News says that Asquith will lead the re-united party.

It is recalled that Lloyd George, in answering interviewers when he landed in Southampton from his visit to Canada and the United States last week, said he would work with anybody who would serve the country faithfully.

#### SERIOUS CHARGE AGAINST INDIAN

Charles Patsy in Jail at Hazelton  
in Connection With Assault on  
White Girl

Charles Patsy, Hazelton Indian, is in jail at Hazelton awaiting preliminary trial on a charge of committing a serious statutory offence against a 15-year-old white girl. Following in incident which occurred about a week ago Constable Cline of Hazelton instituted an investigation which brought about the arrest of Patsy. L. W. Patmore of the city was sent for to conduct the prosecution and the preliminary hearing opened last Saturday before S. H. Hoskins. Some evidence was taken and the case was remanded pending the advice of handwriting experts. Mr. Robinson, barrister of Smithers, has the case for accused.

The incident is said to have aroused the indignation of the entire white population of Hazelton. The girl alleged to have been assaulted had only recently arrived in Hazelton from the Yukon Telegraph Line where she had spent practically all her life.

#### UNION STEAMSHIP COMPANY AWARDED \$15,000 BY COURT

C.P.R. Steamer Princess Beatrice  
Responsible for Crash With  
Camosun Last January

Holding that the Princess Beatrice was liable for the collision on January 20 last in McKay Reach with the steamer Camosun, the claim of the Union Steamship Co. for \$15,000 against the Canadian Pacific Railway was allowed by Mr. Justice Martin in the Admiralty Court at Vancouver last week. The C.P.R. had made a claim for \$15,000 which was dismissed. The Union Steamship Co.'s counter claim for a like amount was allowed.

EDINBURGH, Nov. 13. — Premier Mackenzie King of Canada and Premier Warren of Newfoundland received the degree of D.C.L. from the University of Edinburgh and later were guests of the city at luncheon.

#### KING GIVES AWAY PRINCESS MAUDE IN MARRIAGE TO LORD

LONDON, Nov. 13. — Princess Maude, a niece of King George, became the bride of Lord Garnegie here at the week end. She was escorted to the altar by His Majesty.

#### ONTARIO TO GIVE BOUNTY ON IRON

SAULT STE. MARIE, Nov. 13.—Premier Ferguson of Ontario speaking at a banquet to Hon. James Lyons, announced that the Ontario government would provide a bounty for the development of the iron industry in the province.

#### U.S. NOT INTERESTED IN GERMAN MONARCHY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—President Coolidge believes the traditions of the United States would preclude it from joining the allied government in protesting to Germany against the return of the former crown prince or his father to Germany or in any measures to prevent the re-establishment of a monarchy.

#### THUMB AND TWO FINGERS GONE

Smithers Boy Sets Fire to High  
Powered Detonator With  
Disastrous Result

While on his way to school on Thursday, Pete Hubert, age 12, picked up a high-powered detonator evidently left behind after some blasting operations. With the aid of a match he proceeded to investigate, with the result that there was an explosion, and when the smoke had cleared it was found that the boy had lost the two first fingers and thumb of his left hand.

He was immediately taken to the hospital where Dr. Hanksin performed a necessary operation on the badly-mutilated hand, as the flesh was practically all torn away leaving several bones exposed. The lad is now progressing favorably.

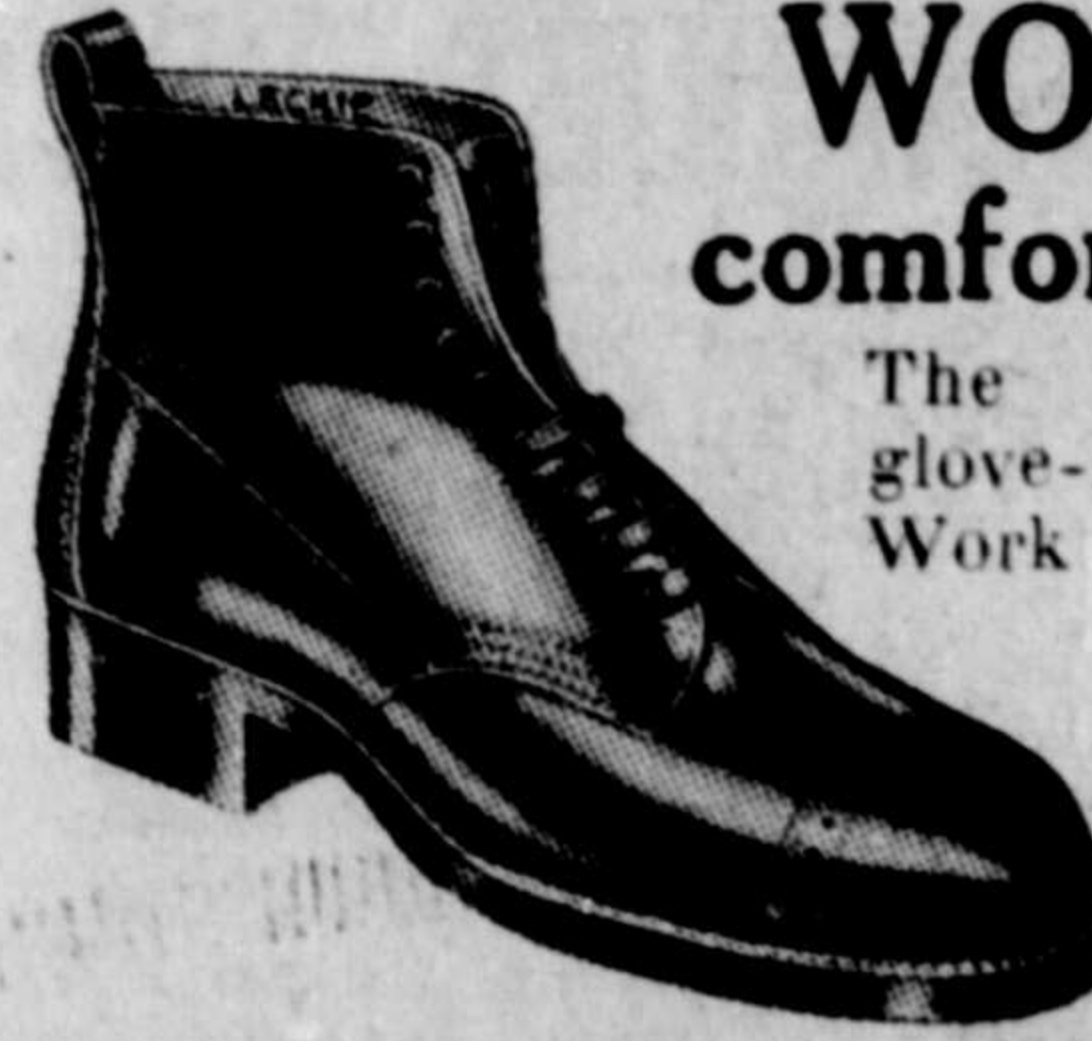

### EDMONTON HEARS OF PRINCE RUPERT AS PORT FOR ORIENT

A. S. Carter Sends Report of Good Time Made by Canadian Freighter

Under a two column headline the Edmonton Bulletin has the following:

"A. S. Carter, an old-time resident of Alberta, writes The Bulletin from Prince Rupert as follows:

"The Canadian Freighter arrived here from the Orient on October 23. She went into the dry dock on Saturday, got cleaned and painted, came off last night and is now loading a cargo of 600,000 feet of lumber for the Orient. This is the first boat to make the round trip from Prince Rupert to the Orient. Her time was 2 months and 1 day. (The time cuts no figure as there are boats on the Pacific could easily double this time.) This is the beginning of a wonderful trade between Prince Rupert and the Orient, which will benefit Edmonton and the whole C.N. line. The day is near at hand when some enterprising steamship company will put a fast line of steamers on this route which saves 500 miles on the Pacific, 200 across the continent and over the best grade crossing the Rocky Mountains on the American continent; in fact, practically no grade. Time is money. The silks (which are heavily insured, rice, etc., passengers and express will move swiftly over this short, excellent route in the very near future. The Canadian Freighter claims her trip was a complete success. She is not a fast boat as she is built to carry. Her tonnage is about 8,000 tons. To compare her to an up-to-date freight boat I might mention the Clemdyk, a Holland steamer, which trades from Rotterdam to Vancouver through the Panama canal. She is a 14,000 ton boat, is between 5 and 6 hundred feet long, and has a speed of 14 knots per hour. She is a steel boat and an excellent sea vessel. The Hollanders seized her from the Germans during the war. She was then a new boat. She makes a round trip from Rotterdam to Vancouver every four months and coals up at Nanaimo, Vancouver Island. ### USING AN AIRPLANE FOR FILMING THIEF

Going on location by airplane is an old stunt in motion pictures, but shooting a scene from an airplane as part of an actual production is new. And Douglas Fairbanks is one of the first to use aerial photography in this practical manner.

Fairbanks is now completing plans to photograph the concluding "big scene" of his "The Thief of Bagdad" by plane. While a battery of cameras grind out the action of the story from the ground, a camera man will soar overhead and register another view of the scene.

The episode to be photographed shows the departure from Bagdad of Douglas Fairbanks as the regenerated thief and Miss Julianne Johnston as "The Princess" on the Magis Carpet. They will float over the city while a mob of several thousand "extras" wave to them from the great square of Bagdad.

Leading Male Role is Taken by Real Live Judge

# KEEP UP FIGHT RAILWAY RATES

Mon. John Oliver Assured Vancouver Delegation He Would Not Let Matter Drop

### BEHIND GOVERNMENT

VICTORIA, Nov. 13. — British Columbia has not finished its fight for equitable freight rates and will continue it until the province gets justice from the Dominion of Canada, Premier Hon. John Oliver announced to a delegation of Vancouver businessmen here.

The premier also announced that the provincial government will stand behind Vancouver business interests in a lawsuit which will be launched immediately in an attempt to stop the federal government from charging duty on goods shipped from Eastern Canada to the Pacific coast through the Panama Canal.

The government, the premier added, will use its entire influ-



ence to bring about the appointment of a Canadian customs officer in New York to aid the shipment of goods from Eastern Canada to this coast by water.

"It is only yesterday that I received a copy of the federal government order-in-council referring the rates case back to the railway board, and I have had no opportunity to study it," the premier told the delegation of businessmen. "But I may tell you that I do not and cannot consider this matter closed until British Columbia receives just treatment in regard to Western freight rates. I regard this as the most important question which we must face today."

J. B. Thomson, president of the Vancouver board of trade, who led the businessmen's delegation before the cabinet, urged the government to demand that the railway board again review evidence taken before when western freight rates were under consideration. He charged that vital evidence bearing on the case had been overlooked by the railway board.

### Government Thanked

"We wish to express our thanks to the government for its fight against discriminatory freight rates," said Mr. Thomson. "We feel that our thanks are personally due to the premier for his hard work on this case."

"We feel disappointed that the federal government referred the rates question back to the railway board instead of deciding it itself," Mr. Thomson went on. "We have information that in considering British Columbia's case, the evidence so ably presented by Mr. McGeer regarding grades and curvature on the Canadian National Railways, was not taken into consideration in the previous findings of the railway commission. We would suggest to the government that if there is any way in which it can do it, that it bring force to bear on the federal government so that the railway commission may review the whole situation, taking into consideration not only one railway, but both the great transcontinental systems.

"We are behind this government or any government in the fight for the revival of discriminatory rates."

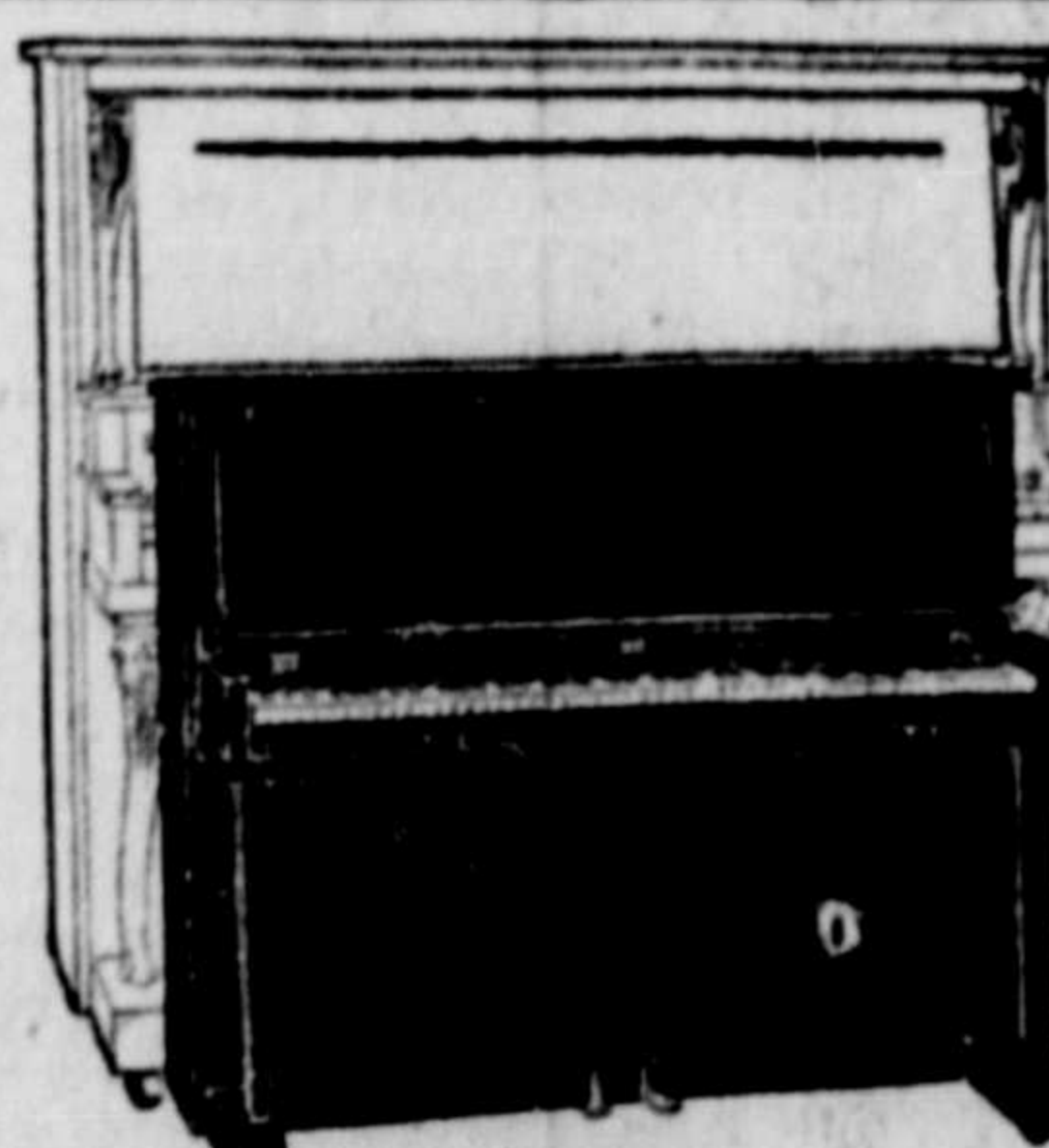
