Ogden Lying on Even Keel in Creek Bottom at Squadaree and is Undamaged

Two Men Well

Fish Packer Lost Course in Snowstorm Ten Days Ago and Ran Aground

Capt. Joseph Petersen, master of the lighthouse tender Birnie, which located the missing fish packer Ogden at Squadaree, north end of Stephens Island, on Saturday, reported to the Daily News Saturday evening that the Ogden was resting on an even keel in the muddy. creek bed where she went aground, is unscratched and in no danger and will be able to proceed on her voyage to Massett as soon as tides become sufficiently high to refloat her.

The Ogden, which has on board a cargo of provisions and supplies for Massett, is well found and well ssupplied with fuel and Sam Simpson, the skipper, and his engineer are quite comfortable and suffering no ill-effects as a result of their enforced delay. The small gasboat which they had in tow is being used for such running around as the two men need to do. The Odgen is in such a perfect cradle that it has been even possible to do some painting at the low tides. The Ogden, Simpson reported to Capt. Petersen, went off her course in a heavy snowstorm while proceeding from Prince Rupert to Massett and, going safely through a blind passage, ran up on the evening of Thursday, December 1, in he creek bottom at Squadaree. Strong winds which have prevailed since have kept tides too low to refloat the vessel but it is expected that she will free herself during i the coming week. After refloating. she will probably proceed direct to Massett. After Capt. Petersen had asceitained that the Ogden was in no danger and that the men on board OF RUSSIA were safe and comfortable, he set the Birnie on her course back to Prince Rupert, arriving here about mid-afternoon on Saturday.
