LONBON, Aug. 10-A few days ago a London man aged 55 died of shock on the operating table in a local hospital where he was being treated for cancer. For three minutes his heart and lungs ceased to function.

A doctor injected a strong solution of adrenalin directly into the man's heart and within a few minutes he revived, emerging even from the anaesthetic.

The operation was completed with a further anaesthetic and today the man is making steady progress toward recovery.
