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BRITISH ELECTIONS BROUGHT ON AT ONCE CANADA HAS VITAL INTEREST IN CONTEST NOW PROCEEDING THAT COUNTRY

Canada is Directly Interested in the British Elections Which are Announced for December 5

OTTAWA, Nov. 13.—Announcement of the British elections to take place on December 5 came as a surprise in political circles here and the surprise increased with the news that former Premier Asquith and former Premier Lloyd George had renewed an alliance against protection.

Canadian interest in the coming election is quickened by the offers of increased preference on Canadian goods made by the Baldwin government at the recent conferences.

It is thought here that victory for the present British government would mean the possibility of extensive development in preferences between the United Kingdom and the Dominions, while its defeat would be regarded as likely to set back the clock of imperial preference for some time.

Though there will be no effort made to bring the recent offers of preference into effect until after the elections, if Baldwin is returned it is expected he will go ahead rapidly with this legislation but defeat for him is regarded as likely to put an end to these offers.

DEFENSE LEFT
TO DOMINIONS

Each Country in Empire Should
Defend Own Shores Is
General Principle

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Official summary of the proceedings of the Imperial Conference published showing that great strides were made in matters of trade and Empire development along lines already published in advance stories and that matters of imperial defense decision is left to the parliament of the various countries comprising the British Empire, except that the broad principle is recognized that each portion of the Empire is primarily responsible for its own defense.

Treaty making powers of the various dominions are defined as subject to most careful consideration of its possible effects on other portions of the Empire and extensive consultation with such other countries involved.

Thanksgiving Services on Sunday Were Unusually Well Attended

At the Presbyterian Church Sunday, there were special Thanksgiving services and in the evening the church was packed to the doors, it being difficult to arrange seating for all those present. The Minister, Rev. Hugh Grant, preached appropriately on "Thanksgiving." The choir in charge of Mrs. F. Darton and accompanied on the piano by Mrs. H. G. Fraser, sang two anthems "The Radiant Morn has Passed Away" and "Ye Shall Dwell in the Land," the solos were taken by Mrs. Jarvis McLeod; A. Clapperton, Mrs. J. G. McMillan and J. Currie.

Special vocal solos were contributed by S. K. Campbell and Mrs. Tupper. The building was beautifully decorated, the work being in charge of Mrs. McLeod and Mrs. Darton.

At the morning service Dr. Grant preached on the Arminian and entered a plea for love rather than hate.

EDMONTON HEARS OF PRINCE RUPERT AS PORT FOR ORIENT

**A. S. Carter Sends Report of
Good Time Made by Canadian
Freighter**

Under a two column headline the Edmonton Bulletin has the following:

"A. S. Carter, an old-time resident of Alberta, writes The Bulletin from Prince Rupert as follows:

"The Canadian Freighter arrived here from the Orient on October 23. She went into the dry dock on Saturday, got cleaned and painted, came off last night and is now loading a cargo of 600,000 feet of lumber for the Orient. This is the first boat to make the round trip from Prince Rupert to the Orient. Her time was 2 months and 1 day. (The time cuts no figure as there are boats on the Pacific could easily double this time). This is the beginning of a wonderful trade between Prince Rupert and the Orient, which will benefit Edmonton and the whole G.N.R. line. The day is near at hand when some enterprising steamship company will put a fast line of steamers on this route which saves 500 miles on the Pacific, 200 across the continent and over the best grade crossing the Rocky Mountains on the American continent; in fact, practically no grade. Time is money. The silks (which are heavily insured, rice, etc., passengers and express will move swiftly over this short, excellent route in the very near future. The Canadian Freighter claims her trip was a complete success. She is not a fast boat as she is built to carry. Her tonnage is about 8,000 tons. To compare her to an up-to-date freight boat I might mention the Clemency, a Holland steamer, which trades from Rotterdam to Vancouver through the Panama canal. KEEP UP FIGHT RAILWAY RATES

Mon. John Oliver Assured Vancouver Delegation He Would Not Let Matter Drop

BEHIND GOVERNMENT

VICTORIA, Nov. 13.—British Columbia has not fought freight rates and will continue it until the province gets justice from the Dominion of Canada. Premier Hon. John Oliver announced to a delegation of Vancouver businessmen here.


The premier also announced that the provincial government will stand behind Vancouver business interests in a lawsuit which will be launched immediately in an attempt to stop the federal government from charging duty on goods shipped from Eastern Canada to the Pacific coast through the Panama Canal.

The government, the premier added, will use its entire influence to bring about the appointment of a Canadian customs officer in New York to aid the shipment of goods from Eastern Canada to this coast by water.

"It is only yesterday that I received a copy of the federal government order-in-council referring the rates case back to the railway board, and I have had no opportunity to study it," the premier told the delegation of business men. "But I may tell you that I do not and cannot consider this matter closed until British Columbia receives just treatment in regard to Western freight rates. I regard this as the most important question which we must face today."

J. B. Thomson, president of the Vancouver board of trade, who led the business men's delegation before the cabinet, urged the government to demand that the railway board again review evidence taken before when western freight rates were under consideration. He charged that vital evidence bearing on the case had been overlooked by the railway board.
