## WILL DEVELOP TRADE IN WESTERN CANADA

### VOTING IN IRISH ELECTIONS PROCEEDING ACTIVELY ALL PARTS OF COUNTRY

#### Minister of Trade and Commerce Proposes to Extend Business West

OTTAWA, Aug. 27.—Hon. T. A. Lowe, recently appointed minister of trade and commerce, discussing with the Canadian press the policy of his department, today laid down three main lines of action which he proposes to follow:

- 1—Strict economy in departmental expenditures.
- 2—An aggressive effort to carry out the policy of the former minister, Hon. J. A. Ross, in the stimulation of foreign trade.
- 3—Close study of western conditions as a basis of wider development there.

Mr. Lowe said that one of his first official acts would be to visit important centres in the west in order to familiarize himself with western problems from the western point of view. He did not propose a formal tour but a brief trip visiting sections that warranted special study. He wished particularly to have the opportunity of meeting and conferring with representative Western Canadians on the spot.

The Peace River country will have the special attention of the minister. For some months the question of rural credits, as in operation in Canada, United States and one or two foreign countries, has been the subject of inquiry by the minister and he stated his intention of learning still more about the system. In the course of his inquiry he hoped to discuss problems which the credit system presents to the agricultural businessman.

An increase in the volume of trade founded on aggressive development of western Canada is one of Mr. Lowe's aims.

#### BUCKLEY BAY SHIP DAMAGED

Collides With Tanker Off Point Conception Yesterday: Left Two Weeks Ago

SAN PEDRO, Aug. 27.—The steam schooner El Abeto, owned by the Los Angeles Steamship Co., and carrying lumber to this port from Queen Charlotte Islands, yesterday collided with the tanker Volente off Point Conception. The damage to the vessels is estimated at half a million dollars.

The El Abeto left Buckley Bay nearly two weeks ago with a cargo of spruce and hemlock. The sister schooner El Cedro with a cargo of 1,470,000 feet cleared for San Pedro last week. The El Abeto was probably coming north when the accident happened.

#### MOSLEMS AND HINDUS FIGHT

Religious Riots Stop all Business at Agra: Postal Deliveries Suspend

SIMLA, Aug. 27.—Religious riots in the united provinces are continuing. Hindus and Moslems were in conflict at Agra last night. Firearms were used and the casualties are said to have been heavy. All business in the city has been suspended, and postal deliveries have stopped.

#### GAMING HOUSES ARE RAIDED VANCOUVER FIFTY ARRESTED

VANCOUVER, Aug. 27.—Five alleged gaming houses managed by white, black and yellow men were raided and fifty arrests made of men of all nationalities by a special clean-up squad of the city police on Saturday night and Sunday morning.

#### PROVINCIAL POLICE TRANSFERS ARE MADE

Constables to be Located at Buckley Bay and Queen Charlotte City: Constable Ponder Here

Colonel McMullin, superintendent of provincial police, announces that two new provincial police stations are being opened, one at Buckley Bay and the other at Queen Charlotte City. A. Collins of Fort George is going to Buckley Bay, replacing R. Ponder, who was stationed at Massett and who is now coming to Prince Rupert as clerk to Inspector Parsons.

Queen Charlotte City will be looked after by Constable E. A. Beaven, who has been transferred to that place from Ocean Falls. Another change has been made with the transfer of J. A. Williams from Vanderhoof to Stewart.

#### MISS BETTY BARROW MARRIED SATURDAY

Popular Young Lady Becomes Bride of Gordon James Reading of This City

A very quiet wedding took place here Saturday afternoon when Miss Betty Barrow, daughter of Arthur Barrow, B.C.L.S., became the bride of Gordon James Reading, son of the late James Reading of London, England. The simple ceremony took place at the Anglican Rectory, Rev. Archdeacon Rix officiating.

Mrs. Reading, who is a valued employee of the Indian Department, is one of the most popular young ladies in the city. She has lived here for some years and has many friends from whom she has been receiving congratulations. Mr. Reading is chief clerk in the local forestry office and is also well and favorably known here.

The young couple intend to reside in the city.

#### CLAM CANNERY FOR QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Beach Staked For Many Miles by Capt. Babbington and Associates View to Using Product

MASSETT, Aug. 27.—Many miles of the beach running northward from Rose Spit has been staked by Capt. H. B. Babbington and associates for the purpose of making there a reserve for clam fishing. Just now the captain is visiting at Hii-elen River six miles north of Massett investigating with other experts with a view to locating a site for a clam cannery, which is to be erected somewhere in the neighborhood. He has been working on this scheme for some time and is said to have interviewed sufficient capital to make it possible to proceed with the work at once.

#### Voting is Brisk Throughout all Ireland Today: Shooting Took Place in Dublin is Unexplained

DUBLIN, Aug. 27.—Voting in the Dail elections began throughout the Irish Free State this morning at nine o'clock. A lively outbreak of rifle and machine gun fire occurred here today. The shooting is not explained.

Balloting was proceeding quietly during the middle of the forenoon with national troops patrolling the streets. There were reports of an attack on Mount Joy prison and various posts occupied by national troops but these reports are unconfirmed.

Polling continues brisk in all parts of the country. At Waterford the office of the Waterford News was destroyed by fire this morning. The paper has been republican in politics.

#### DOUBLE SHIFT AT BUCKLEY BAY MILL

A double shift is to be started in the Massett Timber Co.'s sawmill at Buckley Bay this week and by the next steamer from Vancouver a large crew of men will arrive at the plant. The output of the mill will thus be practically doubled. It is now turning out 125,000 feet daily, most of the lumber being exported by the company's steamers to California.

#### SOCKEYE AND HUMPBACK SEASON IS CLOSED NOW

Skeena River Sockeye Pack Will be Some 25,000 Cases More This Year Than Last

With the pack totalling some 25,000 more cases this season than last, the sockeye and humpback fishing season on the Skeena River closed Friday evening. The use of the 5 1/2 inch mesh gill net is now prohibited for the remainder of the fishing season. Fall varieties such as cohoes and chums are now being taken although a large number of the fishermen, especially natives, have stopped fishing.

#### Buckley Bay Murder Case will be Tried Here at Fall Assizes Evidence Given Before Magistrate

Held responsible by a coroner's jury for having caused the death of his countryman, B. Hirata, by stabbing him in the breast at the bunkhouse at Buckley Bay on August 18 and later formally committed at a preliminary trial before Magistrate A. R. Mallory on a charge of murder, E. Nishida, Japanese, arrived in the city on the Prince Albert last night in custody of Provincial Constable R. P. Ponder. He is now locked up in the city jail and will be taken to Okalla prison where he will await jury trial at the Supreme Court Assizes to be held here this fall.

At the preliminary trial at Buckley Bay, Nishida pleaded not guilty. Accused being unable to speak English, Sam Ennyu acted as interpreter.

Jeremiah Chase, mill superintendent, was the first witness. He told of being informed of the murder, finding the body and taking accused in custody. He was in bed in a room not his own.

Dr. J. A. Briggs told of viewing the body of deceased. There was a large incised wound in the right chest which would have caused death. Death would have been instantaneous or almost so.

N. Inabae told of an altercation between Nishida and Hirata followed later by the crack of a bottle. He saw Nishida go out of the bunkhouse followed by Hirata. Hirata came back soon and fell down. Hirata had been holding a bottle. Witness saw Nishida strike with his hand two or three times. He did not see a knife.

Mrs. Yei Inouye of Nishida coming into her house about 11.30 with blood on his clothes. He changed his clothes and went to bed. Previous to this, Nishida had left her house with a knife returning without one. Witness identified the knife.

Tomizo Tanabae declared Nishida had come into the bunkhouse about 10 o'clock. He spoke with Hirata and they had a row. Y. Fugimoto took Nishida outside and told him not to fight. About 11.45 Nishida came in again and had another altercation with Hirata. There was a noise and a bottle was broken. Nishida had a knife in his hand and was swinging it around but he did not see him hit Hirata. Hirata got up and went over two beds apparently looking for something he did not find. He (Hirata) ran outside quickly, came back and fell down beside the stove. Witness went over and lifted Hirata's head. It was warm but there was no breath or pulse. The doctor and coroner were called.

S. Takeyama told of differences between Nishida and Hirata leading up to the stabbing. On the night in question deceased had informed him (Takayama) that Nishida had come to his bunkhouse and had a knife in his back pocket. A woman in the case was suggested by witness. Deceased and accused had had trouble in Vancouver.

Constable Ponder told of being called to the scene of the stabbing affray and later obtaining the knife.

Accused had nothing to say. Magistrate Mallory committed him and court adjourned.

#### HOME BANK CURATOR TO MAKE STATEMENT END OF NEXT WEEK

TORONTO, Aug. 27.—A. R. Barker, curator of the Home Bank of Canada, will issue a statement of the financial status of the suspended bank on September 6 indicating the extent of the recovery likely to be realized by the depositors.

#### WILL CONFER OVER LIQUOR

Britain Will Not Reply to United States Note Until After Imperial Conference

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Owing to the direct interest Britain's overseas dominions and possessions have in the shipment of alcohol to countries of North and South America it seems likely that the long deferred reply of the British Government to the note of United States Secretary Hughes concerning smuggling liquor into United States will be postponed until after the Imperial Conference in London in October.

It is held by the Government that questions raised by the United States including extension of the territorial water limits to twelve miles should be thoroughly discussed at the forthcoming conference and the views of Canada and other Dominions sought.

#### PROVINCIAL SANK SUNDAY

Prince Rupert Boat House Power Boat Struck a Rock in Grenville Channel

The Prince Rupert Boat House power boat Provincial, Capt. Walter Larsen, struck a rock, while proceeding, in the fog, down Grenville Channel yesterday morning at 4 o'clock, filled with water, keeled over and sank in 12 fathoms of water. The boat, which has been under charter to a couple of the Rivers Inlet canneries this season, was going to Rivers Inlet from the Skeena River and had 5,000 fresh salmon on board when the accident occurred. Nobody was hurt and Capt. Larsen and his crew of three men will arrive in the city this afternoon on board a seining boat. Capt. Swanson, owner of the Provincial, will then proceed south to raise the boat and bring her back to port. He is hopeful that the damage will not be very serious.

**BIG SALMON PACKS IN SOUTHEASTERN ALASKA**  
Visiting Official Tells of it and of Progress Made in Hyder

JUNEAU, Aug. 27.—One of the heaviest salmon runs in the history of the packing industry in Alaska is reported in the Southern end of the division by canners and fishermen, according to Karl Theile, Surveyor General and Secretary of Alaska, who returned here on the steamer Queen from a two weeks' visit to Ketchikan and Hyder. "I was told by J. R. Heckman, Ketchikan business man, salmon packer and vice-chairman of the Alaska Fish Commission, that the present run is the heaviest he has ever seen in his many years' experience," said Mr. Theile.

All of the canners are putting up heavy packs. The Sunny Point cannery a week ago had 90,000 cases and it was expected would reach between 150,000 and 160,000 for the season. Other packers are operating at capacity. A big pack is also reported at the Petersburg cannery. The cannery operations and fresh business at Ketchikan is reflected in the confident business prosperity there, much activity being in evidence in all lines, he said.

**Texas Creek Mining**  
All interest in the Portland Canal district centers in the Texas Creek strikes and prospecting on the American side of the line is increasing. Persons who had been prospecting on the Canadian side since the discoveries on Texas Creek, have crossed into Alaska.

The ore from Texas Creek was said by Mr. Theile to be the finest specimens of silver-lead he has ever seen. The strikes were made on the surface and the samples were taken from outcroppings. Hardly a day passes, he said, without the arrival of mining engineers from all over the country and several capitalists were at Hyder when he left. The ore and general appearance of the ledge from which it was taken is said to be identical with the famous Premier mine deposits.

**Pat Daly There**  
No development work had been started but options were being taken on some Texas Creek ground. Pat Daly and associates had taken an option on claims held by Hewitt & Olson and the Granby Smelting & Refining Company holds one on a group of claims owned by Jackson and Hummel.

The renewed interest in the district is reflected in the improvement of business conditions at Hyder, Mr. Theile said. Bank deposits there show a remarkable growth, increasing over 100 per cent and the bank is contemplating increasing its capitalization from \$15,000 to \$50,000. All of the merchants report a fine business.

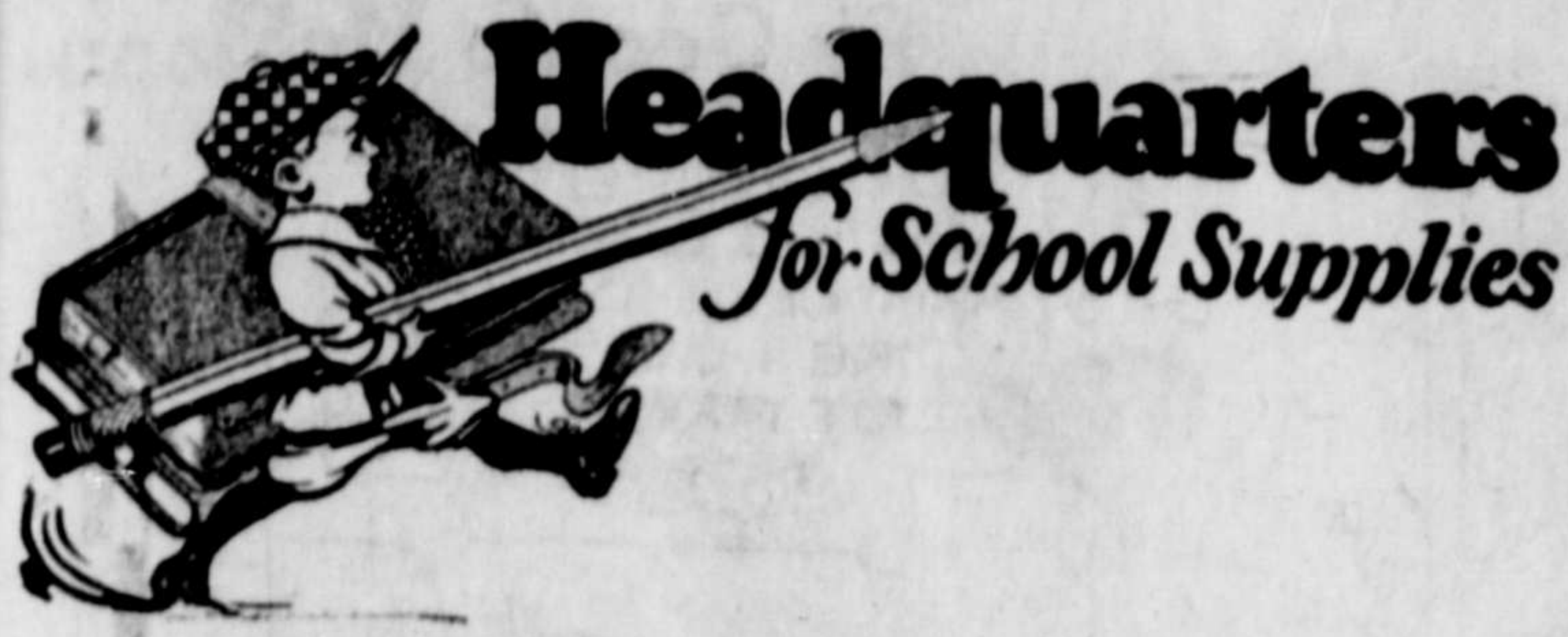

### Inaugural Address

E. C. Gibbons, president of the Board of Trade, referred to the solid class of young business and professional men who were included in the charter list of the Gyro Club. He knew them all personally and would vouch for the success they would attain at anything they set about to do. He was taking away a list of the members and was going to make them members of the Board of Trade.

Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant, president of the Rotary Club, referred to the similar ideals and purposes of Rotary and Gyro. There was room for both clubs in the city. Every one of the chartered members of Gyro would have been welcome in Rotary had the classification limits permitted of their admission.

### Consul Wakefield

U. S. Consul E. A. Wakefield congratulated the Gyro Club on its establishment in Prince Rupert. All social service clubs had a great duty to perform in the world and they would be a great factor in bringing about a solution to the present problems that were disturbing the world. Thanking the meeting for the respect that had been paid to the United States by toasting the president and singing the National Anthem, Mr. Wakefield referred to the international aspect of Gyro. "The United States may not join the League of Nations, it may or may not join in an International Court of Justice, it may or may not enter into other compacts with other countries, but Canada may rest assured that it will bring about such a spirit between the two great North American continents as is embodied in the maxim that there is no 49th parallel in Gyro."

The singing of "O Canada" brought the memorable gathering to a close. During the evening there were selections by an orchestra consisting of A. A. Easson, Howard White and W. Vaughan Davies. Solos were rendered by S. K. Campbell, J. Pinder-Moss and V.

### LUMBER SHIPMENTS GOING FROM ALASKA

Cargoes Being Shipped from Juneau to Australia and British Isles

JUNEAU, Aug 27.—The five-masted barkentine Phyllis Comyn, Capt. O. A. Daewertiz, loaded to full capacity with a cargo of 1,700,000 feet of spruce lumber from the Juneau Lumber Mills, left Juneau on a three months' voyage over the Pacific to Sydney, Australia. The ship was in tow of the Flossie, tug boat of the Wrangell mills and formerly the harbor boat Peterson, army boat at Chilkoot Barracks. The Flossie will take the barkentine to Cape Ommaney in Chatham Straits from where it will sail for Australia.

The Phyllis Comyn commands a crew of 14 men. Difficulty in securing a crew delayed the ship several days in sailing.

A second shipment of lumber, aggregating approximately 1,800,000 feet of spruce will be shipped to Australia this fall, from the Juneau Lumber Mills. The lumber is being cut at the present time and will be taken out on a barkentine similar to the Phyllis Comyn.

The Washington Tug & Barge Company, of Seattle, barge, with a shipment of 400,000 feet of clear spruce, was taken out Friday by the company's tug boat Arago. It will be taken to Seattle from where it will be shipped to the British Isles. A cargo of 100,000 feet of clear spruce will go to Glasgow, 50,000 will be shipped to Liverpool and the remainder, aeroplane spruce, to London.

## BLACKLIST FARMERS FOR EMPLOYEES' USE

Names of Those Not Treating Men Well are Posted

REGINA, Aug. 27.—The hieroglyphic system used by the old-time tramp to inform his fellow traveller where hand-outs were available without having to cut a cord of wool or mow the front lawn has been adopted, to some extent, by harvesters who have perfected a "blacklist" scheme against farmers alleged to be particularly unsympathetic in their treatment of harvest help. But the system works both ways, according to some interesting facts recently related by T. M. Molloy, commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries, as the farmer who has been fair in his treatment of hired help also gets much publicity and finds no trouble in getting all the men he may require.

The system has been in vogue for some years. It is somewhat different from that of the old-time tramp as no mysterious signs or symbols are used, but names and addresses are given instead. Sometimes the "blacklist" is a piece of paper tacked to a nearby telephone pole, while against it is written on the pole itself, or on the wall of the labor building. In Regina a fence near the employment bureau has been utilized, and at Moose Jaw the names of dozens of farmers were found written in small letters on pillars inside the government employment building. It was the "blacklist" and accounts for many farmers who ill-used their harvest labor having difficulty in securing help for the gathering of their next crop.

**Names Found Correct**

As an experiment, stated Mr. Molloy, officers in charge of the Moose Jaw bureau copied down all the names of employers on the men's blacklist before the pillars were painted. Then they checked up the list by comparison with their own records, and by inquiry found that in practically all cases the names represented farmers at whose places working conditions were, to say the least, unpleasant and in many cases hardly endurable.

It is not the fault of the labor bureau that men cannot be secured for blackmail farms, Mr. Molloy said. When a man applies for a harvest or farm position he is sent to a place on the bureau list, irrespective of whether it is blacklisted by the men or not. When the harvester secures his employment card he takes it away, proceeds to the blacklist and scans the list to find if the name of his employer is there. If it is he returns to the bureau, saying he doesn't think he will go harvesting for a few days.

**Ill-Fame Spreads**

Employment office blacklists are not the only places where the ill fame of an objectionable employer is spread. Mr. Molloy stated that a large percentage of harvest laborers are a floating population. In the winter they may be found in the lumber camps, in the spring at the docks in the summer in the southern parts of the continent, and in the autumn in harvest fields. Whenever they meet they discuss the various places where they have worked. Names of employers are exchanged. If an employer has treated a harvest laborer particularly well he may find himself swamped with applications the next fall. If he has not a popular with his men, he may find it impossible to get help.
