



City Manager Is Discussed.

A group of businessmen in the south lunched together recently and spent their time discussing the question of employing a city manager to have charge of the affairs of the city. As outlined the scheme was to have a council elected by the people to discuss, direct and control questions of public policy, legislation and finance. In addition to this it was suggested there should be an experienced appointed manager or commissioner to carry out the decisions of the council, to supervise and control administrative detail of all departments and to advise the council on all technical questions and finance.






