VICTORIA, Dec. 14 .- Bitterly denouncing the new Pro-ELECT OFFICERS vincial Party and its leader, Major General McRae, Premier Oliver last night told the Legislature he intended to make searching investigation into their motives and antecedents through a commission to inquire into the charges against provincial government and certain public men in connection a livelihood. Diverging opinions as to the abvisability of closing the port of Prince Rupert to American halibut fishermen as a tariff reprisal were expressed at the meeting called last night by the city council to consider the present situation of the fishing industry as it affects this port. There was a large attendance at the meeting, fishermen being in predominance although there were a number of local businessmen present as well as other persons who were apparently watching the proceedings on behalf of interests connected with the fisheries. 

They all became very weak so that they did not care to go out on parole and the growing boys often fainted on parade. They could hardly climb the stairs. A school was started, a library formed and classes in French, German and shorthand occupied their attention. However, it was difficult to concen-

The first food that arrived was some bully beef and hisleuits and it was the best food they ever tasted. It was followed by Red Cross clothing. pyjamas, soap and other things. They sent and received letters and post cards and by means of a code managed to get information from the outside and give it.

P. R. Red Cross More food and clothing followed and also dripping, bully beef, tobacco and cigarettes. Later. thanks to the Red Cross of Prince Rupert they were kept well supplied. This was the first opportunity he had found of pubticly thanking the local people for what they had done. Their health improved so that they were now able to go on parele. While on parole they could not escape but once their cards were returned they lost no opportunity. They dug tunnels beneath the wood pile and a number managed to get away but all were captured except one and he. Capt. Clinton, got to Roumania where he died from, exposure. He had made eight attempts to escape. The punishment for attempting to escape was eight days in the celfs.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13 .- Longer life may be achieved by the American people, as a whole, if they will take steps to reduce their blood pressure, said Chief Actuary Arthur Hunter of the New York Life Insurance Com- Royal Crown Loaf Cheese, Bead Necklets, from ..... ..... 35c to \$2.50 pany at this afternoon's session of the seventeenth annual convention of the Association of Life Insurance Presidents. He made this statement at the end of the presentation of an original survey of blood pressure experience collected from various parts of the world and said: "Taking the population of the United States. as a whole, I believe that a better adjusted diet, with less animal food, would result in a lower blood pressure and in greater longevity, with an equal ability to carry on their occupations."

Mr. Hunter disputed the theory that blood pressure is affected by race and said that it is principally affected by kind and quantity of food and to prove his contention submitted life insurlance blood pressure records affecting representative groups in China, Japan, Australia, Argentine, Canada and the United

It was also disclosed by Mr. Hunter that the leading American life insurance companies are now pooling their blood pressure experience covering about one million lives in this country and Canada in an effort further to study the relation of pressure to longevity. While the primary object of this more extensive investigation is to gain further information with respect to selection of applicants for insurance, the opinion was expressed that the resulting information will be of scientific value in prolonging human life.


