### Labor Is Opposing Protection In Britain.

Unqualified opposition to the high tariff policy of Premier Baldwin in Great Britain is being registered by the Labor organizations. Labor has always opposed high protective duties and rightly so. The country grew great under free trade and captured much of the business of the world. It is a great thing for a country to be able to hold its own under most trying conditions, as Britain did in Turkey following the victory over Greece, and yet leave under conditions such as those which obtained when General Sir Charles Harrington withdrew his troops. If there is one man more than another who is deserving of recognition by the British people it wou seem to be the general who carried the dignity of the British flag through such trying conditions and brought it forth unblemished without bloodshed.


