MEN WILL BE NEEDED IN B.C. THIS YEAR BOARD OF TRADE CONSIDERS NEW STEP TOWARD DEVELOPMENT OF PORT

Mining and Lumber Industries to Boom This Year say Experts of Government; Everyone Working

VICTORIA, March 15.—British Columbia industry between now and the end of April will require every able-bodied man. This is conveyed in a summary of conditions as they exist today by J. D. McNiven, deputy minister of labor. Because of these conditions, it is understood the government will not take any steps to encourage men to go to the prairies. No extra low rates, such as were in vogue last year, will be either sought or given. In fact the prospects for industry this year are so bright that not only all surplus labor will be taken up but there may develop by summer a serious shortage.

At present unemployment is setting down near the vanishing point. The prairie provinces have asked British Columbia for 1500 men for seeding and during the growing season but now this province has reached the conclusion that it cannot spare that number.

A survey of conditions by government experts shows the logging and lumber industries experiencing the biggest boom they ever had. Indications also point to a startling boom in the mining industry in the province. It was early in this century that the last mining boom took place and it is time now for another period of activity. This is being speeded up by the rising price of copper, which has now reached the seventeen cent level, with the probability of going to twenty cents by the end of the year.

Building is active throughout the province and wage increases for mechanics appear probable later this year.

FOUND GUILTY MANSLAUGHTER

Fred Deal Not Murderer According to Finding of Court at Vancouver

VANCOUVER, March 15.—Fred Deal was found guilty of manslaughter by a jury in the second trial on a charge of murdering Constable R. G. McBeath, V.C., while the constable was arresting him for being in charge of an automobile while drunk.

The first trial resulted in a sentence of death. Counsel obtained a second trial on the grounds that Deal was not responsible and was apparently dazed by a blow which the constable is said to have dealt him. A new sentence will be passed at this assize.

CLAIMANT OF WORLD'S ENDURANCE RECORD IN ART OF TERPSICHOIRE

LONDON, March 15.—A test claimant to marathon dancing honors is Santos Casani, former aviator, who claims to have beaten the world's record with a continuous dancing performance lasting eighteen hours and thirty-four minutes. During this time he did 424 fast dances with successive partners. The first lady lasted thirteen hours.

TWELVE LIVES LOST WHEN BRITISH SHIP SINKS OFF HOLLAND

FLUSHING, Holland, March 15.—The British steamer Merville has gone down near Steenbank with a loss of twelve lives.

OFFICIALS ARE COMING SOON

F. G. Dawson to Meet Mr. Keeley Here on His Return From Ottawa

GENERAL MANAGER COMING
Railway Director to Meet Prince Rupert Delegation at Capital

Word has been received from F. G. Dawson that he will meet B. C. Keeley, Pacific Coast manager of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, in this city on his return from Ottawa and that E. A. Warren, general manager of western lines, will also be here about that time. These officials would have been here earlier in the year but they have been waiting for Mr. Dawson, whose enforced trip to California rather upset arrangements.

The meeting of railway directors will be held in Ottawa on March 19, and the Prince Rupert delegation should arrive there about the day following. They will be met by Mr. Dawson who will give them every help possible. Mr. Dawson expressed particular pleasure at the information that Hon. T. D. Pattullo is to be a member of the delegation on account of his ability and standing. He thinks the delegation is a strong and aggressive one.

While expressing regret at being unable to come here before going to Ottawa, Mr. Dawson says he will get all necessary information from the members of the delegation.

Mrs. Dawson is greatly improved in health and at the time Mr. Dawson left was in high spirits and convinced that she would make a complete recovery. Mr. and Mrs. Dawson extend best wishes to the people of Prince Rupert.

Authority is Asked for Building of Permanent Brick and Concrete Six Stall Roundhouse at Rupert

According to information received here, A. H. Eager, superintendent of motive power for the Canadian National Railways at Winnipeg, has applied to headquarters at Montreal for authority for the building of a permanent brick and concrete six stall roundhouse here to replace the old frame structure which was destroyed by fire recently. Details are not yet officially available but it is understood three sites are under consideration—at the mouth of Morse Creek, near the drydock, or on the present site. The building of such a roundhouse would run into considerable money and would take at least a year to put up.

For temporary accommodation, a frame structure is now being run up here on the site of the destroyed roundhouse.

NO ROYAL FUNCTIONS FOR THEM

Scottish Laborites Decline Participation in Regal Affairs

LONDON, March 15.—The dour Scots of the Labor party in the House of Commons have sternly renounced participation in any royal functions. Most of them yesterday signed a declaration that they would accept no invitations to such affairs "when there is so much unemployment" in their constituencies. Papers today reiterate the statement that Ramsay MacDonald, John Clynes, Philip Snowden and James H. Thomas are to dine with the King and Queen tonight at Buckingham Palace.

RESERVE AIR FORCE MAY BE ESTABLISHED

Secretary of British Aviation Department Forecasts Such a Departure in Commons

LONDON, March 15.—Formation of a reserve Air Force of 1,000 officers and 12,000 men and the possible establishment of an auxiliary Air Force was foreshadowed last night by Sir Samuel Hoare, secretary of the Air Department, in the House of Commons.

FIRST CLASS FARE
TO VANCOUVER DOWN
R. F. McNaughton, G. N. B. district passenger agent, this morning announced a reduction in the first class steamer fare from Prince Rupert to Vancouver, from \$26 to \$24, also a reduction in the fare from Prince Rupert to Ocean Falls from \$13.75 to \$12.75. The new fares are effective from today.
W. C. Orchard, G.P.R. agent announced a similar reduction on his steamers.

WELL KNOWN TERRACE MAN DIED TODAY

Daniel McGregor Was Pioneer of District and Served as Captain with C.E.F.

Daniel McGregor, accountant of the George Little sawmill at Terrace and well-known old timer in this district, passed away at the General Hospital in this city this morning at 7:05 o'clock. He was admitted to the hospital on Monday night in a serious condition, and had also been in the hospital a fortnight previous to this but had returned to Terrace.

Deceased served with the Canadian Expeditionary Forces for a long period in the Great War. He enlisted in the 30th Battalion early in 1915 and was transferred to the distinguished 16th Canadian Scottish under Col. C. W. Peck, V.C. later receiving his captaincy and going to the Canadian Tunnelling Corps. He was wounded once.

The late Mr. McGregor was 44 years of age and was a native of Cornwall, England, of Scottish descent. He came to the United States at an early age. An expert broad axe man, he was in the G.T.P. Railway in construction days and had contracts in his line. He is survived by a wife and child in England. Mrs. McGregor having gone home about six months ago on account of her illness.

Deceased was a member of the Great War Veterans' Association and Oddfellows Lodge at Terrace. The remains are now in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers and the Great War Veterans' Association are looking after arrangements.

NEAR EAST SETTLEMENT

Problem Brought to Allies by British High Commissioner at Constantinople

PARIS, March 15.—The problem of the peace settlement in the Near East was put more definitely before the Allies today with the arrival from Constantinople of Neville Henderson, acting British High Commissioner at the Turkish city, who brought the official text of the Ankara government's proposals to the peace agreement submitted to Turkey at Lausanne.

LONDON, March 15.—A preliminary conference between the British, French and Italian representatives to consider the Turkish counter-proposals in the Lausanne draft peace treaty will be held here next week. It is likely that the Lausanne conference will be resumed after the meeting.

APPOINTMENTS OF SIR HENRY

Two Grand Trunk Men Get Positions of Importance in New Organization

OTTAWA, March 15.—The offices of assistant vice-president and publicity agent of the Grand Trunk Railway and general stationer of the Canadian National Railway are abolished as a consequence of the appointment of the following officers, it was announced here last night by Sir Henry Thornton.

D. E. Galloway is to be director of publicity. He has hitherto been publicity agent of the Grand Trunk Railway at Montreal.

W. S. Simpson is to be director of publicity. He has been hitherto publicity agent of the Grand Trunk at Montreal.

R. A. C. Henry is to be director of the bureau of economics. He was formerly special engineer of the department of railways and canals at Ottawa.

F. P. Mallory is appointed director of the bureau of statistics. Formerly he was general statistician of the Canadian National at Toronto.

OFFER PLAN REPARATIONS

Germany Will Make Suggestion If Assured It Will Receive Consideration

LONDON, March 15.—Germany is about to make a declaration that she is willing to produce a plan for the final settlement of the reparations question provided she can rely on the plan being received by the allies with attention and consideration, says the Daily Telegraph Berlin correspondent.

JAIL AND FINE DOPE CARRIER

Ah Sing Found With \$1,000 Worth of Morphine on Person—Nine Months and \$200

Ah Sing, Chinese cook from the steamer Prince Rupert and erstwhile dope carrier, came ashore yesterday afternoon shortly after the arrival of the steamer from the south to do a little business.

Suspected by Sergeants Warrior and Jepson, of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, he was taken off the street to the city police station and searched. Fastened to his leg with a garrote between his sock and underwear was found a package which, on examination by Dr. J. P. Cade, police doctor, was found to contain morphine to the value of \$1,000 retail price.

This morning Ah Sing pleaded guilty before Magistrate McClymont on a charge of having drugs unlawfully in his possession. He was sentenced to do nine months in jail and was also assessed \$200 in the way of a fine.

POOR HOUSE BURNS

ANGELICA, N.Y., Mar. 15.—Seven men and two women perished when the county alms house, on the outskirts of the village, burned down early today.

Possibility of a Harbor Board for Prince Rupert Mentioned in Parliament

At the meeting of the council of the Board of Trade yesterday, S. K. Campbell put in a memorandum for the use of the delegates to Ottawa urging the appointment of a Harbor Board for Prince Rupert to control the port and to undertake the work of erecting a grain elevator here, borrowing the money to do so from the Dominion government as was done in the case of Vancouver. The matter was not gone into at any great length owing to lack of definite information locally. That the matter has occurred to others in the East is plain, however, from the discussions which have taken place in Parliament. A. M. Carmichael, member for Kinsdlesley discussing the Vancouver expenditure in the House of Commons said:

"This is the first application that has been made, I believe, for a development that is going to continue. Now, I wonder if this is only the first 'bite' and if there are many more applications to follow. When the hon. member from Skeena (Mr. Stork) was eulogizing the beauties of northern British Columbia and pointing out the advantages of the fine harbor of Prince Rupert, he took occasion to remind us that the prospects of shipping grain from the prairie provinces were never better than by the port of Prince Rupert. Are we to expect that a board of harbor commissioners will be organized at Prince Rupert and an application made here for another five million dollars to develop that port?—and then possibly in the near future another loan of five million dollars asked for the further development of Vancouver harbor? Will the good work continue in this way? If such is the case, I would not be very strongly in favor of lavishly expending Dominion money or loaning it out with the likelihood of not getting it back in the near future. I would rather favor the citizens of the interested cities and provinces getting together and contributing the money—I am sure it would be forthcoming in that western country—and so developing the ports of Vancouver and Prince Rupert and opening up for the prairie provinces further outlets for the grain."

Develop all Ports

Murray MacLaren of St. John urged the claims of the city as follows:

"It has been stated once or twice in this discussion that grain can be exported through Vancouver during the winter season and that navigation is during that period closed in the East. Now—I was going to say, unfortunately, but rather I should say, fortunately—that is not a correct statement of facts. At the present time grain is exported from the city of St. John, where the elevator capacity is two million and a quarter bushels, a million more than the elevator capacity at Vancouver. However, the same difficulties exist at the port of St. John that are met at the port of Vancouver; that is, there is lack of accommodation and facilities. It is not a case of creating business. The business is there, but it is being refused; it is being lost on account of the lack of accommodation. That is one reason why I am in favor of the encouragement of all ports in this Dominion that are suitable to the handling of the business which presents itself. A few days ago in the port of St. John (continued on page 4)

MOUNTIES WILL BE UNCHANGED

The progressive member for Portage La Prairie, Harry Leader, moved a reduction by twelve and a half per cent in the Parliamentary indemnities and the salaries of ministers. He insisted that economies should begin with Parliament. The debate was not finished at the time of adjournment.

SASKATCHEWAN REMAINING DRY

Government Rejects Petition Asking For Another Plebiscite for Moderation Law

REGINA, March 15.—The Saskatchewan government will not change its policy regarding liquor for some time and yesterday it rejected the petition of the Moderation League signed by 65,075 residents asking for a vote in regard to the matter. The government points out that there have been two plebiscites already and a third could not do any good. They must try out prohibition a little longer.

OIL WELL EXPLODED SOUTHERN ALBERTA

CALGARY, March 15.—The Illinois-Alberta oil well, 35 miles from here, exploded and burned Wednesday causing \$25,000 damage. It burned many hours and steam jets were finally applied to quench the flames.

BOARD COUNCIL MET DELEGATES

Took up With Hon. T. D. Pattullo,
E. C. Gibbons Several
Matters to Lay Before
Ottawa

The council of the board of trade met yesterday afternoon to discuss with the delegates to Ottawa some of the matters that it is proposed to bring before the government and the railway heads there.

Several of the members placed their recommendations in writing and all of these will be thoroughly discussed by the delegates on the way to Ottawa and with Fred Stork, F. G. Dawson and others on their arrival at the capital before being finally placed before the ministers.

Among the subjects suggested were the formation of a harbor board, somewhat similar to that at Vancouver, to borrow money with which to erect an elevator; the request that the government implement its promises in carrying out the original agreements with the city under which people were induced to come here. Some difference of opinion developed in regard to the advisability of placing a port tax on foreign fish passing through this port and this matter will be left with the delegates to find out what is being done at Ottawa if anything to alleviate the present condition.

The delegation has for its guidance two memorandums prepared recently by the board for submission to the government and the railway heads asking for a number of things here. They will leave tonight for Ottawa and will be joined there by F. G. Dawson who will give them every possible assistance. It is also possible that they may proceed to Montreal to meet Sir Henry Thornton.

BRINGING UP FATHER



POSSIBILITY OF A HARBOR BOARD FOR PRINCE RUPERT MENTIONED IN PARLIAMENT

(continued from page one)

there were six steamers lying in the stream waiting to be loaded; the business was there, but the accommodation was insufficient."

The loan recently passed of five million dollars for Vancouver was explained in the House by Ernest Lapointe, minister of marine and fisheries. In Hansard he is quoted as saying:

"All this shows that from now on, increasing quantities of grain will find their way through Vancouver, and it is, therefore, necessary and important that more facilities should be provided there, especially in the way of further elevator accommodation."

"The Vancouver Harbor Commission was organized in 1913. In 1919, this parliament authorized advances to be made to the commissioners to an amount of \$5,000,000, and I think this country is entitled to know what has been done with the money. First, an amount of \$300,000 was paid to redeem bonds which had been issued by the harbor commissioners. Then they acquired property for the site of the pier to which my hon. friend has referred, called the Ballantyne pier, for an amount of \$672,000. Other expenditures included:

Repairing foundations and dredging, berthing and turning basin for the main pier... \$512,095
Work to December 31, 1922, on construction of pier and sheds... 2,814,871
Engineering and contingencies... 121,583
Development of other harbor property and acquisition of plant and tools for harbor works... 35,319
Interest during construction charged to capital account... 68,032

This makes a total expenditure of \$4,524,800. There remains a balance of \$475,200 available for future expenditures from this loan of 1919. The Ballantyne pier is not altogether completed, and a further amount of \$1,760,765 will be required to complete it—that is, in addition to the \$475,200 which remains of the loan of \$5,000,000. As to what will be done to increase elevator accommodation, the commissioners have engaged the services of an expert, Mr. Rolph, of the J. S. Metcalf Company, of Montreal, who is studying the question with them presently in order to take the best course, and especially the most speedy course for the handling of the grain—if possible, the next crop. What is proposed now—but it is not definite—is that the present elevator, which has a capacity of 1,250,000 bushels, should be enlarged by an extension which would give a further capacity of 500,000 bushels, or a total capacity of 1,750,000 bushels. That would cost \$100,000. Then, another elevator would be built at the place suggested by my hon. friend, on Ballantyne pier, this elevator to have a capacity of 2,000,000 bushels and to be built at a cost of \$2,000,000.

Proposed Expenditures
Mr. Stevens: Could the minister at this point say what the existing elevator cost?

Mr. Lapointe: Between \$800,000 and \$900,000. The other works which would be constructed with the money would be advanced to the commissioners are as follows:

Log booming grounds... \$174,000
Marine ferry terminal... 155,375
Ballantyne stage yards... 76,000
Railway equipment... 81,000
Strips of land adjacent

As to the financial condition of the harbor, I might say that it is excellent, indeed, and I have no doubt that in a very short time the Vancouver Harbor Board will be self sustaining and that interest will be paid to the government on all the money which may be advanced to the commission.

Made Good Profit
Mr. Ludner: Is it not a fact that last year's operations disclosed a profit above operating expenses of some \$38,000?

Mr. Lapointe: Yes. The receipts last year amounted to \$328,307.98 while the expenditures totalled \$131,246.75. While there was an increase in the revenue of \$82,307.10 over that of the previous year; the increase for the year of receipts over expenditures on revenue amounts account showed a decrease of \$34,123.16. This is certainly creditable and shows that the traffic in the harbor, which I have no doubt will continue to increase, entitles the Harbor Commission of Vancouver to the help which this parliament and the government intend to give them.

Mr. McLean (Halifax): Do I

understand that there was a surplus of revenue over expenditure of some \$290,000?

The Colts Seniors have already had one successful encounter with the smaller town all stars and the Anyox critics themselves admitted that the local quintette excelled as far as concerned efficiency at the hoop game was concerned. The Colts Seniors are expected to repeat their performance tonight and the Colts Intermediates and Maple Leafs it is thought will have no difficulty in successfully accounting for themselves. All three teams are sure of returning home tomorrow with the laurels of victory. Miss Mills accompanies the girls' team as chaperon and Ben Self, P. Laporte and Dick Greenwell have the two men's teams under their wing.

Plans for the staging of a Dominion wide lacrosse series for the Mann Cup are now being considered by officials of the Canadian Amateur Lacrosse Association and several suggestions for the championship play have been forwarded to the different provincial Associations by Abbie Goo, of Winnipeg, president of the Dominion body. Mr. Goo suggests a series between all star teams from each province; a knockout series in each province, the winners to play down similar to the Dominion football competition for the Connaught Cup, and also urges the champions of 1922 to play a series early this season. Arrangements for a Dominion championship competition were under way, last fall but, owing to the lateness of some of the provinces in completing their schedules, the plan had to be abandoned.

The inclusion of lacrosse, Canadian National game, in future Olympic program will be urged by officials of the Canadian Amateur Lacrosse Association when the Olympic committee meets this month in Winnipeg. W. J. WOLVES DON'T ATTACK HUMANS IN THE CANADIAN WILDS

Wolves Mitted Up With
Man on Day of Capture and
Made to Work

WINNIPEG, Man., March 15.—The "big" stories of ferocious man-eating wolves that have come out of the north country during the past winter make good fiction but are far from the truth and are harmful in creating a false impression of the northland to newly arrived settlers. The wolf stories are having a terrifying effect upon the wives and children of newly arrived settlers, according to Rev. F. G. Stevens, a veteran missionary who has lived among the Indians for 25 years, and stationed for the past 15 years at the Fisher River, Manitoba, Indian reserve.

Make Good Reading
The thrilling tales of people pursued by wolves make good reading, said Mr. Stevens, a recent visitor to this city, but they have no place in fact for a person in the north country, or for a red, ever heard of a wolf attacking or killing a man. They are the most cowardly of beasts, more fearful of man than the lowest bred mongrel. The wolf is a very inquisitive animal, Mr. Stevens says, and often will follow a human being for several miles out of sheer curiosity, but turn on him, and he flees with his tail curled between his legs. Although these wolves are as large as a St. Bernard dog, they are frequently taken out of traps by the Indians, hitched in with a dog team and made to work the first day of their capture. Once in the power of a man, they are utterly bereft of courage. Singled-handed and armed only with a stick Indians have often chased and clubbed them to death.

During his three decades in the north he has travelled thousands of miles, musing it along the dog teams, and Mr. Stevens has never given a thought to the possibility of being attacked by a wolf. He has observed wolves killing him, like many others who have come back and told amazing tales, but he knew they were lies after his dogs. A timber wolf likes nothing better than meat, and pains must be taken to protect the teams at night. He howls hideously on the outskirts of the camp fire, but the sound of his interest invariably is found to be a joint of meat or a team of dogs.

Does Not Attack
It is the expressed opinion of naturalists that the American wolf does not attack human beings, and Mr. Stevens agrees he is fully persuaded by the Canadian timber wolf, his American cousin, has established no authentic record of having taken a human life.

FRIENDS SAY SUTTON MET WITH ACCIDENT

No Idea That he Took His Own
Life by Jumping Into the Sea

Friends of Captain W. Sutton, who is thought to have been drowned from the Gold Storage dock, declare that there is nothing to warrant the assumption that he had committed suicide. He had been drinking and at such times he had a habit of taking his clothes off.

Only that day he had been talking of his plans for the coming summer and did not seem like a man who would take his own life. The assumption is that he fell into the harbor from the dock.

Drugging operations in an endeavor to recover the body of the late Capt. Sutton have so far proved unsuccessful. Little hope is now held out of ever recovering the remains on account of the tidal current at the point where the tragedy occurred.

SEVEN TRAINS OF COAL DAILY FROM ALBERTA COALSPUR DISTRICT

EDMONTON, March 15. — Seven coal trains a day—20 to 25 cars of 35 tons to the car—have been coming off the coal branch this winter. The coal branch leaves the G.T.P. main line at Sickerdike, 137 miles west of Edmonton and 9 miles west of Edson. The branch is 56 miles in length. The Mountain Park sub branch leaves the main branch at Coal Spur. It is 31 miles in length. The Lusear branch, the Mountain Park, Cadomin and Lusear mines produce high grade bituminous coal. It is first quality of railway coal. It has from 67 to 77 carbon content, and is an excellent cooking coal. These three mines turn out approximately 160 cars of coal a day and employ 1200 and 1300 men.

The mines along the branch are semi-bituminous, they produce excellent steam coal, which can also be used satisfactorily on the railway, but it was not of cooking quality. As it is mined more cheaply than the bituminous coal it is sold at a lower price but gives good service. The mines on the branch which were working this winter were the Balkin, Stirling, Coalvalley, Fool-hills, Slackstone, and Mile 54. A mine at Mile 5 on the Mountain Park branch produces the same quality of coal. The Stirling and Coal Valley are strip mines. The Stirling produces up to 2,000 a day and the Coal Valley 600 tons. The five mines besides the Stirling and Coal Valley produced 1300 tons a day. The seven mines on the branch employed 900 men during the past winter.

Mine on Fire

The Yellowhead mine at Coal Spur, at the junction of the Mountain Park spur with the main branch is on fire and has not produced coal this winter.

At Leyland, one mine from the Cadomin mine on the Mountain Park spur a company in which J. C. Calhoun of the King Edward hotel is interested is prospecting for bituminous coal with a diamond drill. Preparations are already under way to secure an output for next season. The quantity of coal in the mines already developed is practically unlimited and no doubt other mines are yet to be developed in the locality served by the coal branch or possible extensions.

RICE LAKE DISTRICT IS PRODUCING GOLD

Stamp Mills Already Erected in Northern Manitoba; Valuable Gold Bar

WINNIPEG, March 15. — Rice Lake district in Manitoba, by the end of April will be one of Canada's gold producing areas, according to John G. Webber, federal mining recorder in this city. Development work in the district has been progressing quietly for two or three years by three large concerns, one of which is an American syndicate that has already spent more than \$100,000 sinking shafts and erecting stamping mills. The other two companies are controlled by Winnipeg capital.

Three gold stamping mills have already been erected in the district, one of which is a 20 stamp mill, another a 10 stamp mill, and the third one a five stamp mill. These mills, when in operation, will be able to handle many tons of gold quartz a day and thousands of dollars in royalties will be paid every year to the Dominion government.

The Rice Lake district is about 80 miles northwest of Winnipeg. The Luleo group of mines owned and being operated by the Selkirk Gold Mining Company Limited, is located on the north bank of the Winnipeg river. One shaft several hundred feet deep has been sunk on this property and a large gang of men is now employed completing the erection of the stamp mill. South and east of the Luleo group lies the Gold Pan group, between Rice lake and Manitowagan river. This group is owned by Gold Pan Mines Limited, in which a number of Winnipeg men are financially interested. One of the superintendents in charge of the development work at this mine is reported to have brought to Winnipeg last week a gold bar weighing 26 1/2 pounds.

The third group, owned and controlled by J. W. Harris, of Winnipeg, is close to Lake Manitowagan and is the closest to Winnipeg. It is about 65 miles

ALBERTA TELEPHONE SYSTEM SHOWS DROP REVENUE FOR YEAR

EDMONTON, Alta., March 15. — Net earnings of the Alberta government telephone system showed a marked decrease for 1922 over the 1921 earnings, according to the annual report of the telephone department recently tabled in the provincial legislature. The net earnings for last year are given as \$425,551.22 as compared with approximately \$268,000 for 1921. Decreased business was responsible for the decrease, the department having installed 11,668 telephones during the year, but at the same time removed 8,745, leaving a net balance of 2,922 additional telephones which were the only additional source of revenue. The balance of the work was simply added expense.

The total revenue for the year 1922 was \$2,359,551.22 and total operation and maintenance expenditure \$1,380,563.54.
