BRITAIN REFUSES PROPOSAL OF STATES MILITARY BEING SENT TO THE STRIKE AREA NEAR SYDNEY, NOVA SCOTIA

Britain Rejects Proposal to Make Dry Area Twelve Miles from Coast Instead of Three

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Great Britain flatly rejected the American proposal for prohibition within the twelve mile limit and this action has left administration officials no alternative, it is said authoritatively today, but to refuse admittance to ship liquor stores under penalty of seizure.

CHICAGO, June 29.—Expressing belief that next Congress will change the Volstead Act to permit foreign ships to bring liquor under seal into territorial waters of the United States, Albert D. Lasker, retiring head of the U.S. Shipping Board in a statement said he had reason to believe that dry as well as wet law makers will support the measure.

DELICATE POINT LIQUOR SEIZURE

Lord Curzon Speaks on Question
Arising Through Action of
United States

LONDON, June 29.—Lord Curzon, in discussing the question of ships' liquor in American ports, said a delicate point was involved through the action of the United States in taking supplies off British boats and if required careful handling. He said the British government had drawn the American government's attention to the fact that domestic laws were fastened on international property and that, while America was technically within her rights, she was going beyond anything ever done before in the marine world. The United States had replied formally but did not discuss that point.

Lord Curzon intimated that the British government strongly disapproved of the liquor seizures and was considering the proper attitude for Britain to take.

STRUCK WHILE READING ACT

Magistrate at Dominion Iron and
Steel Works, Sydney, N.S.,
Knocked Unconscious

SYDNEY, June 29.—While trying to read the Riot Act to a group of strikers and their sympathizers who clashed with the only police at the Dominion Iron and Steel Company's mine last night, Magistrate Hill was struck on the head by a stone and knocked unconscious. Several policemen were hit by a volley of stones from men who had walked out and later returned to remonstrate with strikebreakers. The mob dispersed after the magistrate was hurt and the incident closed.

STEAMER SEAL IS CAUGHT IN ICE AND PROPELLERS BROKEN

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 29.—The steamer Seal on the way to Labrador fisheries with 200 men aboard sent word she is imprisoned in ice floes and is helpless. All four propeller blades were broken.

HOT DAY IN VICTORIA

VICTORIA, June 29.—Yesterday was the hottest day so far this year, the temperature registering 86 in the shade. Record hot weather for this city was 91 in 1920.

It was stated that a formal requisition for troops went out from Cape Breton strike area last night to Ottawa and that instructions came to Halifax this morning to send 500 troops at once. As only 250 were available at so short a notice, that number stood ready.

EVERY NINTH CHILD BORN IS JAPANESE

Secretary of Women's Institutes
Appeals to Women Against
Oriental Occupation

MONTREAL, June 29.—Quoting statistics to show that every ninth child born in British Columbia is Oriental and declaring that Japanese did not hesitate to say they were destined to be the dominant race, Mrs. V. S. MacLachlan of British Columbia, secretary of the women's institutes and national convener of child welfare, appealed to members of the women's institutes to use their influence for the relief of Oriental occupation in an address before the tenth annual convention.

Description of Light Cruiser Curlew which is Source of Interest

Officers of His Majesty's light cruiser Curlew, which is spending three days in port, will say with true British modesty that they do not cut much figure in the Grand Navy but to many Prince Rupert people, the Curlew presents a first and impressive picture of the great modern fighting and police force which maintains Britain's naval supremacy and the peace and liberty of the world. It is with the keenest interest that Prince Rupert citizens are taking the opportunity of visiting the vessel and therefore the cruiser moored at the ocean dock is the centre of general attraction. It was announced on board yesterday afternoon that the Curlew would be open to visitors from 4:30 to 6:30 this afternoon and from 2 to 6:30 tomorrow afternoon.

The Curlew is a vessel of 1199 tons and carries 406 officers and men including 10 Royal Marines. Her length over all is 450 ft., beam 33½ feet and draught, 16½ feet. She has five 6-in. guns, two 3-in. guns, four 3-pounders and four double torpedo tubes. Amidships she has 3-in. armor tapering off to 2½ and 2 inches at bow and stern. On the upper decks amidships she has 1 inch armor.

Oil Burning Engines

She is a twin screw vessel and is equipped with Parsons geared turbines of 10,000 horse power. She has six Yarrow boilers and is oil fired. Her maximum speed is 28 knots but on her present cruise she is steaming leisurely at not much more than 12 knots.

The Curlew belongs to the Geres class of light cruisers and was completed in 1917 having been built by Vickers at Barrow-in-Furness, Lancashire, England. Other cruisers of her class are the Cardiff, Geres, Coventry and Curacao. The ship was commissioned in 1917 and was on active service in the North Sea during the last year of the Great War having been attached to the Harwich force under Rear Admiral Tyrwhitt. She was in the action of November 17, 1917, with German light forces.

Was in China

Following the war, the Curlew was for three years in the China squadron. She was commissioned for the North America-West Indies squadron, to which she now belongs, on November 24, 1922, at Devonport, England, and sailed for the West Indies on December 9, 1922. She will remain in the West Indies squadron until the autumn of 1925. The flagship of the North America-West Indies squadron is the Calcutta and other ships in the squadron are the Cape Town and Constance. Vice-Admiral Sir Michael Colme-Seymour is in command of the squadron.

BIG SHIPMENT FROM ALASKA

Cordova Brought in 223 Tons of
Herring Products For
Transshipment Last
Night

The Alaska Steamship Co.'s freighter Cordova, Capt. Simpson, was in port from 10 o'clock last night until 8 o'clock this morning unloading 223 tons of herring products from Port Waller, Alaska, for transshipment to Eastern States via the Canadian National Railways. The shipment, which was handled over the lumber assembly wharf, comprised 349 half-barrels of mild cured herring and 664 barrels of herring oil. This was the first consignment of herring oil to pass through Prince Rupert this season. More will be coming on steadily, it is expected.

After discharging, the Cordova sailed this morning for Port Angeles and Seattle.

Pensions and Insurance Being

OTTAWA, June 29.—Extensive modifications of the Pensions Act and the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act are recommended in the report of the Senate Committee, which has been considering them. No decision was reached last night. The general debate begins Friday.

GOVERNMENT IS CRITICISED BY THE OPPOSITION

OTTAWA, June 29.—The Conservative and Progressive oppositions joined yesterday in criticising the government for bringing in supplementary estimates so near the end of the session.

Premier King said there was really no necessity for proroguing this week and offered to carry the session into next week if the members so desired.

The presentation was made by Miss Mills, vice-principal of Borden Street School, and an address was read by D. H. Hartness, vice-principal of Booth Memorial School. Mr. Hartness expressed the deep regret of every member of the staff at Mr. Campbell's decision to leave his work here with the hope that prosperity and success would follow him in the future. Mr. Hartness said that Mr. Campbell had enjoyed confidence and popularity at the hands of all the teachers who would not soon forget the pleasant past two years of association with him.

Mr. Campbell replied suitably expressing his surprise but appreciation of the manner in which he had been honored.

NEW ROAD WILL OPEN TOMORROW

Minister of Interior Sends Message to People of Canada

OTTAWA, June 29.—In connection with the opening of the Banff Windermere Highway tomorrow, Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, today issued an invitation to the people of Canada which follows: "It is the hope of the Government that the Highway will enable increasing thousands of Canadians to visit their own possessions, the national parks, and to enjoy the extraordinary opportunities for outdoor life, recreation and education which they afford."

The new road will be the first highway across the central Canadian Rockies to provide a direct route for vehicles from the prairies to the coast.

LOCAL DRY DOCK GETS BELMONT REPAIR JOB

Will Give Gasoline Yacht a Complete Overhaul Following Wreck—Time Limit Four Weeks

The Canadian National Shipyard has received the contract for making a complete overhaul of the Belmont-Surf Inlet Mining Co.'s yacht Belmont which sunk down the coast a couple of weeks ago. Work has already started, the time limit for completion of the job being four weeks.

UPROARIOUS TIME AUSTRALIAN HOUSE

All Night Session and Closure Necessary to Pass Supply—Laborite is Suspended

MELBOURNE, June 29.—An all night session ending with the application of the closure was necessary to get through two supply bills in the Australian parliament. Sixty-five divisions were taken amid the uproarious dissent of the Laborites, one of whom was suspended and several others named by the speaker.

Local people have since the announcement appeared yesterday in the Daily News, been congratulating Miss Jean Mackay on her winning the silver cup emblematic of the championship of the province in the essay contest. In this the High School staff shares.

The text of the despatch, which came in late yesterday and which it was not possible then to publish in full follows:

"Jean Halliday Mackay, 15 years of age, of Prince Rupert High School, Marjorie Wakefield, 13, of Vernon Central School, and Betty Martin, 12, of Meldrum Creek today won the first prizes in the province wide essay competition on 'Our Forests and Why We Should Protect Them From Fire.' It was conducted by the forest branch of the department of lands. Ten thousand students, nearly six thousand of them from Vancouver alone and a couple of thousand from Victoria, competed for the prizes.

"Miss Mackay will be awarded the large silver cup for winning the first prize in the High School group. Miss Wakefield will also be awarded a silver cup for turning in the best essay in the province of any public school pupil. Other prize winners will get gold and silver medals. Little Betty Martin wins third silver cup for heading the intermediate grade list."

LOCAL STRAWBERRIES TO BE SENT NORTH

Jarvis McLeod is to Make a Trial Shipment to Friends in Skagway—Market Possibilities

At the request of personal friends, Jarvis McLeod is going to ship this year to Skagway, Alaska, several crates of strawberries from the interior district. This will be in the nature of a trial shipment and if it proves successful it will in all probability open up another market for the interior product since strawberries are a scarce commodity in Alaska.

LOCAL STORES DISAPPEARING

Fred Stork Tells of Conditions in Ontario Where Small Towns Suffer

An interesting study is the decay of the local stores in the East, especially in Ontario, and the decadence of the smaller towns at the expense of the big cities, according to Fred Stork who yesterday told the Rotary Club of his observations when in the East. He took one town as an example and added that practically all the other small towns were similarly affected. In that town he found one of the old firms going out of business after being there for fifty years. The head of the firm explained to Mr. Stork that for several years they had been going behind with no prospect of improvement. The trouble was that the department stores in Toronto with a small office in the town took orders and the following morning early the goods were delivered. Under these conditions local stores could not exist.

The result of this condition was that the local stores gradually became smaller and it was only a matter of time when most of them would be out of business, while department store growth had been slow at first it was rapid of late with fatal results to the small towns.

Everything Affected

Added to the loss of business came the heavy taxation for the construction of fine automobile highways. Small merchants were everywhere being closed out and the towns had to take over the property because of failure to pay taxes. The loss of general business meant fewer commercial men on the road, and the closing of hotels and loss to the railways. The purchasing power of money in a large way was putting the small men at a disadvantage. They were being gradually strangled. It was a tremendous change.

Mr. Stork closed by stating that Prince Rupert could not be affected that way, for many years at any rate, and he urged that people buy at home and thus keep the city prosperous.

PRINCE RUPERT IS CLOSELY TIED UP ALASKA INTERESTS

Situation of Port Bound to Win In Spite of Hindrances: Alaskan Comment

Various interests in Alaska try to injure Prince Rupert in order to benefit themselves. The financial motif is strong in all moves for or against this port. The "Alaska Fisherman" just to hand comments on the situation as follows:

"Mr. Strong was in Prince Rupert recently making arrangements for the shipment of his cannery products to the East over the Grand Trunk Railway. He is operating the Bellingham and expects to transport the fish from Ketchikan to Prince Rupert in that vessel, recently overhauled and placed in good conditions.

"Carl Strong, who now plans to send his own products to eastern United States via Canadian railroads, is the same man who voluntarily appeared before the committee on Merchant Marine against Sutherland's proposed repeal of Section 27 of the Jones Shipping Act. This section it is that permits foreign ships to engage in general business anywhere in the United States except in Alaska.

"Strong at that time said that Alaska should not participate in the benefits of foreign shipping.

To prepare for washing: Remove all solid matter immediately—put to soak in cold water. If diapers are simply wet place in a covered pail and let soak in cold water.

BRINGING UP FATHER



STORK URGES TAKE COURAGE

Tells of Long Wait City of Edmonton Had Before Progress Made

The need of courage in public and private life in Canada today was the subject of an address given yesterday at the Rotary Club luncheon by Fred Stork, on the occasion of his returning after several months absence in the East. He explained that every part of the country needed that virtue for there were both local and national problems which it was difficult to solve. The country was faced with commercial and industrial revolution and it was difficult to keep up with the march of events.

The march of science, art and invention, Mr. F. Stork explained, had a disturbing influence. Old conditions were changing and this was especially noticeable in Ontario. It was true also for the whole country. The advent of the automobile, the telephone and telegraph, and the flying machine in recent years was causing an upheaval commercially and industrially.

Having recently returned to Ontario where he was born, Mr. Stork said the condition was very marked. The old blacksmith shops at the corners had disappeared and other trades and calling were being remodelled. It required courage to meet the new conditions.

Rupert's Hard Pull

In Prince Rupert there had been a hard pull but there was nothing to justify pessimism. Everything was changing. Even in governmental circles, especially in the matter of the sums to be raised, the changes were very great. It required the highest brand of courage to carry on, but all had faith in the country.

Mr. Stork then told of the fight of the big cities. He had visited Quebec city a few months ago and admired the historic city. He told of the English domination following the battle of the Plains of Abraham and of the fine facilities it now possessed. It had miles of the finest docks, quarantine and immigration sheds, and its drydocks made ours look very small in comparison. Yet Quebec seemed to have gone to sleep on the job and Montreal had outdistanced her. Recently they were asked to witness the rejuvenation of the port when the first store cattle were shipped to England.

Edmonton's Fight

Comparing Prince Rupert's fight with that of Edmonton, Mr. Stork told of having met a delegate from the Alberta capital trying to interest the government in building an elevator at that place. Having told some of the difficulties that Prince Rupert had met, the other man intimated that they were as nothing compared with those Edmonton had to live down. In the early days the C. P. R. announced its intention of building through the Yellowhead Pass and settlers went in and established at Edmonton. The railway changed its plans and left them stranded. They hung on for forty years and even today some of them were still in that city. The first railway to reach there was a branch line from Calgary. Tar sands which they expected to make much of were tied up and held out of use. They had wanted a government elevator since the beginning yet, although other cities had them, Edmonton was still without this facility. Mr. Stork said that while times were often quiet here and people became impatient, it was as nothing to Edmonton's weary wait.

department store problem in the East and urged the necessity of buying at home. He suggested that Prince Rupert people refuse to be stampeded. He kept in close touch with the situation here and he believed the condition was largely mental. The effect of the visit of Sir Henry Thornton had been most encouraging. "We must possess ourselves in patience and both outside and at home give a demonstration of courage," he concluded.

BOILER EXPLODES AT ELECTRIC PLANT

Smithers in Darkness After Interrupted Period of Light

SMITHERS, June 29.—After a somewhat lengthy period of uninterrupted service the electric lighting plant came to grief through the explosion of the steam boiler used in connection therewith. The occurrence took place at 2.40 a.m. Monday, and fortunately at a time when no one was in the immediate vicinity, otherwise there might have been serious personal injuries.

It is estimated that three weeks will be required to put the plant in running order again. In the meantime storekeepers are disposing of their stocks of oil and candles.

Several buildings, including the hospital, have private electrical plants installed, so that in the event of a breakdown, as at present, they can carry on without inconvenience.

CROP INDICATIONS AT SMITHERS GOOD

SMITHERS, June 29.—The recent rains, coupled with good growing weather, are producing a hay crop that will equal, if not exceed, any previous one. If the Bulkley Valley is fortunate enough to escape early frosts there should be an abundance of garden produce, as conditions are ideal, and the crops well advanced.

Indications are that a large crop of wild fruits will be gathered this year. Already wild strawberries are being picked, and old timers claim that there will be more wild raspberries this year than any before.

Six days was spent leaving there last Saturday for Prince Rupert. Off Quatsino, Vancouver Island, she met H.M.C.S. Patrician which now accompanies her. Leaving here Sunday, the Curlew, with the Patrician, will go to Portland, Oregon, and after that calls will be made at Esquimalt, Vancouver, Honolulu, San Francisco, Santa Barbara, San Diego and Panama returning to Bermuda in October.

Is Typical Warship

From the outside, the Curlew has the typical warship appearance. Lying low in the water with high raised forecastle, she looks more like a large destroyer than a cruiser. Of the usual gray steel color, she has one large mainmast equipped with turret and look-out cage. Immediately below is the quarter deck and navigation rooms. Her guns and torpedo tubes are to be found in the usual positions. The captain has a very elaborate suite and the officers quarters are located below and aft. She has all the devices and fittings of a modern warship.

From Captain Holbrook down, the officers and men of the Curlew are a very genial lot and are admired by all with whom they come in contact.

The Curlew holds all the prizes of the North Atlantic-Bermuda squadron for water sports including the Pacific Station challenge rowing cup won at Bermuda last April. The ship also won two sailing races this year and holds the Bermuda Yacht Club cup and the squadron challenge cup for sailing.

The officers are all very keenly interested in trout fishing and expeditions have already been arranged to nearby streams.

Captain L. S. Holbrook, M.V.O., of the Curlew, is a brother of Commander Holbrook, V.C., who won distinction at the Dardanelles during the Great War, being in command of the first submarine to go under the Turkish net defences in 1915 when a Turkish transport was torpedoed.

All the officers of the Curlew are permanent navy men and all served during the Great War although they are very modest when questioned as to their records.

SYNOPSIS OF
LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class land
reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to
\$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to sur-
veyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only
land suitable for agricultural purposes
and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished,
but parties of not more than four may
arrange for adjacent pre-emption
with joint residence, but each making
necessary improvements on respective
claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claim for
five years and make improvements to
value of \$10 per acre, including clear-
ing and cultivation of at least 5%
before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation for
less than 5 years, and has made pro-
portionate improvements, he may be-
cause of ill-health, or other cause, be
granted intermediate certificate of im-
provement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent res-
idence may be issued, provided ap-
licant makes improvements to extent of
\$350 per annum and records same each
year. Failure to make improvements
or record same will operate, as for-
feiture, and transfer his claim.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant
may record another pre-emption, if he
requires land in conjunction with his
farm, without actual occupation, pro-
vided statutory improvements made
and residence maintained on Crown
granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20
acres, may be leased as homestead,
title to be obtained after fulfilling res-
idential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes
timber land not exceeding 40 acres
may be purchased; conditions include
payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessibility
by existing roads may be purchased
conditional upon construction of a road
to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of
road, not exceeding half of purchase
price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to
include all persons joining and serv-
ing with His Majesty's Forces. The
time within which the heirs or devisees
of a deceased pre-emptor may apply
for title under the Act is extended
from one year from the death of
such person, as formerly, until one
year after the conclusion of the great
war. This privilege is also made re-
troactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are
due or payable by holders on pre-
emption recorded after June 24, 1918.
Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of monies ac-
crued, due and been paid since August
4, 1914, on account of payments, fees
or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on pre-emption to purchase
town or city lots held by members of
Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired
direct or indirect, remitted from en-
listment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN
LANDS

Provision made for issuance of
Crown grants to sub-purchasers of
Crown Lands, acquiring rights from
purchasers who failed to complete
purchase, involving forfeiture, on ful-
filment of conditions of purchase, in-
terest and taxes. Where sub-purchas-
ers do not claim whole of original par-
cel, purchase price due and taxes may
be distributed proportionately over
whole area. Applications must be made
by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic
development of livestock industry pro-
vided for granting districts and range
administration under Commissioner.
Annual grazing permits issued based
on numbers ranged, priority for estab-
lished owners. Stock-owners may
form Association for range manage-
ment. Free, or partially free, permits
for settlers, campers or travellers, up
to ten head.

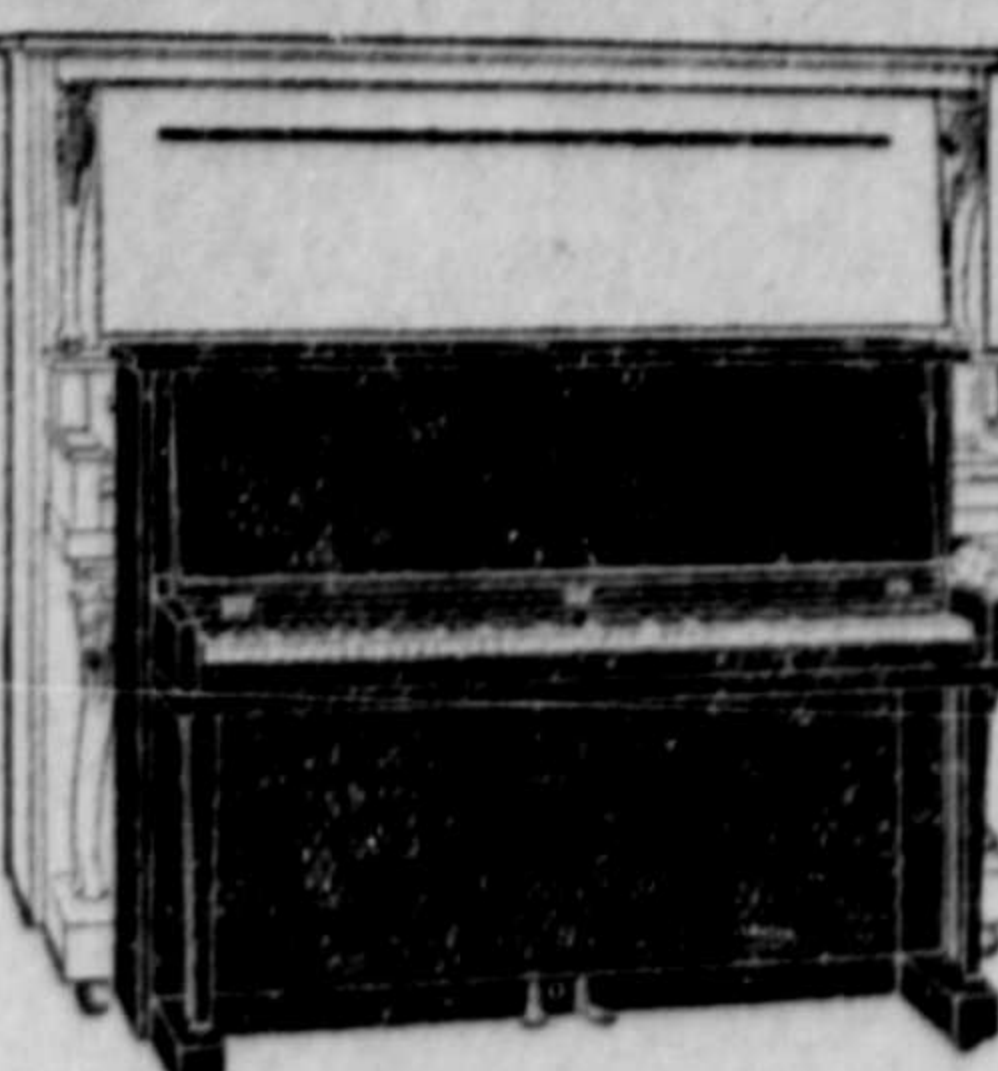
