PRINCE RUPERT'S CASE FOR IMPROVEMENTS

GRUESOME FIND IN NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN TELLS TALE OF BIG FIGHT

Hon. T. D. Pattullo in Fighting Mood Makes Local Position Clear

Legislative Library, Buildings, Parliament, March 15

GEMS FROM SPEECH OF HON. T. D. PATTULLO

"In the ultimate the Government is responsible for the railway policy in regard to this port."

"If the railway were in the hands of a private concern, they would be fighting for business and would go out and make business. The Government is under the same obligation."

"If we advocate what we consider right and keep on advocating it long enough, we are going to get it."

"I am just as sure of the ultimate value of property in this town as I am of anything. Development cannot be stopped but it can be retarded."

"We are not going to Ottawa in a hostile spirit, but if we must fight we are going to do it."

That the Dominion Government had a moral obligation to develop this port and that he still had faith in human nature and expected to see the pledges carried out, was the striking feature of the speech of Hon. T. D. Pattullo to the Rotary Club yesterday afternoon. He explained that people had been induced to come here through the announcements made by the government from time to time and also because of legal contracts entered into with the city. He believed that today more than ever before conditions justified the Dominion Government in proceeding with the policy that had been laid down.

DELEGATION GONE EAST

Board of Trade Party Confident of Success on Mission to Ottawa and Montreal

Confident of attaining results in their mission to Ottawa to ask the Dominion government for assistance in connection with the development of the port and district, members of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade delegation left on last night's train for the Canadian capital and the headquarters of the railway at Montreal.

President E. C. Gibbons, of the board of trade, will visit his old home in Bangor, Maine, while in the East. S. J. McLeod and G. H. Orme will take the opportunity of going to New York while Olaf Hansen and Hon. T. D. Pattullo will confine their trip to Ottawa and Montreal.

WAGE INCREASE IN ANYOX CAMP

ANYOX, March 16.—The general manager of the Granby Company announces that dating from March 16 all Granby people in Anyox who have been receiving four dollars a shift and over will receive an additional fifty cents a shift, and all those who have been getting less than four dollars will get a boost of forty cents. This raise is the result of the recent increase in the price of copper and its duration will naturally depend upon the copper market.

APPLE GROWING IN OKANAGAN INCREASES

VERNON, Mar. 16.—Official figures show an increase of nearly 100,000 boxes of apples from Okanagan last season when 2,552,489 boxes of the fruit were shipped.

BETTER TRADE IN DOMINION

Increase For Eleven Months of Previous Period Is 216,000,000, Mostly Exports

OTTAWA, March 16.—The total trade of the Dominion for eleven months of the current fiscal year to the end of February shows an increase of \$216,000,000 above the figures of the corresponding period of last year. The increase is \$474,000,000 in domestic exports and \$12,000,000 in imports. The re-export of foreign merchandise remains practically the same.

FRENCH LADY WINS TENNIS

Sensational Defeat of American Champion by Suzanne Lenglen

NICE, March 16.—Suzanne Lenglen defeated Mrs. Molla Mallory 6-0, 6-0, in their tennis match today. The American champion received a severe beating from the French woman who is the world title holder. Mrs. Mallory did not take a single game to deuce in the first set scoring only eight points. In the second set she took two games to deuce but scored only eleven points.

REDISTRIBUTION OF PROVINCIAL SEATS

Premier Oliver Suggests That People Register as Voters in View of Change

VICTORIA, Mar. 16.—Redistribution of seats in the provincial legislature is almost certain at next session, Premier Oliver states. He suggests that voters get themselves on the lists as soon as possible. Several small ridings in the interior may be doubled up and the Peace River section of Prince George riding will be given a separate member.

OFFER TO DEMPSEY WAS EXAGGERATED

Fight Against Firpo in Buenos Ayres Would Not Realize Three Quarters of a Million

NEW YORK, Mar. 16.—Advice from Tex Rickard and Jack Kearns here and from sportsmen in Buenos Ayres all indicate that the reports of an offer of \$750,000 for Dempsey's end of the purse in a fight which may be staged in the Argentine against Firpo are exaggerated and that the fight would not yield a gate in Buenos Ayres sufficient to meet such expense.

THIRTEEN THOUSAND WAS SUBSCRIBED FOR MERVILLE SETTLERS

VICTORIA, Mar. 16.—A total sum of \$13,955.81 was subscribed by the people of British Columbia and distributed for the sufferers in the big fire which swept Merville Soldier Settlement, according to a statement of the relief committee presented to Premier Oliver yesterday.

GERMAN SABOTAGE RESULTS IN DEATH

DUSSELDORF, Mar. 16.—A French soldier was killed and three soldiers and three French railroadmen were injured when a French troop train was wrecked near Treves in Rhineland as a result of Sabotage.

DEAL FOR SPIDER MINE

Property Formerly Worked by Algonquin Company Again to be Taken; Collart Concerned

Says the Portland Canal News:—A deal for the Spider mine that has been under way for some time is nearing completion, and will possibly be closed within the next week or so, according to a statement made to the News by Messrs. Hamilton and Larson, owners of the property. The purchasers have agreed to pay off the liens on the claims, which were placed owing to the failure of the Algonquin Company, who had them under lease in 1920, to pay their wage bills.

While it is not known what company is taking this property, it is presumed that it is a Belgian concern, owing to the business being done through Mr. Collart, the Belgian consul at Prince Rupert.

MONTENEGRAN QUEEN DIED TODAY IN FRANCE

ANTIBES, March 16.—Former Queen Milena of Montenegro, mother of the Queen of Italy, died early this morning, aged 76 years.

TOOK WIFE TO WOODS AND SHOT HER A FOX

Alice Arm Method of Presenting Spouse with Costly Wearing Apparel

ALICE ARM, March 16.—"Wife selects a fur boa, Husband brings it home," could be the heading of this story. Anyway, friend husband is glad his wife was along. On Tuesday, while G. A. Young, district road foreman, and Mrs. Young were out walking along the Kitsault river and had stopped in contemplation of the blue sky and the mountain peaks. Mrs. Young pointed out to her husband an animal that was contemplating them from a knoll a short distance away. Mr. Young promptly shot the contemplator which proved to be a large cross fox well furred.

Apparently Fought with Timber Wolves in Saskatchewan and had Six to Credit when Overcome

SASKATOON, March 16.—Mute and ghastly evidence of a death struggle with hungry crazed timber wolves in the hinterland of Saskatchewan was found by two fur hunters at the north end of Creek Lake, 200 miles north of Ile a la Grosse Lake near the headwaters of the Athabaska River. The two hunters found torn scraps of clothing and a gun encircled by the carcasses of six big wolves. The gun and clothes were the property of Carl Lynn, one of the best known trappers and mushers in the north country.

Lynn apparently waged a desperate battle for his life and killed six timber wolves before he was finally beaten down by the ferocious beasts.

Carl Lynn served overseas with the Canadian forces. He was a fine rifle shot.

MRS. TINKER PASSED AWAY

Death of Popular Lady Comes as Profound Shock to Many Friends

Causing a profound shock amid a wide circle of friends in the city, the death occurred in the General Hospital last night at 9 o'clock of Mrs. Georgia Tinker, wife of G. P. Tinker, 336 Sixth Avenue East, after a brief illness. Mrs. Tinker was, before her marriage about a year ago, a teacher on the staff of the Borden Street School. During her residence in the city she became most popular. The widower will receive deep sympathy in his terrible bereavement.

Deceased was a native of Spring Hill, Nova Scotia, where her mother and sisters now reside. These are being communitated with pending the making of definite funeral arrangements. The remains are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers.

HEROISM OF NUNS AS HOSPITAL IS BURNED AND CHILDREN RESCUED

Aged Woman Succumbs as Result of Shock; Property Value Million

MONTREAL, March 16.—One hundred helpless cripples were rescued unharmed through the heroism of nuns while the convent hospital for incurables here was burned to the ground. There were no serious casualties.

MONTREAL, March 16 (later).—One death resulted from last night's fire which destroyed the Catholic hospital for incurables, Madame Marie Ross, eighty years of age, died today from shock. The property loss approximates \$1,000,000.

Would Encourage Fishermen to Come from Norway to this Province but are Difficulties

OTTAWA, March 16.—The government came in for criticism yesterday both from the opposition and supporters on the immigration policy when the estimates for the department of immigration were under review. Little progress was made.

C. E. Neill, member for Comox-Atlin urged the establishment of a Canadian agent in Norway to encourage Norwegian fishermen to settle in Canada. They had started to come into British Columbia, he said. The minister said the Norwegian government was not in favor of such a Canadian agency being set up there.

Mr. Neill also suggested that if reciprocity with the United States could not be arranged, Canada should retaliate with a high tariff on everything including farm products.

BELLINGHAM TO CARRY FISH TO THIS PORT

Equipped With Diesel Engines and Will Make Ketchikan Trip in Nine Hours

Word has been received here that the motorship Bellingham is to fly between this city and Ketchikan. She is equipped for carrying both fresh and frozen fish, has a 200 horse power diesel engine and can make the run in nine hours between Ketchikan and this city.

It is planned to ship some of the halibut through this port in bond after being it in Ketchikan. It is thought it can go by way of Prince Rupert much more quickly than by Seattle or other Pacific ports and with less injury to the fish and without re-icing.

SMITHERS COUPLE WEDDED YESTERDAY

Miss Margaret Hartnet Becomes Bride of Hudson R. J. Fotherby, Father McGrath Officiating

Father P. J. McGrath, O.M.I., officiated yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the wedding of Miss Margaret Hartnet and Hudson R. J. Fotherby which took place quietly in the Priests' Home only a few intimate friends of the contracting couple being present. Mr. and Mrs. Fotherby left on this morning's boat for Vancouver where a brief honeymoon will be spent after which they will return to Smithers to take up their residence. Both bride and groom are well known and popular in Smithers. Mr. Fotherby is in the blacksmithing business there and Mrs. Fotherby formerly conducted a store at that town.

NEGRO WAS SHOT CARRYING OFF LOOT

OMAHA, March 16.—An unidentified negro secured a suitcase full of registered mail and money from the express train and was shot dead while escaping from the train as it slowed up here.

STEAMER RANEE SANK AND 31 LIVES LOST

LONDON, March 16.—The steamer Ranee of about 3,500 tons, sank in a collision off Singapore with the loss of 31 lives.

MARRY BROTHER-IN-LAW

OTTAWA, March 16.—Senator Hardy's bill to make lawful the marriage of a woman to her deceased husband's brother or nephew was given its third reading in the Senate yesterday.

KILL POLICE IN THE RUHR

Germans Claim Price Placed on Head of German Constables

BERLIN, March 16.—Two German policemen who had been banished but returned to get their household effects, were executed by French soldiers, according to a German despatch from Buer, saying the French had placed a price of the head of every German policeman in Ruhr.

GETS DIVORCE FROM HIS WIFE

Hon. John Russell Succeeds in Case Against Mrs. Russell

LONDON, March 16.—Hon. John Russell, son and heir of Lord Amphill, was granted a divorce today. The jury found Mrs. Russell guilty of misconduct with an unknown man but not with Harold Mayer, named in the prosecution as co-respondent.

The case has attracted wide attention on both sides of the Atlantic.

GERMANY IS PROPOSING TERMS TO FRANCE ON REPARATIONS PAYMENTS

BERLIN, March 16.—It is now generally understood that when Germany presents her proposal for reparations payments, she will make it an absolute first condition that the French and Belgians must first completely evacuate Ruhr before any money or materials will be handed over by Germany.

LORD CHOLMONDELEY DIES IN ENGLAND

MALPAS, England, March 16.—Lord George Henry Cholmondeley (pronounced "Chumley") fourth Marquis of Cholmondeley, died today. He is succeeded by his son Lord Rocksavage, well known as a polo and tennis player.

City Loses Valuable Citizen in Col. McMullin.

This morning Colonel J. H. McMullin left for Victoria to assume the position as head of the provincial police. While the Daily News is glad to know that Prince Rupert can supply the province with such able men as has been demonstrated on more than one occasion, it is to be regretted that the city has to be the loser thereby. Colonel McMullin has served the city and district well and has served the government of the province well. His services have been recognized by those whose duty it is to recognize efficient services. However, the regret of the people of the city at losing him is perhaps the truest gauge of his value as a citizen.

Register At Once Before Forgetting.

It is very important to this district that the names of all eligible people should be placed on the list of voters. When redistribution is brought about the present condition of the lists in conjunction with the recent census will guide the legislators in cutting up the constituencies. Prince Rupert should register every man and woman who is a Canadian citizen. In that way better consideration will be obtained for the claims of the district to better representation. What applies to this city applies also to the whole district. During the two weeks now left in which to undertake the work it should be seen that every name is on the list.

Cutting Up This Large Constituency.

Prince Rupert constituency is a large one and will have to be divided. It is much too large for one man to look after efficiently. Hon. T. D. Pattullo has done excellent work in keeping in touch with the various sections, but it costs too much to get around to all points regularly in addition to visiting them at election times. A man needs to be a millionaire with a big private yacht to go around to all the points and do justice to them all. The only way to do with a district so large is to cut it in two. Size as well as population should count in the apportionment of the ridings. The prospects for increase in population should also be a factor in deciding the dividing lines of the constituencies. Everyone will agree that Prince Rupert is likely to have a very large increase in population in the near future.

Delegates Away To Storm Ottawa Ramparts.

Prince Rupert's five delegates left last night bound for Ottawa to try to batter down some of the opposition to this port. They will place the claims of Prince Rupert and district before the government in the most able manner possible. The report of the address of Hon. T. D. Pattullo published herewith indicates the line of attack he will make and the others will have something to say. When joined by Fred Stork and F. G. Dawson they will constitute a strong group and they should be able to make an impression on the people back east.

Improvement For All Industries.

There is every indication that the industries of the province will be having a more prosperous time this year than heretofore. They need it. In many cases it will take some time to make up losses which they have sustained. That is the way with business. Sometimes they make money and sometimes they lose. The general average has to be taken spread over a series of years, in calculating the success or failure of any business. The large number of failures indicates that carrying on a business or industry is a difficult matter. If they now get a little encouragement no one will begrudge them the opportunity.

In response to its appeal to Ottawa for a Conciliation Board, the Union was notified yesterday that such could not be authorized unless the council acceded as the second party in the dispute. The council has already signified its attitude in the matter by rejecting the overtures of the Union by vote. A petition is now being circulated by the union asking the council to reconsider its attitude. This petition, it is stated, is being favorably received and has so far met with few refusals to sign.

tributary to the C.P.R. and the C.N.R. put together. It was a larger and better territory. "While the people here were out after business, they were not in opposition to Vancouver. They all wanted Vancouver to grow, for that growth would benefit us. So the development of this country would benefit the south. There was no rivalry. All that was needed was to go out and develop our own territory.

As to the various matters which might be taken up with the government, the delegation would consult together and consider every phase of the situation. What they would impress upon Ottawa was that if they wanted to go out after business it was there to be got. People here, he understood, wanted Ottawa to put on an aggressive campaign. The difficulty was that some men who got into high office tried to thwart the efforts of the people here. They would make it clear, however, that Rupert was not trying to take business from anyone else but simply to develop a business of its own.

Strengthen Stork's Hand
Naturally the people here were ambitious. Ambition led to progress. They would lay the matters before the executive giving legitimate reasons, and no apologies were needed. They did not anticipate that they would come back with anything tangible for they would be told that the matter would receive consideration. "If we advocate what is right and keep on advocating it we are going to get it," the speaker said. It is necessary to go while the House is in session. It is a splendid thing, sending this delegation. It will strengthen the hands of the member.

"It almost seems tragic that after fourteen or fifteen years the spectacle is seen of lots being thrown on the market for a small amount, property which is valuable," said Mr. Pattullo. "I am just as sure of the ultimate value of property in this town as I am of anything. Development cannot be stopped but it can be retarded. To throw that property on the market at such prices and at such a time was most ill-considered, and I intend to tell the government so. It makes a wrong impression. We are not going to Ottawa in a hostile spirit but if we must fight we are going to."

**COPPER MARKET
GETS STRONGER**

Seventeen Cents Now Being Paid and Price May go to Twenty Soon

NEW YORK, March 16.—Copper in good volume is being sold at 17c delivered for domestic wire and brass mills. This in an advance of 4-8c since yesterday and 2c in the last three weeks, being the most rapid rise in the peace time history of the copper industry. Price trend is still upward, with consumers trying to buy July copper at 17c. Few producers are willing to sell beyond June. Main demand at the present time is for April and May. Foreign sales are in fair volume, with aside ship demand New York moderate.

Wire and brass mills are working up to capacity, made possible by present labor supply with orders booked well ahead. One of the most encouraging features of the market is the way in which mills are trying to buy copper at present prices for July and even August shipment, indicating that despite the rise of two points a pound in price during the last three weeks they are expecting considerable further advance.

Wire-mill buying of copper during the last few days has been slightly stronger than by brass mills. Indications are that the industry has about covered its requirements so far as March is concerned, but the way that ultimate consumers have been coming into the market recently points to capacity operation by mills well into summer as normal good orders for summer business come into the market in April and May.

Price of electrolytic copper for domestic shipment is 17 cents a pound delivered to the end of June. The price of Lake copper is 17 cents to the end of May. The price aside ship New York is 16.50 to 17 cents with little available at the lower price. Prices for European destinations are at levels corresponding with 17 1-8 to 17 1-4 cents c.i.f. Hamburg and London, with little copper obtainable at the lower price and some sold at as high as 17 3-8 cents.

TELLS OF STORY OF THE NATION'S SOUL

Sir Campbell Stuart Reads Paper on Canada at Colonial Institute

Sir Campbell Stuart, in a paper on Canada and the Empire before the Royal Colonial Institute, dwelt on the importance of a new country, of its history and records, says the London Times. He suggested that we lack a knowledge of Canada as a whole, and that Canada can guard against the destructive tendency to sectionalism only by the positive constructive idea of the nation.

The history of Canada, he said, is bound up with the history of England and with the history of France. There are hundreds of families in England and in France whose predecessors or connections served in some capacity in Canada. And doubtless they have records that would help to fill out and complete the story of that richly endowed country. No more patriotic service could be rendered to the Empire than the placing of such records at the service of the Canadian government for transcription. At Ottawa today stands a small modest building. It is the Department of Archives, and in it reposes the story of the nation's soul. Here you see the maps of the early pioneers, here tattered flags that tell the tale of other days and other wars, here the priceless documents which in themselves are the birthright of our people. And in a long room are the trophies of more modern days—the grim reminders of those battlefields in Flanders and in France where the young Canada of today fought for the old Empire which she loves so well. It is to this store of treasures which we hope to add from time to time scraps of evidence which will help to fill in the pages which are missing from our nation's history.

SOCIAL EXPERIMENT PROVES A FAILURE

Building Guild in England Comes to Grief, Pays Ten Shillings in Pound

LIVERPOOL, March 15.—The first considerable attempt made under Guild Socialist inspiration, to secure "workers' control" in industry, came to grief—for the time being at any rate—when the Building Guild appeared before a county court judge and obtained his sanction to an arrangement by which its creditors are to get ten shillings in the pound. In some three years the Guild had undertaken contracts of over two millions in value, and its outstanding contracts are now to be carried out with the assistance and under the control of a successful Glasgow contractor, who comes on the scene not without sympathy for the Guild ideal, but with the intention of furnishing "the expert guidance which is necessary to enable such an ideal to become a reality." With no floating capital and unable, therefore, to meet its day-to-day obligations, the Guild had "bittered more than it could chew," and even to compound with the creditors at ten shillings in the pound the first thing its new Godfather had to do was to put down a sum of £50,000. In return he assumed complete control of the Guild's affairs for at least three years, and his nominees, who are to supply the Guild with the necessary directive ability, are to be paid for their work in proportion to the Guild's income.

MILLION DOLLARS FURS IN ONE YEAR

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., March 15.—Trapping and killing of fur bearing animals has become a prosperous industry in this district and last year the total value of pelts sold was \$1,029,750. This total includes the bounty received by local trappers on 44,600 timber and brush wolves. The season's catch was: Mink, 7,000; black bear, 4,000; marten, 2,000; skunk, 2,000; beaver, 3,000; fisher, 1,000; weasel, 25,000; lynx, 1,000; otter, 1,000; silver-fox, 100; cross fox, 250; red fox, 1,000; rals, 12,000; brush wolves, 11,250; timber wolves, 3,350. A bounty of \$40 per pelt is paid for timber wolves and \$20 for brush wolves.
